- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars for the maintenance of the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire

Department. (\$4,000.00)

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for the prevention and fighting of forest fires. (\$500.00)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Dollars for the maintenance of the Gilmanton Rescue Squad. (\$350.00)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for painting and exterior of the Gilmanton Academy. (\$2,500.00)

(\$1,700.00)

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for the care of cemeteries, (\$300.00)
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars for the support of the Town Libraries. (\$1,100.00)
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars for the support of the Central New Hampshire Home Care Service. (Submitted by petition and without the recommendation of the Budget Committee.)
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars for parks, playgrounds and recreation. (\$1,000.00)
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the expenses of the Town Planning Board. (\$100.00)
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the Conservation Commission. (\$100.00)
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred Seventy-two Dollars and Fifty Cents for payment of interest on long term notes. (\$3,172.50) (See Articles 23 & 24 of 1969 Warrant and Article 38 of 1972 Warrant.)
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for payment of principal on long term notes. (\$7,500.00) (See Articles 23 & 24 of 1969 Warrant and Article 38 of 1972 Warrant.)
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for the purchase of one brush chipper, of which sum \$4,500.00 will be withdrawn from the Revenue Sharing Fund. (\$4,500.00)
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars toward the support of the New Hampshire Humane Society. (\$300.00)

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING March 7, 1972

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator at 10:00 a.m. The warrant was read by the Moderator. Ballots were unsealed by the Clerk and given to the Ballot Inspectors for counting. Ballot box shown to voters. Voted to close the polls at 7:00 p.m.

- 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept any State or Federal monies that may be available to the Town.
- 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for Civil Defense Organization for the ensuing year, with full realization that should a major emergency be created, more money will have to be used for said purpose. (\$300.00)
- 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Dollars for the purpose of entering into a contract with the Sheriff of Belknap County, N.H., for full-time police service, to include twelve hours of patrol per day within the Town. (\$8,380.00)
- 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for Town Police.(\$500.00)
- 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars for the annual salary of a paid fireman, his qualifications and duties to be determined and approved by the Gilmanton Fire Commission.(\$5,720.00)
- 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Eight Hundred Forty-four Dollars and Thirty-seven Cents for the maintenance of the Peaked Hill Fire Department. (\$3,844.37)
- 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars for the maintenance of the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department. (\$3,000.00)
- 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for the prevention and fighting of forest fires. (\$500.00)

- 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy-five Dollars for the maintenance of the Gilmanton Rescue Squad. (\$375.00)
- 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for the purchase and installation of a fence to complete the enclosure of the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Station water hole. (\$200.00)
- 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred Dollars for the purchase of a rescue vehicle with required equipment. (\$6,600.00)
- 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Dollars for the observance of Memorial Day. (\$190.00)
- 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Seven Hundred Three Dollars and Sixty-eight Cents for Summer Maintenance. (\$14,703.68)
- 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars for Winter Maintenance. (\$25,000.00)
- 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-five Dollars and Forty-four Cents for Town Road Aid. (\$1,385.44)
- 19. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-four Dollars and Eighty-one Cents as Block Grant Highway Subsidy Gas Tax Aid. (\$17,874.81)
- 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars toward the support of Wolfeboro Hospital. (\$100.00)
- 21. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars toward the support of Lakes Region General Hospital. (\$500.00)
- 22. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars toward the support of the Center Barnstead Ambulance, said Appropriation to be paid on condition that two full-time day-time operators be hired. (\$1,700.00)
- 23. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for the care of cemeteries. (\$300.00)
- 24. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars to cooperate with the State in Control of White Pine Blister Rust. (\$100.00)
- 25. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars for the support of the Town Libraries. (\$900.00)
- 26. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars for tarring and sealing highways, to be expended only for tar materials. (\$4,000.00)

- 27. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars for parks, playgrounds and recreation. (\$1,200.00)
- 28. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the expenses of the Town Planning Board. (\$100.00)
- 29. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the Conservation Commission, to be used in testing for contamination in Gilmanton's lakes and ponds. (\$100.00)
- 30. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty-six Dollars and Twenty-five Cents for payment of interest on long term notes. (\$656.25) (See Articles 23 & 24, 1969 Warrant.)
- 31. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars for payment of principal on long term notes. (\$5,000.00) (See Articles 23 & 24, 1969 Warrant.)
- 32. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred Dollars for the purchase of one highway sander. (\$3,000.00) Yes-136; No-56.
- 33. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars toward the support of the New Hampshire Humane Society (\$300.00)
- 34. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars as compensation to the Building Inspector and to rescind that portion of Article 29 of Town Warrant, March 12, 1968, which states: "The Selectmen shall remit, as compensation to the Building Inspector, in quarterly installments, the total amount of the fees collected by the Building Inspector during the preceding quarter." The fees that are collected will be retained by the Town.
- 35. Voted to table this article.
- 36. Voted to table this article.
- 37. Voted to post-pone this article indefinitely.
- 38. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars for the purpose of constructing a new fire station on the site of the former Gilmanton Iron Works Elementary School, the sum appropriated to be raised by long term notes payable in twenty equal yearly installments, plus interest. (\$50,000.00)

This article shall not become effective unless an agreement in writing is executed between the Town of Gilmanton, which the Selectmen are hereby authorized to execute, and the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department, providing the following:

A. Title to said property shall be transferred by the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department to the Town of Gilmanton, following demolition of the former Gilmanton Iron Works Elementary School Building:

- B. Payment by the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department of the full cost of said building, payment to be made in installments and at such time so that on the due date of any payment by the Town of Gilmanton the bonds hereby authorized and the interest thereon, the Town will have received sufficient payment from the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department to pay therefrom any bond and interest payment due;
- C. Reconveyance by the Selectmen of said property to the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department upon complete reimbursement to the Town of all payments, including interest, and other obligations incurred in connection with construction of said building;
- D. Selectmen to permit the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department to use and maintain said property so long as it is not in default under said agreement.
- 39. Voted to authorize the Gilmanton Iron Works Fire Department to demolish the Myrtle Marsh portion, so-called, of the former Gilmanton Iron Works Elementary school.
- 40. Voted to enlarge the Parks, Playgrounds and Recreation Commission from three to five members and to expand its organization, powers and jurisdiction, as provided in Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 31, for recreation commissions.
- 41. Voted to post-pone this article indefinitely.
- 42. Voted to adopt the provisions of Revised Statutes Annotated 154:23-30, an act to provide for the coordination of Mutual Aid in the protection against fires and to ratify and confirm the membership of the Gilmanton Iron Works and Gilmanton Corner Fire Departments in the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association, and to accept the by-laws of said Association as operational procedure.
- 43. Voted to authorize and direct the Road Agent and Selectmen to provide winter maintenance, the cost of which shall be paid by the Town, on the following described private roads in the Shellcamp Lake Development: Lakeview Lane (Right of Way), and Lakeshore Drive (entire main road) 1.4 miles. (By Petition).
- 44. Voted to adopt the following by-law: no person, whether a resident or a non-resident of the Town of Gilmanton, shall enter and make any use of the Crystal Lake Park when the same is closed by order of the Selectmen or the Parks, Playground and Recreation Commission. Any person violating this by-law shall be fined not more than \$25.00. Yes—101; No—46.
- 45. This article was post-poned indefinitely.
- 46. Voted to authorize the town dumps be opened five days per week, such days and the hours on such days during which the dumps shall be opened, to be

designated by the Selectmen and posted at the entrance of each dump. Any person found guilty of leaving refuse at any town dump, while the same is not open, shall be fined not more than \$25.00. Each violation hereof shall be considered a separate offense. (This article was amended to read five days instead of three days.)

- 47. Voted to accept conveyance of a parcel of land fifty feet (50') by three hundred ninety-two feet (392') with newly constructed highway thereon, beginning at its intersection with Route 140, passing by the easterly side of buildings now owned by Vernon Slaunwhite, to a point of intersection with the so-called Tibbetts Road, and accept said road as a public highway.
- 48. Voted to discontinue a section of the so-called Tibbetts Road, four hundred twenty-five feet (425') in length, beginning at Route 140 near the corner of the Alton Road Cemetery, passing by the westerly side of buildings now owned by Vernon Slaunwhite, to a point of intersection with the above mentioned new highway.
- 49. Voted to post closed, subject to gates and bars, the Sanborn Hill Road from the southerly boundary line of the Kelley School to the intersection of the Upper City Road by the property of Bosiak. Yes-59; No-51.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 p.m.

- CONSERVATION COMMISSION ACTIVITIES -

Your Commission was a little lethargic this year due to a variety of reasons, but we accomplished a few things in spite of ourselves.

At the beginning of the year, we were involved with discussion on how to restrain the town dogs during the winter months to protect the few deer we have in town. Most people are aware that dogs kill as many, if not more, deer than hunters.

We were suddenly faced with a large dredging project on Crystal Lake that was being aired before the Water Resources Board in Concord. It involved the removal of 16,000 cubic yards of marsh in a bay diagonally opposite the town beach below the old Leather farm. The intent was to make a swimming area and put in docks. The water depth would be between 2 to 4 feet over approximately a 3 acre bay. We felt the bay would end up badly polluted by over-use and under-circulation of the shallow water. The removal of a marsh and its benefitting action to the water and wild life was certainly a step backwards in our mind. The Water Resources Board thought so too, and would not allow the project to go ahead.

Water sampling began in June starting at Shellcamp Lake. Results of samples taken there were much better than expected except on the shore of the development which demonstrated the pollution brought about in very warm water by a little over use and a few poor septic systems.

Sawyer Lake has not changed a bit in spite of the fervent wishes of the Sawyer Lake residents and the blessings of the State Water Supply and Pollution Commission. The State also pronounced Crystal Lake clean after they tested it this past Fall. (Week of October 6th). However, the value of the State analysis and report is questionable for a variety of reasons. Clearly the obvious ones in regards to Crystal Lake are in saying that the lake is clean based on water sampled that has cooled to a point below that in which bacteria cannot live and reproduce and that water was sampled at a time of relatively low usage of the residing shoreline septic system. For the same reason, Sawyer Lake surface water would be drinkable in the Spring when it is cold and having cleared up over the Winter but the same surface water holds heavy growths of pathogenic bacteria a few months later because of high water temperatures and sewage leaking into the water.

It is very heartening to see that the Crystal Lake people have stood up to do something about their water. With their diligence and perserverance, I expect Crystal Lake will not get any worse and may well improve.

Samples taken from Loon Pond showed some improvement over the previous year. I hope those people that haven't yet thought it possible that their poor septic systems may be harming the water will consider this. Septic systems near the shoreline of any lake or pond are a temporary system, at best, unless they are entirely enclosed and periodically pumped out. The system that flaws eventually uses up the filter bed and then pollutes the water.

Now to let it go is a moral question. It is easy to think "no smell - no unsightly mess - therefore no problem for me." But how about the kids who come down with impetigo and other skin diseases, or ear infections, or the occassional dysentary from swimming in contaminated water? Must we turn our minds off from this too?

It is your water to use and enjoy - why help to poison and kill a lake? Your Commission finally would like some suggestions about what to do.

1. About our dogs during the winter months.

2. About the large number of out-of-State hunters that invade our woods every Fall. One suggestion was to close the town entirely to outsiders except by written permission of the landowner where the person wishes to hunt.

- 1. In spite of the fact that this Department has made a major commitment to pay the total costs for the construction of our new fire station, we have continued to defray part of the costs for the procurement of new equipment as is indicated in the foregoing financial statement showing a transfer of \$291.27 from our SPECIAL Account (own funds) to our PRIMARY Account (Town Appropriations).
- 2. Among the several items of new equipment purchased during the past year have been additional boots and helmets for the protection of personnel. Expenditures for radio equipment have been made to provide Engine Three (1250 Tanker) with this most essential requirement for good fire service.
- 3. Other than our regularly maintained endeavors toward providing an outstanding fire fighting service, and to continue to enhance our training toward that end, our principal activity during the past year has been the accomplishment, in an orderly manner of the several steps required for the final completion of our new fire station.
- 4. The first step was to seek competitive bids for the \$50,000.00 Municipal Bond Issue for the construction. This bond issue had been approved by the Townspeople at Town Meeting March 11, 1972 by a favorable vote. For this vote of confidence, the members of this department are most grateful. Competitive bids for the subject bonds produced the best bid of 5.7% from the Farmington National

Bank, Farmington, N.H. The bid for a twenty year payment schedule was accepted as the one best meeting our estimated capacity to meet payment requirements. This program obligates the Department to meet an annual payment on the principal of \$2,500.00 plus interest of \$2,850.00 for the first year with an annual reduction of interest at the rate of \$142.50 per annum.

- 5. The several essential steps toward demolition of the old school house, with salvage of much useable material; formalizing and dispatch of invitations for bids on the new construction; review of all bids received (6); acceptance and further negotiation of successful bid which was awarded to H. J. Lank, Inc., Center Barnstead, N.H.; site preparation; ground breaking and the overseeing of all steps toward the final construction were accomplished with dispatch.
- 6. In spite of what might reasonably be considered as delaying factors, adverse weather conditions included, typical to most any construction project of this magnitude, the new building was finally accepted on December 17th, with all vehicular equipment being moved to the new station as being fully operational that week.

Training and fire schools have been held and attended this past year with future plans for more of the same.

In April, 1971, the Town of Gilmanton became the first town in the State of New Hampshire to enter into a contract with Law Enforcement wherein a town contracts with an established Law Enforcement Agency to police their town. In this case, the Sheriff's Department of Belknap County entered a contract with the Town of Gilmanton. This program was financed on a 60/40 basis with a grant from the Federal Government, the grant absorbing the largest percentage. In all probability there will be no Federal Funds awarded for the Town of Gilmanton in 1974 for this program. However, at this time, there is an indication that for the year 1973, the program might be financed on a 25 or 50 percent grant by the Federal Government.

The contract calls for a 12 hour coverage, yet actually all calls are taken care of regardless of time and a 24 hour patrol is granted to the Town of Gilmanton.

By calling the Sheriff's Office, 524-3830, guarantees that a complaint or emergency will be answered because this office is manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

To report a crime, accident or any emergency:

(1) State location where police are needed; (2) What has happened; (3) State clearly, your name, address and telephone number. If possible, obtain description of person or persons involved, write down registration number if vehicle is used.

Start a crime check in YOUR town. In cooperation with the National Sheriff's Association, we are trying to reduce crime in rural areas through the "Neighborhood Watch Program". This Program is based on YOU reporting anything suspicious in the area of YOUR neighbor's property and he in turn reporting any unusual activity of HIS neighbors.

The Belknap County Sheriff's Department wishes to thank Mr. Osler, Mr. Bickford and Mr. Nelson, the Board of Selectmen for their continued cooperation and understanding shown us during 1972 and we will continuously strive to protect the citizens of Gilmanton and provide them with efficient Law Enforcement.

- REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF -

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegally and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

- STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT -

George B. Roberts, Jr. House Majority Leader

As the 1973 Session of the New Hampshire General Court gets underway, it will prove to be a busy schedule with many of the recommended bills being controversial. As of this date, it is anticipated that nearly 2,000 bills and resolutions will be introduced and acted upon.

I start this session again being in the position of House Majority Leader and Chairman of the House Rules Committee as well as membership on the Committee of Interstate Cooperation. These assignments and many administrative duties connected with the House dictate that at least three days a week are spent in Concord from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Other special interim committee assignments also demand time of the two remaining days of the week. As I was re-elected Chairman of the Belknap County Delegation to preside over matters concerning county government, the next two years will perhaps be the busiest since I have been your state representative.

Belknap District 4 now includes the towns of Alton, Barnstead and Gilmanton and requests for special legislation and legislation specifically dealing with my district have multiplied.

One such request is now House Bill 87 - an act providing for the acquisition of Shell Camp Pond in the Town of Gilmanton and making appropriations for the purchase, repair or reconstruction of this dam. This bill was introduced by request of taxpayers and residents in the town of Gilmanton particularly in and around Shell Camp Pond area. As of this date, House Bill 87 is in committee and while legislation of this type is not easy to pass, I am in hopes to report by July 1st that the town of Gilmanton will be relieved of the problems that this poorly maintained dam has created.

Another bill of concern to this local area is a bill which I will co-sponsor to establish that the fire underwriting for the State of New Hampshire be done by the New Hampshire Insurance Department to create a more accurate criteria for fire rates. This underwriting is presently being done by a private group paid for by the fire insurance companies doing business in New Hampshire.

I have made appointments to meet with the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways to bring to him local requests for highway improvements and betterment projects. Among the requests that I will bring to him will be a betterment project for Route 107 near the Belmont town line and a complete resurfacing project of Route 140 along with a request for betterment projects from the Gilmanton Iron Works section to the Alton village.

In the past, there have been many favorable comments about motor boat requests on the ponds and requests for rights-of-way to our public bodies of water. Because of our success in these projects, there will be another request for a right-of-way to those ponds of water in Gilmanton which presently do not have a

legal right-of-way or access to the water.

As in the past, I will continue being available to town officials and agencies to report to them about changes in state laws.

As always, I will try to continue to be responsive to your comments and suggestions regarding state legislation and look forward to your opinions and suggestions. This year, with a more accurate mailing list of constituents, I will again be reporting to you and look forward to your response.

Moved and seconded that the district raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred twenty-nine thousand, six hundred fifteen (\$229,615) for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Amendment to Article 4

Moved and seconded to increase the Budget Committee's recommended budget by eleven thousand, five hundred eleven dollars (\$11,511) to include in the following:

\$8,000 for the salary for an additional teacher to be hired under the Emergency Employment Act (fully reimbursed by federal funds).

WHEREAS, the present Gilmanton Elementary School building was built during the period 1965-66 with anticipation that New Hampshire School Building Aid funds, sufficient in amount to meet 30% of the annual obligation for payment of principal on bonded indebtedness would be provided by the State of New Hampshire pursuant to the provisions of Sections 15A and 15B, Chapter 198, New Hampshire Revised Statutes, annotated, and,

WHEREAS, such funds have been received by the Gilmanton School District in the amount of \$4,500.00 per annum for the years 1967 through 1970, and,

WHEREAS, the New Hampshire State Legislature has provided payment of only \$2,477.83 or 55.6% of the amount due for this purpose for the year 1971, and,

WHE REAS, we do recognize that Section 15E, Chapter 198, NH RSA does provide for a pro-rata distribution of available funds when inadequate funds are provided, and,

WHEREAS, WHEN ADEQUATE FUNDS ARE UNAVAILABLE to meet the subject School Building Aid obligations of the State of New Hampshire the only recourse available to the citizens of Gilmanton to meet the obligation of the Gilmanton School District is an unwarranted addition to the local property tax burden, and,

WHEREAS, if public school construction is to be advanced in the State of New Hampshire the integrity of funding for obligations of the state pursuant to the

provisions of the New Hampshire School Building Aid Program must be inviolate, and,

WHEREAS, it is a primary purpose of this Gilmanton Elementary School to teach its students the fundamental principal of adherence to obligations, contractural or implied, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that we, the citizens of the Gilmanton School District, at School District assembled, this 6th day of March, 1972, so direct that our Representative to the Great and General Court of the State of New Hampshire, Mr. George B. Roberts, Jr., advise the members of that august body of our displeasure and great concern as to the serious question of the indicated lack of adequate funding, and be it further

RESOLVED, that Mr. Roberts also advise that body it is our opinion that in the furtherance of school construction programs, School Building Aid, provided for under the provisions of Sections 15A and 15B, Chapter 198, NH RSA, must be considered to be firm, contractural obligations of the State of New Hampshire, for which adequate funding is mandatory, with timely payments being made to applicable School Districts, thereby precluding provision of deficit funding by local property tax.

- TO THE PEOPLE OF THE GILMANTON SCHOOL DISTRICT -

It has been my pleasure to report to you, over the past two years, how well your elementary school has run. It is still a joy to visit in the school and to observe the progress that is being made. The faculty is very dedicated and all are doing a conscientious job in educating the children of the community.

Your school, as any public school, has to take the children "where they find them" and proceed from that point to give them the education that they need. In checking with the various secondary schools where Gilmanton students attend, it is found that generally the Gilmanton students are well prepared. There are some areas, such as Industrial Arts and Home Economics which are lacking. In the academic areas, however, the students are well prepared and progress according to their ability and interests.

As this is being written, the question is being asked as to what will be Gilmanton's role in providing secondary education for its young people in the future. By the time this report is presented to you, a determination of some sort will have been made. Regardless of the outcome of the AREA vote and the Gilford School Bond vote, I urge the people of the town to continue, as they have in the past, to provide the best educational opportunities that are possible.

Education is expensive and will continue to be so for years to come. There are cases concerning the methods of expenditures for education before the U.S. Supreme Court at present. It is expected that decisions will be reached in the Spring. It appears that there will be required charges in the method of financing schools within the next few years. The reason, of course, is not to deny any students a proper education because of their living in a low economic area. These changes will not reduce the total cost of education but will redirect the method of apportioning those costs and expenditures.

As the world changes and there are new scientific and human developments, education will have to change to meet those developments. No longer can any school district feel that those changes will not affect them because the citizens are much more mobile than before. Do not expect that your young people will always reside within the confines of the present district lines. Many of you have come from and will go to various other parts of the country and world. Gilmanton is a good place to live and it is sure to attract more people. In order to prepare the youth of the community, outside changes must be recognized and education must change to meet the new challenges. I trust that the people of Gilmanton will be willing to provide the necessary educational tools for those meeting the competition from people of other areas of the world.

It has been my pleasure to have worked with the fine School Board members and the people of the community over the past five years as your Assistant Superintendent and then your Superintendent. My only hope is that I have helped the children of the community. It has personally been a rewarding experience.
