

## To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Libray.

4. To see what action the Town will take relative to the extermination of the gypsy and brown-tail moths.

5. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Memorial day.

6. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for band concerts.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for transportation and placing in position headstones furnished by the Government for deceased soldiers.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the construction and repairs of highways.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# Library Report.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF NICHOLS MEM-ORIAL LIBRARY.

There is very little that is new to report in reference to the library this year. The number of volumes has very materially increased, as is shown by the Librarian's report, and the library has been more extensively used than ever before, the total circulation being 5866 over 5275 last year. The people of the town are more and more appreciating the excellent library facilities offered, and are using the library. This is especially true with the younger portion of the community, who are acquiring the reading habit.

While the great majority of books used are fiction, as is the case in all public libraries, yet there has been, during the year a gratifying growth, in the number of books in other departments, that have been read. This is conclusive evidence that the taste for solid reading is growing and that the library is **con**istering more and more to the liter-, ary needs of its patrons.

The library is especially strong in its department of history, as special carc has been taken for several years to develop this department, so that it should be of the greatest use to the girls and boys of the town in connection with their courses of history in their school work. New libraries the size of this, arc better equipped in this direction.

# **Report of the Board of Health.**

The Board of Health has to report a very satisfactory condition of the public health for the past year. There has been no epidemic of any kind. What contagious cases have occurred have been promptly guarantined and consequently there has been no spread of the disease. There have been an unusual number of deaths from tuberculosis, and attention is again called to the fact that the law now requires that houses in which a tubercular patient has died must be disinfected as in other communicable diseases. People are also requested to notify the board of any cases occurring in their families, and the board will be glad to give them instruction in preventing other members of the family from catching the disease. It is to be remembered that the Board of Health is for the purpose of protecting the general public from disease and it is as much the duty of every other citizen as it is theirs to aid in this matter. It is every citizen's duty to assist in abating nuisances and protecting a quarantine, for it is to every citizen's benefit physically and financially. that the town be kept as healthful as possible.

# **Report of School Board.**

In looking over the year's work we find that on the whole it has been very satisfactory, yet there is still much room for improvement. We hope that more attention will be paid to reading and writing, the teachers bearing in mind that we are not looking for the quantity, but for the quality.

To our system of grading has been added this year the requirement of half-term tests, which will prove very helpful, as it accustoms the pupils to more written work.

Much to our regret the town was deprived this year of the usual aid from the state. This so reduced our funds that we were obliged to shorten the winter term three weeks. But we hope that a portion, at least, of this time can be made up in the spring term.

In No. 1 we have been fortunate in securing the services of Miss Anna Fifield for the year, and the school is in good condition.

In No. 2 Miss Edith Horne taught the spring term, giving place in the fall and winter to Miss Clara Brown. The number of pupils has been unusually large, but good work has been done during the year.

In No. 3 the spring term was taught by Miss Elsie Whippen, but at its close she resigned her position. Miss Marion Clark was engaged for the fall and winter, and the school is in excellent condition.

In No. 4 Miss Etta Currier has taught the three terms and the results of her labor are very gratifying.

In No. 5 the spring term was taught by Miss Mary Cald-

well, and the fall and winter terms by Miss Laura Bartlett of the class of 1907, Sanborn Seminary. Her heart has been in her work and the school is in good condition.

It is hoped that in the future greater effort may be made to bring about more regular attendance of children at school. The attention of parents and guardians is called to Sections 14 and 15, Chapter 93, Public Statutes:—

Section 14. Every person having the custody and control of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, or of a child under the age of sixteen years who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, residing in a school district in which a public school is annually taught, shall cause such child to attend the public school all the time such school is in session, unless the child shall be excused by the school board of the district because his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school for the period required, or because he was instructed in the English language in a private school approved by the school board for a number of weeks equal to that in which the public school was in session in the common English branches, or, having acquired those branches, in other more advanced studies. Any person who does not comply with the requirements of this section shall be fined ten dollars for the first offense, and twenty dollars for every subsequent offense, for the use of the district.

Section 15. The state superintendent of public instruction shall have authority to enforce the laws relating to attendance at school and the employment of minors, and, for this purpose, he and any deputy appointed by him shall be vested with the powers given by law to truant officers when authorized by school boards to enforce the laws relating to attendance at school and the employment of children. And the expenses necessarily incurred by the state superintendent in such enforcement shall be paid, as audited and allowed by the governor and council.
