HASSAN CONTINUES TO BE POPULAR; POTENTIAL 2016 GUBERNATORIAL CANDIDATES UNKNOWN

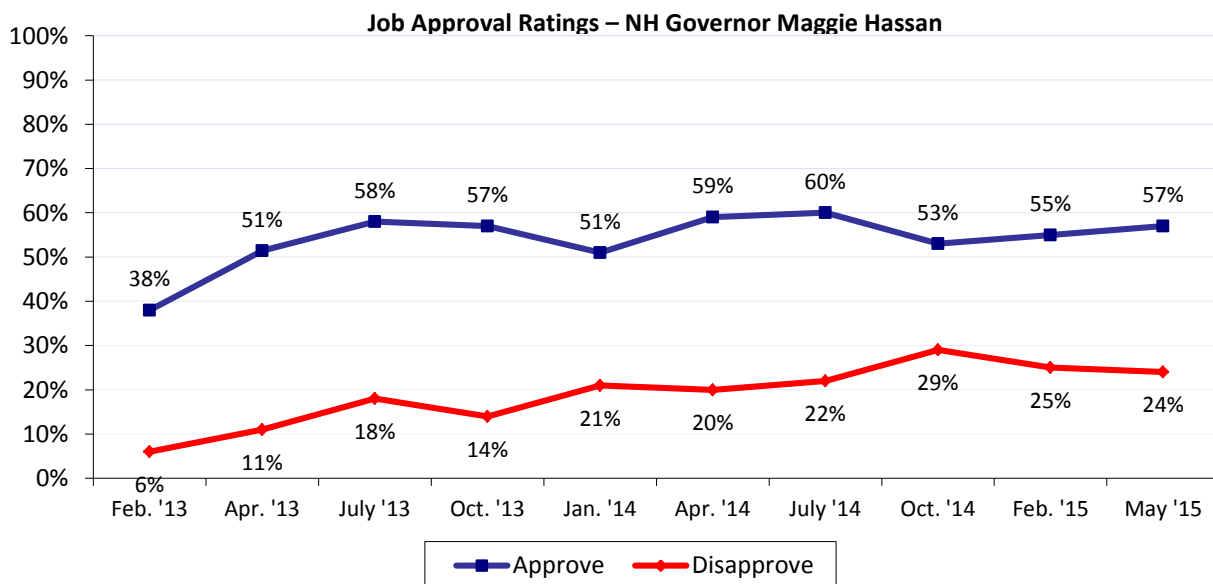

DURHAM, NH – Governor Maggie Hassan’s favorability and job approval continues to be high among New Hampshire residents. Four potential 2016 candidates for governor are largely unknown by Granite Staters.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and sixty-seven (567) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between May 6 and May 22, 2015. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent. Included were five hundred twenty-four (524) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE = +/- 4.3%).

Gubernatorial Approval

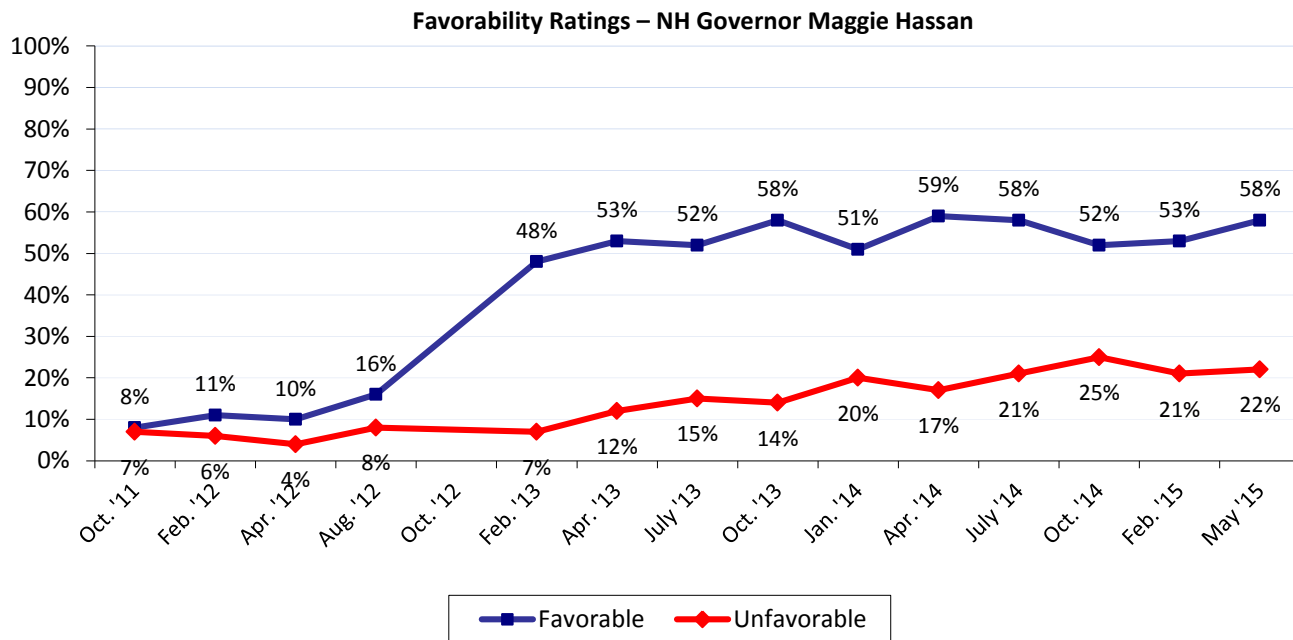
Democratic Governor Maggie Hassan continues to have the approval of a majority of New Hampshire adults. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 57% of Granite Staters say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor, 24% disapprove, and 19% are neutral or don’t know enough to say. Hassan’s job approval rating has been over 50% since early in her first term as governor and her disapproval has remained stable as well. Democrats (84% approve, 4% disapprove) and Independents (41% approve, 33% disapprove) approve of Hassan’s job performance, while Republicans (41% approve, 38% disapprove) are divided on the governor.

Favorability Ratings – Governor Maggie Hassan

Currently, 58% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Hassan, 22% have an unfavorable opinion, 10% are neutral, and 10% say they don't know enough about her to say. Hassan's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is +36%, which is up from +32% in February. Hassan is very popular among Democrats (+84% net favorable) and somewhat popular among Independents (+13%), while Republicans (+1%) are divided in their opinions of her.



Favorability Ratings – Potential NH Governor Candidates

It is widely speculated that Governor Hassan will not run for a third term as governor and will instead run for US Senate against Republican incumbent Kelly Ayotte. Should she not run for re-election, three of the state's five executive councilors have been rumored to have interest in running. However, these executive councilors are largely unknown by New Hampshire residents, even in their own districts.

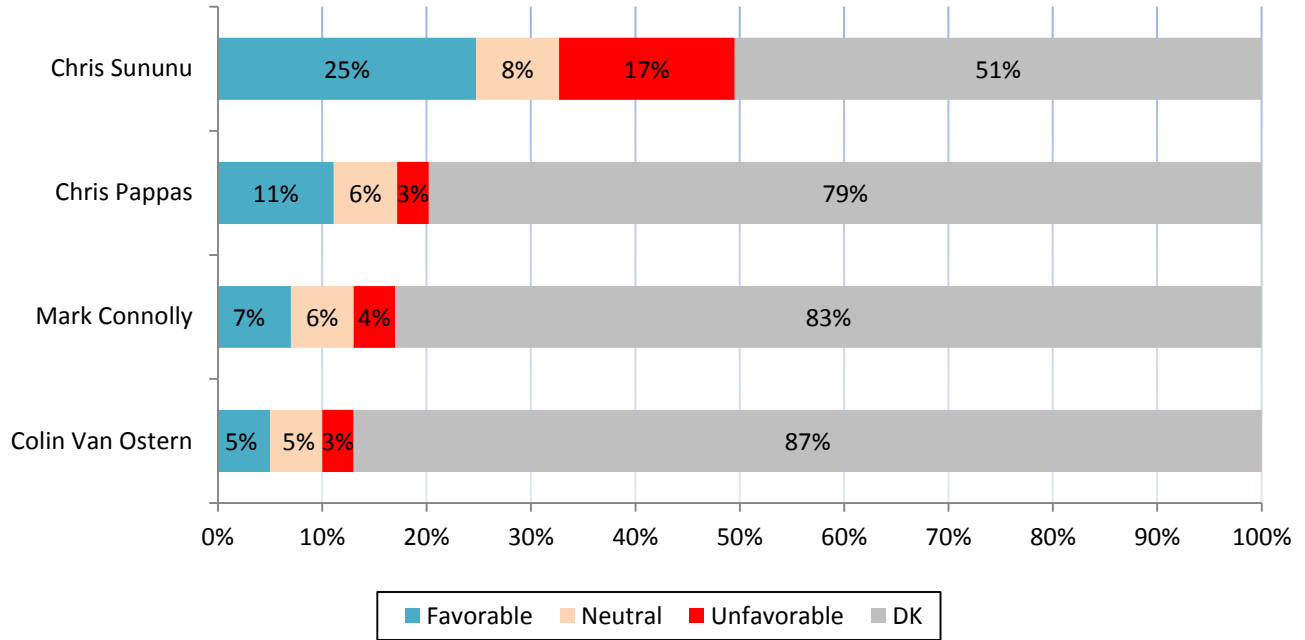
The best known of these potential candidates is Republican Chris Sununu of Newfields, who is the son of former governor John H. Sununu and the brother of former US Senator John E. Sununu. Currently 25% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 17% have an unfavorable opinion, 8% are neutral and 51% don't know enough about him to have an opinion (including 38% in the 3rd district which he represents).

The next best known Executive Councilor is Democrat Chris Pappas of Manchester -- 11% have a favorable opinion of Pappas, 3% have an unfavorable opinion, 6% are neutral and 79% don't know enough about him to have an opinion (including 59% in the 4th district which he represents).

Only 5% of New Hampshire adults have a favorable opinion of Democratic Executive Councilor Colin Van Ostern of Concord, 3% have an unfavorable opinion, 5% are neutral and 87% don't know enough about him to have an opinion (including 81% in the 2nd district which he represents).

Another potential candidate for Governor is New Castle resident and former New Hampshire Securities Chief Mark Connolly – currently 7% have a favorable opinion, 4% have an unfavorable opinion, 6% are neutral and 83% don't know enough about him to have an opinion.

Favorability Ratings - Potential NH Governor Candidates - May 2015

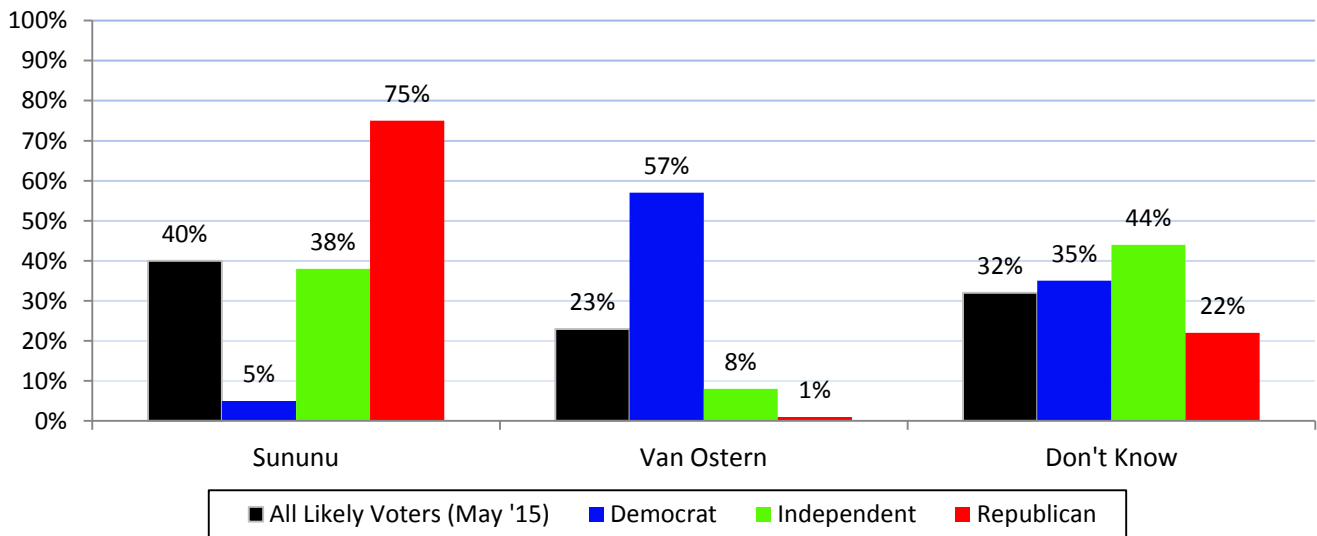


Because potential candidates are unknown by most New Hampshire residents, it is not surprising that a high percentage of 2016 likely voters do not know who they would vote for in hypothetical matchups. Furthermore, these results are likely based on the limited name recognition that these candidates have. Currently just 3% of likely voters say they have definitely decided on who they will support, 5% are leaning toward a candidate, and 92% are still trying to decide.

Governor – Sununu vs. Van Ostern

If the election was held today between Sununu and Van Ostern, 40% of likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 23% would vote for Van Ostern, 4% support someone else, and 32% are undecided.

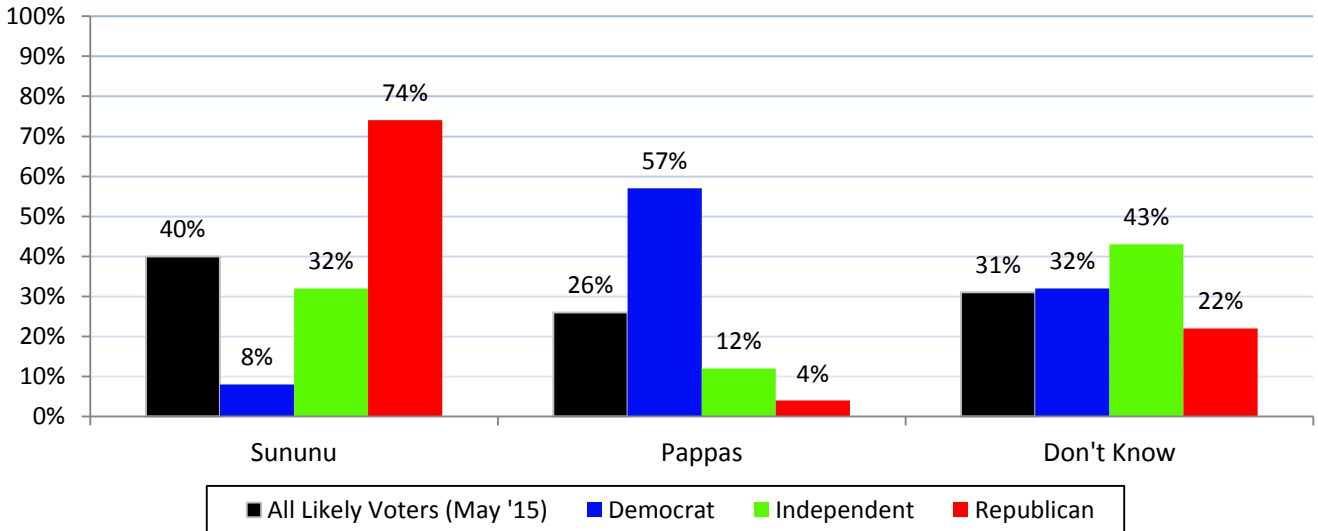
Governor - Sununu vs. Van Ostern

If the election was held today between Sununu and Pappas, 40% of likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 26% would vote for Pappas, 4% support someone else, and 31% are undecided.

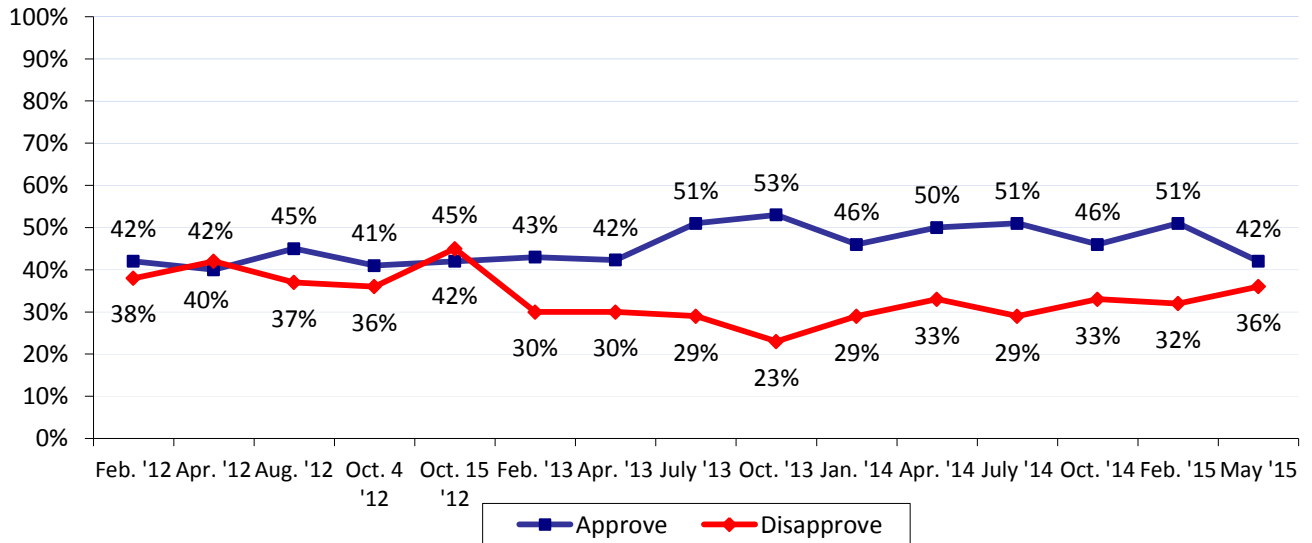
Governor - Sununu vs. Pappas



Approval of New Hampshire Legislature

New Hampshire residents are divided on the job the new legislature is doing. Currently, 42% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the State Legislature is doing its job, 36% disapprove, and 22% are neutral or don't know enough to say. This sentiment is bi-partisan as 44% of Republicans, 44% of Democrats and 35% of Independents approve of the job the legislature is doing.

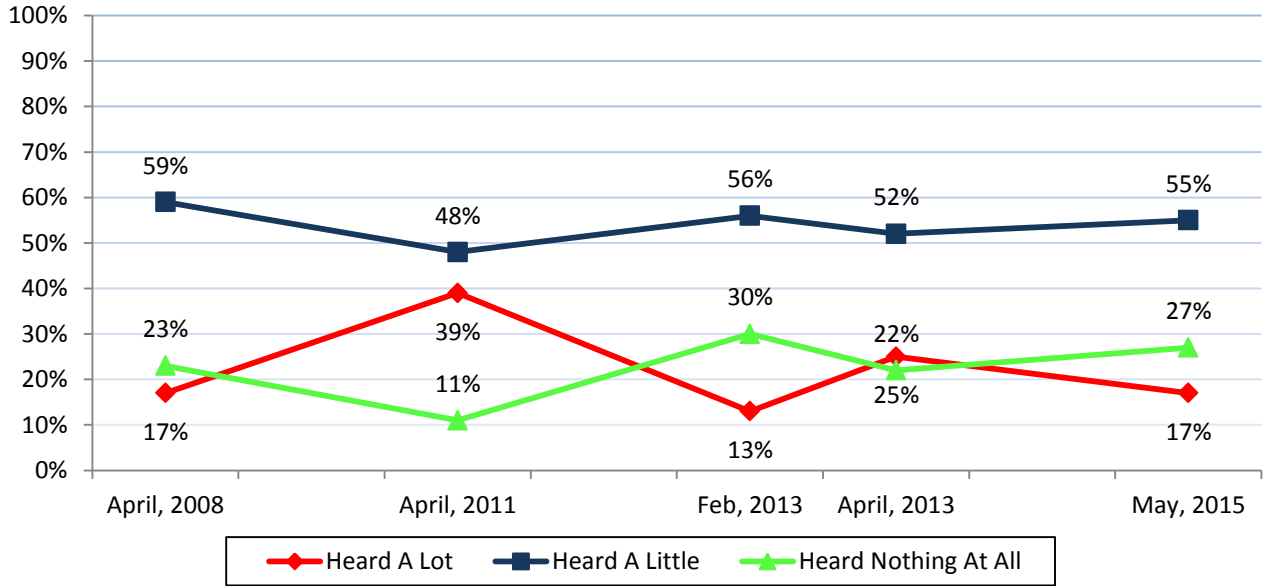
Approval Rating – NH Legislature



State Budget

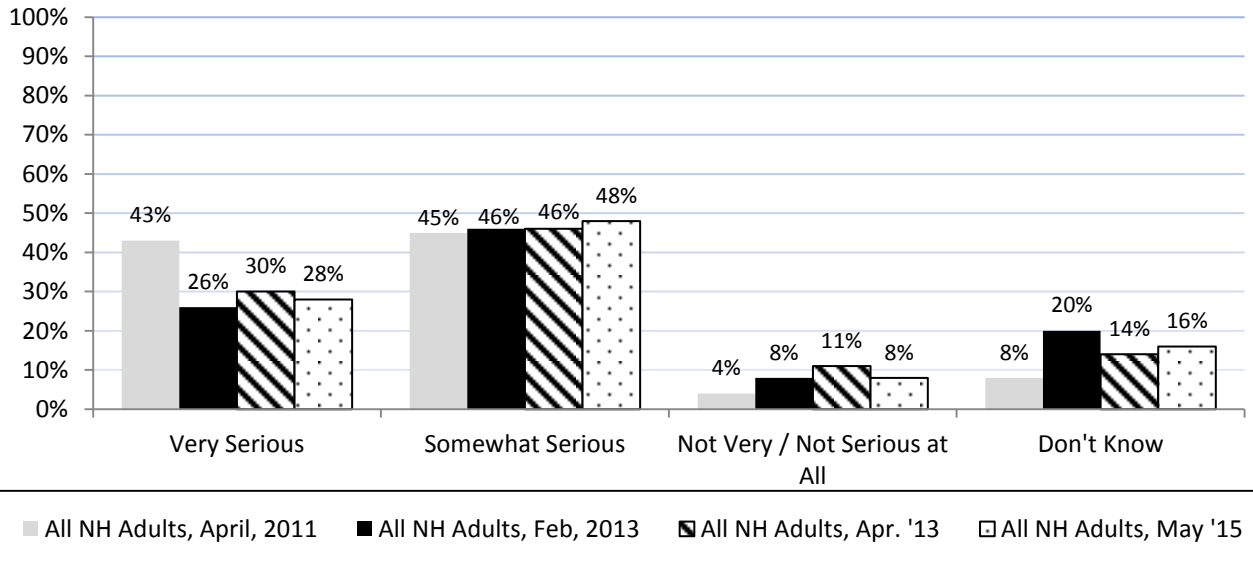
One of the biggest issues facing the State Legislature this year is crafting the State's two-year budget, but most New Hampshire residents heard little or nothing about the projected budget shortfall for this year – only 17% say they have heard a lot, 55% say they have heard a little, and 27% say they have heard nothing at all.

Heard About State Budget Deficit



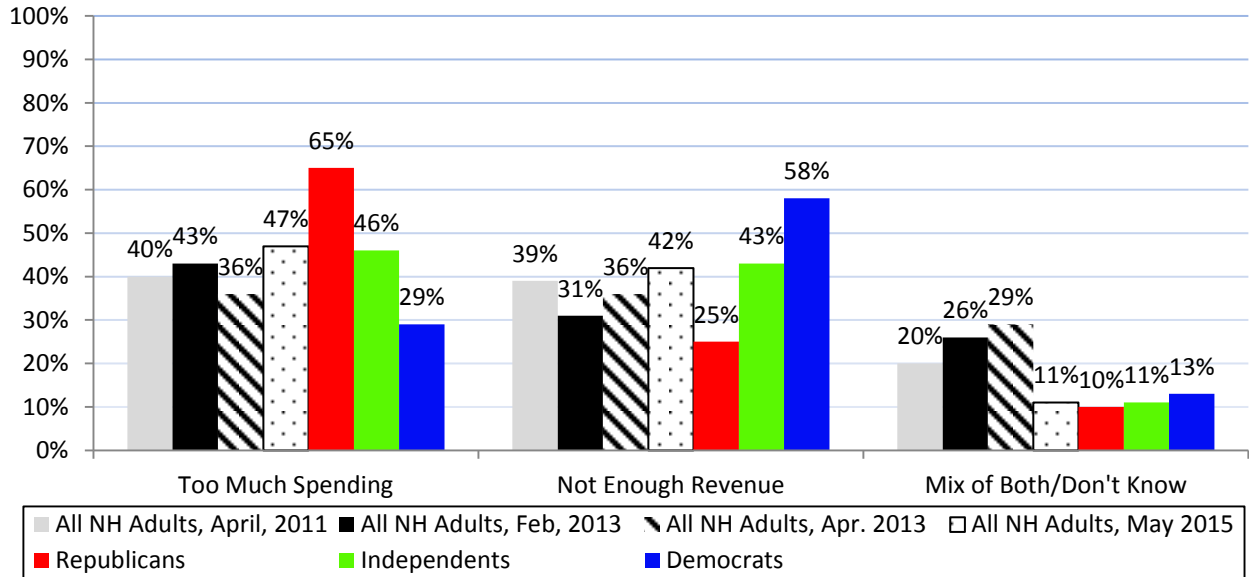
Perceptions about how serious budget issues are similar to perceptions in recent years. Currently, 28% think the deficit faced by the state is very serious, 48% think it is somewhat serious, 8% think it is not very serious or not serious at all, and 16% are unsure. Most Republicans (79%), Democrats (74%) and Independents (74%) view the budget situation as either very or somewhat serious.

Seriousness of Budget Issue



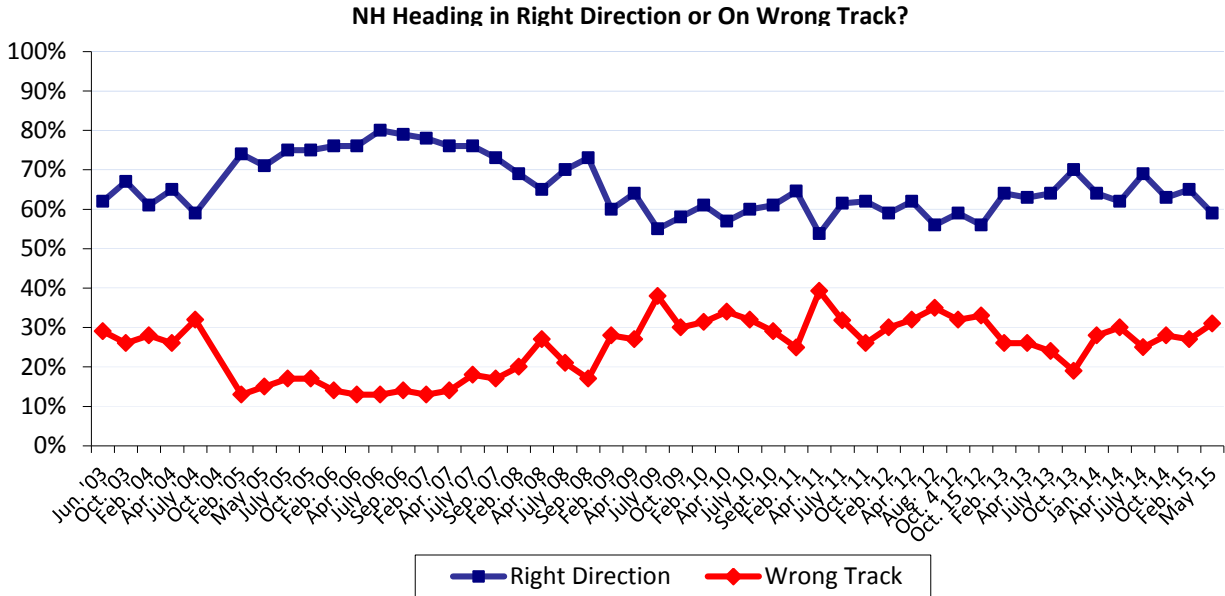
The New Hampshire public is divided about the main cause of the state's budget problems, 47% think it is because of too much spending, 42% think it is due to a lack of revenue, and 11% say it's a mix of both or are unsure. Republicans are most likely to think it is due to too much spending (65%), Democrats are most likely to cite a lack of revenues (58%), and Independents are evenly split (46% cite too much spending and 43% cite not enough revenue).

Main Cause of Budget Issues



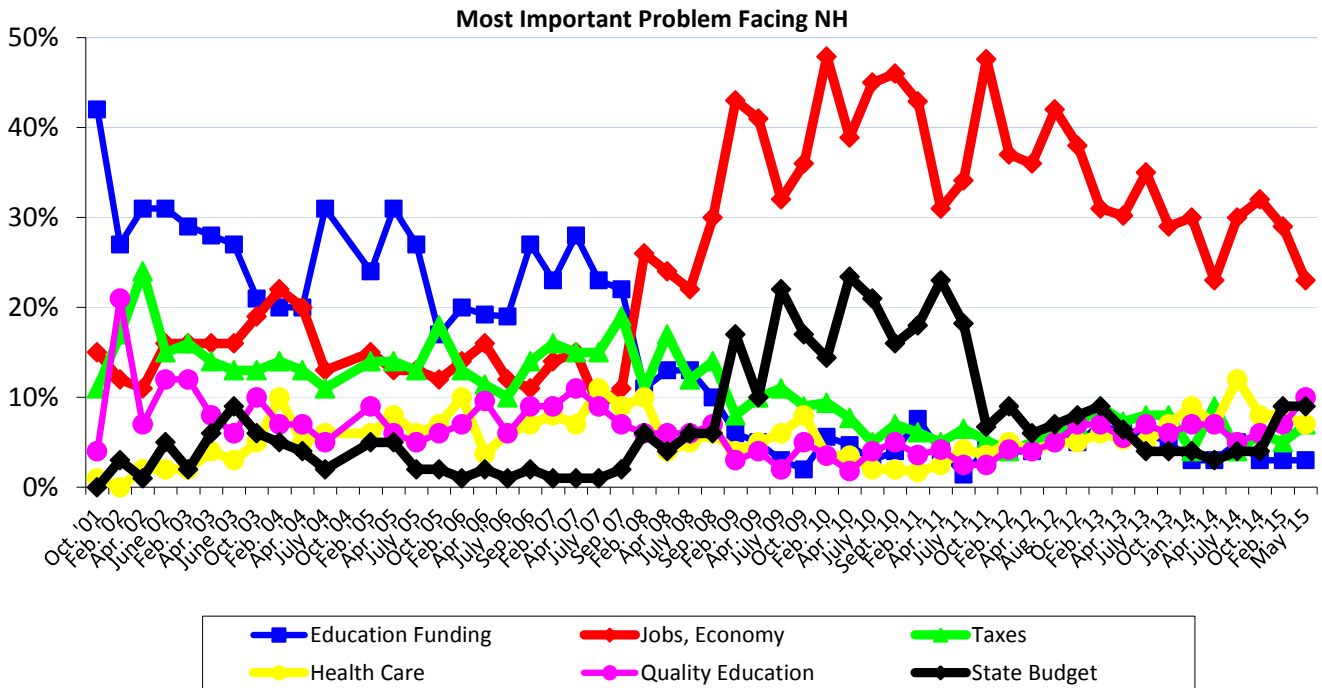
Right Direction or Wrong Track?

Despite the problems with the budget, New Hampshire residents continue to think the state, as a whole, is headed in the right direction. Currently, 59% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 31% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 10% are unsure. Majorities of Democrats (66%) and Republicans (62%) say the state is headed in the right direction, while just 44% of Independents agree.



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

Although the New Hampshire economy continues to recover from the recession, the state's economy and unemployment are still seen as the most important problem facing the state. Currently, 23% of New Hampshire adults say that jobs and the economy is the most important issue facing the state, followed by education (13%), the state budget (9%), health care (7%), and taxes (7%). Nine percent (9%) of Granite Staters also cited drug use as the most important problem facing the state.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and sixty-seven (567) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between May 6 and May 22, 2015. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent. Included were five hundred twenty-four (524) likely 2016 general election voters (MSE = +/- 4.3%).

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may sum to just above or below 100%. Respondent numbers in each demographic may not equal the total respondent number due to respondents choosing not to answer some demographic questions.
