## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and take any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class IV and V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$264.84, the State to contribute \$1,765.60.
6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
7. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
8. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.
9. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of trees.

11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Welfare, Old Age Assistance and Soldiers' Aid.

12. To raise and appropriate money for parks and playgrounds, including band concerts.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$116.22 for the White Mountain Region Association.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the benefit of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Hall and Municipal Building.

16. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of the Town Dump.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

18. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

20. To see if the Town will vote to trade the Town Truck for a new one and raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

21. To see if the Town will vote to make renovations and repairs to the Town Hall, designate what repairs and renovations are to be made and raise and appropriate or borrow money for said purpose.

22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase radio equipment for the police department and raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt and enforce any or all of the following regulations:

Paragraph 1 — Fire Prevention

Section. 1. Every dwelling within the town must have a masonry chimney or an approved type metal chimney in good condition.

Section. 2. Every chimney of any type must have a clean-out opening or door at the base for the purpose of cleaning or removing the by-products of burning.

Section 3. All buildings shall be subject to inspection by the members of the Fire Department under the direction of the Fire Chief.

Section 4. All oil burning equipment shall meet the code of the fire underwriters and the State Marshal's Office.

Section 5. Every single family dwelling, both seasonal and permanent, shall have at least two exits, both of which shall be easily accessible, usable and unobstructed, and shall be at opposite ends of the structure.

Section 6. All multiple dwellings shall have at least two exits available and restrictions as designated in Section 5.

Section 7. All vacant or unused buildings shall be kept free of tall grass, bushes and any movable debris which may be declared a fire hazard by the fire chief. Removing such hazards shall be ordered and enforced and at the expense of the owner.

Paragraph 2 — Sanitation

Section 1. All refuse, cans, bottles, boxes or other discarded material of any kind must be dumped at the town dump and not on private, state or federal land. R. S. A. 147: 24 Laws of 1955.

Section 2. No more than two unregistered motor vehicles shall be kept within two hundred feet of any state or town road, unless obscured from public view. R. S. A. 267: 2 Laws of 1955.

Section 3. All sink, bathroom, toilet or privy drains must be underground and lead to a septic tank, cesspool or dry well.

Paragraph 3. Safety

Section 1. No motor vehicle, trailer or attachments thereof shall be parked over night on any public road or in the ditch of any public road.

Section 2. No vehicles of any kind shall be parked at any time on any side walk within the town except for loading or unloading of passengers or cargo.

Section 3. No vehicle shall be driven at a speed in excess of 25 miles per hour between Model Village Cabins, so called, and the Saw Mill of Kenneth Witcher on Route 25C and the home of John Morgan on Route 25.

24. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing beano be adopted in the Town.

25. To see if the Town will vote to apply calcium chloride treatment to the unsurfaced roads in the vicinity of residences, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the maintenance of the Mount Mooselaukee Health Center.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to Petition the New Hampshire Water Resources Board and the Grafton County Soil Conservation District to install an outlet pipe from the dam at site #2 to provide a water supply sufficient to allow the future installation of fire hydrants and to raise and appropriate money for said pipe.

28. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1965, and determine the date and percentage of the same.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

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During the past year there have been no state wide defense drills. However, at least four such drills are scheduled for 1965, two of which will have taken place before Town Meeting.

In the past year the Glencliff Sanatorium has been stocked with fall-out supplies enough for four hundred (400) people.

The Volunteer Fire Department and the Civil Defense Department have each purchased two walkie-talkie radios capable of two-way communication.

Your Civil Defense Director has attended two civil defense meetings, of a state wide nature. It is hoped to have a meeting of this kind in the near future in Warren.

A supply room for the civil defense materials is being constructed in the basement of the town hall.

It is suggested by the State Civil Defense agency that the town consider the purchase of a Base Radio-Transmitter Receiver and at least two mobile units. Our nearest telephone operators are now in Laconia and in case of flood, or other catastrophe, it is possible that telephone communication would not be in working order for some period of time. In such cases the radio units would be indispensable.

The Civil Defense Department is still hoping to obtain a truck of the right size for the two 500 gallon tanks which we have, or a complete tank truck which would also be suitable for use by the fire department.

The Town Dump proved to be the bigger hazard of the year and the Fire Chief and the Selectmen decided the safer course was to close same except at stated times and place; a person there to control the dumping of refuse, and maintain the dump in a suitable condition.

This seemed to work out very well, mainly keeping the fire hazard at a minimum, by keeping the refuse burned as fast as it collected. Many adjacent Towns are having to maintain Dumps in this fashion.

From the experience gained this year on this project it is hoped the same or a better plan may be continued in 1965.

The Dept., along with the Civil Defense Dept., is still most anxiously searching for a Two-way Radio Unit, which would be most useful for both Depts..

The Fire Dept. has had several most successful raffles this year and has raised money which is spent at the discretion of the fire department members. We invite your participation and assistance in all these endeavors.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

---

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy - both industrial and recreational - is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident we can improve our fire record in 1965.

## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

1964

As this year comes to a close it is noted there was a sharp increase in the work load placed upon this department. We are no different than any other department in the nation or in fact the whole world. Reports show that some have had their work increase as much as fifty percent.

To further facilitate the operation of Police Departments in the area, Chief Welch of the Plymouth Police department has been assigned a radio channel with the FCC and has had a base unit installed in the fire station at Plymouth. This set is in service twenty-four hours a day. They also have a set in their car and one at the Police station, plus a walkie talkie. The towns of Campton, Rumney, Wentworth and Holderness have sets in their cars. Bristol, Ashland and Bridgewater also plan to tie in as well as others in the area. It is hoped money can be appropriated for one for this department. This could be used in the operation of the department as well as any emergency be it on a local, state or national level, and also cut down on the telephone toll calls of this office.

Due to the number of requests of non-residents to check on their property, it has been decided to make a routine check once a week. This used to be handled by the State Police once a month, but due to their added work load they had rather the local police handle it. This involves thirty-five miles a week and a minimum of five hours depending on the weather.

The use of the town hall was obtained three times in the past year to sponsor a show. The proceeds were used towards the purchase of equipment.

The financial report of the South Main Water District for 1964 shows a year of low expense and freedom from costly maintenance or repair. Small streams of water are running constantly at the end of each line but the continual rust problem obviously creates a condition which promotes freezing in spite of this precaution. This makes it important that the district install some device to reduce the accumulation of rust in the system. It is hoped to obtain a cost figure for a unit of this type in the near future.

It should be noted that the district has reduced its indebtedness by \$500.00. This is encouraging and should be continued as this will automatically preserve the financial soundness of the district. However, the trouble which was encountered in February of this year will cost about \$450.00 which fortunately we have available in our bank balance.

It may become necessary to replace our storage tank but this should probably be put off as long as prudent in favor of installing some device to control the rust.

Some consideration should be given to increasing the small remuneration allowed to the person who maintains the pumping station. A 50% increase is certainly justified. The voters of the district should also set fixed water rates for less than full time use, such as stores and business establishments.

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

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The following Health Activities were conducted in Warren, for the year 1964—by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health—Public Health Nursing.

Regular monthly pediatric and immunization clinics were held at the Moosilauke Medical Center during the year. These clinics served residents from Warren and eight surrounding communities. Dr. Abbott Winegrad, of the New Hampshire Division of Public Health, Concord, was the attending physician, assisted by the Public Health Nurse and two very faithful committee members, Mrs. Esther Whitcher and Mrs. Ethel Graves.

The following gives the total attendance at these clinics and the activities conducted. Later on in the report it will be broken down to Warren residents only.

### PRESCHOOL DENTAL FLUORINE PROGRAM:

In June, a dental fluorine program was conducted at the Center for preschool children 3-6 years of age, for the towns of Warren and Wentworth.

Each child attending received dental cleaning, four flourine treatments, and instructions on diet and care of the teeth. Literature was available. Mrs. Marjorie Plaisted, Dental Hygienist from the New Hampshire Division of Dental Public Health, serviced the clinic. She was assisted by members of Warren P. T. A. and Wentworth Woman's Club, who were the sponsors of the program. Preliminary arrangements were made by the Public Health Nurse, assisted by members of the above committees. The Nurse, who also attended the clinic several days and spent one day interviewing the mothers of the children attending the program.

The Tuberculin Testing Equipment was loaned to the School Nurse; she tested 32 school children. The reactors were followed through with chest Xrays as recommended.

Follow-up home visits have been made as necessary for instruction. Several Warren residents attended the Mobile Chest Xray Clinic at Plymouth in Septem-

ber and others attended the Chest Clinic of the N. H. Tuberculosis Association held at Plymouth in the spring and fall. Reports of chest Xrays were sent to the parties concerned. Arrangements were made for other patients to have chest Xrays at Glencliff Sanatorium as necessary.

Names of worthy families were submitted to Hanover Social Service for Thanksgiving remembrances and names of children submitted to Plymouth Firemen for their Operation Santa Claus toy remembrances.

My sincerest thanks to the Trustees of the Moosilauke Medical Center for granting the use of the Center for the numerous health activities. We feel that many children and families, not only in Warren, but surrounding communities, have benefited greatly from this service. The families from the towns of Warren and Wentworth are nearly 100% immunized at the present time.

My sincerest thanks to Dr. Abbott Winegrad, who so willingly traveled from Concord each month to service the clinic, also to the two clinic assistants for giving outstanding service to their community, namely Mrs. Esther Witcher and Mrs. Ethel Graves. Words are inadequate to express my thanks to them.

It has been a privilege to use the well equipped medical center during the time it was not in use by a physician. I am glad that the town has now obtained a resident physician. It was a pleasure to meet and work with Dr. Omer Brochu, at the last clinic, and we wish him success in the community.

## COMMENTS

At the 1964 Town Meeting it was suggested that some unused roads be formally discontinued as some of them might become subject to considerable expense in the future. The voters of Warren were in favor of this action in principle but took no action because the complete list of town roads was not available, and it was thought best to wait a year, during which time some research was to be done to determine the location and status of all town roads. This has not been done as yet but will probably be completed this year and an appropriate article inserted in the warrant next year. It certainly was wise to defer action for awhile in the interests of accuracy.

Early in February a piece of valuable fire equipment was added, in the form of a Dodge tank truck. This is in good condition and is at the disposal of the town. The obligations for its use are that the town house and maintain the truck and have it available for forest fires. This agreement is obviously of mutual benefit to Warren and to New Hampshire. This truck, plus the Ford pickup, which was obtained as a Civil Defense item, gives Warren very good fire fighting equipment.

The Town is being asked this year to raise \$150 for Blister Rust control. This is the largest appropriation for this purpose we have been asked to make, but it seems that White Pine represents 70% of all lumber cut in New Hampshire and thus it is to the advantage of our economy to give financial support to the program with the hope that future appropriations will be substantially less.

This year marks the beginning of an extensive flood control project in the form of several dams at various points in the Baker Valley. Site #2 on Berry Brook, above the farm of Claude and Leona Foote will be under construction by mid-summer. The potential value of this dam and storage pool is very great. As a multi-purpose dam it will control flooding from Berry

Brook and can be used for fishing and boating. The opportunity to use this resource is ours if we want to pay for the installation of a suitable pipeline through the dam. This possibility is now being explored and cost estimates should be available by March 9th. We cannot hope to extend the line very far this year but if we can buy the necessary pipe and fittings to a stand-pipe which would have to have its opening in recreational waters, and above the sedimentation area, in future years the town could extend this line to the streets and install hydrants. This would reduce fire insurance rates if the pipe were at least 6 inches in diameter and also increase the fire fighting potential of our fire department.

The budget for our police department should be increased regardless of who serves as chief of police. The town has non-resident property with a total value of \$325,855.00. The owners of this property are entitled to periodic inspections during the winter. The State Police do not perform this service now and most towns recognize this as a legitimate and necessary function of the local police. In addition to this there are the several calls for various purposes plus some highway patrolling at night and on busy week-ends and holidays. The town should also consider a minimum outlay to provide radio communication as has been done in several of our neighboring towns. Local officers are expected to help form a network of police information and communication for the mutual protection of all people and their property.

Under Article #23 appear many proposed ordinances relative to safety and health. These were written by a committee composed of Hazel Bemis, Floyd Ray, Paul Merrill and Theodore Marston. The group consulted the Assistant Planning Director for New Hampshire, Mr. J. Elbert Baril. These are not suggested for any purpose other than to insure health and safety of our citizens and to enhance the appearances of Warren. They are listed here to enable all voters to

consider them prior to Town Meeting. The local laws or ordinances, which are hereby suggested are in three sections as follows:

#### Paragraph 1 — Fire Prevention

Section 1. Every dwelling within the town must have a masonry chimney or an approved type metal chimney in good condition.

Section 2. Every chimney of any type must have a clean-out opening or door at the base for the purpose of cleaning and removing the by-products of burning.

Section 3. All buildings shall be subject to inspection by the members of the Fire Department under the direction of the Fire Chief.

Section 4. All oil burning equipment shall meet the code of the fire underwriters and the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Section 5. Every single family dwelling, both seasonal and permanent, shall have at least two exits, both of which shall be easily accessible, usable and unobstructed, and shall be at opposite ends of the structure.

Section 6. All multiple dwellings shall have at least two exits available from each living unit and under the same conditions and restrictions as designated in Section 5.

Section 7. All vacant or unused buildings shall be kept free of tall grass bushes and any movable debris which may be declared a fire hazard by the fire chief. Removing such hazards shall be ordered and enforced and at the expense of the owner.

#### Paragraph 2 — Sanitation

Section 1. All refuse, cans, bottles, boxes or other discarded material of any kind must be dumped at the town dump and not on private, state or federal land. R. S. A. 147:24. Laws of 1955.

Section 2. No more than two unregistered motor vehicles shall be kept within two hundred feet of any state or town road, unless obscured from public view. R. S. A. 267:2. Laws of 1955.

Section 3. All sink, bathroom, toilet or privy drains must be underground and lead to a septic tank, cesspool or dry well.

### Paragraph 3. — Safety

Section 1. No motor vehicle, trailer or attachments thereof shall be parked over night on any public road or in the ditch of any public road.

Section 2. No vehicles of any kind shall be parked at any time on any side walk within the town except for loading or unloading of passengers or cargo.

Section 3. No vehicle shall be driven at a speed in excess of 25 miles per hour between Model Village Cabins, so-called, and the Saw Mill of Kenneth Whitcher on Route 25C and the home of John Morgan on Route 25.

These will be so arranged in the Warrant as to make it possible to consider each section separately if desired.

The possible purchase of a new truck and renovations to the Town Hall represent major investments this year. The town's only indebtedness is the T. R. A. note, on which only a small amount is paid from taxes, and so it would seem financially sound to pay some of the cost from this year's taxes and borrow the balance. The truck should be traded this year and we should follow the recommendations of our Town Hall Committee, replacing the floor and ceiling plus putting in water and flush toilets. The estimate given for this work including labor, and materials is \$4,500.00. This figure is based upon the use of local labor and the purchase of materials at near wholesale prices.

Your school study committee hopes to have a plan for a Cooperative School, grades 7-12 ready for a vote sometime in May. It is sincerely hoped that all voters, will seek all the information possible from the committee, give it careful consideration and then vote according to what they believe is best for the Youth of Warren in the years ahead. This could well be a year of great decisions in the educational future of Warren.

## STATUS OF THE BAKER RIVER WATERSHED PROJECT AFFECTING THE TOWN OF WARREN

The complete Baker River plan, as developed by the sponsors of the project, was approved by Congress in March, 1964. Since that time, the U. S. Soil Conservation Service has established a project office in Plymouth, New Hampshire, which will handle the engineering phases of the project.

The overall project plans call for 14 man-made dams, creating lakes ranging in size from 5 to 105 acres, for flood prevention or multi-purpose development. Four (4) of these dams are located in Warren.

**SITE #1.** This site is located on the main branch of the Baker River about three miles northeast of Warren. The detailed topographic survey of the site has been completed, but no completed design has been developed as yet. A final design cannot be developed until a foundation investigation has been completed. This is scheduled for this summer (1965).

**SITE #2** This site is located on Berry Brook about 1 mile north of Warren along highway #25. All the detailed surveys and foundation investigations are completed. The final design is progressing and is approximately 75% completed. Easements and rights-of-ways are about to be obtained from the landowners involved. It would appear that a contract could be let this Spring and the dam completed by the Fall. This site will have a 36 acre lake, which could be used to supply water for a fire hydrant system in the village.

SITE #3. This site is located at the confluence of Ore Hill Brook and Black Brook, which is one-half mile northwest of Warren on highway 25c. This is planned as a dry dam, no permanent pool created. This site isn't sheduled for construction until 1968, so no design surveys have been made.

SITE #4. This site is on Patch Brook in the White Mountain National Forest about one mile east of Warren. Detailed surveys have been completed and the foundation investigations will be done in the Spring. No design work has been done to date.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Warren qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 6th day of March 1965, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) in payment for use of the lunchroom.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars \$400.00 for the support of the school lunch program.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to apply the balance received from the 1964 Sweepstake Fund (\$823.64) to the support of the school lunch program.

12. To see if the district will vote to establish the policy that the school board may require a pupil to walk a distance, not greater than one-half mile, to a regularly established transportation route, or to the school building.

13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## 1964-1965

Mr. John Carroll was named principal of the Warren School, taking over the duties in September vacated by the resignation of Raymond Burton, who was elected principal of a school in Andover, New Hampshire.

Mr. Peter Thomson of Orford, N. H., was employed to teach in grades seven and eight. Mr. Thomson graduated from Plymouth State College, Class of 1963, receiving a B. Ed. degree.

It would seem appropriate that the thesis for a concluding report, as your superintendent of schools, be "A Summary of the Profile of the Superintendency".

In this 1964-65 school year, schools are "at the center of the vital currents of community life". They are touched by forces operating throughout the nation. They must move along through time adding new ideas and discarding obsolete practices in order to keep in tune with the attitudes, beliefs, activities, and hopes of the American people. As America changed from a political experiment in a remote world frontier to the most powerful industrial nation in the world, the school changed, too. The demands upon the school changed, the school's methods changed, the number and types of its pupils changed—only those vital elements which withstood the test of growth have survived. As a whole, the school has become a more comprehensive, an increasingly effective, and a clearly essential social institution.

It is clear that many of the stereotypes of superintendents are not true, that the cliches do not hold up when the facts are known. Much of what has been discovered should be reassuring to the people of America.

The school administrator of today has far more preparation for his job than did the school administrator of 30 or 40 years ago. His undergraduate schooling is of better quality and has greater depth of scholar-

ship. Possibly of still greater significance—he can be characterized as being ON THE MARCH with a courageous determination to lift the profession of school administration to a status consistent with its responsibilities and professional complexities.

The operation of a modern school system is a complex and intricate endeavor. “The truly successful superintendent serves as the quarterback of a staff team. Sometimes he runs with the ball; sometimes he blocks for others; at other times he may be a line backer or a lone safety. Of course, the superintendent’s signals are called in huddle where his colleagues may question his judgment or he can seek advice before the new play gets under way.”

We think often of the NECESSITY of education. But, too often, we fail to give attention to the IMPORTANCE of education. It has often been said that “education is the ultimate weapon of freedom”. If our system of unfettered education were installed in Russia, communist rule could not survive. We are in a great, long-range struggle to determine whether our free society shall survive. In this struggle, the basic source of our strength lies in the education of our people.

We must provide not only more education for more children; we must be sure to identify early and guide the special talents of EACH child, so that each may make the most of his or her abilities, whatever these may be, both for individual achievement and for the progress of our society.

The responsibility for advancing and improving our educational system falls heavily upon the administrator, but it also falls upon every citizen.

In helping our citizens to appreciate this responsibility, our schools might well consider teaching the SUBJECT of EDUCATION to our children, as a part of their basic course of study.

However long the path may be—whatever the tensions of the day and hour—we shall remain confident and strong if we cherish knowledge as both a blessing and as the ultimate weapon of free men.

In conclusion, I wish to express again the pleasure I have enjoyed in the challenges which have been experienced in endeavoring to improve the educational system in this supervisory union.

I do wish, at this time, to pay special tribute to the loyal members of the school board with whom I have been privileged to work, from the first members: Mrs. Helen Evans, Mrs. India Lupien, and the late Leon Gould; to, and including the late Leon Gould; to, and including, your present board members.

I would also express my gratitude to Mrs. Evans and to Mrs. Barbara Pike for being a valuable part of the Warren School system during the eighteen years I have supervised the school; Mrs. Evans first as board member, then as teacher since 1950, and Mrs. Pike continuously as a teacher.

A note of appreciation also to the Warren P. T. A. for its years of support to the lunch program and other activities.

I hope for my successor, the continued interest and support of the board members; the loyalty and cooperation of the teachers, each of which has made my administration a pleasant task.

The school, as a community institution, is more than a matter of organization and financing, or a collection of buildings, teachers, and pupils. Its place in the community is that which all of the people, including its own leadership, conceive it to be. It should be an integral part of all community activity.
