



### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Piermont, N. H., in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To raise money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
- 4. To raise money to maintain Trunk Line with State Aid.
- 5. To raise money for State road maintenance other than Trunk Line.
- 6. To raise money for State road construction with State Aid.
  - 7. To raise money for support of Library.
  - 8. To raise money for observance of Memorial Day.
- 9. To see what action the Town will take in the eradication of Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To see if the Town will take any action to supply a set of public scales.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to buy a Road Machine.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to soil the State Road.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to purchase a new fence for the river road cemetery.
- 14. To transact any business that may legally come before the meeting.

### TOWN CLERK'S REPORT FOR 1921.

As part of my duties are with the individual and part with the town as a whole, my report will be brief.

One of the important duties of the Town Clerk is to keep a complete and accurate record of the town's Vital Statistics; this is fully realized when one is placed in a position where they are constantly receiving requests for certified copies of records of marriages, births and deaths which took place before the days of the Civil war, and in most cases cannot be given owing to the incompleteness of the records of those days.

In four cases this year birth certificates have been returned without the name of the child. In every case I secured the name later, thus making it a complete and accurate record.

I have registered thirteen marriages and could have registered two more if the Town or City Clerk who issued the license had made the returns sooner.

Eleven births have been recorded and ten deaths, only five of which occurred in town; one of these being an infant one day old and the other four being males who had passed the three score year and ten mark allotted to mankind.

I have issued fifty motor vehicle Registration permits between Jan. 31, 1921 and Feb. 1, 1922, for which I received \$318.83 less a rebate of \$31.49, because of proceeds of property sold and turned in towards price of car which was assessed Apr. 1, 1921, and upon which a tax had been paid once within the year.

Fifty-one dogs were licensed, forty-six males and five females.

I believe, we the people of Piermont, as we look back over the history of our town for 1921, have much to be thankful for. We have seen the remains of the Town's only resident boy, who paid the supreme sacrifice in the late war to help make the world a more decent place in which to live, brought home from France and laid to rest in the soil he loved so well. We have had but little sickness, and only five deaths actually occurred within our borders. We had no fires, no

destructive storms to damage our highways and crops, and, as the business depression which has hung over our country for the past year gradually fades away and the Peace Conference and the farmers' block in Congress finally succeeds in restoring to some extent the Peace and Prosperity of the country, we shall all be glad indeed we are American citizens.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Piermont:

It is with pleasure that I submit the following

very brief report:

Of the six teachers now employed in the district five have taught one or more years in this district and one is without previous experience. Three of them attended summer school for six weeks last summer and profited much by it. Owing to experience and extra training of teachers, the teaching is better than in previous years during which I have been connected with the schools of this district. The change at the village from one teacher to two was made necessary by the large number of pupils and grades; while the membership is now smaller than it was in the fall the change has been justified.

During the last few years considerable in the way of new equipment, up-to-date supplies and text books have been purchased. These, with standarized tests and exercises, enable the teachers to do more efficient work and assist us in the proper grading and promotion of pupils.

The attendance last year averaged 92% of the total membership. This was an increase of 5.8% over the previous year, being just the same as the average for the state: The attendance thus far this year is better

than last year.

The rather extensive repairing of buildings during

the last few years leaves them in good condition. Some painting both inside and outside with attention to minor repairs is about all that will be necessary for a

number of years.

Improvement of schools cannot be brought about by a revolution or too radical changes but by striving each successive year for better teachers, better attendance, better buildings and equipment, and higher standards of scholarship. Good schools are everybody's business and not merely the business of school board and superintendent. I wish more parents would visit the schools. I assure you the teachers will welcome your visits and be glad to discuss your children's work with you.
