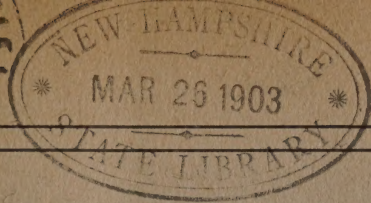

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1903.

To the district and town of Chesterfield:

In submitting to you, this our annual report, we think we can truthfully say that the schools the past year have been very successful. Care has been taken by the school board to secure teachers suitable for the respective schools for which they were hired, and in nearly all the schools the teachers worked for the interest of the pupils.

The school in No. 3 was much broken in the winter term by sickness, which makes the per cent of attendance small.

In all the schools there are many cases where pupils were absent. We hope in all cases as many pupils were present at school as possible, and none stayed at home who could avoid it, as every pupil should be at school every day to make the schools a perfect success. Parents should see that their children are in school every day they are able, and scholars should strive to do their best to make the most of the few short years of their school life.

Through the town we think there has been less fault-finding than there has been some years, but we think if both parents and pupils would strive as hard to do their best as the teachers do, the schools would be better and there would be less fault found.

Scholars should be able to master more fully the more common branches, and when they have mastered them it will be time for the higher branches.

In No. 13, one side of the schoolhouse was shingled from the school money which is usually appropriated from the town's money,

but the school board thought it better to shingle the schoolhouse than wait another year.

Your board thought it best to make a change in the histories, as nearly all the old histories were unfit for use. It was thought best to exchange, which was cheaper than to buy new books, as well as making a change, and we now have a much better history.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Chesterfield, in the county of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 2—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools in addition to what is required by law, or act thereon.

ART. 3—To see what sum of money the town will raise to be worked out on the highways, or act thereon.

ART. 4—To see what sum the town will raise to defray town charges.

ART 5—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to raise and repair the road near the Fullam pond and raise money for the same, or act thereon.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is required by law, or act thereon.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor, or act thereon.

ART. 8—To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen not to appoint a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old road, commencing at a stake and stones set in the fence of Erastus

H. Cobleigh's north line, thence southerly by the Oscar Sargent place to intersection of roads westerly from Ashbel Stoddard's, or act thereon.

ART. 11—To see if the town will accept the sum of two hundred dollars as trust fund, the interest to be used to keep the so called Wheeler cemetery in repair.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to sell or repair the schoolhouse in District No. 7, or act thereon.

ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair the schoolhouse in District No. 5; or act thereon.

1. Do you approve of requiring every person in order to be a voter or eligible to office to be able to read the constitution in the English language and to write, the requirement not to apply to any person who now has the right to vote nor to any person who shall be sixty years of age or upwards on January 1, 1904;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
2. Do you approve of the requirement that captains and subalterns in the militia of the state shall before their nomination and appointment be examined and found duly qualified by an examining board appointed by the governor;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
3. Do you approve of striking out the words "the commissary-general" from the requirement that the secretary of state and the state treasurer and the commissary-general, shall be chosen by the legislature;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
4. Do you approve of empowering the legislature to impose taxes not only upon polls and estates but also upon other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
5. Do you approve of allowing the legislature to give police courts jurisdiction to try and determine, subject to the respondent's right of appeal and trial by jury, criminal cases wherein the punishment is less than imprisonment in the state prison;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?

5. Do you approve of amending the Bill of Rights by striking out the word "evangelical" before the word "principles" and inserting the word "Christian" and striking out the word "Protestant" before the words "teachers of piety, religion and morality" and striking out the word "towns" in two places where the legislature is empowered to authorize "towns, parishes and religious societies" to support and maintain teachers of religion and morality; and striking out the words "and every denomination of Christians" and inserting the words "all religious sects and denominations" where equal protection of the law is assured;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
7. Do you approve of striking out the word "male" before the word "inhabitant" in the clause which provides that every male inhabitant twenty-one years of age (with certain exceptions) shall have a right to vote; which clause is supplemented by the existing provision that every such person shall be considered an inhabitant for the purpose of electing and being elected to office;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
8. Do you approve of granting to the general court all just powers possessed by the state to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, trusts and corporations who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?
9. Do you approve of amending the provision as to representation in the house of representatives by making 800 inhabitants necessary to the election of one representative and 2,400 inhabitants necessary for two representatives and 1,600 necessary for each additional representative; with the proviso that a town, ward, or place having less than 800 inhabitants may send a representative a proportionate part of the time; or that such towns, wards, and places when contiguous may unite to elect a representative if each town

so decides by major vote;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?

10. Do you approve of giving the legislature authority to establish more than one place of public meeting within the limits of each town or ward in the state for the casting of votes and the election of officers under the constitution, and for that purpose to divide any town or ward into voting precincts;—as proposed in the amendment to the constitution?

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
