

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1906.

To the district and town of Chesterfield:

In submitting to you our annual report, we feel justified in saying that the schools have been reasonably successful and the per cent of attendance higher than in the previous year, due in part, we believe, to the longer spring and fall terms, thereby shortening the winter term. Eight schools have been maintained for thirty weeks, with the exception of No. 10, which had only twenty-one weeks. Owing to the fact that the scholars were small and few in number it was not thought advisable to open a school there for the winter term.

Because of the shortening of the terms at Spofford last year, those were allowed thirty-one weeks this year.

The addition which was made to the Spofford schoolhouse greatly adds to its comfort and convenience. New furniture in the upper room at No. 5 was a much needed improvement, which should be seen to be appreciated. Not enough pains have been taken in the past to make our schoolhouses attractive. They have been simply inclosures where the children were confined for six hours a day, with nothing to please the eye and little to comfort the bodies. Let the good work go on.

We believe that it will be for the best interests of the town to consolidate the four small schools at the west part of the town and to provide a suitable building for that purpose. It seems a pity that four schools should be maintained to teach forty scholars, when they could easily be accommodated and receive much better service if they were brought together and divided into two schools.

Parents and those who have the control and custody of a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years should remember that the law requires that such child shall attend the public schools all the time such schools are in session.

After paying all expenses, the sum of ninety-six dollars and sixty-five (\$96.65) remains in the treasury.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Chesterfield, in the county of Cheshire; in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 2—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools in addition to what is required by law or act thereon.

ART. 4—To see what sum of money the town will raise to be worked out on highways or act thereon.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is required by law or act thereon.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor or act thereon.

ART. 8—To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote to rescind its vote to pay a police justice an annual salary, passed at its town meeting held on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1900, if the proceedings of that meeting can be legally construed as a vote to pay such a salary or act thereon.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50 to be expended in the old cemetery at Spofford or act thereon.

ART. 11—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$75 to be expended in grading the hill near Herman Chickering's or act thereon.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road commencing at a point near J. H. Stearns' farm house in Spofford and running southwesterly to the old County road or act thereon.

ART. 13—To see if the town will vote to accept the road as laid out by the selectmen, commencing at a point near J. H. Stearns' farm house in Spofford and running southwesterly to the old County road or act thereon.

ART. 14—To see if the town will vote to instruct its officers or agents to procure a site in the west part of the town and build a schoolhouse thereon and raise money for the same or act thereon.

ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to repair schoolhouses in districts No. 1, 3, 9 and 10 and raise money for the same or act thereon.

ART. 16—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
