*Over 1900 contributions to the Building Fund have made possible the new 27 bed hospital which is now being constructed in New London. One-third of the anticipated cost of \$634,000.00 will be met by the Federal Government under the Hill-Burton program. Construction started on August 5, 1957 under the direction of the MacMillin Company of Keene, New Hampshire, general contractors. The building was designed by the James H. Ritchie Company of Boston, Mass. who specialize in hospital architecture. It is expected that the building will be ready for occupancy in the early fall of 1958.*

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year  
ensuing.

2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore  
chosen and pass vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate  
the sum of \$14,160.00 to defray Town Charges for the en-  
suing year. This sum includes:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 for Tracy Memorial Library for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day, for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for Cemetery Purposes for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to grade and reseed the roadside bordering on the New London Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,725.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year and authorize the Selectmen to install three new lights on the Country Club Road and two lights on Gould Road under this appropriation.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for Town Welfare cases.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the construction of a sewer line from the new, New London Hospital to the existing system and raise said sum by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by issuance of serial notes and due as follows: \$1,000.00 due in 1958, \$2,000.00 due in 1959, and \$2,000.00 due in 1960. The New London Hospital Assoc., Inc. to match this figure with the sum of \$5,000.00.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Sewer Commission to use an amount not exceeding \$1,500.00 for

the construction of the new, New London Hospital sewer line in conjunction with Article 10, the same to be paid from an unused balance of the 1951 sewer improvement bond loan. Any amount used under this Article to be matched by the New London Hospital Assoc., Inc.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of shade trees for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of control and eradication of Pine Blister Rust for the ensuing year.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense for the ensuing year.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,628.30 as the town share of Sewer Maintenance for the ensuing year.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,100.00 for Summer Maintenance and \$6,840.00 for Winter Maintenance of highways, bridges, and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$694.08 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$4,627.19.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 in excess of maintenance funds for the improvement, rebuilding and resurfacing with bituminous mix of town roads to be designated by the Selectmen in conjunction with the Town Road Agent.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for the purpose of exchanging Highway Dept. trucks.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the improvement of sidewalks.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$3,600.00 for Fire Department maintenance for the ensuing year.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Police Department for the ensuing year. (Chief of Police salary, \$3,000.00, special officers and miscellaneous, \$500.00)

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for publicizing and advertising the Lake Sunapee Area, the same to be turned over to the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade for this purpose.

## **FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS**

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

**REMEMBER**—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT

1957 has been a busy year for the New London Planning Board with many meetings to consider various aspects of the future growth and orderly development of the town.

**Members:** James E. Shepard III, Arthur Little, A. T. Kirk, Laurids Lauridsen, Mary C. Barrett, H. Leslie Sawyer (resigned June, 1957) Wayne K. Wheeler (appointed, June, 1957). Chairman, Mary C. Barrett; Laurids Lauridsen, elected co-chairman in October to succeed as chairman in March.

### Projects:

Town Building - Following the adjourned town meeting in March, the Board of Selectmen invited the members of the Planning Board to work with them on the proposed town building to house a new post-office and town offices. Frequent joint meetings were held between that time and the town meeting in June. The primary concern of the planning board was that the building should be an asset to the appearance of New London and that it should carry out the charm of our traditionally colonial town. In this concern we hoped that we reflected the opinion and the wishes of the townspeople. At the June meeting, the plans were enthusiastically received and a vote of 155 in favor to 33 opposed was received. The proposal then went to the budget committee and another special town meeting was called for July 29 to raise the necessary funds. At this meeting the vote was 90 in favor to 88 opposed but since a 2-3ds majority was needed, the proposal was defeated. Project No. 2 was the direct result of the vote taken at the March town meeting: Article 25: To see if the town of New London will vote to participate in the Urban Planning Assistance Program authorized by the Housing Act of 1954, amended, and administered by the State of New Hampshire. Article 26: to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00, the State to pledge \$100.00 in administrative and technical services, the combined sum to be matched with Federal Funds to secure the services of a qualified consulting firm to prepare a base map and a land use study of the town. Both these articles were passed and on August 21, 1957 the contract for Urban

Planning Assistance between the town of New London and the State of New Hampshire was signed.

This program includes the following points:

1. Preparation of essential base maps for use in development of project. These include a township base map at scale of 1" - 1000', and compact area on map at scale of 1" - 200'.

## 2. Land Use Survey

**Existing Uses**— A study and analysis of existing land uses —residential, agricultural, commercial, recreational, educational, and other. Results to be delineated on town base map at scale of 1" - 1000', and compact area on map at scale of 1" - 200'.

**Land Use Plan - Generalized**—A study and analysis of proposed land uses - residential, agricultural, commercial, recreational, educational, and other. Results to be delineated on town base map at scale of 1" - 1000', and compact area on map at scale of 1" - 200'.

**Report**—Report outlining existing land use pattern, and reasons for proposed land use pattern.

3. **Zoning Ordinance**—Draft zoning ordinance and zoning map based on community needs.

Since the signing of this contract we have had frequent meetings with Mr. Charles Crangle, State Planning Director and Miss Mary Louise Hancock, assistant planning director. Mr. Eliot Hansen was appointed by the State Planning Board to work with us. At this date, the first two steps have been accomplished. From this analysis, based on existing land use, a report is being prepared outlining the present land use pattern and reasons for the proposed land use pattern. The next step which is now in process is the drafting of a zoning ordinance and a zoning map based on community needs.

Without a zoning ordinance we would be powerless to prevent the erection of a hot dog stand or a glue factory in the midst of our residential areas. We would be helpless in the

face of a development of match-box size houses on too small lots—which would present health and fire problems. With zoning, we can plan for a more orderly pattern of growth, eliminating dead-end streets and inaccessible properties thus keeping our land values up and our town a desirable and wonderful place in which to live.

Any zoning ordinance adopted will not affect existing land uses but will protect your property in the future. For example, old signboards may stay but we hope to incorporate in the zoning ordinance a restriction on the size of signs so that our visitors will come to admire our scenery and not our billboards.

We are grateful to Henry Stanley, town road agent, for his help on the maps. On the town map, private roads are shown only when they service more than one or two houses or if they connect two town roads. The Planning board, with the approval of the road agent, has recommended to the selectmen that new roads should be 50' wide; and that the two dead end roads in back of Orchard's house be joined.

The Planning Board also considers that the present dump location is adequate for a good many years so do not suggest any change at this time.

Another recommendation made to the selectmen by our board is that open trucks going to the dump be covered with canvas.

The sum of \$100.00 was contributed to the Hospital Finance Fund. On Memorial Day, all our Gold Star mothers were remembered with flowers or plants. At Christmas time, the sum of \$5.00 was sent to the Elkins Chapel to buy Christmas tree gifts for the village children.

ANNUAL REPORT

At the completion of a busy year at the library, a brief report of book and magazine circulation seems to be in order:

It is a pleasure to show an increase over last year of 1882 books circulated, and to note that 1300 more visitors, making a total of 12,264 persons, have used the library in 1957.

We have been glad to send 23 books on interlibrary loans to the New Hampshire State Library, and to neighboring libraries. The Bookmobile calls on alternate months to supplement the juvenile and adult collections.

During 1957, the library has purchased 390 new books; 187 for adult reading, and 137 for the Children's Room. We have received 66 books as gifts. By subscriptions, and by gifts of generous friends, our table in the reading room is well furnished with 52 current magazines.

By request of the teachers at the elementary school, 206 books have been sent to them for informational and supplementary reading. We have also been glad to loan the following books: to Mr. Alphonse Soucy (for remedial work with his classes), 105 books; to the kindergarten, 27 books; to Sutton School, 30 books; and to Wilmot School, 55 books. The counsellors at the summer camps have made frequent use of our library for books and pictures. The requests for information and special material have amounted to 393 calls, most of which was for source themes for class work.

The Woman's Club has held three of their meetings in the auditorium during the year, and the Committee Room is open at all times for small meetings. The auditorium is put to good use in the summertime for special exhibits.

Military books added to our special shelves by the New London Service Organization this year include: "Through Hell and Deep Water," "The Naked Warriors," "The Secret War," and "Guns of the Navarone."

Two children's authors, Mrs. Elizabeth Ripley and Mrs. Elizabeth Honness, have presented the library with copies of their books, "Goya", by Mrs. Ripley, and "Mystery at the Doll Hospital," and "Mystery of the Diamond Necklace," by Mrs. Honness.

Grades VI and VII at the Central School were brought by their teacher, Mr. Philip Hammond, for two classes in library instruction by Mrs. Ray. The first class was for teaching the use of the card catalogue. The second class taught the knowledge of the tools of the library, such as the Readers Guide to Periodicals, the dictionary, and the encyclopedias, as well as a conducted tour of the building for familiarization.

Form letters were mailed by the librarian to the various organizations in town offering our assistance in obtaining special material to help them in their work.

The number of borrowers added to our register this year was 126 adults, and 91 juveniles, an increase over last year of 25 borrowers.

The article entitled, "Tracy Memorial Reading Club," written by Mrs. Ray was accepted for publication in the 1957 vacation issue of The Wilson Library Bulletin. This article described the successful reading project conducted by the library in the summer of 1956.

In May, Senior Citizen's Month was observed with an exhibit of books, journals, and articles on gerontology. During this

month all organized groups were asked to honor the older members of the community.

During this month, also, the Chairman of our Board of Trustees, Dr. J. Duane Squires, was elected the first president of the New Hampshire Association of Library Trustees, newly formed in 1957.

The executor of the estate of Mrs. E. W. Converse notified the librarian that Mrs. Converse had willed all of her many books to the library. Many of the duplicate sets have been sold, and the money used to purchase new books.

During August Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard exhibited her beautiful collection of oil paintings. Many of these depicted local scenes and were much enjoyed by our many summer guests.

Fifty children enrolled in July in the Vacation Reading Club. Armed with maps and suitcases, these "World Travelers" explored our universe by way of books. On August 31, a party was held for all members, and the awards and diplomas for completion of the course were given to the children. Refreshments of punch, cookies and ice cream were served by the librarians.

In September, the librarians attended the fall "workshop" meeting held in Newport. The theme of the meeting was built around the new standards for public libraries. The film strip, "Your Library—Oasis or Desert", was shown to the assembled librarians.

United Nations Week was marked with a display of posters, books, pamphlets, and flags of the nations. An answer sheet of questions about the United Nations, edited by Henry Cabot Lodge, was a feature of this exhibit.

A combined exhibit of book and hobbies opened Children's Book Week in November. This year saw our largest number of visitors, 450 persons. All the grades of the Central School, some of the High School students, Springfield Memorial School, the Wilmot Schools, the Kindergarten, and the Story-Hour Group attended the display. A beautiful collection of old and new can-



dle sticks loaned by Mrs. Lewis Simonds, and a large number of foreign dolls, loaned by Miss Sharon Wright, attracted much attention from all. Wood carvings by Mr. William Lawrence, a Japanese paper folding display by Miss Evelyn Boynton, dowsing rods by Mr. Norman Champion, a model of the USS Constitution made by Robert Wheeler and a model plane made by Ralph Marshall attracted the interest of everyone. Displays of our new additions, from picture-books to historical novels and biographies, were eagerly examined by all our visitors.

On Wednesday afternoon, November 20, the children's author Mrs. Duane Bradley Sanborn, addressed 200 children, gathered at the High School auditorium. She spoke on the subject of science for children, and displayed her new book, "CAPPY AND THE JET ENGINE." The kind comments and real interest shown by the visitors to our Book Fair have greatly pleased the Board and Staff of the library.

During 1957, five hundred and ninety-five children have been entertained and instructed during the Saturday afternoon Story Hours, which are held throughout the school year. Several parties have been arranged for their interest and amusement by their teachers.

Our Christmas lights shine out again, welcoming our friends to another year of helpful service to all at our library.

## NEW LONDON HOSPITAL HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION REPORT FOR 1957

The most important matters of interest at the monthly meetings of the New London Hospital Board of Directors have been the building of the new Hospital and the many problems in connection with it. After much planning and many delays the new Hospital is now an actuality and it is expected that we will occupy it by September, 1958.

On March 20, 1957 the first bids for the new Hospital were opened and to the great disappointment and dismay of the Board all the bids were much too high. After a great deal of discussion, re-drawing and revision of the plans they were again put out for bid and on July 2, 1957 the Board met for the opening of the bids. The MacMillen Company of Keene was the low bidder, as they had been previously, and on July 9, 1957 the Board voted to accept their bid. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on Wednesday, August 7th and since then the building has progressed so rapidly that it is considerably ahead of schedule. This has been due to the friendly cooperation between the builders, the architect, the Building Committee and the Board and Medical Staff, also the favorable weather in the Fall and early Winter. A great deal of credit goes to the Building Committee, Mrs. Sargent, the Administrator, Mr. Hemenway, the President and Mr. Cave, the Treasurer, for the innumerable hours they have spent working and planning for the new Building.

Mr. Harold Allen of New York, who gave the land and \$3500.00 for the new Hospital, has now deeded the remainder of the Walter Gay property to the Hospital. The Board deeply appreciates Mr. Allen's generosity. A gift of \$4720.00 from the Gorham Dana Estate was also given to the Hospital and was put into the building fund, for which we are very grateful. There have been several additional gifts to the building fund, for all of which the Board wishes to extend its heartfelt thanks.

Dr. James B. Brown of New London and Dr. John Walker of Sunapee were welcomed to the Staff of the Hospital.

The Medical Staff and the Board of Directors put on a delicious roast turkey dinner for the personnel of the Hospital in January, 1957, at which Dr. J. Duane Squires served very ably as Toastmaster. He presented citations to the personnel, according to their terms of service. Dr. Clough, Jr. spoke for

the Medical Staff and expressed their deep appreciation for the loyalty and support of all the personnel. Mrs. Sargent thanked the Staff and the Board for the dinner and the recognition and citations for all the members of the Hospital personnel.

Hospital Day, under the very efficient management of Mr. Frank Ramsey, was one of the biggest days financially that we have ever had. We were fortunate in having a fine day and the net income to date is \$10,161.36, with some still coming in. Everyone worked so hard to make this day a success and we are very grateful to all who had a part in it.

Donation Day was also one of the biggest ever held and we wish to thank not only the Committee and the Collectors, but everyone who contributed something for the Hospital.

Again we wish to thank the Womans Club for their financial donation, the Hospital Aid for their support, not only financially but for their never-ending work for the Hospital, and the Summer Residents Committee, whose untiring efforts this year went toward equipment for the new Hospital. Without the help of these organizations the work of running the Hospital would be most difficult.

The Board voted that the Fiscal Year of the Hospital would end on September 30th of each year. The number of inpatients cared for during the first nine months of 1957 was 576, an increase of 95 patients over the same period of the previous year. 433 operations were performed in comparison to 277 for the same previous period. The accident room showed an increase of 91 over the same period, 1165 patients being treated. The laboratory showed the biggest gain, 5,075 tests being performed against 4,099 in the first nine months of 1956.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New London qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said District on the sixth day of March, 1958, at 8:00 o'clock p. m. to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, and other state sources, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to sell the land and buildings known as the Elkins School and to convey the same to the purchaser thereof by proper deed in the name of the District.

9. To see what action the District will take toward considering the formation of a Co-operative School District, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of New London:

I submit herewith my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Since most of New Londons immediate and long-range school problems involve increasing enrollments and space limitations, the bulk of this report will be given over to setting down some of the items involved in providing additional space at both the elementary and secondary levels.

## Elementary Enrollment

Present and projected elementary enrollment now warrant consideration of single grades. Presently in Grades 1 - 6, no grade has less than 20 pupils. Based on the School Census, we can anticipate the following approximate number of entrants in Grade 1:

In addition to two different grades in a room, a further disadvantage to our present set-up is the fact that pupils in the same grade must be assigned to two different rooms.

Next September will see a high-pupil-teacher ratio and several undesirable grade splits—if we continue to operate under the present arrangement of five elementary classrooms for Grades 1 - 7.

A minimum of three additional classrooms would be needed in order to set up single grades. Additional elementary classroom space must be provided within a year or two—or New London will be faced with an undesirable and educationally unwholesome situation.

## **High School Plant**

At the High School level, the present plant and facilities are not adequate in a number of areas. Increasing enrollments and increased offerings—to provide a more varied instructional program—will make this problem more acute.

The High School program and facilities require a thorough study which should begin at once. However, such a study cannot be realistic until a decision is reached as to whether the planning should be for a High School (Grades 9 - 12) of approximately 150 students or whether it should be for a High School of 300 or more students. (The larger size would likely come about only in the event of some type of school consolidation.)

For a High School of 150 students, some—and not necessarily all—of the general areas of the present plant that need to be looked at include:

1. Improvement and enlargement of the Science facilities
2. Additional space for the Industrial Arts program
3. Improvement and enlargement of the Home Economics facilities
4. School Library facilities
5. Shower and locker room facilities
6. Additional general classrooms

## **Co-operative School Study**

New London school officials and some interested citizens have joined with representatives of surrounding towns to gain information on Co-operative School Districts. It was felt that this school set-up should be thoroughly explored at this time—especially since additional school building appears imminent here.

Co-operative School Districts may be formed on either a total twelve-grade basis or on a High School unit only. It should not be assumed that a Co-operative School would necessarily result in any substantial reduction in school costs. However, it is generally contended that higher educational standards could be provided for the same amount of money.

Co-operative School Districts are re-imbursed from 40 to 55% of school building costs by the State—in contrast to 30% received by a single District.

It seems desirable for New London citizens to learn as much as possible about the workings of this type of school set-up now—realizing that any major decision—especially at the High School level—will probably set the pattern of school organization here for many years to come. Unfortunately, New London cannot afford to delay its decision for school expansion for long. Your serious attention to this urgent problem is requested. Either some type of consolidated co-operative organization should be formed—if such is feasible for New London—or plans should be formulated for an expansion within the framework of the present New London School District.

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my annual report as Principal of New London Central School.

For several years my annual report to you has dealt with the various extra-curricular activities carried on by the students and the teachers. Since these activities follow a more or less general pattern each year, I wish to deviate from my usual procedure this year and instead summarize for you some of our findings concerning our graduates.

Six months after graduation we make a follow-up survey of our graduates to find out what they do after completing their high school course and the following statistics have been compiled from the records of the graduating classes of 1948 through 1957.

This survey shows that 23.9% of our graduates entered 4-year colleges compared to 23.3% for all the graduates in New Hampshire in 1955 when the last results were released from the New Hampshire State Department of Education. The survey also indicates that 30.9% of our graduates entered junior colleges, nursing schools, business schools, technical school, and like intitutions compared to 14.4% for all the graduates in New Hampshire.

It is apparent from these results that a large percentage of our graduates continue their schooling beyond high school. In order to meet their needs it is recommended that our science and mathematics programs should be strengthened by the addition of a course in general science and by doing away with the present system of alternating the science and mathematics courses in the junior and senior years. Also, consideration should be given to the possibility of offering both college preparatory and general English all four years and not just in the junior and senior years.

While strengthening our college preparatory program we must not forget, however, the students who terminate their fomal education when they gaduate from high school. Many of these students enter employment that is dependent on the vocational training received in high school. Since this is the case we must strive to keep our vocational offerings abreast of the times also.

## REPORT OF HELPING TEACHER

The position of Helping Teacher in this supervisory union is now in its fourth year of providing services as directed by the Superintendent of schools and as established by law:

“ . . .to give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils and parents of a school system as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adapting the program of studies to meet the needs of children and the community, bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, and community, and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of educational needs.”

The cooperation and encouragement given me by all school personnel in Newport, Sunapee, New London, Springfield, and Croydon have constantly helped me to keep in focus and seek the fulfillment of the objectives mentioned above. I wish to express my deep appreciation to all who have guided and helped me to realize the various responsibilities and services outlined below:

- 1. TESTING PROGRAM** - This includes the achievement tests scheduled at all grade levels for the entire school at the end of the school year; mental ability tests administered to pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7; and individual or small group tests administered as needs arise. Test scores, whether taken from tests of readiness, aptitude, mental ability, or achievement, are meaningful only to the extent they are used to guide the educational growth and development of children and of the school system as a whole. With increased interest and need for providing better education for the exceptional child, whether below or above the average, a closer look at test scores in achievement and mental ability, together with careful consideration of all cases through conferences with teachers and principal, may indicate the need for more effective grouping of pupils within the classroom.
- 2. CLASSROOM VISITS** - Visits are made with a purpose and make it possible to share the physical, emotional, and educational atmosphere of the classroom. Follow-up conferences with teachers are intended to exchange ideas, review general observations, and to promote instructional im-

provement, especially with new teachers and experienced teachers in new positions.

- 3. RESOURCES AND MATERIALS** - These are essential in providing enrichment in teaching, with greater interest and learning for pupils. New texts, references, bulletins, and other memoranda bring to the classroom a variety of teaching aids and all help to strengthen the overall curriculum. Science at the elementary level, and English at the secondary level have been more recently under study with the hope of improving the curriculum in these areas.
- 4. MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES** - Whether a formal staff meeting, an informal chat with a teacher, participation in P-T A discussions, or attending educational conferences, such meetings cover a variety of topics, including the reporting of pupil progress to parents, curriculum materials, promotion of pupils, tests and their use, pupils with special problems, ideas for special grouping of pupils, and many other topics - all aimed at providing the best education for all.
- 5. AUDIO-VISUAL AIDS** - The filmstrip is still the most useful and effective teaching aid in this field. Although the sound motion picture film is an excellent aid to teaching, it is rarely available when it is needed most. This year, with new filmstrips added in the fields of social studies and science, our library has seen considerable use in all schools. Future plans include the purchasing of more filmstrips in other areas of the curriculum.

The work of Helping Teacher shares in many other services and responsibilities of education, including conferences with parents, individual testing of pupils, the provision for in-service training of teachers through extension courses, assisting teachers with problems of keeping the school register, and many other interesting and varied experiences. The cooperative spirit of all teachers and the mutual interest in the best education for all make this work a purposeful pursuit.
