## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money, including that required by law, the town will raise and appropriate for building and repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the repair and painting of the East Sullivan Bridge.

5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$330.23 for town road aid. The state's share to be \$2,201.56.

6. To see if the town will raise or borrow and appropriate any money for the purchase or hire of equipment for use on the highways or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves of residents that are buried in town.

8. To see what sum of money including that required by law, the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the public library.

9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for a memorial or honor roll, for veterans or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$23.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Company, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for other fire protection.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the aid of the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, N. H., or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

17. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by tax deed by private sale.

18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to help stamp out the white pine blister rust, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$148.00 for street lights, or take any action relating thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to repair the town hall, foundations and floors or take any action relating thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the town hall insurance.

22. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action relating thereto.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

The condition of the school buildings of Sullivan has changed markedly since a year ago when the school district voted a sum of money to repaint and repair both buildings. The school board worked out a complete repair schedule and asked for bids on the work. Very good prices were obtained and the following work was completed on the schools:

### CENTER SULLIVAN SCHOOL

Wash classroom walls and ceiling.

Remove all loose paint.

Paint ceiling two coats flat white.

Paint walls 1 coat flat, 1 coat semi-gloss, color light green.

Paint all trim two coats.

#### Hallway work:

Remove all plaster on ceiling and walls and replace with plywood, painted three coats.

Remove all flooring, replace with fir flooring.

Replace broken panels in front door and strengthen door with a turnbuckle.

#### Storage room:

Repair plaster walls and ceiling, paint two coats.

Repair shelving.

#### Toilet room:

One coat outside white on entire building.

Two coats grey gloss on walls, ceiling, floors.

#### Outside work:

Replace damaged clapboard, nail up loose clapboard.

Repair window screens.

Putty, repair and refit all window sash.

Paint front of school two coats white, other walls one coat white.

Paint all sash two coats green.

Make covers for basement windows.

Chimney:

Rebuild entire chimney.

Contract price \$888.43.

WORK ON EAST SULLIVAN SCHOOL

Wash interior walls and ceiling of classroom.

Paint ceiling two coats flat white.

Paint walls two coats light green.

All trim to be painted two coats.

Toilet room:

Two coats white, final coat gloss.

Storage room:

1 coat flat cream finish.

Exterior:

Paint front of school two coats white.

Paint other walls one coat white.

All trim two coats green.

Repair loose clapboards.

Replace broken clapboards.

Paint flagpole two coats white.

Woodshed:

Paint woodshed two coats white.

Chimney:

Rebuild entire chimney.

Contract price \$437.50.

I am sure that all who visited the schools have been pleased with their improved appearance, both inside and out. Teachers and pupils are both much happier in cleaner, lighter quarters.

Efforts have been made to improve the instructional program by supplying the teachers with new maps, globes, books to stimulate reading and new texts in social studies. The music program has continued successfully and through the voluntary assistance of Miss Hazel Stone, training in home economics has been provided for the girls in grades 6, 7 and 8.

It would be very desirable to provide the pupils of each school with some playground equipment. This would help solve the discipline problem that often arises at recess and also provide pupils with healthful recreation. At the present time, the Sullivan schools are the only ones in the union with no playground equipment.

Teachers in multiple-class schools are no longer being trained in our colleges. I consider the present teachers to be capable and dependable and hope the community has their services in the future.

I have enjoyed working with the Sullivan School Board and the citizens of the community and feel that much good has been accomplished during the past year.

Following is my report concerning Home Economics in the 7th and 8th grades of Sullivan Center School:

For the first half of the school year, a room in my home was converted into a classroom for the purpose of conducting classes in home economics for the girls of the 7th and 8th grades.

Emphasis was placed on becoming familiar with the use of the sewing machine. Simple garments and Christmas gifts were constructed for members of the family, friends, and for the girls themselves. Every item attempted was completely finished before the completion of the course. Gifts were attractively wrapped. A Hallowe'en party was planned and carried out for all four grades of the school. A Christmas party for the girls alone was enjoyed.

The girls have made every effort to use their knowledge of good grooming at all times. They know how to select clothing wisely, dress appropriately on a limited budget, and keep their wardrobe in good condition.

It has been a great pleasure to work with these girls and witness their enthusiasm, and especially fine cooperation.
