DEDICATION

The Board of Selectmen hereby dedicates the 1984 Annual Report to Stanley F. and Arthur W. Hill, two native sons who have contributed much to the history, growth and direction of the Town of Belmont. Stanley and Arthur operated the family farm together, shipped their milk to the Manchester Dairy System, of which they were cooperators and which Stanley served as treasurer. The Hill farm has been owned by the Hill family since 1848 and was recognized by the N.H. State Grange by receiving the Century Farm Award in 1965.



ARTHUR WILDE HILL

Mr. Arthur W. Hill died on October 4, 1984. Arthur operated the family-owned farm with his brother Stanley. Arthur was a charter member of the Historical Society, serving as its director.

Arthur was a long-time participant in municipal matter being Selectmen from 1965 to 1971; Budget Committee member from 1971 to 1977; Planning Board member, and a Supervisor of the Checklist.

Arthur was also involved in civic affairs, as past president of the Belknap County Farm Bureau, charter member of the Historical Society; and past master of Mt. Belknap and Belknap County Pomona granges. He was a fifty year member of the grange. Arthur was active in the Manchester Dairy Cooperative.

Both gentlemen carried on the family tradition of community service. Grandfather, Solon Hill and father, James Hill, identified as school board members and years of service to the local schools, and their mother, Addie Hill represented Belmont in the N.H. Legislature.

The Town of Belmont will certainly miss these two gentlemen's contributions to their family, friends and community. No greater memorial could exist than to have the prime farmland of the Hill Family Farm remain in agricultural use in the coming centuries.



STANLEY FORREST HILL

Mr. Stanley F. Hill, a long-time municipal office-holder and participant in local civic affairs, died on December 21, 1983. Stanley, known as the "Mayor of Belmont", lived in the community all of his life and operated the family farm with his brother Arthur.

Stanley was Belmont School District Moderator for twenty years, a Selectmen from 1936-48; Budget Committee member from 1952 to 1972 and trustee of the trust funds for many years.

Besides his involvement in municipal affairs, Mr. Hill was a member of the Board of Supervisors and Treasurer of the Belknap County Conservation District for 27 years; a trustee of the Iona Savings Bank; long-time member of the Lawrence Grange; and a life member of the Belknap County Farm Bureau.

AUDITOR'S REPORT TRANSMITTAL AND COMMENTARY LETTER

Board of Selectmen
Town of Belmont
Belmont, New Hampshire 03220

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the Town of Belmont for the year ended December 31, 1983, and have issued our report thereon dated February 22, 1984. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the system of internal accounting control of the Town of Belmont to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards and the standards for financial and compliance audits contained in the U.S. General Accounting Office "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions." For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal accounting controls in the following categories: financing, receipts, disbursements and financial reporting.

Our study included all of the control categories listed above except that we did not evaluate the accounting controls over financing or financial reporting because in our opinion substantive testing in these areas was more efficient than reliance on internal controls. The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing and extent of the auditing procedures necessary for expressing an opinion on the Town's financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole or on any of the categories of controls identified above.

The elected and appointed officials of the Town are responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgements are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control of the Town of Belmont taken as a whole or on any of the categories of controls identified in the first paragraph. However, our study and evaluation disclosed no conditions that we believed to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended solely for the use of Town officials and interested government agencies. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report or its publication as required by Chapter 71-A:21 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In 1984 we saw a continued rapid population growth in our town with building permits issued for 117 new housing units. We completed the reconstruction of Bean Hill Road, but see and hear from many citizens, of the need for more maintenance and repairs on many other roads because of increased usage.

In an effort to increase the tax base, with a limited impact on town services, we have negotiated with a local investment corporation for the development of an industrial park in town. The installation of the town sewer system has progressed well and the village district users should start going on line early this summer. After completion of the village district hookups we plan to reconstruct the sidewalks, curbs and Main Street in 1986.

Through the New Hampshire Public Works and Highways we are reconstructing the "no-name bridge", now called the Harold Reed Bridge on South Road. This replaces a very narrow and deteriorated bus route.

The new computer system has been installed and is proving to be very useful and well worth the investment. Through the utilization of a municipal intern hired last summer we have completed assigning street numbers for all lots in Belmont. This will aid the Postal Service and Police and Fire Departments in locating residences when the current owner is not readily known. The municipal intern also aided in an indepth review and codification of all town ordinances.

Solid waste disposal continues to be a major concern of many municipalities as well as Belmont. We have met with and investigated the Concord Solid Waste Recovery Facility which appears to be the best available solution at this time and we are recommending the town participate in this venture with the other area towns.

The hydroelectric facility at Lochmere is nearly completed and should start producing power in the near future. This should provide a nice profit to the town for many years to come.

The Board of Selectmen are pleased to report that we have successfully maintained the town portion of the tax rate with 1984 being only \$8.49 per thousand. This compares with \$8.60 in 1983; \$8.70 in 1982; \$8.60 in 1981 and \$9.00 in 1980 and the tax rate for 1985 is expected to remain constant.

The Board sincerely thanks Dave Caron, Administrative Assistant and all Department Heads, Commissioners, and Committees for their cooperation and assistance this year.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

This year the Civil Defense department was very busy. In May and June we had several flood conditions at Coons Point, Gardner's Grove, Nelson Court. Several cellars in the community were pumped out.

Civil Defense also has emergency plans for the Lochmere Dam. This year the Civil Defense is updating the Town Plan and to better our radio communications through the help of matching funds, and also to be better prepared in case of flooding in the future. Civil Defense would like to thank the Belmont Fire Department and the Highway Department for supporting Civil Defense during these emergencies.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Belmont Conservation Commission made five dredge and fill inspections and two on-site inspections of new applications of earth excavations. Also, being monitored is the fill for the sewer line along Route 140 between Church Street and Depot Street and fill on Route 106, near Friend Road.

The commission has been requested to find a new location for a town dump as our present site has reached its maximum capacity as determined by the State of New Hampshire. Two possible sites, have been presented. We do feel however, that the possibility of open dumps could be forgotten in the next decade due to higher costs and a more feasible plan would be solid and hazardous waste separation, and/or composting a viable solution.

The commission is concerned about development in a flood plain area i.e., the Tioga River along Route 140. The commission feels that extreme care should be taken in monitoring growth in this area. Wetland and flood plains serve a valuable role in storing flood waters and in the moderation of extreme flows. When bulldozers and dump trucks alter these areas, unfortunate events occur.

A plan is being formulated to monitor the location of old abandoned gasoline tanks. Leakage from some of these old tanks can contaminate water supplies.

In closing the commission requested our administrative assistant to budget funds for the painting and repair of the bandstand.

BELMONT FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Belmont Fire Department responded to a total of 405 calls in 1984 which shows an increase of 41 calls or a 11.3% increase over 1983. Fire calls, mutual aid calls and special service calls were all higher this year. The only increase that we had, was medical aid calls which were down 1 call from 1983.

Fire and Building Inspections showed an increase of 37 inspections over 1983. Total man hours spent on inspections was 392 hours. The Fire Protection Program is underway and so far most of the businesses on the Route 3 end of town have been inspected. Many violations were found and corrected.

Last year was the first full year of operation for the new fire truck that was put into service in early January, 1984. I must say that when you buy quality equipment it will do the job. Many Fire Departments from throughout New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont and Connecticut have been in to see the truck and they all say it's one of the best looking trucks that they have seen. We have mailed out 12 to 15 sets of specifications for this truck to different departments that have asked for them.

1983 was a very busy year for the members of the department. A total of 5,836 hours which covers emergency calls, meetings and training. This was an average of 291.8 hours per person. Three more members of the department became emergency medical technicians in 1984 and two members are taking an E.M.T. course which is just about completed. A Fire Fighter Level I course was set up in the department and the members who are taking the course will be State Certified Fire Fighters when the course is completed.

A problem that we are having more and more is improper installation of woodstoves. After woodstoves are installed, the Fire Department is called to inspect them and most of these inspections are not approved. Reasons being, not having the proper clearance for the stove, poor chimney, more than one type of fuel being used in the same chimney, etc. We would be more than happy to inspect anyone's home before they purchase a wood or coal stove.

At this time, I would like to thank our Administrative Assistant, Board of Selectmen, Budget Committee, Town Office Personnel, other departments and committees and the citizens of Belmont for their cooperation and support during the past year.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF BELMONT IN THE COUNTY OF BELKNAP, IN THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet for the 1985 annual meeting of the Town of Belmont to be holden in two sessions as follows:

FIRST SESSION

The FIRST SESSION shall be holden at the Roland Kimball Auditorium, Belmont High School, Belmont, New Hampshire on the 12th day of March next, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. Are you in favor of increasing the term of the town highway agent from one year to three years, beginning with the term of the town highway agent who shall be elected at next year's regular town meeting?
3. Are you in favor of having the office of town clerk combined with the office of tax collector, thereby creating a new office of town clerk - tax collector to be held by one individual, with the term of said office to be for three years?

SECOND SESSION

The SECOND SESSION shall be holden at the Roland Kimball Auditorium, Belmont High School, Belmont, New Hampshire on the 16th day of March next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To hear and act upon the reports of committees.
2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, and to renew or refund any notes that may be issued for a period shorter than one year from the date of the original loan.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at Public Auction and convey real property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and/or State grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of any Town funds, unless previously appropriated; (2) that a Public Hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of Town monies, all as provided by RSA 31: 95-B.

construction and paving of Durrell Mountain Road from Swallow Road to the corner of Hoadley Road.

(2) In addition, we request that any other monies required to complete this task of construction and paving of Durrell Mountain Road between said points be appropriated in 1985. (By petition) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

Funds requested - approximately 10,032 feet at approximately \$82,380.00. (By petition) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

13. The current sand composition permits constant erosion causing potholes and ridges to which the repeated grading, raking and sand additions have little or no lasting effect. We, the undersigned, all registered voters and taxpayers of Belmont, N.H. petition the Town of Belmont to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 to gravel and pave Gardners Grove Road from Jamestown Road to the cul-de-sac known as Pine Grove Road, to be financed in the following manner: (By petition) (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and cities in a joint and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at the town offices during normal business hours. The Board of Selectmen is specifically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto.

- 16. We the undersigned are taxpayers that reside on Ladd Hill Road in Belmont would like to designate Ladd Hill Road as a Scenic Road. That a Scenic Road incorporates prominent visual features such as boulders, old stone walls, fences, outlooks and picturesque trees or other vegetation; should accomodate slowing or stopping traffic; has no drastic cut and fill banks; is relatively free of commercial or intensive development; has a "design speed" condusive to a drive of moderate speed but is not laid out to encourage constant speeds. (By petition)

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow Mark Mooney to relocate the present position of South Road passing between his house on the left and a house on the right which includes a sharp curve a distance of approximately 1,500 feet at no expense to the Town to an area behind the house on the right on property now owned by Mark Mooney to be deeded to the Town when completed according to Town road specifications and to see if the Town will vote to discontinue the present portion of the affected roadway and deed same to Mark Mooney.
18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a portion of Bryant Road beginning at the intersection of Rte. 106 for a distance of approximately 400 feet, thus making Bryant Road a dead-end road.

19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

STREET NUMBERING ORDINANCE

All buildings within the corporate limits of the Town of Belmont shall hereafter be identified by reference to a uniform numbering system which has been established by the Selectmen, and from time-to-time may be amended, altered or deleted. Each building within the Town of Belmont shall be conspicuously posted with a street number so assigned by the Board of Selectmen. Failure of the owner of any building to affix the assigned number to the structure shall constitute of a violation.

To see if the Town of Belmont will vote to discontinue a small portion of the Old Rte. 3 right-of-way, lying southerly of the 1975 relocation of said road, and extending from the westerly side of Sunset Drive to the shore of Lake Winnisquam, and to convey said portion to the owner of the abutting property, Matthew Mirski.

To see if the Town will vote to convey a small portion of the Rte. 140 Meadow Land, so-called, lying westerly of the old railroad right-of-way, to Peter Duffy, provided that Peter Duffy or his successor gives the Town access to its Rte. 140 Meadow Land via the aforementioned old railroad right-of-way.
22. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Chapter 20, Section 17 (Squealing Tires) and to replace said ordinance with the following ordinance:

MISUSE OF POWER: Loud, unnecessary, unnatural and unusual noises for the purposes of this chapter shall include but

not be limited to any noise occasioned by any one or more of the following actions of the operator of any motor vehicle operated within the confines of the Town of Belmont. Misuse of power exceeding tire traction limits in acceleration, sometimes known as "laying rubber" or "peeling rubber"; misuse of braking power exceeding tire traction limits in deceleration where there is no emergency; rapid acceleration by means of quick upshifting of transmission gear with either the clutch of a manual transmission or automatic transmission; rapid deceleration by means of quick downshifting of transmission gears with either the clutch of a manual transmission or automatic transmission; racing of engines by manipulation of the accelerator, gas pedal, carburetor or gear selection whether the vehicle is either in motion or standing still.

23. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Chapter 20, Section 22 (Penalties) and to replace said ordinance with the following ordinance:

PENALTY: Any person who violates any of the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of a violation and shall be penalized as provided for in the Criminal Code of the State of New Hampshire except that any person who as owner or operator of any motor vehicle who violates any provision of Sections 6, 20 or 21 shall be issued a parking violation notice which shall be affixed to the motor vehicle by any police officer and said owner or operator shall be charged five dollars (\$5.00) if payment is made to the Town Clerk's Office within forty-eight hours. If payment of five dollars (\$5.00) is not made as aforesaid, the Town Clerk shall mail such owner or operator a written notice by certified mail requesting such payment plus the certified mail fee, and if said payment and fees are not received by the Town Clerk within seven (7) days, or if said written notice is returned by the post office because it could not be delivered, a complaint for violation of this ordinance shall be issued by the Police Chief and upon conviction of a violation of any provision of Sections 6, 20 or 21, shall be penalized the same as for a violation under the Criminal Code of the State of New Hampshire.

24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

One smoke detector shall be required on each level of any residential structure. All chimneys hereafter constructed shall extend at least two (2) feet above the roof line, and only one heating appliance (1) is allowed per flue. All chimney work that serves solid fuel heating appliances shall be inspected by the chief of the fire department or his designee prior to its

enclosure. All masonry work shall meet NFPA #211, 1983 edition.

25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the 1984 National Fire Codes and all subsequent additions, deletions and modifications to the Codes.
26. We, the undersigned, all residents and registered voters of the Town of Belmont, respectfully request that the voters at the Annual Meeting consider the following ordinance:

WHEREAS, the Town has recently accepted ownership, operation and maintenance of Concord Street and Main Street from the State of New Hampshire; and

WHEREAS, it is to the Town's benefit to limit heavy traffic on these roads to preserve their structural integrity and maintain the residential nature of the area;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Annual Meeting pass the following ordinance forbidding thru trucking on Concord and Main Streets:

Concord Street and that portion of Main Street, from the intersection with Concord Street to its intersection with Depot St. shall be designated as public highways where thru trucking is prohibited. Thru trucking shall be defined as all trucks in excess of a gross weight of 12,000 pounds, provided that no such designation shall prevent business operations in connection with stores, factories or any other business or industrial establishments, enterprises or warehouses along said highways. The operators of said vehicles in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation. (By petition)

27. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

During 1984 we replaced many troublesome culverts, grubbed Union Road and laid over 900 tons of asphalt, sealcoated Juniper Drive, cut trees and grubbed sections of Dutile Road. In cooperation with the State of New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways, approximately seven hundred feet of culvert pipe was installed on Rte. 3 next to Granite State Oxygen to eliminate a severe drainage problem. I feel that funds were well spent shimming Union Road and we will continue this practice on other roads.

The Town contracted out for the reconstruction of Bean Hill Road this past summer, and Durrell Mt. Road is scheduled for reconstruction in 1985. Also in cooperation with the State and the Federal Government, the Harold Reed Bridge on South Road is currently being constructed, to be completed in 1985. The State is currently designing the planned 1986 reconstruction of Main Street, to be accomplished with Town and State money.

Last winter was hard because of the ice conditions, and this winter seems to be starting the same way. We appreciate all of the cooperation we receive from the public. We are trying our best, and have a good year.

At the close of 1984, the Belmont Library can be looked back upon with satisfaction as to its present condition. Outside the brickwork was sealed with silicon and caulking applied between window frames and the masonry to shut out the drafts of cold air seeping in around the windows. The new front door of a year ago, also, has helped keep out the cold as well as the quilted curtains. At the suggestion of the trustees an asphalt walk was put in by the Town from the library's downstairs door to the parking lot.

Inside two overhead fans have been installed to circulate heat in winter and blow cool air in summer. Two new bookshelves were purchased which necessitated a table having to be removed from the adult side. The library is very much limited as to space and some expansion may have to be made in the future. At present, there are 1263 library patrons and it is difficult to find places to put all the books, old and new. It has been necessary to discard some books, and the librarian has had the assistance of the N.H. State Library in so doing. The discarded books were given to the N.H. Humane Society for its sale. Mrs. Kay Herrick of the State Library met with the trustees and librarian to discuss the forming of a "Friends of the Library" group.

It was decided by the trustees to continue renting the telephone rather than buying it. Fees were discussed and the fee for non-resident library cards was raised to five dollars. Except for Civic groups which do not pay, the rent for the library hall was raised to twenty dollars.

It was with great regret that we accepted the resignation of the librarian, Mrs. Jo Anne Stevens effective last April 1. She was excellent, had good rapport with the public, was always willing to help, made good book selections and maintained a friendly orderly library. We were fortunate to secure Mrs. Norma Roulx to take over the librarian's duties and she, too, is doing good work.

We would like to see more of the card patrons use the library. It's one the Town can rightly be proud of.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1984

Despite the improved economy in 1984, and a local building boom, fewer new lots were approved by the Planning Board. This reflects a backlog of several hundred building lots which have not been developed. The statistics are as follows:

Due to the absence of a zoning ordinance, each sewerred lot has no restrictions on how many dwelling units may be placed on the lot, or the use of the lot. Unsewerred lots are usually restricted to two units.

The board continues to assess developers for road improvements for lots on unpaved roads. Most new lots are on paved roads.

1984 saw the first industrial subdivision on Rt. 106. This will attract needed nonresidential development and improve the tax base.

For 1985, the Board sees growth to be primarily residential, with more multi-family housing. Taxes will inevitably increase due to the demand for more services.

BELMONT POLICE DEPARTMENT
"Service and Protection"

From the Chiefs' Desk: Douglas A. Boyd

1984 proved to be a busy year with some relatively serious offenses taking place. The community is growing very quickly, which tends to produce more strain on police service. As you may know, Lieutenant Michael McCarty is now the fulltime Detective for the department. This was made possible by the acquisition of Officer Joseph Corso in 1984.

We are planning a new project in 1985 named "OPERATION TOWN WATCH" which will be ready by Town Meeting for distribution. This program will suggest ways of deterring crime and helping the police to more effectively control crime in the community by having concerned citizens be the eyes and ears to prevent crime. These pamphlets will be available for you soon, definitely by Town Meeting Day.

Again we managed another year servicing the community without any real major problems.

We have not experienced any major problems with equipment and are very impressed with the Ford cruisers and have not experienced any major mechanical problems. Some departments are having transmission problems, blown engines, etc. We feel because of good driving habits, and the fact the men are pleased with the cars that we spare ourselves these problems.

In these times of advancing criminal activity, especially violent crime, and police officers having to act instantly to very hazardous and complicated situations the chance of making the wrong move is ever present. We have no pending litigation whatsoever against the Town by our actions nor anything either initiated or pending against the Police Department.

The Department experienced eleven and one half sick days for the year 1984.

The Belmont Police Department responded directly to 2700 calls from citizens and the public for service.

The areas of concern in the area of aggravated assaults and of which one was an attempted murder. This is a sign of a growing community, which encourages transients to populate in Belmont, because of new apartments making for new living quarters. The community is growing very fast and consequently it is difficult to keep up with every new short term resident. These aggravated assaults have been directed toward policemen as well as other citizens.

The burglaries are down considerably over the last four years and that is attributed to many reasons and remote factors. Some of them were resolved by way of criminal trespass prosecution which is under "All Other Offenses". All in all we feel we are doing a respectable job deterring serious crimes such as burglary by vigorous investigation and by citizen awareness.

1985 is a year we are looking forward to as we have new programs to initiate, more appropriate ways of dealing with problems and a rejuvenated spirit toward the new year.

I would like to thank sincerely the people for their tremendous support, by way of equipment, and their realistic understanding of what we need to function in a professional way, doing what a police agency must do in these complicated, demanding police times.

BELMONT SEWER COMMISSION

The Sewer Commission continued this year with its building program covering the village area. As of the end of the year, over 90% of all work had been completed, leaving the final cleanup and paving for the Spring of 1985.

The village's system ties into the larger Winnepesaukee system that has been ongoing at the same time. The Commission would like to take this opportunity to thank their two construction inspectors for a job well done, and a special thanks to Town Administrator Dave Caron who has served as our construction administrator and has brought nothing but praise for the town from state and federal agencies for his superior reportings.
