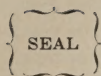

State of New Hampshire



To the inhabitants of the town of Milan, in the county of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at Knights of Pythian hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz:

- 1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk.
- 2nd. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Treasurer.
- 3rd. To choose by ballot and major vote three Selectmen.
- 4th. To choose by ballot and major vote, Road Agents and all other necessary officers for the town, including Fish and Game Wardens.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor and other necessary charges arising within the town.
- 6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for laying out and building and maintaining highways and bridges.
- 7th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for breaking roads during the winter of 1915 and 1916.
- 8th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for building State Highways.
- 9th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for maintaining State Highways.
- 10th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of schools.
- 11th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of books and paying other expenses of the Public Library.
- 12th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the proper observance of Memorial day and appropriate the same to the use of the Grand Army.
- 13th. To choose a Library Trustee to serve three years.
- 14th. To hear the report of agents, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Chairman's Report

To the Citizens of Milan:

As retiring member of the school board I take pleasure in submitting to you a brief account of the work done in our schools the past year.

The schools of Milan at this time are in excellent condition.

We have been very fortunate in retaining the same teachers in many of our schools, and in the others we were successful in securing very good teachers.

Read very carefully the tabular report of average attendance and per cent of attendance. You will see that the attendance has been very good.

The average cost of school per pupil in the state is \$31.80. The cost per pupil in Milan was \$22.79 for the year ending July 15, 1914. There were thirty towns that cost less than Milan and 224 that cost more.

We have laid two hardwood floors this year: one in West Milan grammar school room and one in Milan grammar school room. Two more are badly needed in the primary rooms of these buildings, which we hope will be included in next year's improvements. Other repairs have been very light this year.

The matter of transportation is getting to be quite a problem as the demand is constantly increasing.

Our citizens are talking of a two year high school course. It would be a good thing and I would like to see it tried in any way that may seem most advisable.

In closing I wish to urge that the parents visit schools often and keep in touch with all school work.

I wish to thank the parents, teachers, and other members of the school board, for their kindness and generous support during my term of office.
