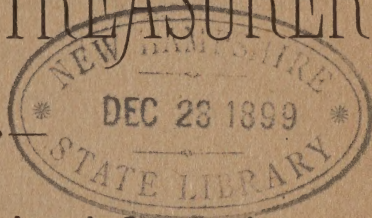

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THE ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

DISTRICT NO. 1.

N A. WENTWORTH, PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE.

The spring term of this school was taught by Miss Hattie J. Bradley. There was a larger number of pupils than during the previous year and many of them were regular in their attendance. The closing day of this term was a very pleasant occasion, there being present a large number of parents and friends who seemed by their presence and attention to evince a deep interest in the school.

Miss Bradley commenced the fall term, but other duties calling her away, Mrs. L. E. Welch was employed to take charge of the school. The exercises at the close of the term were witnessed by a goodly number of visitors. A remarkably wide awake and go ahead spirit was manifested by the pupils on this occasion. They were evidently determined to do their best, their very best for the entertainment of their friends and they succeeded admirably. We have never heard so much voice used by scholars at an examination. Reading and spell-

ing had received that attention which their importance demands. Length of school in weeks, 25; there being 11 weeks in the spring term and 14 in the fall and winter. Whole number of scholars 42. All attended to Reading and Spelling, 20 to Writing, 24 to Arithmetic, 24 to Geography, 5 to Grammar, and 4 to History.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

MISS CORA B. POLLARD, teacher for the year.

The same features characterized this school as in the preceding year, viz: orderly deportment and careful study of the text books.

The exercises at the close of the spring term were of a particularly interesting nature and it was regretted that a violent storm prevented the parents and friends from witnessing and enjoying them. This district has always manifested a very commendable interest in their school house, and a recent liberal expenditure upon the same has made it very nearly a model house. Length of school in weeks 27, being 9 in the spring, 12 in the fall and 6 in the winter. The whole number of scholars was 29. All attended to Reading and Spelling, 19 to Writing, 20 to Arithmetic, 11 to Geography, 4 to Grammar, 3 to History and 2 to Algebra. Rollof Honor. 1st term, Nellie L. DISTRICT NO. 3.

MISS STELLA M. GEORGE, teacher for the year.

It is well known that this school, owing to its size, its multiplicity of classes, and the endless minutiae of its details, requires a teacher possessing energy, fortitude, patience and all the other virtues. Such a teacher was found, we think, in Miss George. She has labored assiduously, has devoted heart, soul, time and strength to the work and the result is satisfactory to the district, and they have testified in many ways their appreciation of her labors

The spring term closed with some very pleasant rhetorical exercises and at a recent examination it was evident that the scholars had made good progress in their studies. There were 32 weeks of school in this district, 10 in the spring, 12 in the fall and 10 in the winter. Whole number of scholars 57. All attended to Reading and Spelling, Writing 39, Arithmetic 49, Geography 28, Grammar 16, History 10, Composition 14, Drawing 47.

A good amount of talent was found in this school, perhaps a

higher degree of it than was realized by the parents in the district, they having like many others, lost the habit of visiting the school, except upon state occasions. There was a good attendance during both terms, and at the close of the fall term it was regretted that a storm prevented some of our friends from listening to some literary exercises which, it is our unbiased opinion were of a high order. Length of school in weeks 18 1-2, there being 8 1-2 in the spring and ten in the fall. Whole number of pupils 30. All attended to Reading and Spelling, 18 to Writing, 19 to Arithmetic, 14 to Geography, 5 to Grammar, 3 to History, 2 to Book-keeping, 5 to Composition.

The whole number of registered pupils in all the schools is 158, being an increase of 21 over the whole number of last year. None are reported between the ages of 14 and 21 unable to read and write, and but 2 between the ages of 5 and 15 as not attending any school. A good amount of time, money and labor has been expended upon our schools during the past year and we think, on the whole, with satisfactory results.

There is one suggestion to parents, which is not new, but which will bear repeating, and that is, remember if you do feel an interest in your school, that in no way can you benefit it so much as to express that interest to the teacher.
