THE SELECTMEN REPORT

In years past many of the voters have had no means of knowing how their tax dollar is used, other than reading the financial reports. The following pages constitute an initial start in giving you, the people, a brief report of the activities of the several departments which carry on in trying to make our town a creditable place in which to live.

There is much that can be done, and will be done in the years ahead.

With united effort and careful planning in keeping with a steady growth, healthy progress can be assured for our town.

VALUATION, APPROPRIATIONS AND TAX RATE

Assessed valuation of any town, in dollars and cents is what you actually have in taxable property.

Appropriations represent the amounts, in dollars and cents, voted at Town Meeting, to be expended, during a fiscal year, for maintenance and improvements by the several town departments as well as the School District tax and County tax.

The tax rate is that percentage figure in which many people are so deeply concerned. About the first thing the selectmen hear after Town Meeting is — "What is the tax rate going to be?"

The exercise of good or bad judgment in voting on the various appropriations, in the Town Warrant, is the controlling factor in determining the tax rate.

New London has been most fortunate in having a steady annual growth in taxable property. The increase in 1958 over 1957 is \$67,335.00. This increase includes, Resident: new buildings \$16,000., additions and adjustments \$21,735., college property \$14,000. Non-Resident: new buildings \$10,000., additions and adjustments \$5,600.

Appropriations for 1958 exceeded those for 1957 by \$14,458.23.

The result was an increase in the tax rate of twenty five cents over that of 1957 or \$47.00 on each \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Without this increase in valuation the 1958 tax rate, would have, without doubt, exceeded \$50.00 on each one thousand dollars of taxable property.

The outlook for 1959 is for some new taxable property in both buildings and land but we do not estimate it will approach the amount for 1958.

The indications are that a much higher budget will be presented at the March 10 Town Meeting.

TOWN HALL

Our Town Hall, or "Whipple Memorial Hall", is a beautiful building situated in the heart of a beautiful town.

Erected in 1918, as a memorial of Solomon Mason Whipple and Henrietta Hersey Whipple, by their son Amos Hersey Whipple, to become the municipal center of our town.

It has been the practice of the selectmen to carry on some maintenance of this building annually.

During the past year the exterior has been redecorated, the cupola thoroughly overhauled and a new light placed over the front entrance.

It is hoped that in the near future adequate quarters may be provided for a selectmen's office and provisions made to keep the ink from freezing.

An article will be in the 1959 Warrant asking for funds to build this office room in the basement. We hope you approve.

ZONING

The Zoning Ordinance gives the Selectmen the responsibility of issuing building permits to all applicants whose proposed structures comply with the requirements of the ordinance, and denying applications which are non-conforming, as well as enforcement of the ordinance.

Enforcement presented no problems; applicants were most co-operative.

We issued building permits for the following:

12	year-round private dwellings
4	summer residences
10	private garages
6	miscellaneous buildings

This record of construction during the year will be of con-

siderable help to us in assessing. Heretofore, assessors relied on word-of-mouth reports, or personal knowledge of new construction.

Six applications for permits were denied by the Selectmen for non-compliance with the terms of the Zoning Ordinance. It would be well to bear in mind that the Selectmen have no discretionary powers in these cases, and therefore referred the six denial applicants to the Board of Adjustment. Five of these presented their problems to the Board, and after public hearings, the Board was able to grant permits in each case.

Considering the controversial nature of zoning, we feel that the first year of operation in New London has been quite satisfactory.

HIGHWAYS

Maintenance of our highways is subject, in many ways, to the weather. If the rain storms are heavy and our dirt roads are badly rutted they must be filled with gravel and regraded. When the winter months bring heavy falls of snow the plows must do their job or if the sleet and rain makes traveling just about impossible we always know our road agent and his crew are on the job doing their best to make all roads safe for traveling.

An annual job, each summer, is tarring all the hard surface roads. This is all accomplished through the maintenance appropriations.

The \$5000. Road Improvement appropriation was used in conjunction with the Town Road Aid Fund to finish Bunker Road and to shape up and gravel Shaker Street beginning at the Sugden farm and extending to the residence of Harold Currier. This piece of highway will be black topped during the season of 1959.

SIDEWALKS

The annual appropriation of \$1000.00 for the rebuilding of sidewalks is gradually showing results. In 1957 a new section was built in the village of Elkins.

This past year the old and very uneven section built many years past, beginning at the residence of Esther Whittemore and extending north to the hardware store was replaced with asphalt. In rebuilding sidewalks, it has been the policy of the selectmen and the road agent to rebuild the very bad sections first and gradually bring the ends together for a complete job.

TOWN DUMP

The Town Dump has been the source of many complaints over the past years. There was always too much broken glass, too much odor or just too much rubbish.

Early in the spring of 1958 your selectmen decided to take positive action and inaugurate a program to control the hours the dump is to be open, also control the kind of rubbish and where it is to be placed.

Notices were posted and copies mailed to residents of the town explaining the rules and regulations, and the time they would become effective.

Under the supervision of our highway department, an attendant was placed at the dump to keep all combustible material burned, direct the placing of all waste material and we understand the attendant has been of great help to the ladies. A small house has been placed at the dump to be used as a shelter by the attendant during inclement weather.

There have been many favorable reports as to the condition of our dump during this past year, with no complaints.

We wish to thank Mr. Stanley of the Highway Department for his interest and effort in keeping the dump in such fine condition.

We also wish to express our appreciation for the fine cooperation on the part of our towns people.

CEMETERIES

The special appropriation of \$200.00 to be used for regrading the roadside of the Old Main Street Cemetery has shown much improvement. The new seeding will be done this spring. It will now be possible to mow the roadside more frequently.

Commissioner Harold Messer reports that the fence will be straightened and painted this coming season.

Many compliments have been paid the Cemetery Commissioners for the fine condition in which the Town Cemeteries are being maintained.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

For the New London Fire Department, 1958 was a successful year. Meetings were held the 2nd Monday of each month, along with four paid practices and four volunteer practices.

Fire prevention, thru the sale of fire extinguishers, was undertaken and proved satisfactory. Your Fire Department

would like to see adequate extinguishers in every home and place of business in town. They will be happy to advise you on the type of extinguisher suitable for your needs, and to supply them at reasonable prices.

The Department added the 2-way communication system that was voted at last year's Town Meeting, and also 500 feet of new nylon hose. There is an article in this year's warrant for approval of the purchase of a new fire engine to replace our 18 year old International. The addition of this new equipment should make our Department one in which to take pride.

The house fire and the garage and car fire resulted in complete destruction. In both cases, the Fire Department was called too late to be of any help other than to prevent possible spreading.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Our Police Department consists of one full-time, salaried member, the Chief, who is elected annually at Town Meeting. Under him are three appointed deputies.

A brief summary of cases handled in 1958 would include the following:

Cases other than motor vehicles would include 8 blood relays to the New London Hospital, and miscellaneous problems of one suicide, transportation of persons to Concord, thefts, "Peeping-Toms," breaking and entering.

In addition to the regular duties of patrol and school-crossing work, you might be interested in some of the behind-the-scene activities of our Chief. Perhaps you have noticed him painting yellow traffic lines on town roads or parking areas, or putting up special signs at certain times of the year, or being our "dog-catcher", or escorting tramps out of town. He covers the town quite thoroughly on his daily patrols and visits closed residences weekly when at all possible, frequently having to walk in to check many lake shore cottages. To do this, he drove 11,450 miles in his car in 1958 (and it is his car, not the Town's). His car is equipped with a two-way radio which is on at all times while on duty. State Police in Concord can call him; he can call them, or he can talk thru them to a State Trooper, getting advice or prompt assistance if needed. In addition to the usual law-enforcement tools, he carries his own Polaroid camera and takes photographs of most scenes of accident or crime. He develops the prints on the spot, and thus insures having indisputable and ready proof for court evidence. We have recently added fire extinguishers and a simple first-aid kit to his traveling equipment.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 for the Tracy Memorial Library for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 for the maintenance of street lighting for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to install two street lights on Pressey Ct. and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for maintenance for the ensuing year.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 in excess of maintenance funds for the improvement, rebuilding and resurfacing with bituminous mix of Town roads to be designated by the Selectmen in conjunction with the Town Road Agent.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purchase of the Roy Emery sand bank, so called, on Wilmot Road, the tract of land to be approximately eight acres.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$690.77 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$4,605.11.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$15,000.00 to be paid over a period of

five years for the purchase of a four-wheel drive bucket loader for the Highway Department.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the improvement of sidewalks for the ensuing year.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Fire Department maintenance for the ensuing year.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,200.00 for the purchase of a new Fire Truck and to be financed over a period of five years.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Police Department for the ensuing year.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for publicizing and advertising the Lake Sunapee Area, the same to be turned over to the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade for this purpose.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 for the maintenance of the Information Booth for the ensuing year.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 as the Town's obligation in Social Security payments for the ensuing year.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of \$1,400.00 for Hydrant service for the ensuing year.

31. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Zoning Ordinance that was recommended at the 1959 Town Meeting by the Planning Board.

32. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

1. Article III D

(Signs) "Upon application, the Selectmen may permit, at their discretion and when conditions justify the request, an increase in size by not over 25%, of all classes of signs heretofore permitted. In the case of a non-conforming use, regulations concerning the size of signs shall be governed by land use instead of district."

2. General Provisions

Article III G

"In all zones the required set back shall apply to the extreme limits of the building."

3. Article V D (Add No. 2)

"Property owners or tenants with business, professional, or other service enterprises shall be allowed two advertising signs, relating only to the use or uses conducted in the building or on the immediate premises thereof; also two signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed."

4. Article VI. Section a9 the final sentence shall be changed through the insertion of words "or rear" to read "No building shall be located within ten (10) feet of the side or rear property line."

5. Article VI

Section C (Add) "and may also permit the erection of two (2) directional signs, relating to other businesses located in the Town of New London." The size of these signs shall not exceed 8" by 30".

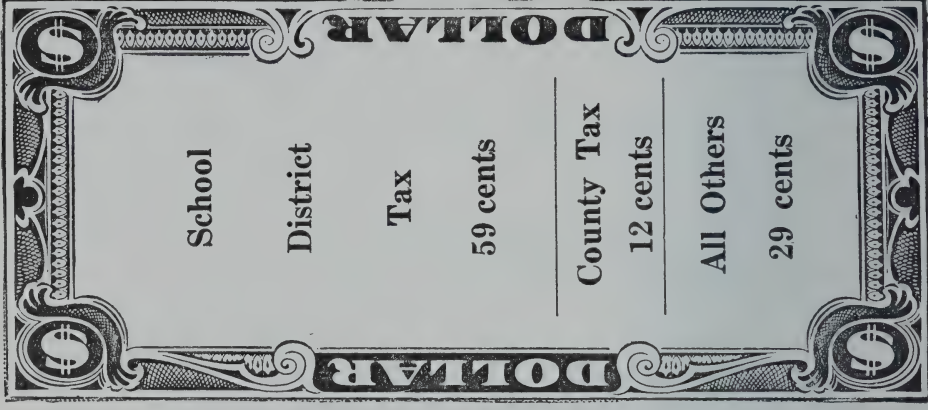
Your tax dollar is here divided into three parts to show, quickly, how it is used.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it. **Save yourself much possible difficulty. . . . Use your town dump**

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

1958 will be a memorable year when the next history of New London is compiled. A beautiful new hospital, the town's first bank, and our first zoning ordinance were achieved—all marks of a progressive and forward-thinking town. It took a small group of workers to head the actual accomplishment of each of these but without the support of a majority of our townspeople no one of these could have succeeded.

So, we on the New London Planning Board welcome this opportunity to thank the people of New London for your support in achieving the zoning ordinance. Members of the board worked hard to bring in an ordinance tailored to the needs of our town. However as we explained at the 1958 town meeting when this ordinance was adopted by a majority of the voters present, we anticipated that changes and improvements would be necessary.

At this writing, the Zoning Board of Adjustment has been active for about ten months. During this time five cases have been referred by the selectmen to the zoning board for appeal. In each case public hearings were held and four were granted on the first appeal and the fifth was granted on the second appeal on the basis of new evidence.

However as had been anticipated, the Zoning Board—in working with this ordinance—has found some inadequacies and for this reason an article appears in the 1959 warrant requesting your consideration to certain changes in the ordinance.

Since the last town meeting the Planning Board has met frequently to study and make recommendations for the layout of new roads.

NEW LONDON SERVICE ORGANIZATION, INC.

1958

Two meetings were held during this year, however, during the past year several worthy actions were undertaken some of them being listed in the following report.

In the Spring the Green Benches were again placed at their usual inviting spots in the town for the use of all. These have again been taken up and stored for the winter.

A High School junior girl and junior boy have again been sponsored and their expenses paid at Boy's State and Girl's State held in University of New Hampshire at Durham.

Three military books, "Mr. Lincoln's Army", "The Glory Road", and "Stillness at Appomatox" were bought and presented to the Tracy Memorial Library.

For several years now we have been contributing an average of \$100. to the New London Hospital and again did so this year. This to be added to the principal of their "Finance Committee Fund" whose income they can use to pay needy patient's bills. We have been informed that this year the Hospital appropriated \$500 of the earnings of this fund for use in its dedicated purpose. While the growth of this fund can not all be credited to our contributions, we certainly can feel proud that through our contributions we have been able to assist certain needy patients.

Five dollars was given to the Ladies Benevolent Society of Elkins from the income of the Kneeland Parshly Fund for the purchase of Christmas gifts to be presented to the children of Elkins at the Annual Church Christmas Party.

A Christmas Greeting card with a dollar bill enclosed was sent to each boy and girl in the armed services from New London, by the Christmas card committee under the direction of Miss Julia Todd.

Our Treasurer reports that at present we have outstanding loans to former servicemen (at no interest) for a total of \$650. For several years now no repayments have been made on this debt. We made our first loan to a serviceman thirteen years ago. Since then we have helped New London servicemen with loans totaling \$3,085. all of which has been returned for further use, except the above mentioned \$650 which is still outstanding.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

ANNUAL REPORT

Thirty two years of library and community service have been completed at the Tracy Memorial Library. Appreciation of the value of such a service to the life of the town has been variously expressed by many people during the year.

We are pleased to report a definite increase in the circulation of non-fiction books, which we hope points to a trend of more serious reading.

Our visitors this year have amounted to 11,374 persons

The staff has been glad to answer the inter-library loans with 49 books; these include the New Hampshire State library, and libraries in neighboring towns. On alternate months, the Bookmobile lends us books for supplementary reading for adults and children.

During the last year we have purchased 283 new books, divided as follows: 174 books for adults and 109 juvenile books. We have accepted 25 books as gifts from our generous friends. The table in the reading room has a display of 51 magazines, and three daily and one weekly newspaper.

For supplementary reading in their classes we have supplied the teachers at the Central school with 103 books. It has been a pleasure, also, to loan the following books; to Alphonse Soucy (remedial reading) 56 books; to the Kindergartens, 12 books; to the Wilmot Schools, 208 books; and to the Barselle Nursing Home, 23 books. The reference work has been especially brisk this year, with 493 calls for special material and information. The summer camps have used the library for special books, mostly for outdoor activities.

The New London Service Organization has presented to the library three books with military backgrounds. They are the well-known Civil War trilogy of Bruce Catton, and consist of: "Mr. Lincoln's Army", "Glory Road", and "Stillness at Appomatox."

The Committee Room has been used for small meetings on an average of twice a week throughout the year, and the auditorium was open for the Woman's Club, the Hospital Aid, and for special exhibits on request.

The authors of the following books have presented copies to the library: "Making Fascists", "France, a History of National Economics" by Shepard B. Clough, "Across a Covered Bridge" by Mary G. Charles, and "Durer" by Elizabeth Ripley.

During Book Week, the sixth and seventh grades of the Springfield School were instructed in the use of the card catalogue, and how to use the tools of the reference section of the library by the librarian.

There has been an increase of 80 registrants in our borrower's records this year, with 137 adults and 69 children registering at the desk.

In March, the Staff and Board were hosts to the regional neighborhood meeting of the librarians of this area. Miss Marjorie Stroud, state librarian, was the guest speaker on Library Methods and Book Selection.

In observance of National Library Week, the library staff was assisted by a citizen's committee in arranging exhibits and an open house. Local stores generously donated space for book displays, and the library featured an exhibit of books by local authors. Prizes were awarded by the librarian, Mrs. Ray, to the school children, winners of the essay, "Why I Like to Read." We were much pleased with the number of people, three hundred, that registered during the week. The librarian spoke at the Wilmot Schools on available library services, and how to choose the most interesting books to read. During this week, fifteen hundred and seventy-two books were circulated to our readers.

From April 21-25, Mr. Philip Hammond, teacher of the sixth and seventh grades, held an exhibit in the auditorium, of the work of his pupils in Social Sciences, which was attended by many parents and friends.

In May, the library staff attended the New Hampshire Library Association held in Laconia. Several most interesting lectures on library subjects were heard, new books examined and listed for purchase, and many friends greeted. The guest speaker, Harry B. Ellis, news-editor of the Christian Science Monitor, addressed the librarians at the evening banquet, taking as his topic, the Near East problem, and greatly enlightening all on the problems of this world trouble spot.

A trip to the United Nations, sponsored by the New Hampshire Council on World Affairs, for librarians, was enjoyed by the staff on the last week in May. Work in libraries in other nations was stressed to the group of visitors, and several sight-seeing tours were arranged to places of interest in New York City.

In June, a visit was paid to the library by Mrs. J. T. Wattimena of Ambon, Indonesia, in the company of the State Librarian, Mrs. McKay, who selected our library as a model of an excellent rural library.

The theme for the fifty readers of the Vacation Reading Club was "By Rocket to Adventure," this summer. A party was held for all in the garden where thirty children were awarded their diplomas for successfully completing the course. Special book awards were given by Mrs. Ray to Carol and Frederic Horne, of Deerfield, Mass. for reading the greatest number of books. Slides of Disneyland, New Hampshire, and animals were shown by Mrs. Mervin Cadoo, and a puppet play was enjoyed by all.

The New London Historical Society held an exhibition of antiques and local memorabilia in the auditorium from August 10-15, which was open to the public free of charge each afternoon. On display were books, maps, pictures of local scenes and people, toys and utensils, some of which were lent, others having been presented to the Society.

The fourteenth annual exhibit of the oil paintings of Dorothy Dey Howard attracted many visitors from August 18-30.

During her vacation in October, Mrs. Champion joined the librarian's tour of Ottawa and Montreal. This trip included a visit to the Canadian Parliament and a sight-seeing tour of the city of Montreal.

One of the biggest and best displays of the year was held in

the auditorium in observance of National Book Week. The trends of children's books from 1700-1900 illustrated by costumed dolls were greatly enjoyed by our young visitors. The carved birds and animals were loaned by Earle Clark and Kenneth Welch, and the collections of old coins and pennies by Dr. J. D. Squires and Sam Shepard of Sunapee. The kind comments of our 400 visitors were much appreciated by the Board and Staff. All the grades of the Central School, the Springfield Memorial School, the Wilmot Schools, and the Kindergartens visited the exhibit during the week. We are most grateful to the bus drivers for their co-operation in transporting the children to our Book Fair.

The staff attended the regional meeting in Sutton, in November, where the subject for discussion was "library budgets." This was an interesting and informative meeting for all, with the State Assistant Librarian, Emil Allen Jr. conducting the general discussion and question period.

Though the ski lessons on Saturday afternoons have lessened the number of children attending our Story Hour, we have welcomed 386 youngsters for stories and hand work.

Above our door and from our windows, the Christmas lights shine out again bidding everyone a hearty welcome to the "world of books."

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION REPORT FOR 1958

This has been a very important year in the history of the New London Hospital, with the completion of and moving into our new Hospital. An Open House was held in the Spring so that everyone might have an opportunity to see how the work was progressing. The Dedication of the building was held on Monday August 18th at 2:30 o'clock with Dr. Mather Cleveland as the principal speaker. Everyone was invited to inspect the new building after the program. The tremendous job of moving into the new Hospital was accomplished in September.

It has been a busy year for the Board of Trustees and especially for the Building Committee. However, we have a splendid new Hospital to show for their efforts and long hours of planning and work.

The Board of Trustees has held a regular meeting each month during the year to take care of the many problems that have come up in the building and running of the Hospital.

Three doctors have been added to our Medical Staff, Dr. Lynn Beals, Dr. Mather Cleveland, and Dr. Warren Franz, pathologist. We were deeply saddened at the loss of Dr. William P. Clough, who had served on the Staff for thirty-nine years.

Each year our Hospital Day seems to get bigger and bigger and this year was no exception. Under the able leadership of Mr. James Bewley and blessed with good weather, it was the biggest in our history. Over \$11,000.00 was realized and we are **very grateful** to Mr. Bewley and all his committees, the townspeople and all those from the surrounding towns who helped make the day such a big success. We also wish to thank the Summer Residents' Committee and the Hospital Aid Association for all their efforts, which are an important contribution to our Hospital.

We are most grateful to everyone who worked and gave so generously on Donation Day, and also the Womans Club for their financial donation. Again we wish to stress the fact that without the help of everyone who has had a part in working for our Hospital the task of running it would be impossible.

The Hospital Aid Association has inaugurated a program of Nurse Aid, whereby many of the members work regular hours to relieve the nurses of many small duties. Also several couples have volunteered to work evenings to help the nurses. This is all a tremendous help and is greatly appreciated.

During the year 709 adults and children and 78 newborn babies

were admitted to the Hospital. There were 471 operations performed and 1199 patients treated in the accident room. The Laboratory showed the greatest increase in usage and the X-Ray Department likewise showed an increase. Since moving into the new Hospital in September the average occupancy has increased by about four patients a day.

SCHOOL WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New London qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said District on the fifth day of March, 1959, at 8:00 o'clock p. m. to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, and other state sources, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the proceeds from the sale of the Elkins School (\$2200.00) to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used by the School Board for future educational purposes — other than regular operation or maintenance expenses.

Article 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and / or United States.

Article 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of New London:

I submit herewith my eleventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Curriculum

The present school year has brought about some significant changes in both the elementary and high school curricula.

Classes in Art have been added at both levels. This is a required part of the program in the Grades and is on an elective basis in high school. While some might view this area as another "frill", most would agree that it has a part along with music as an area of exploration in the Grades, with an opportunity for those in high school who show particular talent to receive further basic training as an elective course.

An additional high school teacher has made it possible to add a course in General Science for Grade 9 and also to offer other Science and Math subjects on a yearly basis - rather than to alternate them. This will provide better course continuity for the students and should much improve our over-all program in these fields. (The present Laboratory is far from adequate to house a modern science program.)

School Year - 1959-60

Plant-wise, we are marking time pending the outcome of the Co-operative High School Study, at both the elementary and secondary level.

With five class rooms for Grades 1-7 it will still be necessary to operate double grades in most rooms. The possibility of renting space outside the schools was explored and abandoned. The disadvantages of any available areas which were not designed for school use together with the necessary separation from the rest of the school seemed to outweigh the advantages.

At the high school level, funds have been requested to add an additional teacher - primarily in the field of English. Presently, one staff member handles all the English classes. With another staff member it will be possible to provide both Acade-

mic and General sections in the various high school grades. This should result in a much more comprehensive offering for both groups in the all-important field of English.

Sale of Elkins School

Pursuant to the vote of the 1958 Annual District Meeting, the Elkins School was sold at public auction for a price of \$2200. A special warrant article calls for action on the School Board's recommendation that these proceeds be set aside for future educational purposes - other than regular operation or maintenance expenses.

National Defense Education Act of 1958

Under Title III of the above Act, funds will be available on a matching basis to local school systems for the acquisition of laboratory or other special equipment for Science, Mathematics, or modern Foreign Language teaching.

Funds have been included in the Budget to take advantage of this dollar - for - dollar matching of Federal funds. It is hoped to use a portion of these funds to build up the equipment and materials for adequate science instruction in the elementary grades as well as the high school. The needs of our time dictate that children be introduced to the ideas of science and the scientific method at an early age.

Staff

The problem of keeping a competent staff and obtaining qualified replacements is a continual one. In recent years the teacher turn-over in New London has been far less than in many surrounding communities. I believe this is due largely to the policy that good teachers should be rewarded in order to be retained.

A policy adopted by the School Board relative to the In-service Training of teachers should further serve to help us hold competent staff members interested in professional advancement. The policy is as follows:

Each teacher — not holding a Master's degree — is required to obtain at least four (4) semester hours of credit through an accredited post-secondary institution every five (5) years. (Approved travel may be substituted to fulfill a part of this requirement.) (Teachers holding a Master's degree are required to obtain at least two (2) semester hours of credit every five years.)

By State regulation, teachers who become certified after

July 1, 1948 are required to earn six semester hours of credit every five years.

The School District will allow each teacher \$25.00 a credit, toward the cost of summer school attendance to meet the above requirements or to assist them in obtaining credits for an advanced degree, provided the teacher continues to teach in the New London Schools during the entire school year following attendance at summer school. (This allowance shall not apply toward approved travel.) (Requests for such summer school financial assistance must be presented to the Superintendent in writing prior to budgetary preparation for the ensuing year.)

Conclusion

It continues to be a pleasure to serve a community so vitally interested in its schools and so responsive to their needs.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL TO SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my annual report as Principal of New London Central School.

Again I wish to deviate from a report from a report pertaining to the many activities carried on by the students and instead present information concerning the curriculum. Before presenting this information though, a few facts about the Class of 1958 will be presented.

The Class of 1958 will be compared with the findings for the ten year period presented in last year's report.

The percentage of the Class of 1958 continuing in higher educational institutions is 70.0% compared to 54.8% for the ten year period 1948-1957. This increase is greater than that found in many schools. Although several of the class entered the same institution they are in sixteen different institutions.

At the time the students complete their registration forms indicating the subjects that will be taken the following year, each student is given help in choosing the subjects. The choice of subjects is dependent on the requirements of the colleges being considered or the vocation planned if the student does not plan to enter a higher educational institution. Of course there are many sequential groups whereby one subject automatically is dependent on a previous subject. Since this plan does not require that each student, who is college bound, take

the same subjects, except for the required subjects, the student and counselor must be sure the college requirements are being fulfilled. Since this plan allows some freedom in the choice of subjects the chart given below was prepared to find out the number of students in the various subject areas.

According to the chart the required subjects are obvious by the percentage of students in the areas, but the chart also indicates how the subjects in the other areas are chosen as elective subjects. Now that some of the subjects are no longer alternated the percentages will probably increase in certain areas. While compiling the data for the chart it was found that 21.8% of the students were taking five academic subjects. The percentage of students participating in glee club, band and

art was not worked out, but the percentages would be relatively high. The lack of time is a determining factor in the number of extra courses taken by most of the students since most of them have only three to five free periods per week.

Several basic changes were made possible this year in our curriculum by the addition of an art supervisor and another mathematics and science teacher. Although the high school enrollment in art is small the value of the course may be seen in its application to the other subject areas. The greatest benefit from the addition of an art supervisor is found in the elementary grades, however. The additional mathematics and science teacher has made it possible to do away with the alternating of the mathematics and science courses and to present them in the proper sequence. This, in turn, will permit the teachers to accomplish much more in the courses.

Although New London is in an interim period of studying the educational needs of the high school and the outcome is not known at the time this is being written, it is nevertheless recommended that the following suggestions be incorporated in next year's program.

Another English teacher should be added to allow each class to be divided into two sections - a college preparatory group and a general group. At the present time it is impossible to present to the college preparatory group the type of course needed by them. This is especially true in view of the large percentage of students continuing their formal education beyond high school.

The other necessary change involves a third year of French, since it is impossible for a student to acquire the necessary knowledge in French in only a two year sequence. A three year sequence of French and a two year sequence of Latin would give the students taking both subjects a good workable background in these subjects.

Although there are some needed changes in the general areas that eventually should be considered, these areas are adequate enough to meet the needs of most of the students at the present time.

REPORT OF HELPING TEACHER

Now in the fifth year of providing services throughout the five towns of this supervisory union, I wish to express my deep appreciation to all in the schools and communities served for the cooperation and encouragement extended to me toward the fulfillment of the objectives and responsibilities outlined below.

- 1. OBJECTIVES** Directed by the Superintendent of Schools and as established by law, the work of Helping Teacher has aimed toward the giving of "...helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils, and parents of a school system as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children; solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment; bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, and community; and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of educational needs."
- 2. REPORTING PUPIL PROGRESS** This year some revision was made in the report card used for reporting pupil progress in the elementary grades 1-8. This revision makes the report in both scholarship and citizenship more practical and positive for teachers, parents, and pupils.
- 3. TESTING PROGRAM** As in other years, this program includes (a) achievement tests in all grade levels for the entire school system; (b) mental ability tests administered to pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7; (c) the arrangement for individual or small group tests, as needs arise. Every attempt is made to use the results of these tests, together with teacher-made devices for pupil evaluation, as a means of determining and guiding the educational growth of children. These tests often serve as the basis for grouping of children, either by separate divisions or within the classroom, and provide valuable information for parent-teacher conferences.
- 4. CLASSROOM VISITS** These visits make it possible to share the physical, emotional, and educational atmosphere of the classroom. Follow-up conferences with teachers are intended to exchange ideas, review of lessons taught, and to promote instructional improvement.

5. **RESOURCES AND MATERIALS** These are essential in providing for enrichment in teaching and for individual pupil needs. Special texts, references, book lists and other memoranda bring to the teachers a variety of teaching aids to help strengthen the overall curriculum. Science has already received considerable emphasis throughout the elementary grades. Steps are now being taken to provide better materials for teaching various phases of language in these grades.

6. **MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES** Whether a formal staff meeting, an informal chat with a teacher, conference with a parent, participation in P. T. A. discussions, or attending educational meetings, a wide variety of topics are covered, all aimed at providing the best education for all.

7. **Audio-VISUAL AIDS** The filmstrips are still the most useful and practical teaching aids in this field, primarily because they are more readily available when needed than sound motion picture films. With the addition of new filmstrips each year, our library has become more valuable, and revised listings are being prepared in all curriculum fields.

The work of Helping Teacher shares in many other services and responsibilities of education, including conferences with parents, individual testing of pupils, arranging for special testing, assisting teachers with problems of keeping the school register, and assisting the Superintendent of Schools in any administrative details as they effect the improvement of instruction throughout the school system.

The realization of the purposeful goals and responsibilities of the Helping Teacher would not be possible without the cooperative spirit of all teachers and principals and the mutual interest in the best education for all.
