



## DISTRICT NO. 1.

ALBERT H. LITTLE, Prudential Committee.

Teacher for first and second terms, Miss Annie V. Key. The teacher was young and inexperienced and took charge of the school under rather trying circumstances. Defective discipline and irregularity of attendance interfered materially with its usefulness, but those pupils who were constant in their attendance made very good progress in their studies.

The winter term was taught by Miss Susie M. Clifford. Miss Clifford is an excellent regulator and thorough teacher, and a very marked improvement was manifested in the manner and progress of her pupils.

### DISTRICT NO. 2.

CHARLES W. BAILEY, Prudential Committee.

The first and second terms were taught by Miss

Louise M. Pollard who proved to be just the right person in the right place. The winter term was in charge of Miss Almira J. Eaton. Miss Eaton is vigilant and thorough in her method of teaching. Both teachers worked hard for the improvement of their pupils and with good success.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Daniel Nichols, Prudential Committee.

Teacher for first term, Miss Mary Alice Nichols. Miss Nichols was energetic and gave her best efforts for the advancement of her pupils in their various studies, and success crowned her efforts.

Teacher for second term, Miss Mary L. Burnham. The teacher was interested and enjoyed her work, secured the good will of her pupils and succeeded remarkably well for a first attempt at teaching.

### DISTRICT NO. 4.

CHARLES W. BROWN, Prudential Committee.

Teacher, Miss Annie E. George.

The reputation of the teacher is so well known that I need not refer to it in this connection. Suffice it to say that her school ranks high, both as regards discipline and scholarship.

## DISTRICT NO. 5.

Albert G. Rand, Prudential Committee.

Teacher, Miss Ella A. White.

Miss White's work was characterized by thoroughness and devotion to the best interests of her pupils. It was an excellent school in every respect.

#### DISTRICT NO. 6.

SEWELL JOHNSON, Prudential Committee.

Teacher, Miss Emma F. Chase.

Miss Chase, as far as I have been informed, gave satisfaction to the residents of the district, yet there was a general lack of thoroughness in the recitations, which I think is due mainly to a disposition on the part of the pupils to take advantage of the natural kindness of their teacher, and did not apply themselves as closely to their studies as they ought to have done to secure the best results.

#### DISTRICT NO. 7.

EMORY G. EATON, Prudential Committee.

Teacher, Miss Almira J. Eaton.

A guaranty that the best interests of the school will be insured. This school fully sustains its former good standing.

### HIGH SCHOOL.

Principal, Forrest E. Merrill, A. B.

This school is in a flourishing condition. During the past year the Trustees have raised the standard of admission, fixed the per cent. for promotion and graduation and dispensed with the preparatory co urse of study, (previously allowed) fully convinced that it can be pursued to better advantage in the district schools.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead quali fied to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary town officers for

the year ensuing.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the year ensuing.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will

vote to raise to pay town debt and interest.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will

vote to raise for school purposes in addition to what the law requires.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for keeping highways and bridges in repair.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars for the purpose of defraying the expenses incurred in decorating the soldiers' graves on the thirtieth day of May next.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to exempt

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation the Mill and business of the firm of Page & Little, located near the Depot, for a term of three

years.

Article 10. To hear the reports of Auditors and Superinten ling School Committee, and act thereon.



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
