THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and take any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class IV roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$328.67, the State to contribute \$2,191.15.

6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase or trade the present highway truck and dump body and raise and appropriate or borrow money for this purpose.

7. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the \$5,000. presently on deposit in the Woodsville Guaranty Savings Bank, and make appropriation of the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to purchase calcium chloride for use on the unsurfaced roads.

9. To see what action the Town will vote to take in planning for the future utilization of T.R.A. funds which will be forthcoming following the completion of the present accelerated T.R.A. program.

10. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Bixby Bridge near the residence of Edmund Bemis and raise and appropriate money for said purpose.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of trees.

12. To raise and appropriate money for parks and playgrounds, including band concerts. 13. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.

14. To see if the Town will vote to install one or more additional street lights and determine location of the same.

15. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Hall and Municipal Building.

17. To see if the Town will vote to replace the ceiling in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

18. To raise and appropriate money for Town Welfare, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the maintenance of Mount Mooselaukee Health Center.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 to subsidize an ambulance service covering Woodsville and surrounding towns, including Warren.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to subsidize an ambulance service covering Plymouth and surrounding towns including Warren.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$228.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.

23. To see if the Town will vote to support the Lakes Region Mental Health Center and raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase from the State of New Hampshire a tract of land located in Glencliff for use as a future cemetery site and raise and appropriate or borrow money for this purpose.

25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue maintenance of any Town road or portion of town roads and so designate such roads or portion of such roads.

26. To see if the Town will vote to construct one additional bay on the present Fire Station and raise and appropriate or borrow money for this purpose.

27. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$109.05 for the White Mountain Region Association.

28. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development.

The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

29. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Pemi-Baker River Valley Regional Planning Agency. This agency will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the Pemi-Baker River area. The objective of this agency will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town. The agency to have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the regional planning agency shall be from Warren, to be appointed by the Selectmen.

30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$480.00 to finance studies to be conducted by the regional planning agency, these monies to be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the regional planning agency and may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.

31. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the cost of erecting street signs and other identification.

33. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two Scott Air-Pacs and raise and appropriate money for the same.

34. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1969 and determine the date and percentage of the same.

35. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing beano, be adopted in the Town?

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

37. To transact any other business that may legally come before this

meeting.

The Department is glad that the above report shows little severe damage to property in Warren. The Montano fire started around the chimney and was extinguished with little damage. The fire at the George Wright home could easily have resulted in a total loss except for the timely arrival of the fire department and the quick work of neighbors. The damage was extensive, mainly to the interior and to the roof. Again this fire apparently was caused by a defective chimney and/or materials of a combustible nature found near the chimneys. The Whitcher woodshop fire started from a defective fuse or junction box and was confined largely to the roof area. All three saves can be credited to the 1,200 gallons of water in the Dodge tank and the 500 gallons on the pumper.

The DeForest fire originated from a leak in a gas line near the gas stove.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yards of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To <u>never</u> discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for <u>all</u> debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
 - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
 - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire <u>before</u> you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

Early in 1968, a committee of Cottage Hospital Trustees met with selectmen from ten towns and asked for their recommendations. This resulted in a group of towns asking for an appropriation to provide financial assistance in keeping ambulance service available. This seemed to be the logical solution to the problem since Mr. Paul Ricker would continue for at least a year under this arrangement. All that he asked for was financial assistance to cover the cash costs that he would not have should he discontinue ambulance service. Budget for 1968 was as follows:

During the first ten months Mr. Ricker had about 180 ambulance calls from a group of thirteen towns. Four towns in Vermont and nine in New Hampshire. To handle these limited calls, which are all important and many emergency ones, he has to have personnel and equipment ready to go seven days a week and twenty-four hours a day. This around the clock availability accounts for the added cost. The regular ambulance fee covers only a fraction of the total cost of maintaining ambulance service twenty-four hours a day.

Mr. Ricker has agreed to continue service during 1969 under similar arrangements as last year. This is assuming that all towns calling on Mr. Ricker choose to provide some financial assistance in the amounts worked out by the planning committee. In setting the town request, the committee uses town population adjusted for expected use where a town is served by more than one ambulance service. The 1969 budget was proposed on January 18 by the joint meeting of the committee and selectmen from seven of the towns.

This program will assure ambulance service out of Woodsville as long as Mr. Ricker is willing to continue. This will be reviewed and negotiated each

year. If Mr. Ricker should decide to discontinue this service, the area would have to solve the problem in some other way, and, if so, possibly at a much greater cost. To set up a new service, we would perhaps consider figures such as these.

PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC.

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, Inc., has made great progress and is now serving ten towns, Hebron and Groton having been accepted by the directors during 1968.

Mrs. Dorothy Westburg, RN, was hired when we first started, and she is now being assisted by one part-time nurse who works two days a week, and a second part-time nurse who works three days a week. It becomes necessary to hire a part-time clerk to substitute for Mrs. Hibbard during illness or vacations. Mrs. Faye Brown, of Warren, is serving in this capacity. The services of the physio-therapist and occupational therapist are available if needed.

Due to more demands for visits, the travel expenses greatly exceeded our expectations, and in August the directors voted to purchase a Volkswagon for Agency use. This has proved to be a wise decision, as travel expenses were cut in half, according to a statement by our treasurer. The budget as prepared by the finance committee will be of interest to you.

REPORT OF PUBLIC NURSE

Office of Selectmen Warren, N. H.

Dear Sirs:

The town of Warren is unique in regard to the multiplicity of health services available to her citizens. We are most fortunate to have the skilled and dedicated care of our own Dr. and Mrs. Omer Brochu, located in the well-equipped Mt. Mooselaukee Health Center. Several of our residents have received home nursing care from the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency which the town of Warren helps support. Also, the services of the Lakes Region Mental Health Center, 653 Main Street, Laconia, N.H. have been made available to us in the past year.

The state public health service has been made possible by the cooperation of many people. The Trustees of the Mt. Mooselaukee Health Center provided office space. Dr. and Mrs. Omer Brochu have shared the facilities of the health center and have given generously of their time to assist with the clinics.

The assistance of all the local volunteers has been greatly appreciated. Special thanks is extended to Mrs. Jeanette Bixby and Mrs. Emily Evans, L.P.N. Mrs. Esther Whitcher, veteran of many clinics, has been a mainstay for the initiation of this program.

A series of immunization clinics have been held at the Mt. Mooselaukee Health Center, the first being held December 6, 1967. This is considered a permanent clinic which serves the people of Warren, Wentworth and Rumney. The emphasis is toward the preschool aged child; there are approximately 160 preschool children in this three-town area.

TOWN OF WARREN Comments

The financial condition this year is quite good. The comparative statement shows where a few overdrafts were necessary, but in all these cases there were unavoidable expenses. The \$5,000.00 which the Selectmen deposited at the Woodsville Guaranty Savings Bank was tax money which could be best described as a bonus. It represents taxes on some construction equipment, the valuation of which was not included in the total valuation upon which the 1968 tax rate was set. It has been wisely suggested that the town trade the present highway truck for a new model and also replace the body while it still has some exchange value.

Your attention is directed to Articles 20 and 21, both of which grow out of a situation which is apparently plaguing many communities-ambulance service. Last year we voted a sum of money to help support ambulance service out of Woodsville and this year we find a similar situation in Plymouth. A letter has been sent to the Selectmen in Pemi-Baker Valley towns, advising that Fred LaFontaine cannot operate his ambulance service beyond August 1, 1969 unless some subsidy is forthcoming from the towns in the two valleys. Mr. LaFontaine has furnished a table of figures which shows that 12 ambulance calls were made to Warren in 1967, and 10 in 1968. This apparently represents five percent of his total calls and he suggests that Warren try to raise \$350.00 as its proportionate share of the \$7,000.00 which he feels he needs to guarantee continued service. As in the case of Mr. Ricker in Woodsville, the appropriation, if made, would not affect the usual rates charged for such calls. The decision to help subsidize or not may well rest upon whether or not the voters wish to be sure an ambulance will respond if called. This may be a calculated risk which we can ill afford to take, but there is also some logical argument against using tax money to help support private enterprise. It would appear necessary to give this situation careful consideration. It should be noted that we did not raise as much last year for Mr. Ricker as was suggested and the 1969 request was the amount which we raised in 1968.

The articles of the Warrant pertaining to a planning board may seem a bit premature but some towns with no rules and regulations have found themselves in embarrassing positions as problems arise, especially in areas of rapid or sudden growth.

Article 23 asking an appropriation for the Lakes Region Mental Health Center is another indication of a constant need for community support of a variety of programs. The comments in support of this as contained in the next paragraph are those of Mrs. Sandra Howard our Public Health nurse. There is some evidence that at least one family in Warren has been spared real tragedy by the counselling services rendered at the Center.

Warren is located in the area served by this center which has its headquarters at 653 Main Street, Laconia (524-1853). Residents of the town of Warren have received the services of this center.

As with any new service organization they begin with a small staff and a small case load of clients. In time, when their services are better known the demand for care increases rapidly.

Additional financial support from the State, towns and private funds are needed to increase the professional staff. This would lessen the waiting period for treatment and evaluation and allow more people to receive services.

Major objectives: 1) to diagnose and treat individuals and families with emotional problems, 2) mental health consultation—which presently takes place in the schools (a clinic is held in Plymouth for the Plymouth School District).

The center is entering its third year of operation. It is a non-profit organization and part of a state-wide system of clinics authorized by the N.H. legislature. Fees for services are on a sliding scale basis and no one is refused the services of this center because of inability to pay.

Under the Community Mental Health Act, the legislature will appropriate \$2.00 for each \$1.00 raised locally. However the legislature has not provided all these funds, so that it is necessary to ask for additional monies from each town in the cachement area to support operation.

The center will provide professional speakers to all groups upon request. The staff consists of :

two clinical psychologists

two part-time consulting psychiatrists

one psychiatric social worker

two full time secretaries

one other full-time professional staff member

Warren's Fire Department may be able to add to its strength but will need more space to house any additional equipment. It is proposed, in Article 26 that we add one full bay to our present building and to use any extra space gained to house highway equipment when not in use, as well as the anticipated additional truck. Perhaps it would be wise to borrow most of the money for this project as this has the advantage of spreading the cost of construction over several tax years.

Our accelerated T.R.A. project can be paid for next year by appropriating an extra \$1,000.00. It seems reasonable however to begin to plan the next project now by appointing a committee to suggest projects with appropriate cost figures at the 1970 Town Meeting. One reason for this is that the Studio Road seems probable as the next project and if that is considered, some thought must be given to relocating a portion of the road from the foot of the hill near the home of Larry Nicol to a point near the entrance to the home of Kenneth Whitcher.

In relation to our membership in the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency we wish to thank Mrs. Margaret Whitcher for representing us from the beginning of the program to the present time. She has attended almost all the meetings and has ably spoken for Warren. However she has found it necessary to relinquish this position and it is hoped that a replacement can be made in the very near future.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Forty Dollars (\$1,740.00) to support the Hot Lunch Program for the ensuing year, said sum to include rent.

10. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixtyeight dollars (\$168.00) to defray the district's share of the cost thereof. 11. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

12. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

13. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the district will designate the School District Treasurer as the of-ficer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

14. To see if the district will appoint a committee of three (3) legal voters to make a study of the heating system at the school and recommend a course of action to the school board by January 1, 1970.

15. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to negotiate tuition contracts with other districts for the education of Secondary School pupils.

16. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before this meeting.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$11,500, which was received by the superintendent of schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1967-68 school year was made up as follows: \$4,500.00 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$7,000.00 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1,300.00 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby Submitted is my annual report as your superintendent of schools:

The Warren elementary school opened this fall with only one staff change. Raymond Burton replaced Howard Wheeler as principal when the latter resigned. Mr. Burton had at one time been principal in Warren and since has taught or been a principal in other positions. From information I have received the district is happy to have him return. With the return of the other 3 teachers, Barbara Pike in grades 1 & 2; Beatrice Wendell in grades 3 & 4 and Marion Whitcher in grades 5 & 6 we have a competent staff and schools so far this year have run very smoothly.

We have received Title I funds again to allow us to continue work with children who need more help or have been sick. Mrs. Evans has proven to be a great help to pupils she works with and they generally show an improvement in overall classroom performance. Peter Thomson is continuing with physical education but we may not be able to do this another year unless we receive more funds from Title I. Since the inception of the program our budget has been cut nearly a thousand dollars and it is now difficult to continue both programs.

Our curriculum offerings are adequate and we are continually trying to improve them. More use is being made this year of Audio Visual materials and we are upgrading our textbooks. The Reading Program will largely have been taken care of by next year and at least half the school will be supplied with new arithmetic books that include more so-called "modern math". Modern Math is somewhat of a misnomer in my opinion. We still teach the same fundamental principles of numbers as always but the approach in some cases is different. Our greatest problem continues to be the preparation of Grades 7 & 8 for high school. As I have mentioned previously it is difficult for one teacher teaching all these subjects in both grades to have a strong enough background in all of them to properly prepare the students. The answer is a difficult one because no school is very near where these pupils could conveniently attend. Some thought should be given to consolidating with another district so these students could have the advantage of Junior High School. The improvements completed the past year are a wise investment. A continual program of preventative maintenance saves money in the long run. From reports there will be an appreciable saving in fuel from the installation of combination windows and

more should result if the remaining needed few are added.

We were able with a little work to have our lunch program come under the Special Assistance Act. This triples the amount of reimbursement per lunch and as you know has allowed us to decrease the price of lunches. I hope the district will consider appropriating a little more money for next year so the program will operate more nearly on a school year basis.

Mrs. Wilson continues her fine efforts in music which I feel is a necessary part of the curriculum and you are providing a good education for your children.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE Jan. 1, 1968–Jan. 1, 1969

The School Nurse visited the school 39 times during the school year.

Inspections were made for vaccinations, signs of illness, skin, hair, and scalp for signs of infections, nutrition, and cleanliness.

First Aid Supplies were bought and maintained for the school.

First Aid Care was given when needed when the Nurse was in attendance.

An Immunization Clinic was held in the school. All children were brought up to date on immunization for oral polio, Diptheria, Tetanus, Measles and Re-vaccinations.

Physical Examinations were done by Dr. Brochu at his office for pupils in Grades 1, 4 and 7. Parents were notified of any defects.

A Health Record was kept for each pupil recording weights and heights.

Dr. Jamback checked the teeth and 4 Dental Clinics were held in his office in Woodsville. 32 received Dental Care.

The State Dental Hygienist visited each classroom and talked about Dental Hygiene. She showed a film on Dental Health and demonstrated the proper way to brush teeth.

A Visual and Hearing Screening Test was carried out on each pupil. Notices were sent to parents of any who failed the tests, advising that the child be checked with the family physician.

A Tine T.B. Test was done on each first grader.

The State T.B. Testing Program is limited to 1600 first graders in New Hampshire and their family or household if a reaction is shown to be positive.

Referrals were made to Guidance, Mental Health, Sight Conservation, and Orthopedic Clinics.

Home visits were made when conferences were needed with parents.

The Nurse attended Evening Workshops, State Teachers Conventions, School Nurse Sections.

She also had Conferences with the Guidance Psychologists in Concord, and with Director of School Health Services as well as Social Workers.
