TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

- To the inhabitants of the town of Farmington qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet in the town hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:
- Article 1. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expenses for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the money received from the state to the current expense fund.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise on a hundred valuation for the repairs and improvements of highways and bridges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire for the purpose of paying the debt of the town for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the public library.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Clarence L. Perkins Post, No. 60, American Legion, to be used for Memorial day purposes May 30, 1934.

- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for parks, playgrounds and skating rink for the ensuing year, said sum to be entrusted to the Farmington Woman's Club to be expended under the supervision of the selectmen.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be applied towards reducing the indebtedness of the town as represented by notes in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,929.50 for state aid construction to be expended on Elm street, in accordance with provisions of Chapter 59, New Hampshire Session Laws of 1933, amending Section 24 of Chapter 84 of the Public Laws. By the acceptance of this article, the state will give in addition \$2,929.00 for this purpose.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to apply the balance left from the Central street bridge appropriation to the sidewalk fund and vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 more for the construction and repairs of a cement sidewalk down South Main street by the High School building.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of a truck snow plow.
- Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collectors' deeds.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to buy a surety bond for its clerk and treasurer.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint the road agent.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to pay a discount of three per cent on all current year property taxes paid on or before August 1, 1934.

- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to increase the auditors' salaries to a fair compensation for the services performed.
- Article 17. To choose a selectman for three years, a town clerk, a town treasurer and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year, and to vote by ballot to see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted in accordance with the law of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

Articles by petition or request appear on the warrant legally posted.

STATEMENT BY SELECTMEN

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAXPAYERS OF FARMINGTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE:

In closing the year just past it is well to review some of the mistakes and accomplishments made, and looking to the future, correct or improve on past experience.

Abnormal conditions due to the follies of the past still prevail. The matter of tax collections upon which the proper function of governmental finance depends is a problem with most of us. The aim of the administration has been to reduce the tax rate and town debt without curtailment of essential expenditures. This program forcefully pursued over a period of time will lead us to a more attractive situation than we are now obliged to face.

The reduction of the town debt of \$9,386.70 was accomplished in spite of the fact the Missouri Pacific R. R. bond carried as an asset of \$2,000.00 defaulted in interest payments and is now listed in the assets as \$320.00, which is the approximate market value as of January 31, 1934, this representing a loss of \$1,680.00.

The notes outstanding of \$28,000.00 being \$2,000.00 less than the previous year, should be considered as a fixed debt and we recommend that they be converted into bonds which would substantially reduce the interest charges and automatically over a period of years erase this item from the account.

In closing, we wish to impress upon every taxpayer that regardless of what efforts may be made to keep within the appropriation by your officers, your tax rate is made at your town meeting and all undue expenditures should be carefully considered if reduction in the tax burden is to be expected.



TO THE CITIZENS OF THE Town of Farmington.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants, duly notified and holden at Farmington on the fourth day of May 1872, the legal voters by major vote and by acclamation, appointed James E. Fernald, John Barker and Charles W. Wingate a Committee, to employ an expert to examine the books and vouchers of the Town, from the beginning of the year 1857 to to the commencement of the financial year March 1, 1872 and 800 Copies of the Report were ordered for distribution.

That Committee employed J. H. Shattuck of Boston, who made a Report quite voluminous the result of which, was that he found due from R. E. Colbath, Town Treasurer, the sum of

At a special Town Meeting of the legal voters of the town of Farmington, duly notified and holden on the 17th day of May, 1873, it was voted to cloose a Town Agent and Geo. L Whitehouse was elected. It was voted to intrust said Agent "to settle or prosecute to final settlement, all claims which the town may have against all parties indebted to said town."

Also it was voted to instruct said Committee and the Selectmen of said town to furnish said Agent all Books, Notes, Receipts, Bonds or other papers or Vouchers which they may have in reference to said claims. In pursuance of the duties of my office as

Town Agent, on the same day of my election, I addressed letters to R. H. Copp, John G, Johnson and R. E. Colbath, in which I said among other things, that, "The object of my present writing is to request your attention to it and to say to you that if you have any explanations to make or any propositions for a settlement to offer I would be very happy to receive them at your earliest convenience." and I added that "to prevent misapprehensions or mistakes I would suggest that any and all communications, should be in writing and that I hoped and trusted they might be able to place those matters in such a shape as to avoid the necessity of resorting to a suit And I will here remark that from the date of my appointment down to the present date, February 4, 1876, I have never received from any of the parties in interest any distinct proposition for a settlement either written or verbal, but on the contrary a constant and determined effort on the part of all, with one solitary exception, to delay and procrastinate in every movement on the part of those parties, against whom suits have been commenced.

Failing to make any settlement, I caused suits to be commenced against Reuben H. Copp and John G. Johnson, actions of assumpsit. I brought actions in this form because it would be less expensive, as in the other method it would be necessary to bring as many suits as there were parties on the bonds; and also because I did not desire to trouble the bondsmen so long as the desired object could be effected without doing so. I was instructed by my counsel that the Statute of Limitation would not apply in these cases. This proved to be a mistake. These actions were entered

at the September Term 1873, and the parties not being able to agree upon a man, the Court appointed Francis A. Faulkner Esq., of Keene, of the firm of Faulkner & Wheeler, an eminent Law Firm of that city. This proved to be an unlucky appointment, inasmuch as it takes two days to come from Keene to Farmington, and the same to return; and several adjournments caused wholly by the fault of the defendents made the hearing expensive. At the earliest convenient time I caused the Auditor to be called out, Dec. 23, 1873, and the parties with their counsel, (Hobbs and Hall for the plffs. and Wheeler and Eastman for the defts.) met at the Selectmen's office in Farmington.

Two days were spent in the hearing, during which time we proceeded to the trial of the case against Mr. Copp. During this hearing the Plffs. claims were all put in and proved. When the defense was called for their counsel stated they were wholly unprepared to proceed; a postponement was asked for, and much against the Plffs. wishes an adjournment was had to Jan. 20, 1874. Fees of Auditor for this hearing. Expenses, \$18.50, 3, 1-2 days 35.00 \$53.50

At the s cond hearing parties appeared as before, Counsel for defense stated that they were still unprepared to go on, and Mr. Wheeler stated that the state of his health was such that he could not, and would not, go on before the sitting of the Court.

The Auditor decided to postpone any further hearing for the present.

At the Feb. term 1874, he made a Report and the case was recommitted for a further hearing.

The Auditor was again called out by the Plffs the

19th of May, the 9th of July and the 28th of July 1874.

The last two hearings were taken up mostly in the Case against Mr. Johnson. Contrary to my expectations this case was broken off very suddenly without being fully tried.

Mr. Faulkner writes me that he "thinks it would be safe to say, that if the defendents had been ready for trial, at the time first appointed for a hearing, at least half of the expense would have been evoided." At the September term of Court 1874, the Auditor made a Report in the Copp case closing as follows, "At the commencement of this action nothing was due from either to the other." In the Johnson case the Report closes in this way—"I find that there was due from the Defendent to the Plffs. at the date of the Writ, on amount of two items allowed by me as above stated the sum of one hundred and thirteen dollars and fifty cents, which the Plaintiffs ought to recover

with interest from that date."

I had expected a very different Report. Although I had discovered a bias as I thought, early in the hearing, in the mind of the Auditor, against the Plffs. in these suits, I did expect a detailed statement of the amounts showing what was allowed or disallowed in each, and also what was barred by Statute of Limitation if any thing.

In this it will be seen that I was much disappointed. I have had a somewnat lengthy corrospondence with Mr. Faulkner from which I infer that the Copp case was decided by him on the ground that all the charges were made more than six years before the date of the writ, and consequently barred by the Statute of Limitation.

I have obtained from Mr. Faulkner full notes of the testimony as taken by him at the hearing. I am enabled to form an opinion from an examination of his notes what charges he would have allowed or disallow ed in the Specifications of the Plffs if the Statute of Limitation had not come in. Without going into a lengthy statement I will state the items that would have been allowed in 1859, amount to \$10.00 1861, \$185.39 1863, \$658.70 1864, \$14711.26 1865, \$1000.00 1866, \$1245.05. Amounting in the whole to \$17810 40. I cannot state with quite as much certainty the amount he would have allowed on Mr. Copp's Offset, perhaps about \$2500.

I will now give a statement of the state of the Town Treasury, as given by Messrs Copp and Johnson, at the end of each year in the final settlement of their accounts. Mr. Copp was Treasurer for nine years.

The first five years according to his account, he

paid out more money than he received, as follows:-In 1855, \$143.35. In 1859, \$30.45. In 1860, \$118.00. In 1861, \$67.33. In 1862, \$261.99.

In the year 1863, the year which is the first year Mr. Johnson was Selectman, there seems to have been inaugurated an entire change of programme, for the remaining seven years of their administration. Large balances being reported in the Treasury at the end of each year, amounting to an average of over \$6000 per annum. The town was paying about 8 per ct. interest, and that amount lying on hand would make a loss to the Tax payers, of about \$480.00 per annum.

The balances in the Treasury for the remaining four years of Mr. Copp, were reported to be in 1863, \$6209.29. In 1864, \$4063.05. In 1865, \$8538.38 In 1866, \$8666.69. In Mr. Johnson's first year 1867, he returns a balance in the Treasury of \$6654.74. In 1868, \$6871.34. In 1869, \$5737.78. These balances in the Treasury, are presumed to be cash or current funds which may be applied to the payment of debts. And while lying idle in the Treasury, are a dead loss to the Tax Payers, to the extent of the amount of the interest on those sums which the town may have to pay.

Mr. Copp was inquired of about these matters, Hereplied that in the first year 1863, he was not aware that of the sum of \$6209.29, there was a single dollar in the Treasury. He was asked to explain, which he did by saying that he had a large unsettled account with Mr. Lyman, that he had made Deposits in the Bank, that he had drawn out funds as he needed it that there was a dispute as to the amount due, and that he did not get a settlement for three years, and

until about a year after he, (Copp) went out of office, near the end of Johnson's first year as Treasurer, that Mr. Lyman wrote him a curious, confidential letter, which he read to the Court on the trial, in which Mr. Lyman said, I send you the papers, do with them as you think is right. If you think I ought to pay you \$200. or \$300. or even \$500. interest, say so, and I will allow it. I leave it altogether to you, strike the balance as you think is right.

Mr. Copp says he has no recollection what the papers were. Thinks they may have been checks or reccipts Has none of the papers now and no minutes of them; thinks he may have returned them to Mr. Lyman but don't remember, he says he took the papers looked them over, struck a balance, then thought it was more than Mr. Lyman was owing him by from 200 to 300 dolls. and that then the sum was according to his bestrecollections 3000 or 4000 dolls. He says that then he took that and other money, in March, at the end of Mr. Johnson's first year, and paid him the balance in the Treasury 8656.69 dolls. We will now go back to Mar. 7, 1864 when he made up his account.

He says not being able to get a settlement with Mr. Lyman he set down and made up his account, charging what he paid out, and crediting what he received, and that he found himself owing the town, the balunce as stated in the town account at that time, \$6209.29, a large portion of that sum, as he supposes, was in the hands of Mr. Lyman, and at each succeeding annual settlement of the accounts, he made them up in the same way.

I will call your attention to the noted 25.000 dollers which first appeared to the public eye when it

became necessary for Mr. Copp to file his offset with the Clerk of the Court. The filing reads as follows—"Paid J. G. Johnson Town Treasurer, as by his receipt, Mar. 1867 \$ 25000.00." I never saw or heard of it before I found it as above in the setoff on the files of the Court. It was late in the hearing before this was produced, and Mr. Copp said the reason he never showed it to me was because he did not think of it.

Here is a copy of it.

\$ 25452.82 "Farmington March 5, 1868."

"Received of Reuben H. Copp, twenty-five thousand four hundred and fifty-two dollars eightytwo cents, in full for balance remaining in the Treasury of the Town of Farmington Mar. 12, 1867."

John G. Johnson, Treasurer.

Copp's account was made up Mar. 7, 1867. Town Meeting was Mar. 12, Johnson was appointed Treasurer Mar. 16, 1867, and filed his bond Mar. 23, 1867

Copp is presumed to have acted as Treasurer until Johnson filed his bond. Late in the trial Copp found and produced a memorandum book in which were entered about 100 vouchers for various sums paid and also two charges for Cash, one of 2000 and the other 6000 dolls. These various sums added up amount to the sum named in the foregoing receipt \$25452.82

These vouchers are for monies paid out by Copp and passed over to Johnson; about 8000 dolls. as appears from the dates must have been paid, and in Copp's hands before the time he made up his account the 7, of March 1867, and the balance before he passed the books over to Johnson.

They are of various amounts from small up to 5000 dolls. Fifty-six in number were paid before the last account made up by Copp and they are all entered in Johnson's account and on file.

To balance this large lot of papers Copp received various sums as follows;—

and as entered upon the books balance the foregoing receipt.

There is nothing upon the books, or any other evidence except Copp's, to show any thing about the 3000 or 4000 dolls. which Mr. Copp says he collected of Lyman, and whatever sum he did collect of Lyman at that time remained in his, Copp's hands, and he is

accountable for it.

The account against Mr. Johnson is much more simple and less complicated than that against Mr. Copp. The charges are few and susceptible of proof and the case could be soon tried whenever the parties are inclined to attend to it. Undoubtly the town is the loser to the amount claimed, and either Mr. Johnson or some other parties are liable. The case was not fully tried; the last day of the hearing, when I had been led to suppose the defts, intended to occupy several days; the counsel of both parties and the Auditor met at the tavern, took dinner, attended at the place of hearing, talked over both cases some, and without consulting me adjourned without day, and went off in the afternoon train. Why they did so I did not know then, and do not know now.

The suit against Mr. Johnson, was against him as "acting Treasurer of the town of Farmington." The last charge against him of \$3461.17, should not have been in this suit because it was against him as Collector of Taxes. There was no evidence offered on this charge and I doubt whether the Auditor knew there was such a charge made. The general impression among members of the bar is, that these suits were improperly brought. They should have been brought upon the bonds. These suits involve large transactions; in the case of Copp to the amount of over \$450,000 and in Johnson's case of over \$250,000.

It was more convenient to investigate these matters in these suits than in suits upon the bonds.

Now that we have done that, whenever we are able to get a trial they will not be very long. About all the expense of preparation is done. I may be permitted to say here that in commencing suits I did so upon my own responsibility and with the advice of counsel; and that I acted honestly and I am bound to believe that my counsel did in so doing.

From the facts elicited in this trial, I am now satisfied that as these suits were brought the Statute of Limitation applies, at the end of six years.

Suits on bonds are safe for twenty years. Permit me to say here, that the Statute of Limitation never did and never will pay or discharge an honest debt.

I have caused suits to be commenced upon the bonds; first against Mr. Johnson as Collector, in which J. O. Nute and P. W. Horne, are his bondsmen. Second against Mr. Johnson as Treasurer, in the year 1867, in which Levi Pearl and John H. Hurd are bondsmen. Third against Mr. Copp as Treasurer for the years 1864 & 1865, in which Levi Pearl and Josiah B. Edgerly, are bondsmen.

Suits may hereafter be brought for the years 1861, 1863 & 1866 against Mr. Copp and for the years 1868 & 1869, against Mr. Johnson, if desirable to do so.

I will here remark that in the year 1855 the receipts into the Treasury were \$10661.39 and he, Copp gave no bond. In the year 1858 the receipts were about 12.000 dolls. and Mr. Plummer gave bonds in the sum of 20.000 dolls. In 1859 when Mr. Copp came in again the bond was reduced to 10.000 dolls. and although the receipts in some years amounted to nearly 100.000 dolls. Until 1865 the bonds remained at 10.000, in that year it was increased to 20.000 dolls. and in 1866 no bond was given. Of course we cannot recover in any one year any more than the amount of the bond in suits upon the bond.

In the prosecution of these suits I have met with a constant and determined effort on the part of the defts. and their counsel to produce delay, and all the legal obstacles which they, with counsel skilled in such matters, could interpose, have been, to keep off an investigation. After having successfully removed all legal objections I supposed I was in a fair way to try the case against Johnson as Collector; and before proceeding to the history of this case permit me to state how and what is the foundation of this suit.

Mr. Copp was Selectman and Treasurer in the years 1859 '60 '61 '62 '63 '64 '65 & '66. Mr. Johnson was Selectman in 1863 '64 '65 & '66 and Selectman and Treasurer 1867 '68 & '69. In all those years warrants were made out and recorded except the year 1864. Now in the year 1864 the taxes were duly assessed. The Town Tax was 312767.37, Precinct tax \$627.41, District No. 3 \$332.38 amounting to \$13727.16. During that year 5360 dolls. was paid on the Town Tax into the Treasury. In the year 1865 4906 dolls, was also paid on the lown Tax into the Treasury which left still due on these lists the sum of \$3561,16 which was in the settlement of March 1865; of this sum, which would with interest added amount now to more than 7000 dolls, the town has received nothing; and what is perhaps the worst feature when Mr. Johnson went out of office as Treasurer, Chas. W. Talpey and Albert W. Dame as selectmen of Farmington made abatements on Mr. Johnson's lists, in District No. 3, \$63.87, in Precinct Tax \$43.94, Town Tax \$479.83, ammounting to \$587.64 which instead of being allowed to him as it should have been on his Tax List, was allowed him on his

Treasurer's account, which is the same as paying him so much cash. Mr. Shattuck says that he, (Talpey) explains that he erroneously allowed the abatement of \$587.64 made to J. G. Johnson on the Tax Lists for 1864 to be deducted from the balance in the Treasury for 1869. The balances due on these Lists were entered upon and published in Mr. Copp's several accounts as Treasurer and in Mr. Johnson's accounts as Treasurer for the three years that he was Treasurer.

This statement was the same in Mr. Talpeys' account as Treasurer to Mar. 1872 when a credit was made as cash from J. G. Johnson of 2000 dolls. and the entry changed as due on Tax List of 1864, from \$3461.17 to \$1461.17 at which it stands now.

When Mr. Talpey rendered his account for the year 1874 to Mr. Cloutman he returned "Debit \$61950.48 Credits 56,181.09 Bal. in Treasury \$5769.39. Consisting of cash \$3769.39, notes 2000 dolls.

I understand Mr. Cloutman received the cash but did not receive the notes. It was rumored however, and conversations with Mr. Talpey seemed to substantiate the fact that these notes were, one for 500 dolls. which was said to have been subsequently cancelled by Mr. Johnson and another note of 1500 dolls, which was considered of doubtful validity.

For the purpose of ascertaining the truth of this matter I went to the County Records and assertained the note in question which was dated Aug. 30, 1872 for 1500 dolls. and signed by Ira C. Varney, made payable to J. G. Johnson, and endorsed by said Johnson to C. W. Talpey; and that on the 20th of May 1873, said Ira C. Varney made a mortgage deed of his homestead to C. W. Talpey, to secure the pay-

ment of said note. This deed being subject to a prior mortgage to John Barker on which is said to be due some 10 or 1100 dolls. a suit has been commenced and Barker is to take judgement at this Feb. term of the Court.

This being a portion of the claims existing when I was appointed agent, on learning these facts, believeing that Mr. Talpey was liable for this sum of 2000 dolls. I made, on the 5th of Feb., a written demand upon him to pay over to the Treasurer the 2000 dolls. together with interest from the time when he made the credit upon the town book.

Since last March I have had frequent conversations with the present board of Selectmen in relation to these suits; and although the Chairman sometimes expressed an opinion, that he doubted whether we should recover any thing; yet they all decided that the town, having appointed an agent to carry on these suits, they considered that they, the Selectmen, had nothing to do with them.

Having at length removed all legal objections, to going to trial in the suit of Johnson as Collector; Charles G. Conner Esq. of Exeter, having been appointed Referee, I caused a notice to be served upon the defendent, that a hearing would be had, at the office of Joshua G. Hall in Dover, on Saturday Jan. 22, 1876. Fearing that the defense might not be ready I took the liberty to inquire of Mr. Johnson, and was informed by him the day before the hearing that he was ready and anxious to proceed; on taking the train at 7 A. M. for Dover, on the day of the hearing, I was somewhat surprised to see, that Mr. Johnson was accompanied by the whole board of

Selectmen. After my arrival in Dover I was called upon by Mr. Roberts and Mr. Tibbetts, two of the board of Selectmen. Mr. Roberts said to me in substance that they came down at Mr. Johnson's request, (he paying their expenses) and that they were desirous to have these matters settled; it was making great expense to the town. I inquired of him if the Selectmen desired to take charge of these matters and he said no, they only desired to save expense to the town. I replied to him that the parties were all here with the exception of the Referee, who was expected within ten minutes, and that there would be no additional expense to go on with the hearing for that day. Mr. Roberts and Mr. Tibbetts withdrew, the Referee arrived, and after some considerable delay Messrs. Wheeler and Eastman came in, and after discussing some preliminary matters, Mr. Wheeler rose and stated that this case was settled, and produced a paper in his own handwriting as follows;-- "Strafford ss Feb. 1876, Circut Court, Town of Farmington vs John G. Johnson, Parker W. Horne and Jeremy O. Nute In this action it is agreed that the Town of Farmington may take judgment against the defts, at the Sept. Term 1876, for the sum of five hundred dolls., errors excepted This agreement is subject to the approval of the town of Farmington, and to Horne and Nute.

It is furthur agreed that said action be continued to Sept. term without costs to either party."

Signed, John G. Johnson,
James C. Herring, Selectmen
of
Jared P. Tibbetts. Farmington

Now it is proper in this connection to state the fact

that in the end, by this arrangement if this agreement which is conditional, happens to be approved by the town and by Horne and Nute, we get only a judgment against these parties for 500 dolls, with no additional

assurance, that even that sum will be paid.

Our equitable claim, as before stated, is \$3461.17, which with interest added would amount to about 7000 dolls. Abatements have been made to the amount of \$587.64 for which Mr. Johnson has been paid in cash and we are to get a judgment for only 500 dolls, for the whole.

I did not think it proper to accede to this proposition. Motion was made by Plffs. counsel to proceed. Objected to by Defts. Referee decided to proceed with the hearing. Mr. Johnson, having been notified to produce all the papers, books &c. he may have in relation to this case, was called upon to testify, but, as testify; Defts were notified that by a Rule of Court "If either party neglects or refuses to appear before the Referee, or to render an account, or to produce such books and papers and to answer, on oath, such interrogatories relating to the matter in controversy as may be pertinent and materal, the Referee may certify the same to the Court. The Court shall thereupon render judgment against such party, as upon nonsuit or default, and if necessary, cause the damages to be assessed by a jury." The deft, and his counsel refused to proceed and withdrew.

The plffs. proceeded to put in such testimony as they thought their case required; and the Referee is expected to make his report at the term of the

Court now in session.

At the Circuit Court Feb. 21, 1876, the Referee aboved named reported that the Plff. recover the sum of \$3461.16 with interest.
