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



Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Eaton:

During the year which ended on June 30, 1922, our two schools without difficulty maintained their required thirty-six weeks, the graduation from the eighth grade occurring on June 9th. Miss Mabel Rounds completed a very successful year at the Snowville school. At South Eaton, Miss Rena Piper taught the fall term of school, and Raymond C. Holden, the winter and spring terms. At the end of the year Mr. Holden was offered an excellent position in a school in another part of our state, and accepted it.

Miss Rounds returned to the Snowville school last September, and the work of the fall term showed excellent results. Miss Miriam Dorr, of Plymouth, Mass.,—an attendant of the summer session of the Plymouth, N. H., Normal School,—was engaged for the year at South Eaton. Unfortunately, Miss Dorr was taken ill several days before the close of the fall term and was unable to return to complete her year. After several unsuccessful attempts to reopen the school, the winter term commenced on Jan. 22nd, with Harvey Stuart, of Freedom, as teacher.

A real problem which confronts every rural community relates to the teachers' continuity of service. It has a real dollar and cents value which is not properly discerned, or at least not fully appreciated. There are few trained teachers who are willing to accept rural school positions, particularly the more remote ones. And when such a teacher is secured for a rural school, the term of her service is generally short. Many influences which are responsible for this condition cannnot be changed. But in one important respect the community or school neighborhood can help in solving the problem. Its attitude towards a new teacher should be one of sympathy, of encouragement and of co-operation. Too often the attitude is of cold aloofness, almost of suspicion, and of intolerance of things not customary. A large part of all criticisms of teachers are either unjust or else of no importance from the standpoint of the good of the school.

In addition to this general attitude, each school neighborhood should feel its own responsibility to furnish a suitable boarding place for its teacher, a place that is really a home, with a cheerful atmosphere and which offers some degree of privacy. Make the community wholesomely attractive to the teacher and her interest in its children, and their consequent advancement, will be correspondingly increased, and there is a much greater opportunity to retain her services for a period of years.

There seems to be considerable misconception of the obligation of the parent with respect to school at-

tendance. In the strict construction of the law, the parent is responsible for the child's attendance at school for every session. Further than this, if there is reason for the child's non-attendance, he must get his excuse from the school authorities. No school official, however, desires to be unreasonable, so that an occasional absence on account of bona-fide sickness or or the impassability of roads will not be questioned. An abstract of the attendance law follows:

Section 1. Every child between eight and sixteen years of age shall attend the public school to which he is assigned—during all the time the public schools are in session unless he is more than fourteen years old and has completed the studies prescribed for the elementary schools, or has been excused (by school authorities) from attending on the ground that his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance or to make it undesirable.

Section 2. Every person having the custody of a child shall cause the child to attend such a school during all the time the public schools are in session.

Section 4. Any person who does not comply with the requirements of the preceding sections shall forfeit ten dollars for the first offence, and twenty dollars for every subsequent offence for the use of the district.

In closing, let me acknowledge my appreciation of the purchase of a case of maps for each of the schools. This purchase was one of the recommendations that I made last year, and I feel that the cost was entirely justified. These maps are in constant use and of great service to the teachers in their instructions. Also, the painting of the South Eaton schoolroom during the Thanksgiving holiday period made a great improvement, and was appreciated by both teacher and

pupils.

Let me thank you foryour co--operation in my work.
