



#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of the School District of Westmoreland.

Herewith I respectfully submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of your schools, it being the tenth in a series of similar reports, since you adopted your present plan of supervision.

You have at this time on your pay-roll but one teacher who was in the employ of the district a year ago. During the past fiscal year you have had four teachers at East Westmoreland, two at the Depot, three at the Meadow, two at the Glebe, two in the primary school, and in the high, and I have at this time the resignation of two of your present teachers. This state of affairs is exceedingly regrettable but see no way in which it might have been foreseen or avoided by any school official. Three of your teachers have resigned either because of ill health or sickness in their families, three others, though reelected for this school year, refused your offers, two were transferred,

one dropped, and one school was closed. This large number of changes in the teaching force, though unavoidable, has rendered the management of your schools much more difficult and has in some instances detracted from the hoped for results.

The High school has increased in average membership in the past two years from <sup>15</sup>/<sub>11</sub> to <sup>28</sup>/<sub>11</sub>. With the present number of pupils, enrolled in four grades of grammar and secondary work, the duties of teaching are too hard and complex for one teacher. However, the district has been fortunate in retaining Miss MacDonald, who because of her knowledge of conditions and because of her acquaintance with the pupils, has been able to do much better work than would have been possible with a teacher unacquainted with the school.

The resignation of Miss Frost from the primary room was received with great regrets. Here again the district was fortunate in the selection of her successor.

I wish to call your attention to the low per cent of attendance in the primary, East, and Depot schools, nor would statistics for the winter term improve this showing. It is impossible for any teacher to secure the results expected from her with an attendance of less than 80 per cent, and it is practically impossible for anyone except the parents to rectify this matter. There is a compulsory attendance law affecting children between the ages of eight and fourteen but there are many ways of avoiding it and many more ways of obstructing the enforcement of the statue. It is the duty of the school board to appoint a truant officer, but our school attendance would be vastly improved if there were two self constituted truant officers in each family where there are children.

Through you, permit me once more to call the attention of the people of Westmoreland to the provisions of the statutes for paying the tuition of a child attending an approved secondary school, section 1, chapter 96 of the ses-

sion laws of 1901, as amended by chapter 118 of the session laws of 1903. If a parent neglects to notify the school board, as the law provides, before February 15, of the expected attendance of a child in an approved secondary school, and then sends the child to such a school, that parent may find himself called upon to pay the tuition charge. The district would be under obligations to reimburse such a parent but could not do so until another year, unless there should be sufficient funds in the treasury available for that purpose.

In conclusion I wish to express my sincere thanks to the board for their cooperation and support and for the many little courtesies which have made my work in Westmoreland a pleasure.
