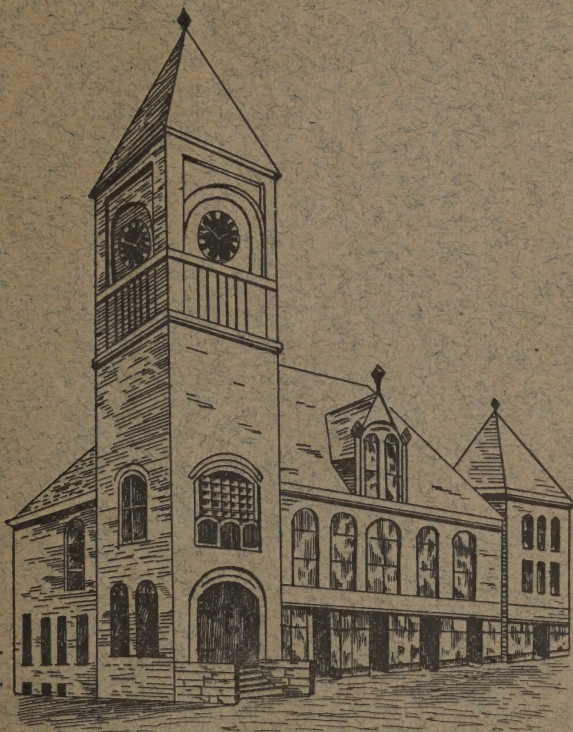

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeborough, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Brewster Memorial Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town expenses.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on its indebtedness.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for breaking roads the past winter.
- ART. 10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise in money to repair the highways the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay each fireman legally returned for the year 1892, in addition to that prescribed by law.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay to James R. Newell Post, No. 61, G. A. R., of said town, to assist in defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of deceased soldiers and other necessary expenses of Memorial Day, May 30, 1892.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to purchase five hundred feet of leading hose for the use of Monitor Hose Co., No. 1, at South Wolfeborough, and raise money for the same.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to purchase eight hundred feet of leading hose for the use of the Hose Companies in Wolfeboro' Village and raise money for the same.

- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to place its system of Water Works under the control and management of a Superintendent.
- ART. 16. To choose a superintendent for the care and management of its system of Water Works for the ensuing three years and fix the salary of the same.
- ART. 17. To choose a Fish and Game Warden for the ensuing year.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its system of Water Works the ensuing year.
- ART. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the rental of Hydrants.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to disinter the remains of the Rev. Isaac Townsend, his wife Lydia and his son, now buried on land of Joseph Brummitt, and re-bury them in the public cemetery and put the grave-stones in proper condition, and place a set at the grave of a former wife and raise a sum of money for the same, not exceeding forty dollars, agreeable to a petition signed by John G. Cate and others.
- ART. 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Board of Water Commissioners.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1892.

To Stephen W. Clow, Eli C. Swett and James H. Martin, Selectmen of the town of Wolfeborough, N. H.:

Gentlemen:—We herewith submit the second annual report of the Board of Water Commissioners, together with a summary statement of new work on the extension.

EXTENSIONS.

At the annual Town Meeting in March, 1891, the sum of \$2,000 was appropriated to extend the system on Cente St. to the dwelling of Samuel Leavitt. Work was commenced in June, and prosecuted under the supervision of Commissioner Heath. A four-inch cast-iron pipe was laid to the point designated. A one-inch wrought-iron pipe was connected with the Center St. main and continued through Cross St. to Whitten's Bridge. One hydrant was placed on this line

and is located at the junction of Cross and Center Sts. near the dwelling of Jones Marden.

The extension from the Reservoir to the house of W. B. Randall necessitated the erection of a Stand Pipe. This work was attended by a considerable expense, and the appropriation of \$2,000 was not sufficient to complete the work. The commissioners, realizing that no income could be derived from the line, unless completed, concluded that it would be for the best interest of the town to prosecute the work to a finish. On this extension a two-inch wrought-iron pipe is laid. Specials for five flush hydrants have been put in for the purpose of supplying water for fire engines, a large watering-trough has been placed at the terminus of the line, and so constructed that a continuous flow of water passes through it, thereby giving it a constant circulation throughout the whole system, besides being a great accommodation to the public by furnishing man and beast with pure running water. Water was let on November 3rd, 1891, and thus far everything in connection with this portion of the system is working to the entire satisfaction of the commissioners and water takers alike.

WATER SUPPLY.

Measurements of the water in Beach Pond (the source of supply) have been taken once in each month, from May 14, 1891, to December 2, 1891. At the first mentioned date, water was then at what was considered the highest point. From May 14 to November 8, the water fell off thirteen inches. It was gradual and uniform in its falling off, being about two inches in each month. At the last mentioned date the water had reached its lowest point and showed a depth of four feet, six inches over the intake. December 2nd the gauge showed the water to be two inches higher than at November 8th.

It will be remembered that the past season was an exceptionally dry one, as but little rain fell during the summer, and the slight falling off of the water during this time more fully than ever before, substantiates the fact that the supply of water comes from subterranean springs in pond. August 10th the gauge showed the fall of water to be eight and one-half inches, and at the natural outlet water was then running sufficient to fill a five-inch pipe. October 1st, the gauge indicated a fall of eleven and one-half inches, and water had then ceased to flow through its natural outlet. From persons living near the pond and who are familiar with the rise and fall of its waters, we learn that it was no lower the past season than what it usually has been in years previous to the taking it for our supply. From all the inquiries made, and facts learned by observation, the people of Wolfeborough need have no fears of a water famine so long as the excellent system they now have is properly cared for.

SERVICE.

Since the last annual report, eighty-three services have been put in, making a total of three hundred and fourteen, which is about seventy-five per cent. of all the dwellings, shops and stores on the line of pipe. Water is being supplied for motive power for two motors, also for one steam boiler. Connections have been made with the sprinkler system at the Shoe Factory, Hawkes & Bent's Mills and the Woolen Factory at South Wolfeborough.

LEAKS.

The number of leaks discovered and repaired during the past year was twenty-five. The cost of repairing the same, \$74.45.

So far as is known the whole system is in excellent condition, and unless some unforeseen accident occurs, the outlay for the near future will be but nominal.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF HEALTH.

I accepted the position of health officer on the condition that in all important cases the selectmen should act with me, so that practically we have had a board of four.

That we have done no more, is due to the fact that we had no money to do with. That so much has been accomplished is because all are interested in sanitary science, and the citizens are anxious to put their premises in a perfect sanitary condition.

At the beginning of the year complaint was made in regard to the surroundings of the tenements of Mr. Moses T. Cate and Mr. Levi T. Horn, on the corner of Center and Main streets. So great changes were necessary that Dr. J. J. Berry of Portsmouth, a member of the State Board of Health, came to advise. Acting upon his suggestions, a barn was removed and important changes made in the outbuildings.

The cesspool was filled up and a sewer laid to the Back Bay. So far as can be seen, the tenements were left in as healthy condition as any in town.

Mr. G. B. Clark ran a sewer from Factory St. to the Back Bay and connected the drains from all his tenements in that section with it, and allowed several others on Factory St. to do so.

Messrs. Sawyer and Tibbetts filled up the cesspool in front

of their Factory St. tenement, and in company with Mr. Kincaid ran a sewer to the Back Bay.

The R. R. Co. laid a large pipe across their ground to the river, and all those owing houses on that side of Glendon St., not already drained into the river, connected with it. There are now only a few houses in that vicinity not well drained.

Pipes have been laid through Lake and Endicott Sts., effectually draining several houses of which complaint had been made. Some of these improvements were not made as soon as they should have been, or would have been had we had the money to do with instead of waiting for private individuals to do it.

By the advice of the State Board of Health, a pipe was laid through the end of the dump next the depot.

There have been reported during the year, four cases of diphtheria, one fatal, two cases of typhoid fever and and of scarletina.

The whole number of deaths during the year 1891 was thirty-eight, making a death rate of less than fourteen per thousand, while the usual average throughout the state has been in the past over eighteen. It is thought by some, perhaps with reason, that the low death rate is due to the purity and abundance of our water supply. It shows at least that Woburn is one of the most healthy towns in the state.

In order that the present healthfulness be maintained, much must be done in the way of sewerage. Pipes should be laid through the main streets and as soon as it is seen that the emptying of so much sewerage in Back Bay is creating a nuisance, it will be necessary to extend the pipe from Center St. to the river.

Before this is done, however, a competent expert should be employed to make a plan of a system of sewerage which

should be approved by the State Board of Health. Then what is done should be done according to this plan. This has been done in some towns, and although it took some time to complete it, they now have a perfect system of sewerage. Some rules should be adopted so that property owners along the line of the sewers can be assessed for their share of the expense, and the tax legally collected.
