**State of New Hampshire.**

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To the inhabitants of the town of Wolfeborough qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Brewster Memorial Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- “ 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- “ 3. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- “ 4. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- “ 5. To choose a Collector of Taxes and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- “ 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town expenses. *2600*
- “ 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on its indebtedness. *4000*
- “ 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads the past winter. *705*
- “ 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the highways; also to see what part of said amount shall be raised in money to operate the road machine, for the ensuing year. *2500* *400 road machine*
- “ 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay to James R. Newell Post No. 61, G. A. R. of said town to assist in defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of deceased soldiers and other necessary expenses of Memorial Day, May 30, 1890. *50*
- “ 11. To see if the town will vote to pay for the Memorial Tablet in the Brewster Memorial Hall. *215*
- “ 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on Water Bonds and incidental expenses in maintaining the Water Works of said town for the ensuing year. *800*
- “ 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to complete the Water Works in said town by issuing bonds redeemable in ten years and payable within thirty years at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent. per annum exempt from taxation. *50000*

- “ 14. To see if the town will vote to extend the Water Works through the village of South Wolfeborough and raise money for the same by issuing bonds redeemable in ten years and payable within thirty years at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent. per annum exempt from taxation. *1000000*
- “ 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay each fireman legally returned for the year 1890 in addition to that prescribed by law. *5 each*
- “ 16. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for ten years the proposed Box Factory, Mills and Machinery of Libby & Varney.
- “ 17. To see if the town will vote to dispose of the “Old Town House” and in what manner.
- “ 18. To see if the town will vote to adopt a Town Seal.
- “ 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen if they think proper to settle the appeal case for land damages on Railroad Avenue, of Levi T. Haley vs. Wolfeborough.
- “ 20. To see if the town will vote to appoint three appraisers to re-appraise the real estate of the town in the month of September next. *H. Rust Jasper Warren*
- “ 21. To see if the town will vote to appoint an agent or agents to prosecute the illegal sale of intoxicants within the town.
- “ 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## TO THE CITIZENS OF WOLFEBORO':—

Our schools during the greater part of the past year have made a marked degree of improvement. Owing to prevailing influences the attendance for the last term of the year was very much affected; but taking the school year as a whole we consider it quite successful. We have made a speciality in regard to the employment of teachers for the different schools. The first thing as regards teachers qualifications is, that they shall be of good moral character. An immoral teacher is a curse to every school instead of being a benefit to it. A teacher that will swear; drink spiritous liquors, play at cards, or is in any way immoral is not the person to whom you should send your child for instruction. A child should be learned good morals, and habits as well as taught out of text-books. We have tried very hard to furnish teachers who were best suited for the different schools. Nearly all of the teachers employed in town during the past year have had more or less experience in teaching. Quite a number of them having taught for years. The selection of teachers is of the greatest importance to the welfare of our schools and should be made with due caution, and never without a full knowledge of their experience and qualifications. We can honestly say, that every teacher who has taught school in town for the past year has proved by being mentally examined, that they were qualified, in that respect; to teach such schools as were assigned to them to teach. To discipline a school correctly is one of the principal qualifications that a teacher should possess. A teacher may be qualified in regard to school work in many respects, but unless he or she is able to maintain good order in or out of the school room, the work simply amounts to nothing. We wish to impress this thought, upon the mind of every person in town or out of town, who henceforward apply to us for a position as a teacher. One great drawback to the welfare of schools is the lack on the part of parents to co-operate with teachers in their school-work. Parents should visit the schools oftener and see for themselves what kind of work is being done. By so doing it not only gives the teacher renewed vigor to proceed with the work, but also gives the scholars more confidence in their teacher. Wherever the scholars become interested in their work, nine times out of ten, there will be good schools. Another drawback to school-work, is the too often irregular attendance. What advancement can scholars make who go to school one day in the week and stay out four, or even three days? We will answer this question by saying that they will not learn scarcely anything except mischief. In such cases they are

more apt to learn the latter than the former. Such scholars are not apt to study much at home, and thus lose nearly all interest in their studies. Being absent so much they fall behind their classes, and don't seem to care whether school keeps or not. Of course we cannot expect much else. The greatest misfortune which any community suffers may be traced to ignorance, that is to say uneducated people. In proportion as schools are fostered, and increase in usefulness the intelligence and happiness of the people are advanced, and lawlessness, intemperance and crime and the cost of courts are lessened. Reviewing the last two sentences over carefully and considering the ideas stated in them, in a common-sense light, the question arises, will you give your children an education or will you not? A great help to parents of not abundant means who wish to give their children an education, will be the furnishing of free text-books. Considering the many opportunities for an education, it seems too bad to let even one child grow up without giving it one, or at least endeavoring to give it one.
