

#### DISTRICT NO. 2.

We have had 25 weeks of school in this district, taught by Mrs. Florrie Locke of South Chatham N. H. Wages of teacher per week including board \$6.50. Paid \$1.50 per week for conveying scholars from Ridge Road, also paid \$1.50 per week for Sadie Eastman's board.

Mrs. Locke is an experienced teacher and gives good satisfaction in her schools.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Whole number of weeks of school 16. First term of 8 weeks taught by Miss Sadie Kimball. Wages including board \$6.00 per week. Second or Fall term also taught by Miss Kimball. Wages \$5.00 per week including board. Length of term 8 weeks.

Miss Kimball had previous experience in teaching, is a High-School

graduate and was well recommended. We consider her a very promising teacher.

In view of the fact that not more than half of the pupils could attend a Winter term, it was deemed advisable to defer this term until a time in the Spring when all the pupils can attend. It is unfortunate for this school that it is so small, as regards numbers. Experience seems to have proved that both teacher and pupils are at a disadvantage in a small school, the teacher losing the inspiration of a larger and interesting school, and the pupils the incentive that numbers and competition produce.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

There were 25 weeks of school in this district during the year.

The summer term was taught by Miss Emma Towle of Fryeburg. Me., Wages of teacher including board \$6.50.

Miss Towle is a teacher of experience and it was a very successful term of school.

Fall term taught by Miss Bessie P. Walker. Wages of teacher including board \$6.50

Miss Walker is a teacher of much experience and one of our best teachers.

Winter term taught by Miss Ethel Guptill of Stow, Me., Wages of teacher including board \$6, 50.

Miss Guptill worked hard in her school and it was a successful term.

#### DISTRICT NO. 5.


