## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

*To the School Board of the School District of Westmoreland:*

Herewith I submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of your schools, it being the eighth in a series of similar reports so submitted since you adopted the district supervisory plan.

In my report of last year, I stated that the work done in your schools from the previous September had been in a marked degree successful, for work done under the existing unfavorable conditions. I believe that the work has for the past year gone steadily forward in the high school and that it has been vastly improved in the primary. At East Westmoreland there has been steady progress, and there has been improvement at the Corners. The Glebe school has been given up for lack of pupils. The work in the Depot school was good during the spring term and better during the fall term but it has now ceased to be effective.

For the last named condition of affairs I wish to blame no one, to offer no excuse, nor to assume for myself the responsibility. Permit me, however, to observe that it is utterly impossible for any school officer to establish and maintain an efficient school without the cooperation of the parents in that community.

Superintendents are today, as perhaps never before, paying close attention to the physical environment of the child. As a

result the school houses are being better heated, lighted, ventilated, and decorated inside and out. It is useless to try to teach a child whose attention is constantly withdrawn because of uncomfortable surroundings, stupefied and poisoned by bad air, or blinded by poor or insufficient light. Poor air and light are the causes of three fourths of the stupidity of school children wherever found.

Your school house at the center is modern, well heated, lighted, ventilated, and is attractive both inside and out. On my frequent visits to this school I have connected the above stated condition with the fact that in these two schools the pupils seemed more active, busy, interested, and I have even fancied that it made a difference with the attractiveness of their personal appearance. I believe it would be a good investment for the district to renovate or remodel as many of the other school houses as are likely to be used for some time in the future. I advise that one of these houses be put in shape each year, commencing with the one at East Westmoreland. A new floor, new furniture, slate boards, and a hooded stove with a few other minor repairs will put this house in a presentable condition.

Your report shows a larger expenditure of money for the support of the school at the Corners than for any other school in the town. In average attendance for the last fiscal year, this school is the smallest with the exception of the school at the Glebe, and that school has been abandoned. It seems to me that some plan ought to be devised whereby it would not cost the district so much larger amount per capita for the education of the pupils in attendance in this school, than for the rest of the town. Every child in town should be furnished with equal school advantages as far as practicable. In spite of the transportation furnished and the mileage paid, I do not feel that the pupils in this school have received the benefits therefrom, during the past year, that have been realized by the pupils in any other school in town. I realize that it is impossible to furnish every child with precisely the same advantages. A school can not be maintained in every man's door yard. In the communities where the children are few, it must naturally be expected that the school will

be more remote from a larger per cent of the homes. It will require patience on the part of school officers and sacrifice on the part of the parents to adjust this matter.

Allow me to indicate to you, and through you, to the people some of the conditions with which you are confronted at present. In the Depot district some of the parents are anxious to close the school and transport the pupils to the Center. Others are bitterly opposed to this policy. There is a demand for a school at the Corners, at Poucham, and at the Meadows. The average attendance from all three of these districts for the fall term was less than thirteen. A few favor transporting the children from these sections to the Center, and some are doing so at their own expense. To meet all of these demands is impracticable if not absolutely impossible. Consequently I say that the parents must be willing to make sacrifices and that the school officers must use patience and, while keeping in mind the greatest good for the largest number, must be just to all. Through you I ask the people to help the board and your superintendent to solve these problems.

With hearty and sincere thanks to the board for their support and cooperation, to the teachers for their earnestness and loyalty, to the pupils for their enthusiasm, and to the people in general for their courtesy this report is respectfully submitted.
