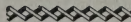

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goshen in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Goshen on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the followin subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Highway and Bridges.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the library.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for old age assistance.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for town poor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to continue to plow door yards and raise and appropriate the necessary sum and take any other action thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for winter roads.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for general expense of highway department.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$178.24 and the state will contribute \$712.96 for T. R. A. road.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for fire protection.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 in cooperation with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee region.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 16. To see what action the Town will take in erecting a memorial for our boys who served in World War II and to vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Municipal Budget act.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to have the names of all those tax payers posted in a public place who fail to pay their taxes by the end of the year. (Sponsored by Kurt Eigenbrod.)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to have all town books audited every three years. (Sponsored by Otho Nelson.)

ARTICLE 20. To bring up any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
5. **HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES**—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

ARTICLE 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Goshen School Board:

I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

I have enjoyed the helpfulness and patience of your School Board, the cooperation of the parents, the seriousness of purpose of the teachers and the steadfastness of purpose and friendliness of the pupils. In such an atmosphere education should continue to progress.

Goshen is very fortunate in having two very able resident teachers. The schools are run in a very efficient manner

and progress under their guidance is steady. Throughout the nation the teachers are demanding and getting higher wages. Any replacements in the teaching personnel would demand increased pay. It would seem only fair that those now doing satisfactory work should receive the same compensation that would have to be paid a newcomer to the town.

The hot lunch program that Mrs. Nelson is carrying on has promise of being one of the finest rural lunch programs in this vicinity. The teacher, pupils and parents are to be commended on this cooperative endeavor. The results of such a program should be noticed by both parents and teacher.

When school opened in September a seriously crowded condition existed in the Corner School. There were so many pupils that the desks had to be placed next to the back windows, in close proximity to the stove and very close to the front and side blackboards. Realizing that the condition should be remedied before cold weather an attempt was made to create a third school. This not only would have helped the immediate problem but would have resulted in increased educational advantages for the children of Goshen due to a lessened pupil load and fewer grades for each teacher. Although a teacher had been located for such a school no adequate housing conditions could be found. During the Christmas vacation a partition was removed. This helped considerably but is not the final answer. If our present enrollment continues and promotions are made as expected, there will be a total of 41 pupils in the Corner School next September. With this number of pupils the room will not only be crowded but will exceed the number of pupils that one teacher can reasonably be expected to teach. Possible solutions to this condition should be considered at the March meeting.

Much serious consideration has been given to the possibility of erecting a new school building. Such a project would mean a more permanent solution to crowded class rooms as well as providing better educational opportunities and housing conditions for the pupils and teachers. Although building at the present time is out of the question, it is hoped that definite steps might be started toward the formulation of a definite building program for the town of Goshen.

There is before the legislature a State Aid bill that, if passed, would mean an increase in aid to the town of Goshen

of over \$2,000. Part of this will have to be absorbed by increased salaries and other expenses but the balance can be used to help pay for the cost of the schools. Any saving brought about in this manner could very profitably be spent in helping pay for a new school.

Realizing that the costs of all departments of the town are increasing and that the taxpayers are interested in keeping the tax rate as low as possible, every effort to curtail unnecessary expenses in the schools is being made. However, we should realize that the education of our children is an investment in the future and necessary expenses are justifiable.
