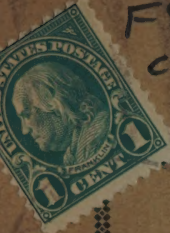

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Freedom, in County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Freedom on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at nine (9) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same,
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for use of hydrants.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the extermination of the white pine blister.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Old Home Week.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to reduce the town debt.
9. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of state roads.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer highways and bridges.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for decorating soldiers graves.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a vault for the Town Clerk's records and appropriate money for the same.

15. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates at large, Alternate Delegates at large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to accepting the land and timber deeded to the town for a ball ground and other public purposes.

In compliance with an act of the Legislature passed at the June session 1877, I hereby submit the following report for the year ending Jan. 31, 1925.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Freedom:

The fall term of school opened on September 2nd, and for the third successive year the Village School alone is being maintained. This necessitates six transportation routes, but an examination of the transportation table at the end of this report will show that there is but a small group of pupils in any one of the outlying districts, and as long as this condition exists it seems unwise, and financially unprofitable, to reopen any of the outlying schools.

The total enrollment at the beginning of the fall term was 59; at the present time it is 50, due to the fact that several families have moved out of the district. It is encouraging to note that the attendance for the pupils in the upper grades has been unusually good during the past eighteen weeks, and if this continues throughout the year, the result will be gratifying.

I wish to call your attention to the list of Freedom boys and girls attending high school and academy found at the end of this report. Sixteen is a large

group for a town which does not maintain a high school of its own and whose total elementary school enrollment is under sixty. It shows that the Freedom young people are ambitious in a high degree and that the parents are awake to the importance of a broader education than the elementary schools can give. It is also an indication of the increased interest which is being manifested today in education, and in which our state is taking a prominent part.

Report cards are issued every six weeks to pupils above the third grade. Parents should sign the cards and return them to the school. The signature is the only evidence the teacher has that the cards have been shown at home; in no case does the signature indicate approval. Consult the teacher often, especially if the pupil's effort or interest seems to lag. Some parents blame the teacher if their children receive low marks; such parents are apt to judge a teacher's efficiency solely upon the report card ranks, which are based upon the teacher's estimate of the pupil's daily work and his ability to answer examination questions. But it should be clearly understood that these estimates or ratings vary widely with different teachers, and an importance is sometimes attached to them far beyond their true value.

In the last few years much attention has been given to standardized tests, and inasmuch as they are scientifically devised for accurate measurement and are designed to eliminate possible errors in judging work, they are a valuable aid in checking up the teacher's estimate of the individual pupil. During the latter part of last year the Pintner-Cunningham Mental Test was given to the Freedom primary children and the National Intelligence Tests to the intermediate

and grammar school groups. The results of these tests have been of great aid in determining the capacities of the children and have in a few cases led to a revision in the grading. But however valuable it may be to secure an accurate and impartial gauge of each child's capacity and his attainment in the subject matter of the school program, we must not forget that the dominant purposes of education are the inculcation of right habits and qualities that make for efficiency and character.

The money appropriated at the last annual meeting of the district for improvements at the school-house seems to have been wisely expended. An abundant supply of water in each room for washing and drinking purposes is not only convenient but makes for habits of cleanliness. The stove drum for the upper room makes the heating much more effective, and the case of maps aids greatly in the work of the geography and history classes.

Let me thank you for your assistance in my work.
