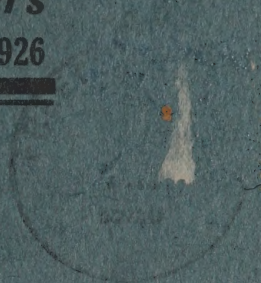

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Freedom, in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10 th day of March next, at nine (9) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for decorating soldiers graves.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer highways and bridges.
7. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid and raise such sums of money as required by the state Highway Department.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to put sills under the roller house.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to apply on the town debt.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of old home week.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the extermination of white pine blister.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of hydrants.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Freedom:

There was no change in teachers during the year which ended on June 30, 1925. Mr. Bennett is continuing his services in the grammar room this year. As Mrs. Heikes was not a candidate for re-election, Miss Lucinda Brown was chosen to fill the position of primary teacher.

The fall term of school opened on September 7th with an enrollment of fifty-four pupils, and closed on December 18th. The Christmas vacation was of one

week's duration, the winter term beginning on December 28th. If neither sickness nor exceptionally bad weather interferes with our schedule, the schools will close on March 12th for a vacation of three weeks, at a period of the year in which traveling conditions are likely to be the worst and consequently school attendance the poorest. The spring term opens on April 5th and closes June 11th.

Last year diplomas were awarded five pupils, three of whom are now in attendance at high school and academy. At present there is an enrollment of four in the eighth grade which probably assures a graduation next June.

Four Freedom girls completed their courses in secondary schools last year and all of them made very creditable records. The community may well take pride in the fact that three of these girls are now enrolled in a higher institution of learning in our state, the Plymouth Normal School. One of New Hampshire's greatest needs in the past few years has been an adequate supply of normal trained teachers, adequate not in number alone but in capacity to understand the problems of the smaller community. Surely Freedom is doing her part when she contributes three of her progressive young people to the cause of education in a single year. No vocation on earth is of greater importance than that of training the young in intelligence and character.

I wish to congratulate you upon the excellent improvements made in the interior of the schoolhouse last summer. The rooms are decidedly more attractive with their lighter colored walls. The partitions serve the double purpose of doing away with cross lighting with its attendant eyestrain, and of making possible a warm, well-ventilated place for the pupils' outer garments. The heating of the rooms is much more effective with the addition of the stove drums. I recommend the installation of slate blackboards on the

front of each of the partitions. The cost of these boards delivered would be approximately \$60.00. Other types of blackboard material can be obtained at less cost, but first grade slate is the most economical because it requires no refinishing and is permanent. I also recommend the purchase of a sand table for the primary room. One of these could be obtained from commercial houses for about \$25.00, and would possibly be built locally for a somewhat less amount. It would be very desirable to have chemical toilets and regular jacketed stoves that provide for both heating and ventilating.

In closing, let me say that I am pleased with the progress of our schools this year. Both teachers are working with interest and enthusiasm and good results should attend their efforts. Let me also express my appreciation of the assistance and cooperation of the school board.
