

## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Merrimack in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Merrimack on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' expenses.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for election and registration.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the overseer of the poor.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the town hall and other buildings.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department, including forest fires.
10. To see if the town will vote to accept the collection of antiques and miniature collection of Harry Watkins and preserve them in the Public Library, Lowell Memorial Building or some other fireproof public building.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 (One Hundred Dollars) to be used toward the eradication of poison ivy on the public grounds and road sides.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department.
13. To see if the town will determine the compensation of all labor and trucks employed by the town, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oil to be used on town roads.
16. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid on class 5 highways. If accepted, the town must raise and appropriate the sum of \$981.96 and the state will contribute \$3,927.82.
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow or take any action thereto.
18. To see if the town will vote to accept cemetery trust funds, or take any action relating thereto.
19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the following roads: underpass at Reed's Ferry under the B. & M. Railroad, and the road known as the Grader Road.
20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$152.12 (1/100th of one percent of the town's valuation based on the 1946 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.
21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town library.
23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the town poor including aid to soldiers.
24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance.

25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.

27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

28. To see if the town will vote to acquire from the International Shoe Company, a tract of land on McElwain Street, in the rear of the Town Hall, for the erection of a building to be used for the storage of town equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

29. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes or take any action relating thereto.

30. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

31. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

To see if the school district will nominate and elect a committee of 7 (seven); (a representative of the School Board, a representative of McGaw Trustees, the Superintendent of Schools, the Headmaster, and three other citizens) to act as a planning committee who would make recommendations as to the advisability of erecting a 12-graded consolidated school for the Town of Merrimack.

12. To see if the school district will authorize the school board to make application for and accept any loan or grant for the preparation of plans and specifications for a new consolidated school building.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 19, 1947

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District  
of Merrimack:

I herewith submit my first report as superintendent  
of your schools.

The problems of operation stand out most prominently. Crowded conditions continue and appear likely to become worse. At Thornton's Ferry the lower grade group was so over crowded that a change in grouping was made, placing five grades in the upper grade room. At Merrimack Village the lower grade room was so crowded that several children who would be away from home the entire day were transferred to Reed's Ferry. All rooms are used nearly to the limit of their capacity. It is not news for me to say that No. 12 at South Merrimack is an unsatisfactory building. Yet its present condition is a compliment to the community cooperation which has existed this year.

In the face of a teacher shortage that has found no real relief we have been fortunate to discover some talent that had been overlooked. Our hope is that such community cooperation and remuneration may be available as to attract the good teacher to stay with us.

I am grateful to all who have showed a desire to achieve the highest welfare of the children. With such an aim we can find common ground on which to work together.
