

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3 To hear the reports of selectmen and other town officers, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4 To raise and appropriate money for support of town poor.

5 To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of Trunk Line and State Aid roads.

6 To see if the town will vote to raise money sufficient to secure State Aid on State Aid construction.

7 To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building, and repairing highways and bridges.

8 To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.

9 To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

10 To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries in town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

11 To raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the completion of White Pine Blister Rust control.

12 To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

13 To authorize the selectmen to distribute the blanks for inventories at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

14 To see if the town will vote to allow discount for the prepayment of taxes on real estate and personal property and decide the dates and percentage for same.

15 To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

16 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by town through Tax Collector's deeds.

17 To see if the town will vote to hold school meeting under the same head and same day as Town Meeting, the second Tuesday of March 1934 and each year, thereafter.

18 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the gates and bars on the road leading to the John Kelley place so-called, said farm now being owned by Mary A. Yates.

19 To see if the town will vote to pay the town officers the same rate of wages as other town help.

20 To see what sum of money the town will raise to apply on town debt.

21 To see what action the town will take in regard to raising a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

22 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens and School Board of the Warren School District:

I hereby submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

At the request of the writer last spring the department of education of Dartmouth College gave intelligence tests throughout the village school. This has been of value in the attempt to arrive at the possibilities and limitations of the children. Reading tests in the lower grades were also given and classes formed for more reading. The first grade is the best it has been for several years. The fundamentals of arithmetic have been examined by standard tests and remedial work prescribed. Mrs. Marjorie Nicol recently resigned her position at Glencliff and Mrs. Everett Barry was appointed to complete the year.

During the summer through the cooperation of the Superintendent, school nurse and other agencies 9 children were treated at a tonsil clinic. Some of the cases have been running several years.

Since my last report a new Kaustive tank was installed in the village school. At Glencliff a new chimney was made, one side of the building shingled and the school painted inside.

It is my recommendation that the grammar school teacher be designated as principal of the village school and have certain authority to regulate play activities on the school grounds, fire drills, etc., and the opening and closing of school each day. With an electric bell connecting with the other two rooms, more uniformity would be realized throughout the building.

In the fall a very successful rural institute was held by the state board of education and the Pythian Sisters served an unusually fine dinner. The Ladies' Aid is at present serving hot lunches at noon. Both these projects show a splendid interest in the schools of the district.
