In the foregoing statement, the Farm is credited for labor done on the roads and Bridge, at the same rate as paid to other persons, and for the stone taken from the Farm, and also for the labor done in cutting and hauling timber for a new Barn, the actual cost of which when completed should be added to the original cost of the Farm, and the interest thereof charged annually.

Your Selectmen have found great inconvenience in commencing and terminating the year on the 25th of March, as has been heretofore practiced—they have been required to make their report before the annual meeting, which is some weeks before the year expires—consequently they could not ascertain the amount of provisions, &c. that might be left on hand. They have therefore made up the accounts to the Fourth of March, at which time the present year commences.

The clothing of the paupers is considered full equal to what it was in March last. Since the 25th of March last, three of the paupers have deceased, and nine others have left and support themselves. Four have been added. The number now supported on the farm is twenty.
