SCHOOL REPORT.

Fellow Citizens of Thornton:

The law requires the School Board to report annually the condition of schools in town. We most respectfully submit the following report :

The greatest trouble we have had this year was in securing good teachers, a lack of money, and a lack of general interest on the part of parents. We have done the best we could to secure the services of good teachers, and if we have failed we hope it is not wholly our fault. Want of co-operation with teachers in nine cases out of ten where there are difficulties might be overcome if parents would listen less to what their children say and quietly consult the teacher.

Laboring under the great disadvantage of not having money enough, we were obliged to have short schools. However, we managed to have an average of nine and a half weeks in each district.

The want of general interest in school matters is *the* trouble in this town, and we sincerely hope the failure to attend to this matter in the past will not be repeated the coming year; for it is the most vital interest of the town to raise sufficient money for school purposes.

No. 1.

One term of fourteen weeks taught by D. O. Hanson. Whole number of scholars, 29; average attendance, 21. Roll of honor, Lillian A. Morrison. At closing examination I was very sorry to see so small an attendance, but what scholars were present showed marked improvement. I think the term would have been a more profitable one had some of the parents taken more interest in trying to encourage their children to attend school regular. Doubtless this school was as successful as could be expected considering bad weather at the close of the term.

No. 2.

One term of eight weeks taught by Miss Ione L. Foss. Whole number of scholars, 24; average attendance, 23. Roll of honor, Kate Caldon, Florence Dearborn, Grace Drew, Eliza M. Elliott,

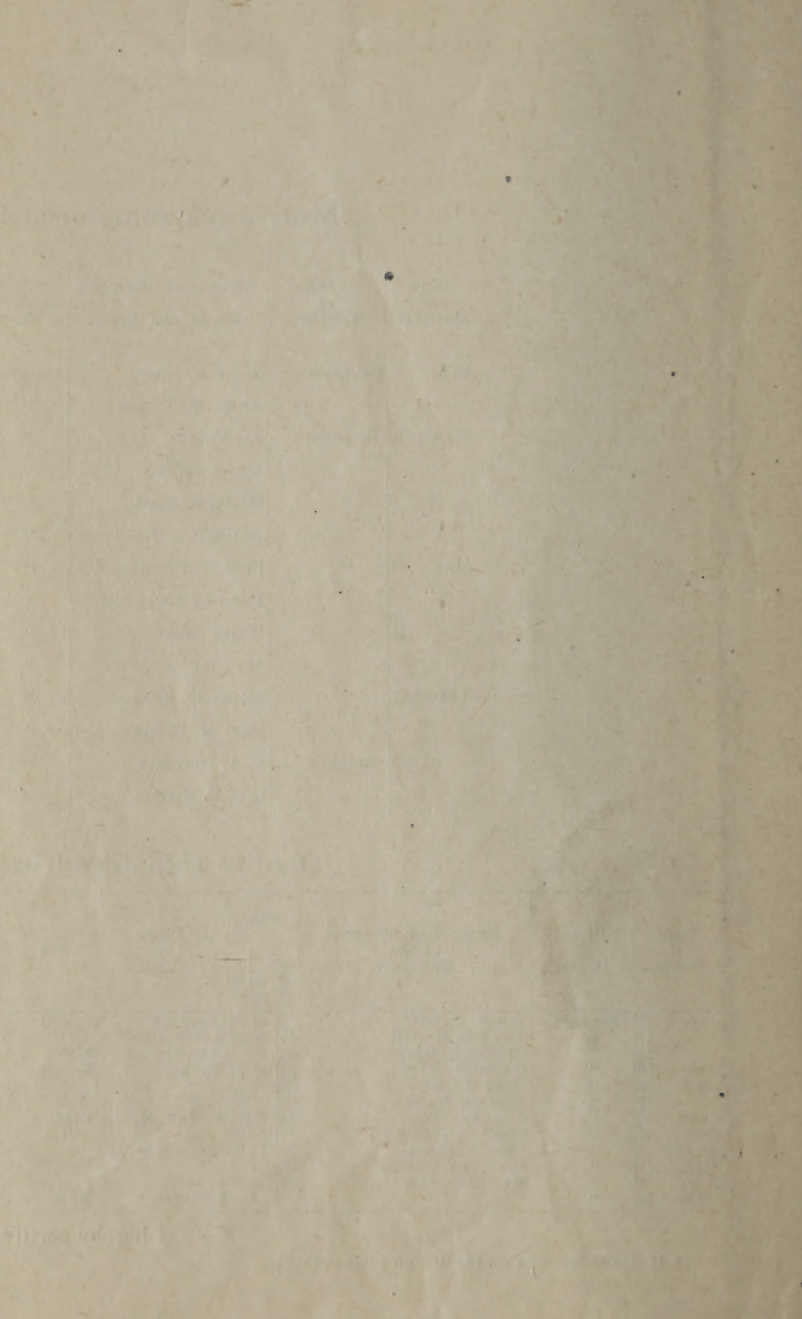

No. 6.

One term of ten weeks taught by Affie A. Russell. Whole number of scholars, 21; average attendance, 16. Roll of honor, Lisie C. Gillespie, Maud L. Gillespie, Jennie A. Gillespie, Edith E. Downing, Dora C. Downing, Albert L. Smith, Ethel M. Smith. Miss Russell is a teacher of experience and the scholars made good improvement.

No. 7.

One term of eight weeks taught by Miss Julia Rice. Whole number of scholars, 13; average attendance, 10. Roll of honor, none. This was Miss Rice's first school. Instruction, fair; improvement in some of the classes creditable.

No. 8.

One term of 12 weeks taught by Miss Hattie E. Morse. Whole number of scholars, 12; average attendance, 11. Roll of honor, Florence W. Dearborn, Mary A. Drake, Viola A. Elliott, Roscoe G. Houston, Grace M. Lyford. Miss Morse is an experienced teacher, good order was maintained and the improvement commendable.
