REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1916.

We respectfully submit the following report:

We have maintained 10 schools in the spring and fall terms, and 9 in the winter term. We thought best not to have a school at No. 9 the third term as there were only three pupils, so they were transported to No. 13. The schoolhouse at No. 3 was burned down last spring, so the pupils from there were transported to No. 2. The pupils from No. 12 were transported to No. 6.

We feel satisfied that if the schools could be more concentrated without too much inconvenience to the smaller pupils and too much expense to the district, it would be a benefit to the schools.

We believe that the pupils from the small schools, where the schools have been discontinued and pupils transferred to other schools, have been greatly benefited by the change.

We have made some changes in the school books during the year, which necessitated some extra expense. In place of Brook's readers, which have been used so long in our schools, we introduced Wheeler's readers for all grades. We also introduced into our schools Hicks' Champion Spelling books and Davison Health lessons, which have proved interesting as well as instructive, and have given general satisfaction.

The last two or three weeks of the third term the attendance was very small, the cause being cold, stormy weather and sickness. We do not believe that the money expended for schools in cold weather is any benefit to the smaller children.

Much depends upon the teacher employed. We have therefore exercised our best judgment in regard to this,

and with one or two exceptions we have been fortunate to obtain good teachers. The relationship between teacher and pupils has been pleasant, and where any unpleasantness has occurred the cause has not been with the teacher and pupils but outside of the school.

Our schoolhouses are in fair condition, except the inside of the buildings, which need whitewashing and some painting done, which would greatly improve them in looks as well as healthfulness. We would therefore recommend that money be raised for that purpose.
