REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

It gives us pleasure to assure the patrons of our schools that we find much to commend in the results of the past year. With possibly one exception, the work accomplished has been quite satisfactory. The school board has been fortunate in securing teachers well suited to the positions they have occupied, and in nearly every instance they have been faithful, earnest and efficient.

There has been less friction than usual in the work, and with few exceptions the schools have been commendably supported by the people. Teachers should invite parents and others interested, to become more frequent visitors. Special effort on their part would be productive of immediate good. There should be more familiarity with present methods; for those only who see the school as it is can justly censure or commend.

At present the greatest obstacle to success is *irregular attendance*, and that is confined to a limited number of families. In a recent report of the superintendent of public instruction, the following points are worthy of thought: "Local sentiment largely determines regular attendance. Most parents desire the education of their children without regard to law, but a few still neglect and ignore the privileges and advantages of free schools. For such there must be a compulsory law, and the demand for an amendment increasing its scope is imperative. Towns should immediately make adequate by-laws to accomplish the desired result."

Of the few to whom the above applies, we ask: Does your child attend school every day when possible? Is the

call for absence reasonably imperative? The public is probably paying ten cents per day for instructing that child—whether present or absent it costs the same. The state undertakes to educate the young that they may become better citizens, and every day when a pupil is absent, something is taken from the public and no equivalent rendered. Is it a fair and honest transaction? But far above this loss to the public is the loss to the child. A lost day never returns, but it leaves an indelible impression upon the mind of the loser which will inevitably be regretted when too late to be retrieved. Parents, do you realize the fearful waste that each passing year records? Let the winter term of No. 13 be an example of promptness; there was not an instance of absence or tardiness.

The schoolhouse in No. 6 needs new floor timbers, and several others need some repairs. A small sum expended now would be in the line of economy.

We have introduced new language books and grammars the past year, a much needed improvement. The admirable method of the new books has aroused a gratifying interest in what is often considered a dry study.

It is encouraging to note that the percentage of attendance throughout the state is gradually increasing; the people are giving more attention to educational matters, and we should be careful that the children of this town have their full share in the fruits of an educational awakening.

It is within our power to increase the efficiency of our schools without increasing their cost. It can be done by a thorough unity of purpose and action. Let every unjust criticism be withheld; every pupil be constant in attendance, and every parent familiar with schoolroom work, lending the moral force of their approval to all worthy means employed, and we should hear little of the complaint that schools are not rendering an equivalent for the amount expended.

The degree of success or failure is frequently determined by the degree of coöperation. Failure does not result so

much from the system employed, as from its indifferent support or overt opposition. The system itself may be defective and may sadly need revision, as we have previously suggested, but it is the best we now have and as such should be supported with a zeal that will overcome defects. We look to the law-making power to remedy imperfections, and to the people to wrest from present conditions the best they will afford.

It is desirable that a law providing for state aid to schools be adopted by the legislature. Rural communities have given many of their best young men and women to help build up the enterprise and wealth of cities, and it is but just that they in turn should contribute of their wealth to sustain in country towns a high standard of schools, and thus more nearly maintain the principle of equal advantages for all.
