

Statement Relating to State Aid for Highways in Town of Webster

Under Chapter 29 of the Laws of 1899, towns are required to raise one-fourth of one per cent of their valuation for maintenance of roads, provided, however, that no

town is required to raise an amount exceeding \$50 per mile of road. The valuation of the towns for 1908 and the actual mileage of roads in each town cannot be definitely stated at this date, hence the amounts opposite "A" and "C" below are approximate only.

Subject to the above statement, the following amounts relate to the above-named town:

If no application for state aid is made in 1908, the town is required under Section 3 of Chapter 35, Laws of 1905, to set apart and expend for permanent improvement the sum of \$305.00

Report of School Board

In reviewing the school work for the year, we are glad to be able to say that the schools and their work, with few exceptions, have been gratifying.

The most serious trouble with our schools is the irregular attendance. While there is a law to compel regular attendance, the results would be more satisfactory with a voluntary rather than compulsory attendance. While irregular attendance is detrimental to an entire school, it seems a pity that parents fail to realize that their own children are the greatest losers by needless absences.

Until parents show more interest and pride in the schools, and work with the teachers, instead of against them, the results cannot be entirely satisfactory.

We have been fortunate in procuring teachers who seemed adapted to the schools. Former teachers have been retained as far as possible.

A number of changes have been made in our text books. An up-to-date Arithmetic has been provided in place of the old White. We have also purchased new United States Histories, Physiologies and Spelling Books, so that now, with the exception of Readers, our books are of high order. We are, however, lacking in maps and other appliances that are provided in modern schoolrooms.

As no money was raised for repairs this year, it has been necessary to draw upon our school money for that purpose.

New seats and desks have been put in at Putney Hill, also minor repairs such as papering and whitening at other houses.

Next year it will be necessary to do considerable shingling, and some outside painting is badly needed. We recommend an appropriation for this purpose.

On account of a change in the Apportionment of the

public tax, the amount of school money required to be raised, will be about 30 dollars less than formerly.

We often hear the remark made that it costs a good deal to educate the number of children we have. It costs almost as much to run schools for the number of pupils we have as it would if there were double the number. Is that any reason why the few should not have the same advantages as if there were more?

There were enough children at White Plain so that it seemed advisable to have a school there this fall. Previously they have been carried, or tuition paid at Schoodac District in Warner. On account of sickness, the Spring term of school at Putney Hill closed after keeping three weeks.

In closing, we wish to thank parents, teachers and citizens for the interest and help they have in most cases accorded us in our endeavors for good schools. And we hope that the united efforts of the school board, parents teachers and scholars in the coming years, will place the schools of Webster in the highest rank.
