Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, Hon. George E. Hutchins, March 25, 1907.

Gentlemen of the City Council :

We are assembled here again to-day to take the oath of office and to commence upon the duties of another year. We should strive to work for the best interests of our growing city, administering its affairs justly, honestly and impartially on sound business principles, bearing in mind at all times the good and welfare of the community.

I take this opportunity of thanking the past Council, all committees of the same for their support and co-operation, also our City Clerk, Deputy City Clerk, City Treasurer, and all others connected with the City Government, for the kind, courteous, and strict attention which they have at all times manifested towards municipal affairs.

Finances.

The net debt of the city has been increased about \$40,000 during the past year, which increase was caused by the erection of two new school buildings. I would recommend in connection with the finances of our city that the valuation of corporation property be increased to meet the additional expenses which must be incurred during the coming year.

Streets and Sidewalks.

Our citizens demand, and have a right to expect good roads and sidewalks, and in order to at least in part accomplish this right, I would again recommend that no more streets be laid out until those that have been already laid out are completed, and that if any work be done on Main street during the year, that it be paved between Postoffice square and Mason street.

Main street in Berlin Mills Village, near the Night House, so

called, should be raised so that this section would be dry at all seasons of the year. In order to do this successfully, the surface drain now ending on Norwegian street should be continued to the river at some point below the dam. This would, in my opinion, do away with the numerous claims which are continually arising against the city from property owners in this vicinity.

Last year by constructing streets and sidewalks, we exceeded our appropriation, and this year we should make special effort to keep within the limit.

Sewers.

A large amount of important work has been accomplished through this department during the past year, the most noteworthy being the laying of the surface drain from Main street up High street to a point opposite Hillside avenue, at a cost of nearly five thousand dollars. I would recommend that this drain be extended up Hillside avenue to Prospect street.

There still remains a great deal of work to be accomplished on sewers in various parts of the city, and I would recommend that special attention be given this department during the coming year.

Fire Department.

We have at the present time one of the most modern fire departments in New England, but the expense of maintaining the same has been large, the department exceeding its appropriation by a large amount, and I would urgently recommend that the department endeavor to keep within the appropriation this year.

Public Schools.

We have during the year constructed two new school buildings, the Marston Grammar school at a cost of nearly \$26,000, and the new High school at a cost of nearly \$50,000, which, with the new Burgess school gives the city three of the most modern buildings for school purposes in the state, and of which we may well feel proud.

I am of the opinion that with the construction of a school building at the Cascades, and one on the East side, so called, our public school system will be in a condition satisfactory to all.

Conclusion.

In conclusion, I desire to say that in the administration of trust which has been committed to me for the third time, I shall have no interests to serve but the welfare of the city as a whole.

Coming together, as we do, gentlemen, with different habits of thought, and with different private interests, it may be possible

that matters may arise before us of which we may not take the same view, but I confidently hope and expect that such matters will be carefully considered, and adjudicated in such a manner as will not bring discredit upon ourselves nor upon the city which we have the high honor to represent.

Ordinances.

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seven.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the erection and maintenance of telephone, telegraph, electric light, street railway, and other poles in certain streets of the City of Berlin.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Berlin, as follows :

SECTION 1. All telegraph, telephone, electric light, street railway, and other poles now standing in the following streets of said Berlin, shall, within sixty (60) days after the passage of this ordinance, be painted a uniform color under the supervision of the Building Inspector: Main street from the tracks of the Glen Junction Transfer Company to the Night house so called, in Berlin Mills village, Exchange street to Grand Trunk station, Mechanic street to J. Fred Bell's stable, Mason street, Pleasant street, High street, Prospect street, Church street, Emery street, First, Second, Third and Fourth streets, Oak street, Willard street, Goebel street, School street, First avenue, Second avenue, Madigan street, Third avenue.

SEC. 2. All poles hereafter erected upon any of the above named streets, shall be of iron or cut square, and shall be of uniform size and color.

SEC. 3. Any person, company, or corporation violating any of the provisions of the foregoing ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each offence.

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seven.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the public streets, saloons, billiard and pool rooms and bowling alleys in the City of Berlin.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Berlin, as follows :

SECTION 1. All saloons, billiard and pool rooms and bowling alleys, shall be closed at the hour of 10.30 of the clock at night of each week day.

SEC. 2. No saloon, billiard and pool rooms and bowling alleys, shall be kept open for any purpose on Sundays or Legal Holidays.

SEC. 3. No person shall stand or loaf upon any bridge, street corner, sidewalk or other public way to the annoyance of others.

SEC. 4. Any violations of the above provisions shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars (\$20.00).

SEC. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this are hereby repealed.

TELEPHONE FRANCHISE.

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seven.

A RESOLUTION granting franchise to the Essex & Coos Telephone Company.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Berlin, as follows :

That the said City of Berlin hereby grants to the Essex & Coos Telephone Company, a corporation organized for the purpose of

doing a general telephone and telegraph business, the right to construct and maintain all necessary, suitable, and proper conduits, cables; wires, poles, man-holes and other materials in the streets and highways of the City of Berlin, subject to the conditions, terms, and stipulations hereinafter set forth.

1. The term of this franchise shall be twenty-five years from the date of the passage hereof, with the right to renew for twenty-five years, provided, however, that the said Essex & Coos Telephone Company fulfills and abides by the terms of the same; and provided that in the event that said Essex & Coos Telephone Company desires to renew said franchise, they shall cause a petition to be presented to the City Council of said Berlin at least one year before the expiration of the one hereunto granted.

2. In the further event that the said Essex & Coos Telephone Company does not desire to renew said franchise, the said City of Berlin shall have the right to purchase all property of said company, including its conduits, cables, wires, poles, and man-holes, and such other property which said company may have acquired during the existence of this franchise, at a sum to be fixed by three competent appraisers, to be determined upon as follows: one to be chosen by said City of Berlin, or its duly authorized representative, one by the said company, and a third to be chosen by the two thus selected.

3. All conduits, cables, wires, poles, man-holes, and other necessary construction work about, above, through or under the streets, avenues or highways of said City of Berlin shall be done in a thorough workmanlike manner, to the satisfaction of the mayor and councilmen of said City of Berlin, or to the approval and satisfaction of any person thereunto duly authorized by said mayor and councilmen to supervise said construction.

4. The said company shall place all conduits, cables, wires, and necessary instruments under at least three feet of the surface on the following streets: Main St., from a point near the office of the International Paper Co. to a point opposite Ste. Anne's Roman Catholic church; Mason street, from the Iron Bridge, so-called, to Pleasant street; Pleasant street, from a point where it is intersected by Mason street, to Mechanic street; and said company shall have the right to both aerial and underground construction on said street; Mechanic street to Pleasant street; and Postoffice square; and on all other streets, avenues, or highways of said city, the system shall be of proper and suitable aerial construction; all poles shall be of a uniform height and painted a uniform color, the material to be square cut wooden or iron poles, and shall be

erected under the supervision of the mayor and city council, or such other persons as they may designate.

5. The man-holes to be used in that part of the system which shall be under the surface shall be constructed and located under the supervision of the mayor and city council, or such other persons as they may designate.

6. The said company shall not uncover any manholes during the day or night without first providing an iron railing around the same for the protection of the public, having at the same time and in the same place a red flag or lantern suitably marked with the initials of said company.

7. All poles erected by said company shall be placed within the curbing and left in a good workmanlike condition.

8. After said company shall have installed its said system it shall not cause the surface of any street, sidewalk or highway to be disturbed for new poles or manholes without permission first being obtained from said city council.

9. Whenever an opening shall have been made for a man-hole or pole, the street or sidewalk shall be placed back in as good condition as possible.

10. Any change of conduits, cables, wires, poles, or man-holes shall be made at the expense of said company.

11. Whenever it is deemed expedient that a change be made, by the mayor and city council, they shall serve notice in writing upon said company, or its managers, when such change shall be made forthwith.

12. The said company shall commence active operation upon the installation of said system within sixty days from the date hereof, and if said company shall fail to have said system in actual working order within one year from date, this franchise shall immediately cease, and any and all rights which said company may have acquired by reason of same shall terminate.

13. The said company shall at all times reserve suitable and proper space on its poles for fire, police, or other municipal purposes in said city of Berlin, and said city of Berlin shall have the right at any time during the continuance of this franchise to place its wires on said poles.

14. The said company shall save the said city harmless from any damages, suits, or other causes of action which may originate by the acts of said company, or its agents during the construction of said system, or during the continuance of said franchise; and said company shall, before commencing operations, execute a bond in favor of said city of Berlin in the sum of three thousand dollars,

conditioned upon the fulfillment of the terms and stipulations of this franchise and the laws of the state of New Hampshire relating to such matters, which bond shall be approved by the mayor and city council and shall be issued by a responsible surety company.

15. Rate for telephones shall not exceed the following :

For residences, \$12.00 per annum.

For offices and business houses with local service, \$15.00 per annum.

Offices, business houses, and other places with local and county service, \$18,00 per annum.

For instruments in the office and residence of the same party, \$25.00 per annum.

Private circuit, \$25.00 per annum.

16. The said company shall furnish free of charge at least ten free telephones with local service to such municipal officials of said city of Berlin as the mayor may designate.

17. Said company shall cause no action to be taken by way of sale, loan, combination, transfer, with any other person or corporation so as to impair competition, reduce the service, or in fact interfere in any way with the business of said company, under penalty of this franchise terminating immediately upon such action.

18. The said Company shall cause to be filed in the City Clerk's office a full and complete map showing the location of man-holes and poles, within one year from date hereof.

19. In the event that said Company shall find itself unable to continue business it shall cause a notice to that effect to be filed with the City Council at least sixty days before the date of ceasing business, when this franchise shall terminate.

20. Said Company shall at all times observe such amendments to this franchise as the City Council may order, and shall also at all times faithfully observe all ordinances and laws relating to telephones.

Said committee shall serve without pay, but shall be allowed a sum not exceeding \$100 for the payment of actual expenses.

Not more than three members of said committee shall be from any one political party.

Cemetery Association.

Rules and Regulations of the Berlin Cemetery Improvement Society.

SECTION 1. The Berlin City Cemetery shall be under the superintendence and control of a board of three persons, consisting of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, and shall be known as the Berlin Cemetery Improvement Society, of which the Mayor shall be an ex-officio chairman, to whom shall be entrusted the entire management and exclusive control and improvement of said cemetery subject to the control and direction of the city council, but no charge or expense to the city shall at any time be created or incurred by them in the premises without the authority or approval of the city council of the city of Berlin.

SEC. 2. All applications for the purchase of cemetery lots shall be made to the President of the Improvement society, having charge of the cemetery, who shall give to the person applying an order on the city clerk for a deed, stating the number of the lot and its price. The city clerk upon the receipt of such an order and satisfactory evidence that the price has been paid shall deliver a deed of such lot, signed by the mayor and countersigned by the city clerk, to the person so applying.

SEC. 3. The owner of any lot shall have the right to use the same for the burial of the dead, for the erection of suitable stones, monuments or tombs, for cultivation of shrubs, plants and flowers, subject to the supervision of the committee.

SEC. 4. If any lot or avenue shall be injured or materially incommoded by means of any shrubbery or other object in or upon an adjacent lot, the owners shall be required to have it removed and in case of failure to do so it shall be the duty of the committee to cause it to be removed.

SEC. 5. If any effigy or structure of any kind, which may be placed upon any lot, shall be decided by the committee to be offensive it shall be the right and duty of said committee to cause such objects to be removed, and no fence shall be placed or erected on or around any lot.

SEC. 6. The price of single lots (10x20) shall be ten dollars (\$10), no lot shall be sold for less than its appraised value. All money

arising from the sale of lots in said cemetery shall be used for improving and ornamenting the cemetery grounds.

SEC. 7. A certain portion of the cemetery shall be set apart for a common burial ground in which strangers and persons of the city other than owners of lots may be buried. No person shall take or hold any lot for free burial purposes except designated places as shall be determined by the committee. A person wishing only a single grave can purchase the same for the sum of three dollars (\$3) in such place as shall be determined by the committee.

SEC. 8. A person wishing a grave dug, or work of any kind done on his lot must present his deed to the sexton or person having charge of the cemetery before the work is commenced, to prevent mistakes.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS.



Report of City Engineer.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

I herewith submit to your honorable body a report of the work performed by the Department of City Engineer, since my election to the office in October, 1907.

Surveys, plans and estimates were made for sewers in Goebel and Norwegian streets and for a sewage system from Dead River to and in Fourth avenue on the west side.

Plans and estimates were made for a proposed hose tower at the Central Fire Station.

Various surveys were made of land for highway purposes and sewer locations.

Grades for sewers being built and sidewalks were given.

On assuming the office of City Engineer I found that there has, in the past, been no system whatever employed in the way of keeping permanent records such as plans of streets, sewers and city property.

My past experience in city work, proves to me that in order to successfully and advantageously carry on the office of City Engineer all work of an engineering nature, whether in contemplation or construction, should be so carried out as to be as permanent as possible.

To accomplish this end our city should, through the office of City Engineer, have permanent plans of all streets, sewers and city property, plans of streets to show established lines and grades, of sewers to show profile and house connections. Assessors maps and record books should be kept up to date and accessible for ready reference.

The first cost of such a system as outlined above would not be great, and would far offset the present difficulties encountered almost every day by our city in the way of locating sewers already built, damages caused by defective sewers, and controversies over street lines, etc.

Hoping that due consideration be given above suggestions by

your Honorable body, and that you recommend that steps be taken immediately to place the Department of City Engineer on a level with other and up to date cities, I beg to remain,

Report of Building Inspector.

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report as Building Inspector. Having taken the office in the latter part of the year, January 16, 1908, there is very little to report on.

There has been only one permit issued: to Albert Croteau to put a flat roof on his building next to the Albert Theatre.

I believe that the ordinance in regard to chimneys both in the fire and residence districts should be rigidly enforced as it would prevent many of the fires, and that fire escapes should be put on some of the large wooden, quick-burning buildings, especially those used for tenements.

Report of High School Building Committee.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To the City Council and Board of Education of the City of Berlin :

The joint building committee of the New High School beg leave to submit the following brief statement of the work done under their direction during the financial year just closing :

The work of actual construction on the building was practically completed previous to our last report although there were a few minor matters that required attention at a later date. These have been adjusted as seemed best under the conditions.

We are aware that there has been a considerable overdraft above the original appropriation for the erection of this building, but a considerable part of this amount has been used for purposes outside of those originally contemplated. Additional work was done on the building itself to meet changed conditions as they developed and a large amount has been expended on grading in front of the building.

Your committee feel that they were unfortunate in the matter of the contracts both for the general work on the building and for the heating and plumbing as neither job was finished in an entirely satisfactory manner by the contractors. The heating and plumbing contractors finally completed their work so that it has met with the approval of the committee, but the expense was greater than it should have been, had the work been satisfactorily accomplished in the first instance. The additional cost, however, has not been a large item.

The work of the general contractors has never been satisfactorily completed and, as the firm who did the work has gone out of business, there is no way for the city to protect itself other than to withhold payment of such sums as were due at the time of the ostensible completion of the contract. This your committee has done and we understand that at the present time the amount that the city should pay either to the contractors or to their proper representatives is less than \$200.

We consider that the city has one of the best buildings in the state for the purposes for which it was designed and that, with the exception of the plaster, the work has been finally finished in good shape although we have had some work done by others than the original contractors.

At the time of the original plans there was some criticism of the size of the building, some of our citizens being of the opinion that it was too large. That this was not so is shown by the fact that at the present time the building is filled practically to its capacity—in fact an addition has already been erected under the direction of the Board of Education for the use of the Mechanic Arts department.

The Board has also had the house in the rear of the building removed as was recommended by your committee last year.

Your committee tendered their resignation and turned over the building to the City Council and Board of Education at the regular meeting of the City Council, December 3, 1907.

REPORT OF SEWER COMMISSIONER.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit to you the report of the Sewer Department for the past year. I will begin by telling as nearly as possible where all the new pipe has been laid: 420 feet of 8 inch pipe in the narrows on Main street. 456 feet of 8 inch pipe on Eighth street. 18 feet of 10 inch pipe in crossing on Eighth street. 18 feet of 10 inch and 6 feet of 8 inch pipe on Seventh street. 200 feet of 8 inch and 50 feet of 6 inch in front of St. Louis Hospital on Main street. 176 feet of 6 inch pipe on Main street in front of Dickinson's. 300 feet of 6 inch pipe on Portland street. 340 feet of 10 inch pipe on High street. 90 feet of 18 inch pipe on Willard street. 200 feet of 8 inch pipe on Mannering street. 210 feet of 4 inch pipe on First avenue. 350 feet of 20 inch pipe on Glen avenue. 150 feet of 6 inch pipe in rear of Fred Bell's stable. 315 feet of 15 inch pipe on Goebel street. There was also 206 feet of pipe in small amounts laid in different places. Thirty-one houses were connected with the sewers and six man holes made during the past year. This, with repairs found necessary, completes what was done this year. Many of the new sewers made were found to be difficult as they had to be laid in places where much ledge was encountered.

In conclusion I wish to extend my thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, and to the Committee on Roads and Bridges, for their courteous and considerate treatment in their dealings with matters connected with this department.

Department of Highways.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen :—I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Street Department. In submitting my report I will state as briefly as possible the amount of work done during the past year. The general repair work on the principal streets has been carried on as in former years. Quite a large amount of grading by use of crushed rock was done mostly on Main, Green, Mechanic and Mason streets. A large job was done on the bridge which crosses Dead River known as the New Bridge by filling the entire side where the back channel ran with rock and gravel thereby making a complete saving of any further expense on that part of it. The ledge on Second avenue near Sessions school was blasted and leveled and the street widened to quite an extent. Also in front of High school considerable amount of blasting was done. This job was discontinued until another year. Grating was also done on Pleasant, Oak, Willard, High, and upper Main street, also on back streets to quite an extent. The cellars from which the houses were moved on Pleasant street extension were filled thereby, connecting with Green street. Quite a lot of work was done on streets at Berlin Mills keeping them in good repair. The usual amount of repairs were done on country roads between here and Milan and West Milan, also the road to Cates Hill was repaired to some extent. The great number of heavy rains and showers encountered the past summer made it very difficult to keep such hilly and rocky streets as we have here in good repair. There were also new sidewalks built on Oak street and new curbing and concrete laid on Mason street, also one on Main street in front of the court house, and also in front of the City National Bank. A number of cinder and sand walks were made where they were found necessary.

In closing I wish to respectfully tender my acknowledgments to

the Mayor and the various members of the City Council for the support they have given me.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

BERLIN, N. H., February, 15, 1908.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

Herewith we beg to submit our report of the City Board of Health for the Year ending February 15, 1908.

The general health of the city for the past year so far as it may be judged by the total mortality and its classified causes, compares favorably with preceding years. A very small percentage of causes of death is attributed to infectious diseases.

Whooping Cough.

Not one case reported, but there are a great number of cases distributed all over the city. Physicians and parents fail to report cases of whooping cough and measels, so it is absolutely impossible to do any effective work in controlling and checking them.

Scarlet Fever.

In inspecting the Brown school a case of scarlet fever in the desquamation period, the most dangerous one for infection, was discovered. Fortunately with effective and proper disinfection of the schools, and of all the children, we checked the disease and prevented its spreading, as no new case has been reported since.

There is as much danger from infection in a light case of contagious disease as there is in a very severe case. In any case where doubt exists as to the nature of the disease, the benefit should be given to the public and the Board of Health notified

immediately. It is sometimes very difficult to make a proper diagnosis in light cases, especially in diphtheria and scarlet fever.

Better sanitary condition and the use of antitoxin has decreased enormously the percentage of death rate in diphtheria. All other contagious diseases are also of a milder type compared with what they were a few years ago.

"As we look back upon the devastating epidemics which in times past depopulated cities and countries, and compare the absence of such menace to existence in our present age, and the enormous improvement in our sanitary conditions, we can appreciate what has been accomplished in the betterment of conditions prejudicial to life and along purely sanitary lines."

Tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis is still the leading cause of death, not perhaps in the city, but all over the states. Not only the medical profession, but the public itself, has awakened to the necessity of checking the advance of the disease.

"Much of the foothold which the disease has gained is due to an absolute ignorance upon the part of many as to its infectious nature, and the methods of its transmission, and it is along purely educational lines that much of the work to be done in limiting its ravages must be accomplished. Prevention is a great factor to be considered in selecting methods of lessening this disease."

Sewers.

The first requisite for sanitary and healthful conditions in a community is the building of sewers. Many of our new streets are still in primitive condition. Some of the houses on these streets are supplied with flush water closets and deficient cesspools, with the consequence that neighbors' premises are flooded with sewers' drainage. This is a revolting condition, to say nothing of its dangers.

About thirty houses have been connected with the city sewers during last summer.

Report of Police Commission.

*To His Excellency, the Governor of the State of New Hampshire,
and to His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City
of Berlin:*

We herewith submit our report for the year 1907.

The entire police of the City of Berlin for the past year has consisted of city marshal, assistant city marshal, five patrolmen, twenty-one specials, two constables, and a dog constable. The only salaried officers are the city marshals and patrolmen.

The beats of the patrolmen have been arranged with a great deal of care, so that the thickly settled portions, and principal streets of the city have a policeman on duty all the time. In addition to this an officer is kept at the police station at all times subject to a telephone call to any part of the city.

The officers are efficient and capable, interested in the faithful performance of their duty, and all work together in harmony and accord, and all violations of the law are thoroughly investigated and prosecuted.

We have no suggestions to offer nor recommendations to make. We have pursued the same policy this year as in previous years, making such changes and modifications from time to time as suggested by constantly varying conditions and the demands of economy.

The following is a statement of the offences committed and that have received the attention of the police department during the time covered by this report, which shows that crime is markedly decreasing.

Report of Board of Education.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

The Board of Education of the City of Berlin submit the following as their twenty-third annual report of the work and condition of the department under their direction.

General Conditions.

Our schools are at last on a normal basis. They are satisfactorily housed, excellently equipped, and provided with an excellent corps of teachers. It should be a source of great satisfaction to every one who has children or who has the welfare of our city at heart that our schools are already the equal of any schools in the state, and if the present policy of strengthening them at every weak point is pursued for a few years more they will take their place among the best public schools of the country. It will not be necessary for our people to send their children away from home to give them a first-class education. In Mr. Libbey we have an able man thoroughly in earnest in his work. He is fast putting our High school on a solid basis. With the devoted teachers who are assisting him and the splendid building and equipment that has been provided it is not surprising that the school is growing and that more of our boys and girls are each year deciding to avail themselves of its advantages.

The courses of study in the High school are being made attractive and practical, while they are losing nothing in efficiency from an

educational stand-point. The classical course is being taught as it has always been and a studious boy or girl can be adequately prepared for any of the colleges or universities. A scientific course is offered and will in another year be much strengthened by the study of chemistry. The chemical laboratory, which has not yet been completed, will be fully equipped as will also the physical laboratory. A good portion of the latter's equipment was saved from the fire which destroyed the old High school building.

In addition to, and more or less interwoven with these standard courses are the Commercial and Mechanic Arts courses, in which a pupil, while he is getting a splendid mental training that will fit him for any walk of life, is acquiring a practical knowledge of such useful lines as stenography, typewriting, book-keeping, machine shop work, blacksmithing, carpentering, etc. It is not to be supposed that every boy who takes these latter will be a carpenter or book-keeper but it is maintained by educators who are versed in such matters that no boy, who studies any subject with the interest that is every day displayed over this work, will fail to be intellectually stimulated to a point where every thing he attempts will be done more effectually and persistently by reason of the proficiency which he has acquired in these branches. There are forty-three boys taking the Mechanic Arts course this year and there are sixty-four boys and girls taking the Commercial course.

This last year there were only two children from the eighth grade who were qualified for entrance to the High school who failed to take advantage of their opportunity to enroll themselves in its membership. We have dealt thus at length with the High school on account of its having only recently been put on its present efficient footing but it must not be forgotten that the grade schools are continuing along the successful lines Mr. Whitcher laid out some years ago and are showing most excellent results.

It would be hard to find anywhere a better fitted or more interested group of teachers than we have in our grade schools. The excellent results of their outside work, which was explained in the Superintendent's report last year is showing itself in the class room and the enjoyment manifested by the teachers and children alike in their school work has taken away all the drudgery and pedantry which is too often associated with schooling in the minds of teachers and pupils of a former generation.

Through the courtesy of our State Superintendent, Mr. Morrison, it has become our custom to have a thorough inspection of our schools made occasionally by him, and his report has proved most valuable in pointing out such parts of our system as need improv-

ing. His report is here printed to give our citizens an impartial account of our schools as seen by an outsider and an expert.

REPORT OF INSPECTION AT BERLIN.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

Buildings.

The Marston building I find to be in good condition throughout and well kept. The sanitary arrangements are all that could fairly be desired. The ventilation is excellent. The seating is good and the light is very good. With reference to the last point, however, I note that the teachers have a tendency to be neglectful about the regulation of their curtains. The city may provide an excellently lighted building, but if teachers leave their curtains so as to exclude a considerable part of the waning afternoon light, the effect upon children's eyesight may become as bad as if the construction of the building were itself defective. The curtains are admirable for adjustment to all conditions of outside light, and their adjustment should be insisted upon. The eyesight of children in the artificial condition of schoolroom light is a delicate, critical matter, and no steps should be omitted to see that it is properly safeguarded, especially when conditions are made right for safeguarding.

I presume that it is needless to point out that the Cole and Sessions buildings are unsatisfactory as schoolhouses. No doubt the city will remedy this condition as soon as it is possible to do so. The class of children brought into these houses is one upon whom the effect of wholesome schoolrooms is likely to be pronounced and lasting.

Meantime the buildings should be put in good repair for such temporary use as may be needed. I note especially that the curtains of the Sessions school are dilapidated and in some cases wanting, and that the windows of the Cole school are screened with old-fashioned blinds. All four rooms which are now in use in these two buildings could at small expense be made clean, the plastering renovated, and the walls tinted an attractive hue.

The sanitary conditions in the basement of the Cole school are unworthy and should not be tolerated even though the building were to be used only another year. They should be thoroughly

renovated, made clean, suitably painted, and then kept so. Conditions such as exist at this point are prone to have so bad an effect upon children as to make it doubtful whether school work itself, however excellent, is sufficient to over-balance them.

Reading.

The reading is only fair in the lower grades. It comes up to grade, however, by the beginning of the fifth year, when it begins to compare favorably with the best. Both in scope of material read by the children and in efficiency of teaching, I note a distinct improvement during the last two years. I note that the teaching of reading is seriously handicapped by the ages of pupils in the different grades, by the mother tongue of many, and by their irregular admission to the schools. All things considered, I think it remarkable that the reading in the upper grades is so good as it is.

Literature.

After the first three or four years of school life the emphasis in reading shifts from teaching the pupils to read to developing in them a taste for good reading as well as the educational value which comes from the reading of good literature in the school itself. Under existing conditions in society the public school has few better opportunities than to develop in children the power to use the public library well in after years. The usefulness of the public library in the community will be to a very considerable extent conditioned upon the habit of reading and the taste for the right reading which the public schools succeed in developing. I find that the scope of the material selected for this purpose is considerably expanded, that the selections have been well made, and the teachers are generally succeeding in bringing out the full literary effect upon the children. As I shall have occasion to point out later, I think that the direction of general appreciation of the good things of literature and art is one of the directions in which the Berlin schools most need effective development. A good beginning and substantial progress has been made in the material selected for literature and the manner of teaching it. I find both in the lower schools decidedly superior to the material selected and the manner of teaching in the High school.

Handwriting.

The writing is greatly improved since my visit of inspection about a year ago. I saw little in the elementary schools to criticise upon this point. If strictly attended to, it should continue to

improve especially in the upper grades and in the High school. In the High school it is still very poor.

English.

The English in all directions is distinctly improved over its condition last year. The capacity of the children in the upper grades to express their own thoughts is very commendable and it should be noted that this point is the all important one in the study of the mother tongue. The grammatical and other technical matters are of small consequence if the child still remains unable to express his meaning.

Spelling is greatly improved as shown by the children's papers. It will take some time before this point comes to be as manifest in the High school as it should, but with dilligent attention upon the part of the teachers and the management there is no good reason why it should not become sufficiently accurate for all the purposes of the ordinary life of the educated person.

Other language technicalities such as grammar, punctuation, sentence construction, etc., are also notably improved. There is abundant room, however, especially in the upper grades and in the High school for a more general accuracy on these points amongst all pupils than can be had now, and this, too, I think will be found largely to be a question of diligent attention upon the part of the teachers and the management.

Geography.

I saw no classes in geography upon this visit. I superficially examined the written results of the work done and see no reason to suppose that it does not continue as good or even better than in the past. As I pointed out in my report to your board a year ago, I deem the geographical study some of the most practical done in your schools.

History.

The history is as good as the average in our best schools, but that is poor as compared with geography and as compared with reading. It needs, I think, systematizing in the course of study, and, still more, a better grasp upon teaching in the upper grades.

Arithmetic.

The arithmetic in the conception of the teachers is thoroughly good and their method of presentation to classes should produce excellent results. As tested out the arithmetic does not make good. While some of the pupils show a remarkable degree of accomplishment, others show an inability to handle effectively the

simplest processes, and the range between these two is greater than it should be. It, of course, should be borne in mind that the school cannot expect to create intelligence where the foundations for intelligence do not already exist naturally in the child, but the great majority of children by the time they have entered the eighth grade should be able to do the common work of arithmetic competently and well. The average of efficiency should be high. My observation leads me to conclude that the reason why this is not so is probably due to the fact that the teachers largely fail to follow up their work as they should. For instance I noted in several rooms that classes reciting in arithmetic could show in the vicinity of one-half of the children doing the exercises nimbly and capably: the remainder would be in various stages of neglect. I think the emphasis is far too much directed to the capacity of the best pupils in the classes and that the slow pupils and those who have a natural tendency to inaccuracy and slovenliness are not rounded up sharply enough. The result of arithmetic teaching in the elementary schools should not be a few pupils able to do spectacular work and a majority below grade. It should rather be a high average of pupils capable of doing the common things with accuracy and capable of thinking well in the solution of common arithmetic problems.

Drawing.

Berlin has no special teacher of drawing. So far as I can see the work of the pupils, both from the artistic and from the expressional standpoint, compares very favorably with that of communities in which there is a teacher of drawing. I note especially the capacity of the children in the upper grades rapidly to make a rough sketch of any material thing which they have in mind and this is, perhaps, the best test of the powers which instruction in drawing is intended to produce.

Sloyd.

So far as I can see the manual training of the elementary schools compares favorably with the best work of this sort being done. It seems to be good in execution of the articles named in the course of exercises, but what is more important it does not lose sight of its essential purpose as work of this sort is so prone to do,—its essential purpose being to develop in the child the power to embody ideas of material things in actual form and to develop thereby the co-ordination of head work and hand work so necessary in after life.

I note with interest, particularly, how well the equipment for sloyd has been kept up. I saw distinctly less evidence of the

neglect and abuse of tools used in the work than I should reasonably expect to find.

Equipment.

I find the equipment of the elementary schools to be excellent with the facilities for illustrative teaching of geography and history and literature made possible by the use of the reflectoscope at the High school building. Few systems of elementary schools are so well equipped with useful apparatus. From time to time additions will doubtless be needed, especially in the line of text books for English classics reading.

I repeat my last year's reference to the need of artistic equipment for the new school buildings in the direction of well selected reproductions of art masterpieces for the adornment of the walls of school rooms and corridors. The opportunity here is a very important one. The buildings are well adapted to such adornment and its presence could not fail to have an uplifting effect upon the children who are now passing through the schools. I perhaps do not need to point out that just in proportion as tasteful adornment is lacking in the home so should it be secured in the schoolroom. It is not usually, however, found to be good practice to purchase pictures, casts, etc., out of the public funds for various schools. They can be best supplied otherwise, either with money raised by the children themselves, or with money given by friends of the schools. A widely prevalent custom is the purchase of some one good piece each year by the graduating class.

Range of Ages.

The conditions in Berlin are peculiar in that the range of ages of pupils in any one grade is very great. For instance I find the following ranges in the Marston school :

It struck me that this peculiarity was more pronounced than on the occasion of my former visits. This is to be expected since it is no doubt true that children are in the public schools today who would not have been there a few years ago. I point out, however,

that these conditions are a serious hamper to the effectiveness of work in the schoolroom. It is out of the question to make work fit equally well the child of five and the youth of 13, or the child of eight and the youth of 16. The practical result is that both classes of children must suffer. The condition presents an administrative problem which ought to be put in the way of solution as soon as possible. I think the board has taken the first step by limiting the age of the pupils upon entrance to not lower than five years. Some other methods by which this problem is controlled in other places are the following :

(a) Public kindergartens for children between the ages of five and six or seven. It is extremely doubtful that children profit much from the formal work of the schoolroom before the period of the second dentition, which comes between the ages of 7 and 9. Roughly speaking it may be said that children do not learn to read readily or to do number work readily much if any before the age of seven. Time would be saved rather than lost if children did not begin regular work until the above named age. In practice it is found that there is less scattering as the children go up through the grades if they do not begin until they are ready to begin. The kindergarten is a useful device to take care of the children between the age of five, when they commonly have to be received from home, and the ages of six or seven, when they may be placed profitably in the primary school. The two years so spent in the hand work and the free play and games and socializing process of the good kindergarten is time more profitably spent than it possibly can be in the primary school.

(b) One or more ungraded rooms. It is often found an effective way of dealing with the problem to provide one or more rooms with an adaptable teacher in each who can take 15 to 20 of these pupils of different ages and abilities and sort them out to rooms in which they can most profitably work. At present, of course this sorting process is going on in the regular rooms and is probably having a wasteful effect.

Discipline.

I saw but little evidence of disorder or bad discipline in the lower schools. So far as I could judge, the spirit of the school is interested and alert and industrious, and where these qualities prevail there is little likelihood of there being serious breakdown of discipline.

The Teaching Force.

The twelve teachers in the elementary schools whose rooms I visited and whose work I watched all show a distinct improvement

in their grasp of the work which they are doing over my observations of last year. Their appreciation of educational principles and their understanding of their problems seemed to be better individually and the average better than those upon previous visits.

HIGH SCHOOL.

I spent the entire day Tuesday, January 14, and a part of Wednesday afternoon, January 15, in observing High school work.

Latin.

The work which came under my observation was thorough and accurate, better than the average high school Latin, and more than the prescribed amount had been done up to date.

French.

The work which I saw was accurate, appreciative, alive and well rounded up, much above the average high school work of its kind.

English.

The English in the High school is poor in composition and very poor in reading and literature study. In composition the work which I saw was not up to the quality of that of the upper grades, and the reading was almost, if not quite, waste time. The enunciation of the pupils in reading aloud was so poor as to be unintelligible. The handwriting also as shown in the composition was very poor. This whole matter of English instruction should be set right at the earliest possible moment. There is no subject in the High school program of greater importance and perhaps none which has a greater effect upon the work of other departments.

Geometry.

The work of the two classes which I saw was close, accurate, attentive, thoughtful, and the average of the class was very high.

Algebra.

Good. I found the pupils alert and competent, the work of average high school quality. I judged that the class was capable of more rapid progress and, possibly as a consequence of the over-readiness with which they were able to do the work, not a little disorder in the classroom was manifest.

Physics.

I find the work in physics on the whole to be good. The pupils take hold fairly well in the recitation. The laboratory work was well up and the quality of the notebooks was good. The best of

the notebooks at the present rate of progress should be acceptable at any college at the end of the year.

Bookkeeping.

The bookkeeping works out to excellent practical effect. The work done upon the books of the school department by the pupils is an admirable training for them and the method is a model for similar courses in other high schools and academies. I point out that this is one of the points at which the legitimate educational purpose of such new lines of work in high schools as commerce is being properly observed and worked out. The so-called practical studies in high school are worse than a waste of time if they do not deal with practical matters, and result in a verified and undoubted ability of the pupils who study them, to do the work which they contemplated. It has been very far too often the case that high schools have in undertaking the work which they have been pleased to call business courses, have allowed such courses to drop to the plane of easy methods of getting through school, and these have turned out to be a farce so far as any real accomplishment is concerned.

Stenography and Typewriting.

As to speed and other technical points the stenography and typewriting is about 70 per cent of requirements for regular office work as contemplated by the State Program of Studies; namely ability to write accurately in shorthand from dictation 500 words in five minutes and transcribe the notes on the typewriter in 45 minutes.

History of Commerce.

This is a new subject and for that reason difficult to teach. I believe the work to be well conceived and unusually well carried out. It should perhaps place still more emphasis than it does upon commerce and the interaction of commercial and industrial causes and effects as shown in history. It is, however, a good model for work in general history.

History (general) I did not see.

Shop Work.

Well conceived educationally and remarkably well carried out. It is a model for the rest of the state to follow. It shows the same fidelity to its announced educational purpose as does the work in bookkeeping above referred to. It aims at using the mechanic arts to develop boys and help make men of them. It sticks to that intention and I believe that there is every reason to suppose that it is making good. I commend especially the relatively low cost of

the equipment and the fact that the pupils are working with a limited supply of tools. I believe there to be a great deal higher educational value in being able to make a variety of useful articles with a relatively small number of tools, learning how to adapt each tool to the end in view, than to have just the right tool ready to pick up for every part of a process which the pupil is carrying out. It is a piece of great good fortune to the pupils who are coming into this work from the beginning that the city has not been able to invest \$25,000 or \$30,000 in a building and \$10,000 more in tools.

Mechanical Drawing.

Of this work I have only the same statement to make as made with reference to shop work. The two work in together in a real and not in a pseudo connection. The mechanical drawing in the high school is work which the pupil does himself, however faulty it may be in technique, expressing in a working drawing a mechanical conception which was first in his mind and later is actually worked out in the shop. In contrast with this excellent work it is not unusual to find similar work in other schools excellent in technique, but so far from embodying any real activity in the pupil as to be a little more than copy.

As time goes on the work in mechanic arts should be better correlated with other work in the school especially with science and mathematics. This has not been done yet. It could not be done. But before the present second year class completes its high school course, I hope that it will have been found possible to use mechanics arts as a means of applying the principles of physics, to some extent those of chemistry, and those of mathematics

Similar Work for Girls.

The work in mechanic arts in your High school now well on its way toward a successful establishment contemplates the use of these arts for educational purposes, for training the boy how to bring the principles of applied science to the construction of useful objects, and for creating in him a realization of the dignity and deeper significance of that work which is done with the hands. I trust that the local administration will contemplate at no distant date similar work for girls,—courses in domestic arts having in view the training of young women how to apply the principles of the sciences and arts which they have learned in school to the creation of wholesome and beautiful homes, and creating in them too an appreciation of the essential worth and dignity of the home-maker's life. It is vastly important for the city of Berlin and for the state that our young women should have, to a greater extent

than they do now, an education with such an emphasis as I have indicated.

The Artistic Side.

I note the same defect in the High school which I have already noted in the lower schools, a defect which I have no doubt will be corrected as rapidly as conditions allow. I refer to the fact that there seems to me to be too little attention paid to the aesthetic side of personal development. I have already pointed out the failure to secure this element from literature. The drawing of the High school is, I believe, entirely mechanical. Arrangements ought to be made for enough free hand work in drawing to bring out and develop, especially in the girls, that good taste in form and color which such work has so excellently succeeded in doing in other places. The walls of your imposing and dignified High school building are almost entirely without decoration of any sort beyond that immediately connected with the finish of the building. I trust that here as in the lower schools a number of good pieces,—photographic reproductions or casts— will annually be provided. An exception to the above general statement that the artistic side is neglected is to be found in the fact that I heard some good school singing. I suggest that music, especially vocal music of a choral nature, should be extensively used in the High school.

Equipment.

The scholastic equipment of the High school I find to be sufficient for present purposes. Before the beginning of another school year equipment for the teaching of chemistry must be provided according to the specifications laid down in the document of this department known as the Standard Program of Studies for the Secondary Schools of New Hampshire. I wish also to urge upon your board the wisdom of purchasing some extra physics apparatus for use of successive classes so that in time the school may be provided with sufficient to give each pupil a complete individual set.

The Spirit of the School.

I found the school to be in the same self-repeating attitude which was manifested last year, a matter upon which your board and the community is entitled to congratulations. The right management of the adolescent stage is always a difficult one, and we too often put up with a condition of affairs in which a considerable proportion of the school maintain an attitude which can best be characterized as insolent indifference. Of this I saw so little as to make it not worth mentioning, in comparison with the fine bear-

ing of practically the whole school. The impression left upon the sitor is that the pupils are in school to work and are doing their work to the best of their own and their teachers' abilities.

In conclusion permit me again to express my cordial appreciation of the manner in which the city of Berlin is conceiving and carrying out its part of the educational work of the state.

Financial.

It is a source of satisfaction that it was possible to keep the expenses of the schools this year by a margin of about \$125 within the appropriation and other monies that came to the schools. That this was accomplished without depriving the schools of the best teachers and the necessary books and other supplies is largely due to the effective way the school accounts have been handled by the High school students in the Commercial Course under the guidance of the Superintendent. The accounting for the disbursement of nearly \$30,000 gives the boys and girls a live interest in this business problem that must prove most valuable.

Suggestion.

We earnestly hope that the people of Berlin will continue to support the schools financially and otherwise in the same generous spirit that they have been doing in the past, and that they will more fully appreciate the good work that is being accomplished by their Superintendent and teachers.

Superintendent's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To the Board of Education :

Gentlemen:—I beg leave to present for your consideration the fourth annual report of this office and with it the report of the Principal of the High school, these reports together with the critical and exhaustive report of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction give a somewhat detailed account of our aims and efforts and indicate something of the results attained.

My own work this year has been very largely administrative nor could this be otherwise, and if the educational side has suffered from neglect it is to be remembered that the labor directed toward the establishment of the Mechanic Arts and Commercial courses has been necessary and that it will bear fruit in the immediate future.

The work of constructing and equipping the Mechanic Arts building has been under my immediate supervision and the following financial statement fully shows the cost and sources of funds.

By the method adopted for constructing this building the city has saved nearly or quite \$800.

The Commercial Course.

This course has been made a practical and highly educational one.

Since February 14, 1907, the books and accounts of the school department of the city have been kept by the pupils. This has removed that lifeless fictitious make-believe bookkeeping that consists in pretty packages of ready-made business forms which might perhaps delude kindergarten children with the idea that it is the real thing but which to high school pupils is an insult.

It is one of the inexcusable stupidities of the times that high school Commercial courses continue to deal with an imaginary John Smith when the real John is probably selling coal or wood or ink to the school board and the record of this genuine business transaction might in all cases be kept by the pupils.

There is necessarily an actual business of considerable volume connected with and available to every high school and it is the only logical thing to make this the basis for the bookkeeping and business practice of the commercial course.

Our books have been kept in two complete systems a journal and ledger set and a card system, each serving as a check upon the other. The result has been not only educational but as a matter of fact errors and overcharges amounting to over \$500.00 have been detected and corrected.

School Supplies.

During the past year an itemized account of all books and supplies has been kept and it is now possible to determine at any time where any set of books is located and also the exact amount of various supplies such as paper, pencils, pens, etc., used by each school room.

Books.

For the year the cost of books per pupil in the grades has been 25 cents and in the High school \$4.36; this wide variation is due to unusual conditions. The grades were fully equipped with books nearly two years ago and as a result very few have been bought since but in the High school the rapid growth has made it necessary to order large numbers of books to supply the classes and in addition to this the development of three equally strong courses has likewise increased the demand for books along special lines. Another year there will be required more grade and less high school books.

Cost of Instruction.

The average cost of instruction in the grades per pupil is \$10.39 and in the High school \$32.86, this does not include supervision.

Coal and Janitors.

The coal bill in school accounts is an important one. The past year for the first time records have been kept showing the amount used in each school house, and I have reduced it to pounds per pupil for the year, as follows :

The average cost of coal per pupil in the grades is almost exactly \$1.00 and in the High school \$4 00.

The Marston, Burgess and High schools have complete systems of ventilation *and they work*. In each of these buildings at least 30 cubic feet of air for each pupil each minute is taken directly from out doors, heated to at least 100° and forced into the room but even with this these figures show that with a well constructed building *intelligently run* it requires but little more coal than in buildings not ventilated at all. (Compare the Marston and Cole.)

Owing to the fact that a school house of a given size will accommodate from two to three times as many grade as high school pupils it is not possible to compare the coal consumption in the high school with the grade buildings.

In this connection I must as a simple act of justice direct your attention to the faithful and efficient service rendered by Mr. Ordway, the janitor of the Marston and High schools. I confidently assert that it would be hard to find schools where so efficient heating and ventilating prevails and at the same time where the coal is so intelligently and economically used.

I hope it may be possible next year to provide means of ventilation in the Brown school. I have a plan well under way which might be worked out for less than \$1000 whereby this building could be as well provided with suitable air for the pupils as are our newer buildings.

This per capita expense includes the unusual cost of equipping the Physics, Mechanic Arts and Commercial Departments, items amounting to \$3,044.41. Deducting these items the per capita cost of the ordinary expenses of the schools become \$22.30.

In this connection I wish to call your attention to the relative cost of school maintenance in Berlin and elsewhere.

If the Berlin tax payer paid at the same rate as the average citizen of the North Atlantic States our total expenditures would be \$70,000 instead of \$30,000, or if he paid at the same rate as the average New Hampshire citizen our gross expenditures would be \$46,500. In a word this means that a Berlin taxpayer contributes just two-thirds as much for the support of schools as does the average citizen of New Hampshire, notwithstanding that we frequently hear it said by those who ought to know better that our schools are very expensive.

Let us see how this appears when examined as a matter of expense per pupil:

There is no escaping the conclusion that our schools are distinctly

less expensive than the average of the state or of the United States.

Anyone who wishes to verify these figures or pursue the investigation further can find the data needed in the reports of the United States Commissioner of Education.

Teachers.

The salary plan adopted last year whereby teachers increase their own salaries according to merit and effort has worked out far better than I expected. It has been the means of unifying and strengthening the teaching and has resulted, from the teachers' point of view, in a very substantial increase in salary. It will be very fortunate for the city if we can hold a large part of the teaching force another year.

Manual Training.

The spread of the manual training movement is probably the most remarkable event in the history of American education. A quarter of a century ago only a few cities had undertaken the work but today eighty per cent. of all cities in the United States of 8,000 population or over have some form of educational hand work in their school system. Everywhere in city and country the cry goes forth for an education suited to the nature and experience of the child and capable of producing efficient men and women when measured by the best standards of today.

The day of the domination of the dead languages is past and we are enjoying the dawn of the day of a real education of real boys and girls by the use of real educational means for a real life of useful service.

The world demands men and women who can think and act, and the schools must supply this demand. Not only must the mind think clearly but the trained hand must co-operate in working out the thought.

There is need of caution just now, however, because in some places there is a tendency to turn this force into a narrow special channel. This tendency would make the school a center for training artisans and craftsmen.

The function of the school is to produce men not mechanics, home makers not pastry cooks, and the thinking American public will see to it that school teachers are not permitted to select the vocation for the rising generation.

It is the province of the public school to develop to the largest degree possible the inherited tastes and tendencies of boys and girls; to discover and draw out all that is best in them; to create a pro-

found respect for labor and the laborer; to banish that pernicious notion that would establish an "aristocracy of learning" and this it can best do by showing children that thinking and doing are equally important; that thought without action is dead and action without thought dangerous. There is no place in the whole of his school experience when all this can be so well done as in the manual training class.

Manual training is a general educational means capable of developing clear thinkers who can accurately control the hand in executing such work as seems desirable.

Such training makes broad not narrow men and women, and in every form of human activity such a training will prove its superiority.

Manual training in the Berlin schools is of the broadly educational type. There has been no thought of training carpenters, cabinet-makers, blacksmiths, machinists or steamfitters but rather has the idea been, that every step from the first whittling exercise of the seventh grade to designing and finishing a gear in the High school, is an effective means for training and developing all of the powers of the pupil. These processes all encourage and demand accurate observation, correct thinking, reasonable inferring, exact testing and result in an ability to do that which the mind conceives.

The success of the Mechanic Arts course like that of the Sloyd in the grades has been remarkable, and fully justifies the labor and moderate cost involved.

At the opening of the term in September, 1907, one year after the course was established, it at once became certain that both the equipment and available room for the work were entirely insufficient. This was due to no lack of forethought, but rather to the fact that half of the boys in the entire school had chosen this course and whereas twenty or thirty had been regarded as the largest number likely to apply, forty-five had selected the Mechanic Arts course. The classes were enlarged and an equipment designed to care for 16 at a time was made to serve for twenty-five to thirty. The results were of course unsatisfactory and in October a new building for the department was planned and construction commenced.

This addition to the high school building is 70 feet long by 23 feet wide, built of brick and cement and at present contains all of the working equipment of the department.

In the construction of this building the pupils of the Mechanic Arts course have largely contributed to labor required.

The roof, floors, inside finish, benches, tool cases and other

accessories have been largely erected by the pupils. The steam heating plant also has been installed with the labor of the school, while the erection of the machinery, shafting, forges and other working parts of the forge room, wood shop and machine shop has been made a part of the practical educational activity of the school.

The equipment as it now stands is suitable and in the main sufficient for the needs of this course until its enrollment reaches 60 pupils except for such addition of bench tools and machine tools as the work in hand may require.

Equipment.

The forge room has four Sturtevant forges, a blower to supply the blast, six anvils and a very full set of anvil tools. The chipping and filing benches have eight first class vises with the necessary hammers. There are also two blacksmith's vises, an outfit capable of handling twelve to sixteen pupils at a time.

The wood room has four Reed speed lathes, eight double work benches for cabinet work, a bench for pattern making and an equipment of bench tools for sixteen pupils in a class.

The machine shop has been equipped the present year. It has a complete Whitcomb and Blaisdell 15 inch engine lathe with taper attachment; an American Tool Co.'s No. 1 milling machine, a Blount grinder and surfacer. The tool room contains a well selected assortment of drills, taps, reamers, chucks and tool holders for the engine lathe. An assortment of cutters for the milling machine and arbors necessary for the same.

There is also a set of hand dies and taps, a steamfitter's die stock and the necessary wrenches and vise for steamfitting.

It will be seen from this partial outline that the equipment well provides for all that the Mechanic Arts Course as outlined by the State Department of Public Instruction contemplates.

In the line of moulding and casting we have been especially favored by the kindness of Mr. E. M. Cross and his foundry foreman and workmen, in that they have voluntarily offered us the privilege of visiting the moulding room not merely for inspection but for actual work in moulding, coring, etc., under the direction of skilled workmen, a privilege of very great value to the school and to the city.

It promises well for the cause of education when men are found who sufficiently appreciate the importance of the public schools so that they are willing to assist at points where the school is unable to furnish facilities.

The Berlin Mills Co., too, have given the teachers of the commer-

cial department opportunity to examine their system of accounts and filing as an aid in organizing our own school system and recently Mr. Toothaker has volunteered to assist in teaching the art of printing so that the school printing office just equipped may become a practical educational means.

It will be a large gain to the cause of education when there are more men like these who are ready to help make a close connection between the school and the industrial and professional life of the community.

Some day as education more completely casts off its ancient ill-fitting garments it will be seen that the life of the school room and the life of the community are not only intimately connected but indeed that they are all one, that the out-of-school experience of the pupil is truly the bed rock upon which the school must build and that the school work if it is educational in the highest sense must have that quality which effectively carries it back into the home. When these truths are appreciated there will be a direct, well worn, path from the school house to the factory, the office, the bank and the shop. Then will pupils fit for life by living, for work by working. Every industry, every institution, every profession will gladly co-operate with the school in the important work of making the next generation more efficient than its predecessor.

The Mechanic Arts Course.

FIRST YEAR.

WOOD WORK. Elementary cabinet making, such models as filing cases, card trays, tee-squares, drawing boards, drawing tables, book cases, tables, specimen cases, etc.

WOOD TURNING. Simple outside turning chiefly to familiarize pupils with the use of tools. Study the forestry problem in U. S.

SECOND YEAR.

WOOD WORK. Advanced cabinet making, carving, use of curved forms, veneering, inlaying.

WOOD TURNING. Outside and inside, useful applications both in cabinet making and pattern making.

PATTERN MAKING AND MOULDING. Very elementary forms with a few exercises in moulding.

IRON WORK. Elementary forging towards the close of the year. Some metal work on hand lathe. Study in detail the iron industry.

THIRD YEAR.

WOOD WORK. Pattern making and moulding. Useful articles as the needs of this department determine. Moulding both in the

foundry and in the shop with some casting in soft metal.

IRON WORK. Chipping and filing. Surfacing and joint fitting in easy exercises.

FORGING. Cold chisels for chipping and tempering the same.

ENGINE LATHE. Used in a variety of easy exercises. Study the history and construction of the engine lathe.

FOURTH YEAR.

IRON WORK. Advanced forging and tempering such as making lathe tools, taps, dies and reamers.

ENGINE LATHE. Use of engine lathe in usual and unusual ways.

MILLING MACHINE. Use this machine for general and special purposes such as gear cutting, etc.

Make some piece of machinery such as speed lathe, drill, saw table, etc.

STEAMFITTING. Teach use of tools; how to make joints. Repairing as needs of the school suggest.

Study the milling machine and its possibilities.

(This covers the technical part of the course only.)

Retrospect.

Four years ago the Berlin High school had an enrollment of 59 pupils, today it has 164. The proportion of boys and girls in the high school is also indicative of the progress we are making. From Principal Libbey's report it will be seen that there are more boys than girls, a very unusual condition and due to the fact that our courses of study meet the needs of the community. Another splendid indication of the unity of the whole system is that all of the grade pupils confidently expect to enter and go through the high school; there is absolutely no break between June of the grades and the following September of the high school. So true is this that last September 96 per cent of the eighth grade graduates entered the high school.

In a very few years now the high school enrollment will reach 250 and in a little while longer 300, for it is the trend of education everywhere to enlarge the high school enrollment with increasing rapidity.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the splendid support given by the Board of Education, of the earnest cooperation of the teachers, of the constant personal and financial backing we have all had by the Mayor and the Council and last but more important than all of the constantly increasing faith the general public has manifested as we have gone on step by step in the work of organization.

Principal's Report.

General Conditions in High School.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1908.

To Supt. George H. Whitcher :

Dear Sir : In my report to you last year, I spoke of four essentials that seemed very necessary for the highest welfare of the school and for the development of which we were laboring viz : A spirit of obedience, a spirit of interest, a spirit for work, and a habit of study.

Of these the first two were developed rapidly, readily, almost spontaneously. The third has been more of a task to secure ; and yet I feel that I can report almost a marvelous development in the working spirit of the school during the past year.

The fourth—the habit of study—we would naturally expect to develop along with the spirit of work, and it has done so ; it has now been acquired by fully 75 per cent. of the students and its results are seen in the class room, not only in better recitations, but in a deeper interest in school work, and in the amount of work capable of being done well.

In most departments of the school we have accomplished from one-sixth to one-third more work than last year.

By this statement I do not wish to imply that we are doing all that ought to be done, but merely to indicate improvement. The statement means however more than it seems to indicate at first thought, because while doing *more* work, the requirements have been for *better* work also, and this has meant more study in preparation for recitation.

The policy adopted one year ago of requiring an equal amount of work from all, and that to be satisfactorily done, to merit promotion, has been strictly adhered to ; it has caused some disappointments both among parents and pupils. It is, however, the right policy if we desire the Berlin High school to attain a proper standard of efficiency. It is now an established policy and understood as such by the student body.

While this policy has lost us some pupils who, rather than com-

plete work here satisfactorily and according to requirements, have entered other schools ready to take them without any questions as to previous standing, yet the fact seems to me to reflect only credit upon our own school.

At the close of the school year last June 56 scholars were conditioned.

Twenty-seven were conditioned in one study only, 17 were conditioned in two studies only, 12 were conditioned in all their studies and required to repeat their year's work. Of the 27 all returned this year and have already worked off their condition or are doing so. Of the 17 all returned but one, of the twelve only three returned; three went elsewhere to school; two moved from the city and the other four are working in the city. Of those conditioned, 12 were then Juniors, three did not return this year; 21 were then Sophomores, four did not return this year; 23 were then Freshmen, three did not return this year.

The total enrollment of the High school this year has been 164; of these 86 are boys, 78 girls. 64 selected the commercial course, 29 boys and 35 girls.

The practical work done by this department the past year in keeping the business accounts of the school department has proven a success, and I should recommend its continuance.

I wish other departments of the city might feel inclined to intrust their book keeping to the commercial students; it would help in developing true business methods among the students, and the students in return would be of great help to the city. Because of the large and increasing number in this department, and the fact of so much practical business being done here requiring accurate knowledge of up-to-date business methods, and because of disciplinary problems that must arise as the numbers increase, it seems to me that the best interests of the school demand so soon as finances will allow, either that a man teacher be secured for this work, or an assistant secured for the present teacher.

The Mechanics Arts department in its new quarters is continuing its good work begun a year ago. This department leading the way in all New Hampshire will prove to be a great thing for Berlin, for the school and for the boys themselves.

It has already attracted the attention of the leading cities of the state and they are planning to follow Berlin's good example.

One thing claimed for this work certainly is proving true viz: that the training here would develop better all round students. It has been a matter of comment among the teachers that the Mechanic Arts students are doing their work in Math., Eng. and

French much better this year than last; and this is so general among these students in particular that I cannot think it a mere coincidence.

Forty-three boys, just one-half of the whole number of boys in school, selected this course.

The number taking the Latin course is 57, nearly one-third of the entire school; 11 are boys and 46 girls.

In all the Latin classes we are doing more than the average high schools of the state.

In French, Mathematics and Physics we are close to the average.

Our new laboratories were opened for work last September with a very large Physics class waiting to work. The size of the class has interfered considerably with doing ideal laboratory work and has made the work both of the teacher and of the pupil much harder than it ordinarily would be. Both, however, have done highly satisfactory work.

In general the High school is doing good substantial work and its students are alive to their opportunities.

At no time since my connection with the school have so large a number of pupils been doing the required work and doing it satisfactorily as at present. In fact there are but 21 in school who are failing to keep up with their class work and of these not five are making complete failures. This in itself speaks for the general scholarship of the school.

Class of 1907.

In June, 1907, a class of six was graduated. Of these one passed the Bowdoin examinations, and entered there in September last. His half-year record has been an excellent one and reflects great credit upon himself and the school from which he graduated. Three others from this class are planning to enter college next September.

Class of 1908.

The present Senior Class numbers 23, thirteen boys and ten girls.

Fifteen of these are up to requirements in all their studies and the rest must be by May 1st if they are to graduate. It is possible for all to graduate and I expect they will, in which case I understand it will be the largest class in the history of the school.

Junior Recital.

Last year was inaugurated the class exercise of presenting publicly some recitation after having made suitable preparation. The affair was a great success in every way, and thought worthy

of being made a permanent feature of the school work. The class of 1909 will have a like exercise sometime in March.

Reference Library.

The school work this year has been made much more efficient because of having reference books at hand to which pupils could readily refer.

While not yet a large reference library it is an excellent nucleus, consisting as it does now of about 125 books well selected and adapted to our school work.

Printing Press.

The new printing press just added to our equipment is another step in the right direction, and I anticipate great educational value in its use in connection with, and correlated with our other work.

Athletics.

The athletics of the school have been carried on to a limited extent without, as it seems to me, interfering with the best efficiency of the school in the least degree. No student has been allowed to represent the school in any athletic contest in any month, whose rank in every study during the preceding month was not up to standard. This rule has worked well and has been accepted by the students as fair and as the right thing to help maintain a high standard for the school. The base ball team of last summer was very successful. This year's basket ball teams both boys and girls have been greatly handicapped by the want of a place to practice.

Athletics are a legitimate part of school life today and must be provided for. It is too late to bemoan the failure to build a gymnasium in connection with our excellent High school building, but it is not too late to make some provision somewhere, someway for a reasonable amount of athletics for the High school scholars in the future.

Social Life.

The social life of the school has been carefully looked after, notwithstanding some very unjust and unreasonable criticisms made of it.

We have averaged a social a month this past year always in the assembly hall of the school. Sometimes they have been strictly class affairs; sometimes strictly school affairs and sometimes they have been made public but invitation affairs.

I personally have been present at every one of these socials, and I know that they have been conducted in a perfectly proper man-

ner, and at none of them have there been objectionable persons or features. These socials were originally intended to offer the student body a place to go reasonably often, where they could have a good pleasant time, without the objectionable features attending the public dances here, there and everywhere. They have fulfilled that purpose, and will continue to do so. They will, I assure you, in the future as in the past, be kept perfectly clean and free from any objectionable feature, and such that no parents need fear to let their child come to a High school social.

The High school has been very unjustly blamed and condemned morally for things that a few parents are wholly to blame for and the school not at all. It is unreasonable and unjust to condemn 164 for what less than a dozen do.

Conclusion.

Someone has said that the efficiency of a High school does not depend upon its ability to develop exceptional scholars—very few can ever be that—but upon its power to attract and hold boys and girls and develop and bring out the best there is in them.

That it seems to me we are doing. Out of 49 graduates from the 8th grades last June 47 came to the High school and all but eight of them are there today. The whole spirit of the school is work and development, and gradually but surely the old spirit of loafing and a good time is disappearing.

Current numbers of magazines have been donated by Mrs. Harriet N. Cordwell, four Christian Science ladies, the Pacific Northwest Co., Mrs. Lydia Ellis, and the St. Cecilia club of Berlin.

Back numbers of magazines have been given by Mrs. M. W. Burlingame, Mrs. O. B. Brown, Mrs. John Wilson, Mrs. W. A. Boothby, Mrs. J. D. Holt, Mrs. H. N. Hodgdon, Miss Gussie Wertheim and Mrs. Holman A. Drew.

The U. S. Government has also given a five by seven foot linen map of the United States.

The appearance of the library building has been much improved by grading and the building of a sidewalk on that side of the street, and much needed curtains have been added to the interior. The immediate need in this direction is that of a ventilator in the center. The air would be much improved and the reading rooms far more habitable in summer.

The Boston Public Library, and the New Hampshire State Library and the General Theological Library of Boston have offered the privileges of inter-library loans, and advantage has been taken of this opportunity to secure for the use of patrons such books as were necessary for further research work.

The books of the Rev. J. R. Horne library have been cataloged and put into circulation. There are 225 books in this collection, nearly half of which are theological works. They have a distinctive bookplate, are arranged by themselves in one stack and cataloged as a separate library.

The children's room has been our chief consideration this year, for that department seemed to have the greatest possibilities. And, too, the benefit to them meant equal benefit to the adults. The accommodations were entirely insufficient. The story hour had to be discontinued, the books could not be properly shelved, the children were crowded into half the proper space, and it was almost impossible to do anything more than deliver books. In May the city council generously appropriated \$400.00 toward finishing the large room in the basement. The work has been completed and it remains now only to purchase the extra furnishings for this room and for the room now occupied by the children. The new room is large, sunny and pleasant. The children will be by themselves and the adult readers will not be so disturbed by the incessant tramping which the younger patrons find so necessary to their happiness. In spite of many difficulties this work has steadily progressed.

The report shows an increase of over 1500 in the circulation, and the reference work for the grades has been more extensive than ever before. The end of another year should find the children more comfortably and happily housed.

The moving of the children's department will leave vacant one room upstairs. This might be converted into a strictly reference room. The reference work done this year has been extensive enough to warrant a quiet room for this sole purpose. The courses in the high school, carried on without text books have given great opportunity for research work and the history alcove and the study tables in the stack rooms cannot accommodate the students with-

out crowding and consequent disturbances. Moving the histories into this room would also relieve the present congested condition of the stack room.

This year the library suffered a great loss through the resignation of Miss Johnson. Since the establishment of the institution she had been the life and soul of it all, and it is mainly through her efforts that the library stands on its present plane. Her plans for the future were of great promise, and the librarians have but done their best to carry out, so far as possible, her policy.

The Halverson case originated in April, 1905 for alleged damages to his property on Sixth street by surface water. With the consent of the city council this case was settled up, paying to the plaintiff the sum of one hundred Fifty dollars there appearing to have been some liability on the part of the city.

The Paine case was an appeal from the laying out of the Highway over Cates Hill, and is now pending before the County Commissioners ; also the petition of Evan Johnson.

The case of Mamie E. Goulette was an action to recover damages for injuries which she received by falling from a plank walk which had been constructed on High street by a street commissioner, and there being some question as to whether or not this plank walk constituted a bridge within the meaning of the Public Statutes governing such matters, it was deemed expedient by myself and with the approval of the City Council to settle the same for about what it would cost to try the same in court, namely one hundred sixty-two dollars and fifty cents.

The case of Foss T. McNally consisted of two separate actions to recover damages against the city for flooding the cellar of the New Revere House in June and July, 1906, and causing considerable damage to his property. He claimed that the surface drains became plugged up and overflowed onto his premises. Inasmuch as

a case of similar nature was settled by a former solicitor and City Council it was deemed expedient to try this matter out in court. The case was tried before Judge Pike and a jury at the September Term of our Superior Court, and judgment rendered for the plaintiff for the sum of three thousand sixty-eight dollars and thirty-two cents. In connection with this case I might suggest the advisability of making some changes in the surface drain in this vicinity as the same has given trouble since it was laid some two years ago, and I have no doubt but that these pipes or drains will continue to give trouble to the municipal officials as long as they remain as they are, and this is, in my opinion, a matter which should be promptly attended to.

Subsequent to the first day of April, 1907, the following suits have been instituted against the city :

- Cyril Brooks v. City of Berlin.
- John D. Lary v. City of Berlin.
- C. C. Gerrish v. City of Berlin.
- Demars Nedeau v. City of Berlin.
- Gershon P. Bickford v. City of Berlin.

- Burgess Sulphite Fibre Co. City of Berlin.
- Sarah Wertheim vs. City of Berlin.
- Harris Wertheim v. City of Berlin.
- C. C. Gerrish & Co. v. City of Berlin.

The case of Peter Levasseur v. City of Berlin was for alleged damages to his property on Willard street caused by the overflow of surface water, and plugging of drains, and is now pending in court.

The case of Cyril Brooks was an appeal from the award of five dollars made by the City Council for land taken in the extension of Pleasant street in said Berlin. A hearing was held before the County Commissioners, who allowed the petitioner three hundred eighty-seven dollars and fifty cents.

The matter of John D. Lary originated out of the extension of Pleasant street the petitioner having owned certain property which was taken by the city in the extension of said street, and having neglected to appeal within the time prescribed by law he lost his rights respecting the same. He brought a petition asking that this right be extended to him, and a hearing was held before Hon. R. N. Chamberlin and decision reserved. Immediately thereafter he amended his petition so as to allege that the records connected with the laying out of said street were defective, and a hearing was also held on this matter, and decision also reserved,

I should assume that inasmuch as there are a number of law questions involved in the matter that it would eventually go to the Supreme Court.

The first case of C. C. Gerrish & Company was an appeal from the award made by the City Council for property taken in connection with the extension of Pleasant street, the amount being thirty-five hundred dollars. After a hearing before the County Commissioners, the petitioners were awarded four thousand two hundred eighty-three dollars.

The case of Demars Nedeau was an appeal from the award made by the City Council for land taken for the purpose of extending York street, and this case is now pending in court.

The case of Gershon P. Bickford was an appeal from the award of five dollars made by City Council for land taken and used in the extension of York street, and after a hearing before the County Commissioners the petitioner was awarded the sum of ninety dollars.

The second case of Cyril Brooks is an action at law for trespass against the city wherein he claims that the city has converted to its use certain land on Main street; this case will be in order for trial at the April Term.

The case of the Burgess Sulphite Fibre Company against the City was an appeal from the assessment of taxes, but the matter was adjusted satisfactorily between the assessors and the company without any action by the solicitor or court.

The suit of Sarah Wertheim against the City of Berlin is an appeal from the assessment of taxes, and is now pending in court.

The suit of Harris Wertheim is of a similar nature.

The case of C. C. Gerrish & Company is an appeal from the assessment of taxes, wherein the petitioners claim that they have been assessed too high. This action having been commenced within a month is still pending in court.

During the past year the matter of the taxes of George J. Oleson was referred to me, and after repeated efforts to effect a settlement with the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company of Baltimore, Maryland, I commenced four separate suits against this surety company basing each action on each bond. These suits are now pending in court, and will undoubtedly be in order for trial at the April Term of the Superior Court.

In addition to the above litigation there has been a large amount of legal matters attended to in the Police Court, consisting of the preparation of complaints and warrants and trial of cases, which work is fully shown by the reports of the Police Commission and

Police Court. A number of small claims have been presented against the city, and after a thorough investigation have been disapproved or allowed, all with the consent of the City Council.

In connection with this report I deem it proper to state that considerable litigation has originated from the construction of surface drains in all parts of the city, and I find that in investigating cases of this kind that it is almost impossible to ascertain who constructed these drains. I would therefore respectfully suggest that some system be adopted whereby a record would be kept of all drains laid in the future, showing by whom constructed, and on what date, and such other information as may necessary. I think a record of this kind would materially assist all interested in such matters.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than 12 o'clock M, on the Saturday preceding the first Tuesday of each month, they will be audited by the Committee on Accounts and Claims, and, if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Thursday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the Committee on Accounts and Claims are held on Monday preceding the first Tuesday of each month, and the regular meetings of the City Council are held on the first Tuesday of each month at 8 o'clock p. m.

To the City Council of the City of Berlin:

The books of the assessors, tax collector, city treasurer, city clerk and clerk of the police court have been audited by Arthur T. Byrnes, and his report of said audit will be found on another page of this report. The report of the city treasurer is annexed to and made a part of this report, as required by the city ordinance, and will show the receipts and disbursements in the several departments, also the balance of cash on hand at the close of the last fiscal year. We deem it advisable, at this time, to call your attention to the overdraft in the High school building account, said overdraft being \$6,181.96. The total expenditure in this account during the past year was \$6,334.83. The bulk of this amount was expended for the balance on the building, heating and plumbing contracts, and also for a balance for plans, and, as no provision for these expenditures had previously been made, this result was inevitable.
