REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF LIBRARY.

At the annual town meeting in March, 1896, the following persons were chosen trustees of the Alstead public library: H. A. Lovell, F. J. Marvin, for three years; Rev. W. E. Locke, Mrs. Sarah J. Fish, for two years; Dr. R. F. Oliver, Mrs. Ina Putnam, for one year.

The trustees have holden four meetings during the year, viz: April 8, July 1, September 8 and February 13. At the first meeting H. A. Lovell was chosen chairman and Sarah I. Fish, secretary. At the same meeting a number of books were found in a dilapidated condition. Eighteen of these have been repaired and the remainder laid aside as unfit for use. In a few cases new copies were purchased to replace discarded books. The total number of books now in the library is 516, besides a large number of reports and other books, received from the state and national capitals, which have not been numbered, but will be before a new catalogue is made. Forty-two new books have been purchased during the year and one has been received as a gift from the publisher. The numbers on the books in the library reach 570. This discrepancy is owing to 96 volumes having been lost and discarded from the library since its formation, more than twenty years ago, by a reading club made up of ladies in Alstead village. The library was presented to the town by the club, about eighteen years ago. Several volumes were lost before the present numbering of the books was made about ten years ago. A new catalogue will be made early in the coming year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Under the present law the school year begins with the first of August, but it is thought best to make the usual reports at this time. The year has not been free from unpleasant incidents, yet there has been a good degree of progress. A few schools have suffered from sickness, but not to an unusual degree. Some opportunities have been lost beyond recall, but most have been carefully improved, and there has been much earnest work. Map drawing has received considerable attention, and the specimens that have adorned the walls of some school rooms were worthy of commendation. Special attention has also been given to original and reproduction work, and the progress made by the pupils has been highly satisfactory and encouraging, teaching them not only to express thoughts correctly, but spelling and penmanship as well. Supplementary reading from the best authors has been given a prominent place in school work, thus acquainting the young with the style of successful writers. Year by year the children manifest an increased desire for general reading. A course of study has been prepared by a committee of the county school boards and is now ready for distribution. We feel confident that it will prove a decided help to the cause of education. It reduces the school work to a uniform system, which has been greatly needed.

Teachers should be interested not only in their schools, but in the individual members; assisting and encouraging each in their different aspirations; exercising this interest out of school as well as in, and being especially careful by word and deportment to deserve and hold the respect and confidence of their pupils. Citizens should remember that a good school has an elevating and refining influence in a community, and that they should coöperate with parents and teachers for the success of every effort there made in behalf of the young.

In general the people of Alstead have liberally supported their schools, not only in appropriations, but in friendly support of the means used. A small per cent. only of the towns of the state have longer schools.

Our work must be measured by results; its silent influence will permeate the future far beyond our present line of vision. To pass hasty judgment is often to judge amiss; external views are frequently deceptive; logical conclusions are not drawn from a single premise. The work of our schools cannot be fully measured in the present. The unit of measure should be years, not hours. How many are willing and eager to draw unfavorable conclusions from a single outward circumstance? It may be self interest; it may be prejudice; it may be misunderstanding. How much injury is thus done our common schools, and through them the children of our homes, is a question which may well claim the attention of the thoughtful.

In view of the fact that "the welfare of the whole country is at stake in the education of its children" and that "this government must stand or fall with free schools;" in view of the fact that "upon their education may depend the future success or failure of our children;" and that "there is nothing better done in these United States of America than this work of the teachers among the children," may we not confidently rely upon that steady progress which makes the foundations broader and firmer from year to year.

TRANSPORTATION.

The matter of transportation has probably caused more adverse criticism during the past year than all things else connected with our schools, and it is thought best to make a full statement of the facts.

The law in relation to transportation is in these words,—"They" (the school board) "may use a portion of the school money not exceeding twenty-five per cent. for the purpose of

conveying scholars to and from the schools." The amount used for this purpose is evidently left to the discretion of the school board, as the law specifies no distance, no amount to be used in any given case, and, fortunately,—when we consider our schools and their many needs,—does not require twenty-five per cent. to be used in any case. At the meeting of the school board in April, the matter of transportation was considered, and it was deemed best to adjust the rate,—as nearly as possible,—so that all those conveyed should receive proportionately the same. Children must necessarially live at different distances from school and no rule can be adopted by which exact equality can be secured.

After full consideration it was voted to pay those who carry their own children, only, as follows:

J. L. Nash, three scholars; J. P. Kemp, two scholars; and Frank LaFountain, three scholars; each living about 13/4 miles from school, \$1.00 each per week; and Mr. Barlow, five scholars, living 2½ miles from school, was paid an average of \$1.62½ per week.

Mrs. Messer was employed to take the children from No. 8, or the "Mill" district, for \$2.00 per week; from the family of Geo. Kenney, 2¼ miles, one scholar; D. H. Still, 1¾ miles, two scholars; E. P. Kidder, 1½ miles, one scholar. Of course the two girls living with Mrs. Messer, 1¼ miles, were also carried, but the contract was only for those living 1½ miles or more. All scholars transported from this district were girls.

It has been charged by some that the school board did not act fairly in paying more for carrying the "Mill" district scholars than was paid individuals for conveying their own children. It will be evident to all that it requires more time and effort to collect the scholars from different families than to take one's children from their own door. Furthermore, had each family, living a mile and a half or more from school, been paid separately, the cost could not have been less, nothing would have been saved to individuals or the town. The arrangement was as nearly equal as it could be made.

Again it has been claimed by some that the amount allowed does not pay for the time required to carry their children. The manifest intention of the law is to assist the parents rather than to pay in full; since full payment would discriminate in favor of the child living two miles away, who is carried and against the child living one mile away, who must walk. In view of the evident intent of the law, and feeling that parents should do something for the child, when the towns are doing so much,—the Cheshire County Association of School Boards, after considering the matter at several meetings, adopted the following rule as a recommendation to the several towns.

That no mileage should be paid for scholars living less than one and one-half miles from school, and that others should be paid ten cents per mile for the distance they live beyond that limit. This rule had previously been in successful operation in one of our towns under the direction of one of the leading educators of the state.

The school board have somewhat exceeded these figures, yet they have endeavored to expend the appropriation in a manner equitable to the individual and the public. Why all this discord about minor matters when it only serves to detract from the one great object—the future good of our children. In years to come how trivial will appear those opinions and and prejudices that now bar the way to the best interests of the young. There is a better course than this; there are nobler incentives, and higher plans of action.

We often hear it said that schools do not accomplish what they used to; this tends to discourage pupils. Ex-Minister Phelps says: "For the ordinary work of the world I prefer modern methods to the old." The School Journal says: "The teaching throughout the country is fully twenty-five per cent higher than it was ten years ago." We are brought face to face with new conditions and we must look forward, not backward, in adjusting educational methods to the work in hand. The changed condition of society calls for a change of methods. An education should best serve the time in

which it is to be used. It is true that methods of instruction differ from those of half a century ago—so do the methods in every branch of human industry. All those educated in former generations did not succeed, those educated now may do as well, even better, time only will determine it. It is the opinion of leading educators that the common school was never doing so great a work as at present, and despite all defects, it has done and is doing more for civil and religious liberty than all other forces combined.
