STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newton qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditors, Road Commissioners, Trustees of Public Library, Constables, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Measurers of Wood and Bark and Surveyors of Lumber, Health Officers, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, for the support and maintenance of the Public Library, and for other necessary charges arising in said town.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25 for Memorial Day purposes.

4. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional convention.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise extra highway money to receive State aid.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the extermination of Brown Tail and Gypsy Moths.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen of said town (or a committee duly elected at said meeting) to contract with the Exeter & Hampton Light Co., or some other company, for electricity to light the streets in said town, agreeable to Section 4, Chap. 40, Public Statutes, and make the necessary appropriations for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to replace the money that was taken from the Lovering Fund for the purpose of furnishing the Library building.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Newton:

We hereby submit the annual report of our schools for the year ending February 15, 1912.

Owing to the epidemic of scarlet fever last spring the schools were badly broken up, and the average attendance smaller than usual.

We have had a new floor laid in the Junction School house, and the building shingled.

Four new blackboards have been placed in this school house, and a like number in the one at Rowe's Corner. Both of these buildings need painting; otherwise not much is needed at present by way of repairs.

The Grammar School during the spring term was under the instruction of Mrs. Ellen E. Wood. Her teaching was very successful and she was greatly beloved by her pupils.

Believing that the work of Miss Josie B. Caler at the Junction School merited promotion, we placed her in charge of the Grammar School in September, and feel that the results have justified our action.

Miss Margaret Ingalls resigned her position at the Village Primary in June, and Miss Faye A. Dame was engaged to take her place in the fall. Miss Dame is an excellent teacher, as regards both scholarship and discipline.

Miss Margaret Abbott has remained at the Rowe's Corner School, and has given us the same faithful, conscientious work as last year.

In September Miss Alma B. Nichols took charge of

the school at the junction where she has won the affection of her pupils, and her work has merited approval.

Mrs. Myra P. Lewis was engaged to teach music in the schools, giving one lesson per week for twenty weeks. Mrs. Lewis will be remembered as Miss Myra Prescott, who formerly taught the Village Primary School.
