TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Benton in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Benton, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one Selectman for three years.

Article 4. To choose one or more Highway Agents for the ensuing year, not to exceed three.

Article 5. To choose one Library Trustee for three years.

Article 6. To choose one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article 7. To chose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and building bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for trunk line maintenance for the ensuing year.

Article 10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for trunk line construction for the ensuing year.

Article 11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for state aid maintenance for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the provision of chapter 117, laws of 1917 on section of the Moosilauke road, so called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$100.00 for this purpose.

Article 13. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to prevent the blister rust on white pine forest in Benton. for the ensuing year.

Article 14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for memorial for the ensuing year.

Article 15. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 16. To choose all other necessary town officers and transact any other business thought proper when met.

Article 17. To bring in your votes for the election of delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the national convention of the Democratic and Republican parties to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-president of the United States.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Benton:

The present year there are 12 children enrolled at Benton Street, 6 at Glencliff, and 4 at East Haverhill. There are 5 pupils in high school, Frances Braley at Bath, Theda Page at Woodsville, and Lydia Fillian, Charles and George Belyea at Haverhill.

Last year the attendance at Benton Street was excellent. There were but 7 tardy marks; the average attendance was 94 per cent; and 2 pupils were not absent nor tardy for the year, Frances Braley and Welton McKeen.

This year the school is in charge of Marjorie Deming who is proving a capable teacher. There is a helpful spirit of interest and co-operation in the community which is invariably the sign of a good school.

I suggest that the district offer for sale the schoolhouse at Benton Flats and the one over East. Both are in need of repairs. The prospect of a school in either locality is very distant and it would seem poor economy either to keep them in repair or to let them rot down. At present they have some value.

A small sum of money should be raised at school meeting for repairs on the schoolhouse at the Street. The floor is sagging, the lighting is not sufficient, and there is need of paint inside and out. A model school-building would be a good advertisement for the town.

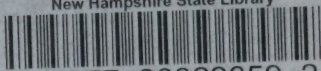
