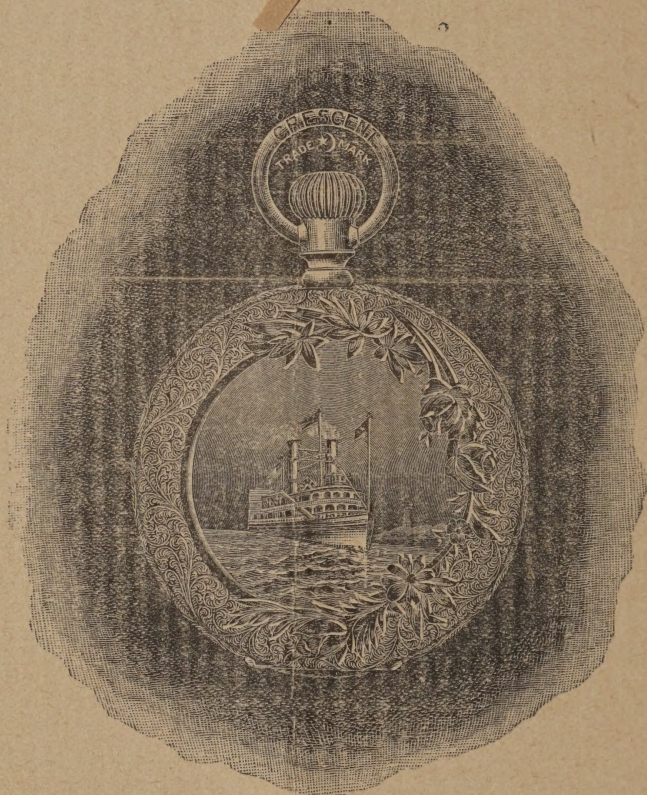

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The trustees of the Barnstead public library are pleased to report that the library is so well patronized.

You have in your library at this time 442 volumes besides the law reports. Agreeable to the vote taken at the last annual meeting, the library has been divided and a part placed at the North with E. J. Locke, at the South with J. Y. Osgood, and at the Parade with J. E. Blanchard, the main library remaining at the Center with Mrs. S. A. Nutter, librarian.

There have been loaned from the library and its branches, the past year, books as follows: Center, 2,364 volumes; North, 231; South, 142; Parade, 460; making 3,197 volumes in all. This shows that our people appreciate their library. Of course some have not read any of the books, while some have read fifty, and one as many as sixty-five volumes. There have been a number of volumes given by friends the past year. John George gave one; I. W. Stearns and his mother gave twenty-five.

There are many of you who have good books that you do not read (perhaps they are packed in a box and put away in the attic to get them out of your way) that you could give to the library and not miss them. They would be new to most of our readers, and it would be no loss to you and a gain to them. Anything that is readable and suitable to put in the library, not already there, will be acceptable.

Although we have nearly 450 volumes, when they are divided and placed in four sections of the town the patrons do not have as good a chance to make a selection as they would if the books were all in one place; but, in another light, it gives the patrons, perhaps, better accommodations to have them divided.

Your trustees think it would be for your interest to raise a small sum of money above what the law requires for the support of the library. You have been very liberal in the past toward

your library, and we think there is not a tax-payer in town that regrets his part of the taxes that have gone for its support. We do not wish to ask anything unreasonable of you, but ask you to use your own good judgment in regard to it. You will see by the treasurer's report that what money you have raised for the library, and what the librarian has collected for fines and cards, has all been expended for books, supplies, etc. What your trustees and librarians have done is gratis.

It will be seen by this report that the expenditures exceed the receipts by \$306.86, showing an increase of indebtedness by that amount.

It has been said by many that the increase of expenditures was caused wholly by the new highway law, but such is not the fact. There were several causes, the one most conspicuous being that not money enough was raised for town purposes. It will be seen that it required \$1,110.13 to pay the outstanding bill for breaking roads in the winter of 1892-93. Also, the law required the town to raise \$133 more for support of schools. The county tax was \$286.55 larger than last year; and so in all departments.

But notwithstanding the increase of debt shown by this report, the town's liabilities are less than ever before since 1862. The actual condition of the town's finances on the first day of March, 1893, was, balance of town indebtedness, \$1,309.51; which, with the amount outstanding for breaking roads for the winter of 1892-93, and paid during the present year, of \$1,110.13, shows the town's actual liabilities on March 1, 1893, were \$2,419.64. The town's liabilities on February 15, 1894, are \$1,616.37, showing a net decrease of liabilities of \$803.27 during the year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

CITIZENS OF BARNSTEAD,—In compliance with the law the following report is respectfully submitted :

Nine schools of three terms each have been maintained in town during the past year in the following named houses : Lock's Corner, Berry, White Oaks, Shackford's Corner, Pitman, South, Center, Beauty Hill, Dennett, and Parade. The Shackford's Corner and Pitman schools were united, and the first term was at the former place, the last two at the latter. By keeping the number of schools down to nine, we have had twenty-nine* weeks of school for every scholar in town, the longest school year we ever had.

There has been some complaint about going so far as a few of our scholars are obliged to go, to attend school, although conveyance is provided for them. We admit it is rather inconvenient to get ready every day and ride a mile and a half ; so is it quite as hard for those who live just within the mile and a half limit to get ready and walk all the way. This they do, however, without murmuring. If a few small children living at a distance from the schoolhouse are unable to attend in the coldest weather, it must be borne in mind that the schools begin early in the season, and that they have as much schooling as they would if two or three more houses were opened, and the length of terms shortened accordingly ; while all others have the advantage of the long school.

Now, while our schools have been excellent, there might be improvement, especially if some parents would manifest a little more interest, and not only allow but compel their children to go to school every day and in season. Absenteeism and tardiness are serious hindrances, and the scholar who is habitually absent or tardy soon falls behind his more punctual classmates,

becomes discouraged, and finally quits, with little benefit to himself, simply because there is not the right influence at home.

An education cannot be had for nothing. It costs some care and expense on the part of parents, and close application on the part of pupils. The latter should be encouraged to make the most of their privileges. It is in our common schools that the majority get their early mental training, and nearly all receive here all the school advantages they ever have. We should then give them the best possible chance, and if it should be necessary to have more houses opened, let us have money enough to at least keep as many weeks as we have had during the year just past.

It has been our pleasure to visit many schools in town in years yast, and we have never found them under a more capable, conscientious class of teachers. Teachers and scholars in nearly all instances have worked together in hearty co-operation, and the result is most gratifying.

We cannot speak too highly of the boys and girls of our good old town. Parents, how we wish the registers bore more of your names as visitors. You must frequent the schoolroom if your children are to receive the greatest benefit. You will be welcomed by the teacher, and the scholars will be delighted to prove to you that their time is not spent in vain. Do not always wait for the last day, when the work is done, but drop in at any time and see them at their daily duties. Our word for it, you will agree that the teacher after all is a pretty faithful servant; that your neighbor's children give him no more trouble than your own; and that the most of the pupils are surely, steadily, acquiring that knowledge which is to be of so much importance to them when their school days are ended and they go out into the world to fight its battles and win for themselves positions among their fellowmen.

Most of our schoolhouses are in good repair, quite a sum having been lately expended on them. Others are in need of labor and material to make them fit for the use to which they are put.

The text-books are in very good condition except the spellers and readers used by the small children. These must be replaced, but the cost is not great for such books.
