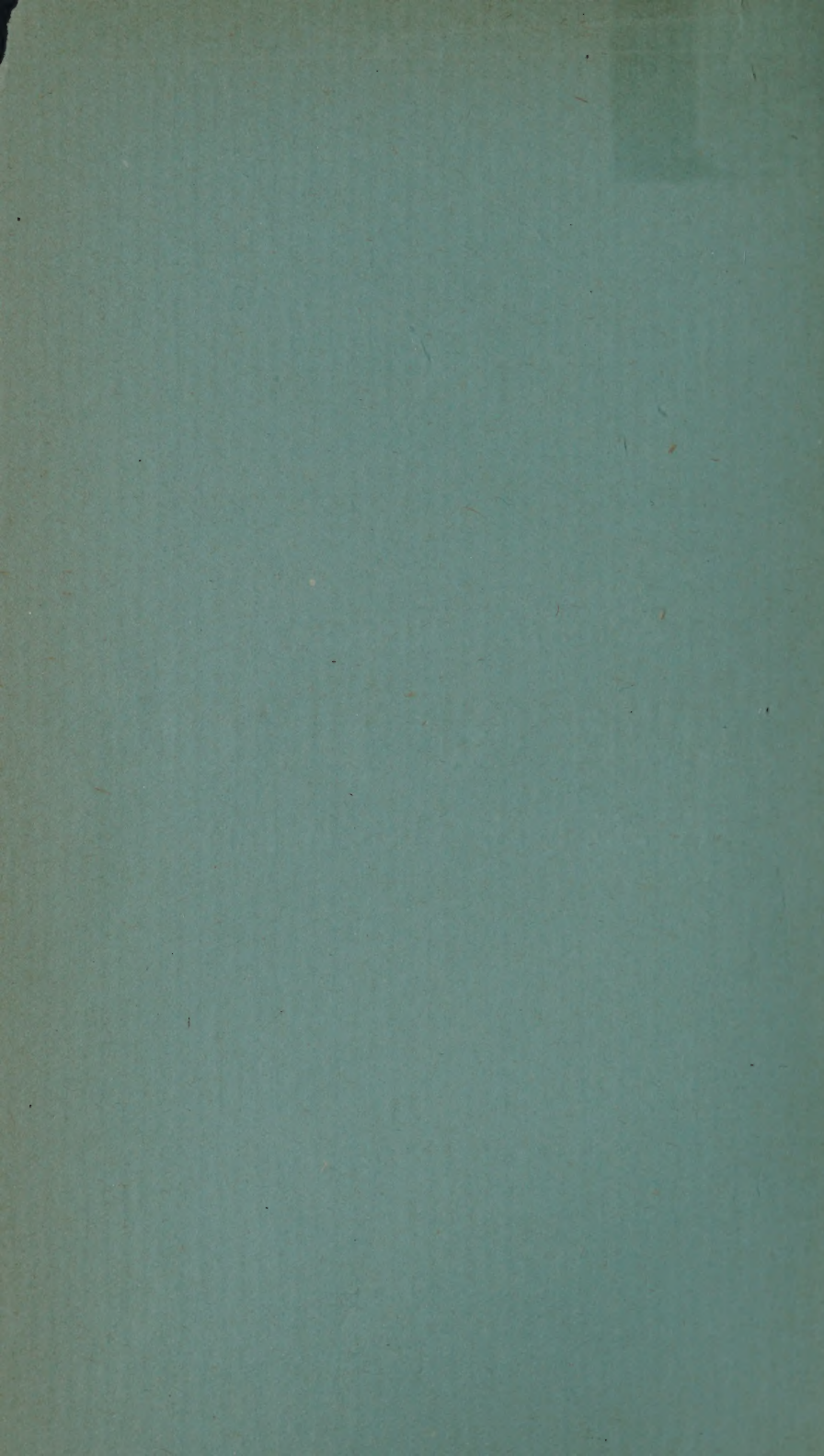

The state highway appropriation was as follows:

Amount set apart by the town \$966, extra money raised by the town \$483.29, received from state \$562.60, making total joint fund \$2,011.89. The contract for constructing the road was awarded to the town at its bid of 95 cents per running foot. The whole survey, 2,200 feet, was built, which was nearly 100 feet more than required at the above bid, and at an expense of \$1,587.94, leaving \$423.95 of the joint fund in the treasury. Included in above expense is \$89 expended for stone work and railing on culvert which was not required by the contract.

On the 14th day of August 1905, George W. Lord, executor of the last will of the late Hannah Page, paid to the town \$200, under the ninth clause of her will, which reads as follows: "I give and bequeath to the town of Tilton, in trust, two hundred dollars, the income thereof to be paid annually to the Trustees of Park Cemetery Association, and by them expended in paying any assessment that may ever be levied on my lot in said Cemetery and in keeping said lot sodded and lawn mowed and the stones and monumental work thereon clear and free from moss and other accumulations, and the balance, if any, used in general repairs and improvements on said Cemetery grounds." Said \$200 was deposited in the Iona Savings Bank, Acct. No. 6,316.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Of Union School District No. 1, in Tilton.

---

The board of education of Union School District respectfully submit the following report:

Our schools have made good progress during the past year. We have aimed for steady, sure advancement rather than showy work.

The attendance and punctuality have been better this year than ever before.

Our principal has been doing some supervisory work in the schools by having an assistant a part of a day each week. We are now contemplating plans whereby this work can be done more systematically and our principal have more time for this work. This can easily be done by procuring an assistant for our principal's room for one day in each week and thus giving him time to look after the work in the other grades. Thereby we shall receive as much benefit with less expense as we should if we united with other towns in hiring a superintendent.

The present day methods of training children in the public schools have called forth from parents much comment and criticism, partly on account of so called "fads" and partly because of the new ways of teaching old things.

In the days before the kindergarten had taken its place in public schools, children were plunged with no preparation whatever into first readers and primers. The training of the child which begins in the kindergarten is invaluable.



When the little one is advanced, his mind is in that receptive condition which accepts readily the more serious grade work.

Our primary grade is much too large for one teacher as the children are allowed to enter so very young. The most of them are too young for first grade or primary work, thus the teacher has to divide her time between primary and kindergarten work.

Much better results will be secured when the two are separated.

We can look upon our fire escape with much pleasure and satisfaction. It has cost more than was at first estimated, but we thought it advisable as we were to have one, to have it right in every respect, and we hope the district will be well satisfied.
