#### LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The trustees of the library feel that some progress in the right direction has been made in the past year. The interest in the library and circulation of books seems to be increasing, as our librarian reports a circulation of 2093 books in the past year.

We have seven of the most popular magazines published, which are in constant use and we think are much appreciated by our readers. 37 new books have been added by the trustees with an order in for 11 more.

Through the courtesy of Miss Kingsland, 22 secondhand books have been sent from Lebanon and Portsmouth libraries with a promise of 15 from war libraries. 20 have been donated by Mrs. Martha White.

In October, under the direction of Miss Grace E. Kingsland, Sec. of State Library Commission, our library was given a thorough overhauling; some objectional books culled out and worn-out books discarded.

Our books are now catalogued by the Dewey Card System, which is followed by most up-to-date libraries. This was done with no expense to us except board for the week Miss Kingsland was here. The expense for equipment etc., accounts for not adding more new books this year. We have established two branch libraries, one at Clay Hollow in care of Miss Viverne Gould, and one on the River Road in care of Mrs. Fred Horton. This seems to fill a long-felt need in these places. If it seems desirable we may send books to other sections of the town. It is hoped the same appropriation will be made this year as last. There are at the present time 1413 books on our shelves.

Our librarian, Mrs. J. O. Evans, is always ready to give advice or help in the selection of books.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

To the School Board of Piermont:

It gives me pleasure to submit the following brief report for the past year, for while everything I would like to have done in the schools has not been done I feel that the year has been one of progress.

#### School Work.

The attendance last winter was very poor owing to much sickness and the extreme weather. The total loss of time was large and could not fail to affect the year's work. The attendance this winter has been much better thus far.

Standard Mental Tests have been given this year in all schools of the district and I am glad to say that the results are gratifying. The average score of the sixth grade is above the average score determined by testing a large number of sixth grade children in city schools. The aver age however, for all grades falls somewhat below the standards determined by tests in city schools. This does not mean that our schools are inferior but is due to the fact that city children have about forty weeks of school per year while Piermont children have seldom had more than thirty weeks per year until last year. During the balance of the year I am to give standard tests in spelling, penmanship, silent reading, and arithmetic. By this means I hope to eliminate haphazard judgment of progress, and find out how our children and schools compare with others.

#### Medical Inspection.

Dr. Weaver did the medical inspection of the pupils last year and I believe he was careful and thorough. As the work has not been completed for the present year it is impossible to say what it actually accomplished. I believe that next year we can secure a nurse to do the work for about the same cost, who will do follow up work of visiting parents and talking over the cases of their children who may have defects. If this can be done I believe the inspection will be far more valuable.

#### School Buildings.

The school buildings to-day are all in condition to meet the requirements of the state board. The changes made last summer in lighting, seating, color of walls and ceilings, and in toilet arrangements have made the school rooms much more satisfactory and hygenic. The Clay Hollow school house will need shingling next summer and at least two buildings should be painted.

#### Teachers.

The teachers this year are giving good satisfaction. Most of them are experienced teachers and those with little or no experience are doing good work. The change from two schools to one at the village has proven satisfactory so far. However, should there be any considerable increase in the number of pupils or grades it would not be wise to try to have one teacher do the work. The matter of wages for next year is uncertain. There still is a nation wide shortage of teachers and with the standards of requirements constantly being raised, I do not anticipate any lower wages at present.

I wish to thank the teachers, school board, and citizens, for loyal support and co-operation.
