



# FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Firewards would submit the following report:—

We consider the fire department well organized and in good working condition. The engine is in good working order and all the appurtenances ready for use should there be an alarm of fire. We have six-hundred feet of hose; two-hundred and fifty new, the remainder is in very fair condition. We have had an eave-trough put on the town hall for the purpose of conducting the water from the building to the cistern near the hall. The company have been called out three times during the past year by the alarm of fire, once by fire on the roof of Mrs. Howe's dwelling-house, twice by fire at the Blanket Mills. For repairs and expenses see selectmen's report.

## SCHOOL REPORT.

The Annual Report of Schools in the town of Troy, for the year ending March 1st, 1881, is here respectfully submitted:—

The schools have been mostly under the care of teachers who have taught in town previously, and have become known as efficient public servants. We should be pleased to see each teacher retained in the coming year, as each knows just where to begin and continue the work of last year. We regard the presence of the same teacher in the school-room as equivalent to a week or more of school. The raising of the standard of admission to the grammar school in Dist. No. 1, is advised for the benefit of that school, and that the scholars may enter it at as early an age, the recommendation of last year is renewed: viz. that the appropriation for schools be sufficient to furnish three terms of ten weeks each, to primaries. This would call for an appropriation of \$1250 for the town, and would give longer terms to the districts out of the village, which is as desirable for them as for the primaries in Dist. No. 1. We urgently advise that the vacation be considerably shortened. Shall we not have as many weeks of school as vacation? For statistics of the schools see tables at close.

NORTH PRIMARY.—Miss Lillian A. Wright, Teacher. Great praise is given, no fault is found.

South Primary.—Mrs. Emma E. Maynard, Teacher. A former teacher welcomed back and still approved.

#### DISTRICT NO. 2.

CHARLES D. CLARK, Prudential Committee.

Miss Jennie G. Clark, Teacher. With few scholars she accomplished large results.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

HAMILTON PARKER, Prudential Committee.

Miss Jennie Newton, Teacher. Painstaking and successful in imparting knowledge, but needing a little more nerve to impart pains to unruly boys.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

STILLMAN TAYLOR, Prudential Committee.

Summer Term.—Mrs. Margaret G. Field, Teacher. Lack of order results in lack of study; lack of study, in lack of progress and knowledge of the lessons. There was a marked lack of order in this term of the school.

WINTER TERM.—Miss Mattie B. Clarke, Teacher. This was Miss Clarke's first experience in teaching, and what was lacking in the first term was made up in the second. This teacher possesses excellent qualifications for the school-room.
