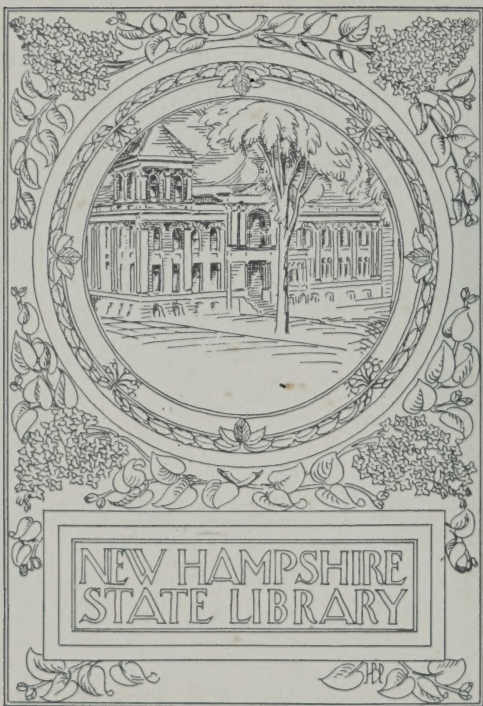


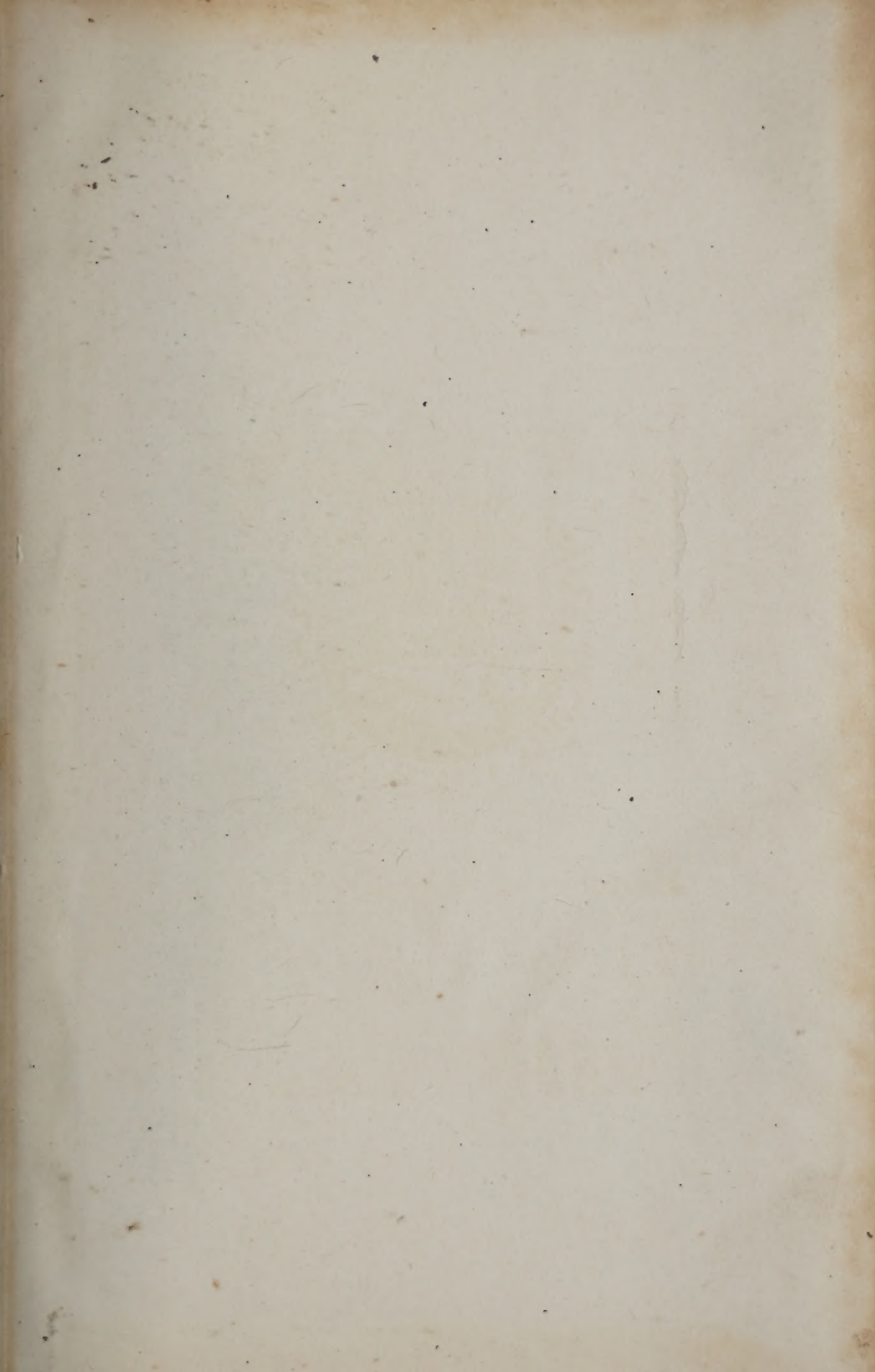

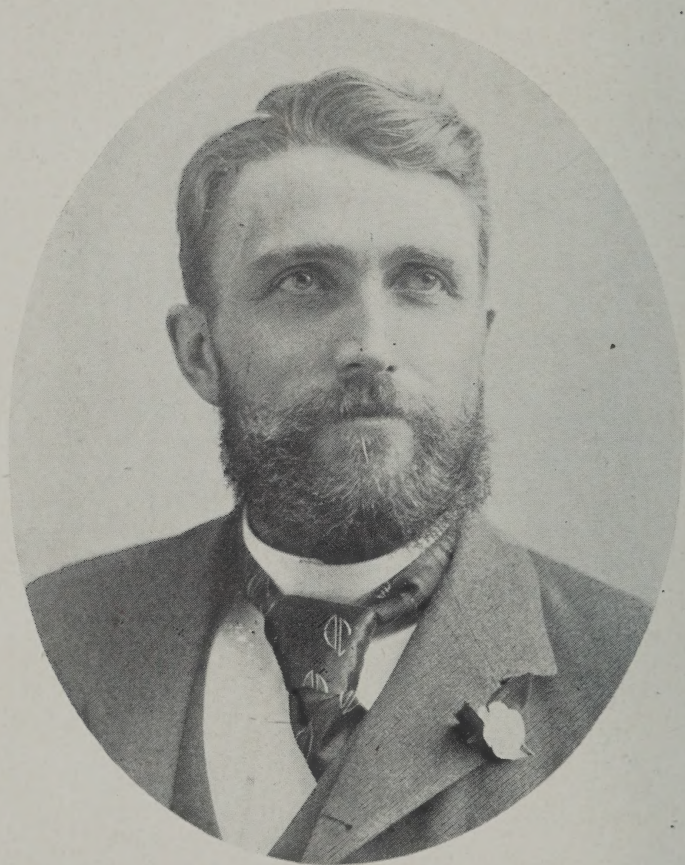

Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, Hon. Daniel J. Daley,
March 28, 1910.

Gentlemen of the City Council:—

Permit me, as Chief Executive of our City, to extend to you my first official greeting in that capacity, and to indulge the hope that our relations during the ensuing year may be agreeable and harmonious to the end that the public duties devolving upon us may be performed without friction, and the greatest good to the greatest number result from our labors.

To three new members of this body and your Mayor, has just been administered the legally prescribed oath of office, the beauty and solemnity of which should impress upon us the dignity and responsibility of our respective positions.

In this same language the other members of this Council have, at an earlier date, solemnly pledged themselves to faithfully and impartially discharge and perform their official duties.

Gentlemen, shall we all observe this pledge during the coming year?

Shall we, when our official action is involved, severally and collectively be guided by the spirit as well as the letter of this obligation?

To these questions there can be but one answer, and that reply dedicates to those we represent, of whatever station, creed, nationality or political affiliation, the very best service of which we are capable.

We are the peoples' servants; they are entitled to, and we are in duty bound to give them, a full measure of faithful work; they have confided to us a most sacred trust, and to violate it would be treachery of the worst type.

We may make mistakes; to err is human; honest mistakes and errors we may be forgiven; but to wilfully refuse or neglect to honestly execute the commission confided to us by the voters of this City, ought to expose us to public ostracism the remainder of our lives.

A variety of important problems will be submitted to us for our consideration and action, to properly dispose of which we will require mature investigation, calmness and moderation in all our deliberations.

Chief among the questions for solution are all matters arising under the general subject of finance.

To successfully and economically conduct the financial affairs of American municipalities is the great problem of the age, especially in cities like our own, where growth and development have been rapid and public improvements expensive.

I trust we shall be able to exercise a wise discrimination and sound discretion in making the appropriations for the current year.

Each department should receive all that is reasonably required, but no more than is absolutely necessary to meet the demands upon it.

The outgoing financial committee has rendered us valuable service by their recommendations on this subject to be found on Pages 207-208 of our last annual report, which should receive our careful attention.

The total amount recommended is \$135,539.71. This is \$1,550 more than the amount first appropriated last year, but only \$250 more if we include two items appropriated May 20th, 1909 for streets and miscellaneous amounting to \$1,300.

It seems to me wise to limit our appropriations to such sums as will make our tax rate in any event no more than it is now, and reduce it a little if consistent with the needs of our city government economically administered.

Included in the aggregate of unpaid taxes is the sum of \$5,686.32 for the years 1900 and 1901 due from W. A. Pingree, collector, long since deceased.

Upon what ground can this amount be considered an asset?

What possible justification can there be for longer treating this item as a part of our resources, when it is generally conceded to be absolutely worthless?

Why delude ourselves into the belief that our net city debt is \$167,394.45, when, as a matter of fact, it exceeds that sum by \$5,686.32?

A little heroic effort on the part of those having this important matter in charge, will eliminate from our assets this worthless item, and I unhesitatingly recommend such action.

Further, for the years 1902-3-4 and 5 we find by reference to the report, total unpaid taxes due from George J. Oleson, collector, amounting to \$13,519.04.

From this, of course, should be deducted \$8,250.00 received by the City on Oleson's bond, leaving a balance of \$5,269.04 still unpaid, and very little encouragement to hope that it will ever be collected.

If this balance is uncollectible it is in no sense an asset, and must soon be stricken from our financial record.

With your permission I quote from a letter recently received by me from A. T. Byrnes, your auditor, as follows:

"It is improbable that much, if any, of these taxes are collectible, and we are confronted with the fact that there is no overlay to take care of the necessary abatements to be allowed on the Gonya taxes.

"As you know, Berlin is peculiarly situated as regard poll taxes, and I believe that there are at least \$2,500 of polls assessed each year that are uncollectible when the Tax Collector receives his commitment, owing to the fact that the men have left town and do not return.

"Possessing a full knowledge of these conditions, it seems to me that it is the duty of the Assessors to make their overlay large enough to cover, not only ordinary abatements and interest allowances, but these necessary poll abatements, otherwise the city is going along year after year spending more money than it receives.

"It is not necessary to be an Accountant to foresee the ultimate results of this policy."

These comments from your auditor, whose knowledge and experience in such matters entitles his opinion to great weight, should impress us with the necessity of beginning at once to apply a remedy to these besetting financial ills.

Beginning with the delinquencies of Collectors Pingree and Oleson, before referred to, a portion of which we have hoped might be collected, the situation has continued to grow worse until we are now confronted with the enormous total of \$57,311.96 uncollected taxes.

No reflection on prior administrations is even remotely intended, and no criticism of them can justly be made, because the trouble is largely attributed to local conditions and the law applying to this subject.

We should not, however, longer delay in providing relief by gradual abatements, covered by suitable overlays to meet the deficiencies thus created.

Notwithstanding these conditions our City is in very good financial standing.

We can eliminate from our assets the aggregate of the Pingree and Oleson uncollected taxes, \$10,955.36, and our net debt would then be only \$178,349.81, which considering the value of our taxable property for taxation purposes, \$5,567,854.00, leaves us well within our debt limitation, which is 5 per cent. of our valuation.

We could, if necessary, increase our debt by more than \$100,000.00, and still not exceed the limit provided by law.

The matter of an additional bond issue to cover our outstanding note indebtedness ought to receive our thoughtful consideration.

If, by so doing, our interest charges could be reduced such action ought to be taken.

Our City Report shows that \$28,626.09 of our Sinking Fund is on deposit in savings banks and drawing but 3 1-2 per cent. interest.

Whether this fund could be so used or invested as to secure better returns, is a matter we ought to investigate.

The use of money we loan ought to be worth about as much as the use of money we borrow, and still preserve the equation of safety.

Schools.

It is somewhat embarrassing for me to treat this subject freely, because I have been a member of the board having this department in charge for the past three years.

We may justly claim, however, that our public schools are second to none, in similar communities, in New England.

I disclaim any credit for this condition, other than what may be due me from the joint action of the board in hiring and retaining our present superintendent, George H. Whitcher, and under his recommendations, our principal and teaching force.

The expediency of placing the conduct of our school affairs under one superintendent was at first a matter of some doubt among us, but we must now admit that the wisdom of that course has been fully demonstrated.

Under this system as applied and developed by our superintendent our schools have, in a few years, grown from a condition of demoralization, disintegration, and chaos, caused by destructive fires, and prior inadequate superintendence, to their present high efficiency.

We now enjoy the distinction of possessing as good public schools as the country affords, and they are models for our neighbors to follow.

Many cities and towns in New England are now enjoying advantages derived from knowledge acquired by acquaintance with our methods of education.

Your attention is respectfully directed to the City report for detailed information, pages 75 to 93 inclusive.

A few matters, however, connected with this department should be here considered, namely:

Amount of appropriation.

Congested condition of school buildings.

Manner of relieving this condition.

The school board has recommended in its report an appropriation of not less than \$32,000.00.

This recommendation was predicated mainly on two propositions, viz.:

The amount expended last year, \$29,526.77, and the number of pupils in the High school.

It is estimated that the enrollment in the High School next September will be 50 to 75 more than at present, and a total of nearly 300.

As shown on page 86 of report, the cost per pupil in the High School was \$48.09.

Assuming the increase to be 50, the increased cost would be \$2,404.50.

It will be seen from these figures alone that the appropriation recommended by the board is not excessive if economy was observed the past year.

More room must be provided to accommodate the probable increase of pupils in the high school.

As a solution of this problem, the board suggests an extension of the Mechanic Arts shop 32 feet toward Hillside Avenue, two stories high, affording two large rooms, one for use of advanced Mechanic Arts pupils, and the other for mechanical drawing, and other recitations.

This would satisfy the immediate demands for additional High School space.

Later another similar extension from the opposite corner of the High School building could be constructed when needed, making a court in front of the building and between these two wings.

These suggestions should be submitted to an architect for an opinion as to their feasibility from an architectural point of view, and as to the cost of the structures.

The Brown School is crowded to suffocation, and relief in some form must be sought.

The board suggests a two room addition to the Burgess School building as originally contemplated, transfer thereto the fourth grade at the Brown school, and use a portion of this new addition for a fifth or sixth grade as required.

Something must be done at once in the way of ventilation at the

Brown School. In this respect the condition of this building is deplorable.

These suggestions should receive immediate consideration if the proposed improvements or any of them are to be accomplished this season.

We certainly should make every reasonable effort to accommodate our growing school attendance.

The Domestic Science department, recently established, is in a very flourishing condition.

Suggestion is made to the overseer of the city's poor that he get into communication with this department.

It is believed that co-operation between these two departments would result in material benefit to many needy families with practically no expense to the city.

For details of school conditions and necessities, the report of the board of education, superintendent and principal should be carefully read.

Public Library.

A free public library is a fountain of knowledge, and "Knowledge is power," therefore, possessing such an institution we should make a supreme effort to develop it to the highest possible degree of efficiency, consistent with our financial ability.

By reference to the report of our librarian, page 60 of the City report, it will be noted that on February 1st, 1910, our library contained 7,064 volumes, and that the total circulation for the past fiscal year was 24,764.

Of this total circulation 10,385 volumes were delivered from the children's desk.

The figures last quoted indicate a fixed purpose in the youth of our city to properly equip themselves for future usefulness; and to be prepared when the time comes, to intelligently assume and perform the duties of mature life.

Believing that such purpose should have active and material encouragement from our City government, it seems to me that we ought to appropriate \$400.00 to defray the expense of furnishing the room in the library basement for a children's department as recommended by the trustees.

The finance committee failed to include this item in recommending appropriations for the ensuing year, but I am convinced that they would have done so had they fully understood the situation.

Our library is a valuable adjunct to our public schools, but its usefulness is materially diminished by lack of room to accommodate the

large number of pupils who resort to it for information in the course of their school work.

Opening a children's department would relieve the present congestion, and when accomplished, would, I am sure, be greatly appreciated by all.

For the reasons stated, the appropriation requested by the trustees is recommended.

The entrance to the library building, as now maintained, is a monstrosity. The front steps are a public nuisance and should be abated.

Such an obstruction, if occasioned by a private person would not be tolerated for a moment, but collectively we are permitting it to remain from year to year, destroying the beauty and symmetry of the building and causing a source of annoyance to every critical eye.

I am advised that the estimated cost of removing the steps and providing an entrance in harmony with the building and its surroundings would not exceed \$200.00.

This would give us a sidewalk of uniform width in front, add beauty to one of our public buildings, and be worth many times the cost.

Streets and Highways.

To the great credit of the last administration, Main street was concreted from an including Postoffice Square to High Street.

My predecessor informs me that it was intended to extend this work to Fifth Street, Berlin Mills village.

Of the \$25,000 raised and appropriated for this purpose, \$18,078.20 has been expended, leaving a balance of \$6,921.20 unexpended, which, with \$2,636.44 due from the Street Railway company, as its proportion of the cost of the completed portion and another credit balance of \$587.70, which ought to be collected soon, makes a total fund of \$10,145.34 available for extending this work the present season.

It must be conceded that no single improvement ever made in this City has been better worth the money expended, than the concreted portion of our main thoroughfare already completed.

Let us make a united effort to extend the good work as rapidly as possible, not only on Main Street, as contemplated but also on Exchange, Green, Mechanic and Pleasant Streets, as recommended by our street commissioner.

Neither should we forget Mason Street from its intersection with Pleasant Street to the Boston & Maine Railroad station.

A very large amount of traffic passes over this portion of that street, and its condition spring and fall justifies this improvement as early as possible.

Our street commissioner estimates the cost of completing the state road from the Dyer farm to the S. E. Paine place at not exceeding \$2,000.00.

The committee on finance has recommended an appropriation of \$10,000.00 for this purpose, which with a like sum to be furnished by the State will secure to us this much needed improvement, and I hope this recommendation will be adopted.

It may be noted that the street commissioner recommends covering with tar or cement this season 7,765 feet of sidewalk curbed, filled in with cinders and covered with stone dust last year.

I hope when this work is being done, many localities with no sidewalks at all will not be forgotten, among which may be mentioned the southerly side of High Street, especially from Main Street to Hillside Avenue, where we have been wallowing in mud spring and fall for the past twenty years.

We should not fail to adopt the commissioner's recommendation to relay with Portland cement concrete, those portions of Main Street sidewalks where the grade was changed the past year.

The unperformed orders on First Avenue, Green, School, Broad and Madigan Streets should be attended to without unnecessary delay.

Many streets on the east side are almost impassible, and with a view to improving these conditions the commissioner accumulated a large quantity of cinders last year.

It is incumbent upon us to make an effort for better street service in this locality, for the need of it cannot be denied.

It must be conceded that this department was especially well conducted last year.

Let us hope that its present efficiency may be indefinitely continued.

Fire Department.

This department seems to be in excellent working condition from an administrative standpoint and otherwise.

By reference to report of chief engineer, we find that the number of fire alarms was thirty-eight last year, and that with extremely few exceptions the resulting damage was slight, and if my computation is correct, no damage occurred in twenty-six of these cases, the fires being extinguished without damage by the department, and only three cases where substantial damage was suffered.

I don't believe this record can be duplicated in any city or town of the size of ours in this section of the country, where similar conditions, as to fire risk, prevails.

The engineer advises me that the ladder truck equipment should

be improved by the purchase of a new extension ladder, and some new ordinary ladders, the former being too heavy to handle, and some of the latter being twenty years old and unsafe to use.

These matters should be attended to at once.

He also advises that the operating expenses of the department might be reduced by the purchase of a combination chemical and hose wagon.

At present two horses are required on the hose wagon, and two on the chemical, whereas with the combination, only two horses would be needed in responding to first alarms.

Some other suggestions and recommendations from the engineer will later be communicated to you, which are of importance, and which will require investigation and due action on our part.

If we can still further improve this service, and I believe we can with comparatively small outlay to the City, we may be able to obtain lower insurance rates, which are now higher than they should be.

The finance committee have recommended an appropriation of \$12,000 for this department, the same as last year, and if this amount is required for good service it ought not be denied.

Sewers and Sanitation.

The subject of the public health is of prime importance in every community, and too much attention cannot be devoted to these departments.

For this work \$5,000 has been recommended, \$1,000 less than our last appropriation, which ought to be sufficient considering the good work accomplished last season, 4,269 linear feet of sewerage having been constructed.

Orders were passed by the City Council for the construction of sewers on Gilbert, Burgess and German Streets, as per report of sewer commissioner.

These orders should be complied with at the earliest possible time, especially on the two latter streets.

Exhaustion of appropriation was the reason for postponing this work last year.

Good work and good results were accomplished by the Board of Health during the last Administration.

The Board's efforts combined with the vastly increased efficiency of our sewer system have produced very gratifying results, an exceptionally good condition of the public health having prevailed for some time past.

For sanitary purposes the sum of \$2,000 has been recommended

by the Finance Committee, and considering the importance of the subject we ought, if possible, to appropriate this amount.

City Building.

Our City and Police Court business is now being done in a building that is absolutely inadequate for the use of a thriving modern community of about 14,000 people.

It is antiquated in construction, inaccessible and unfit for our present and future needs.

Would it not be wise to seriously consider some remedy during our administration?

A move for more commodious quarters must soon be provided, in any event, and I believe our citizens would appreciate an effort by its City Government to provide a decent place for the use of their public officials in the discharge of their duties.

Why not begin by obtaining propositions for purchase of our old building and lot, prices for new location, and approximate cost of a new and suitable structure?

We can at least make some progress which may be of use to our successors if not to ourselves.

If we find it incompatible with the public good to build this season, we may be able to secure a lot upon which to build next season.

Some move in the direction indicated is certainly justified, and earnestly recommended.

City Poor.

In dealing with the affairs of this department, it is difficult to follow a course which will do justice alike to the unfortunate poor, and the public treasury.

It is likewise difficult to discriminate between genuine and spurious calls for aid; consequently the person having these affairs in charge must exercise a wise discretion in affording relief to those who demand it.

It must be conceded that this department has been conducted economically under the management of our present Overseer, but every good citizen, while appreciating the economy thus practiced, will hope the saving of a few dollars has not deprived of relief even one meritorious case of poverty.

In all our human relations there is no condition of life which appeals to our hearts, which should excite our genuine sympathy and loosen our purse strings like that of meritorious want.

As already intimated it is my personal wish that this department establish co-operative relations with the Domestic Science Department

of our public schools, because I have reason to believe that many poor families can be greatly assisted by such co-operation with little if any public expense.

The Superintendent of our public schools will be glad to outline what can be thus accomplished on request.

Conclusion.

There are many other matters of importance, gentlemen, to which your attention has been directed, but which, with your knowledge of our City's affairs, I am sure that you will carefully and intelligently consider as they are presented for your determination.

We shall, of course, be unable to respond to all demands which may be made upon us, but if we are fortunate enough to act with reasonable wisdom in all our official deliberations, we may rest content that public approval will not be denied us.

In the discharge of our public duties we should have no friends to favor, or enemies to punish.

Honest, courageous persistency in doing right, and opposing wrong, should be our motto. Guided by this rule the success of our administration is assured.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF BERLIN AND THE BERLIN ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY.

This AGREEMENT made the fourteenth day of February, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven by and between the Berlin Electric Light Company, a corporation organized un-

der the laws of the State of Maine, and having its principal place of business at Berlin, in the County of Coos, and State of New Hampshire, of the first part, hereinafter called the Company, and the City of Berlin, a municipal corporation duly organized and located within said County of Coos, of the second part, hereinafter called the City.

WITNESSETH: That the Company for and in consideration of the agreements and undertakings to be performed by the City as hereinafter set forth, covenants and agrees as follows:—

1. To furnish electric light by direct current enclosed arc lamps, each lamp consuming approximately four hundred fifty (450) watts to be used for the lighting of the streets of said City, continuous all night service, and for such other purposes as the City may require, in a proper and sufficient manner as hereinafter specified for a period of ten years from the date of this contract.

2 To maintain during the period of this contract, the eighty-four arc lights now furnished by said Company to said City, and to further install at the expense of said Company such other arc lights at such places as may be designated by the said City, provided that if the location of any light is changed after installment, the expense of such change shall be borne by the City.

3. To maintain during the period of this contract in a proper and sufficient manner the incandescent lights now furnished by said Company at the rates hereinafter set forth, and at the present locations but not including the renewal of lamps.

4. To install and maintain such sixteen, and thirty-two candle power incandescent street lights, and at such points on the streets of said City as the City may request during the term of this contract, provided that the installment of said incandescent lamps shall always be made in multiples of ten, and the distance between the lamps in each multiple shall not exceed three hundred (300) feet, the multiples to be located as requested by the City, and provided that if the location of any lamp is changed after installment the expense of such change shall be borne by the City.

In consideration whereof, the City covenants and agrees:—

1. To pay the said Company monthly during the period of this contract the sum of fifty (50) dollars per year for each of the eighty-four (84) arc lights furnished, as aforesaid, and a like sum for such other arc lights as may be installed, as above provided.

2. To pay to said Company monthly during the period of this contract a flat rate of five (5) dollars per year for such sixteen candle power incandescent lights furnished for interior lighting purposes or meter rates at ten (10) cents per thousand watts, with discount at

the present published rates, at the option of the City, and to pay for such sixteen and thirty-two candle power incandescent lights as may be used for street purposes during the period of this contract the sum of eight (8) dollars per year each for sixteen candle power lights, and eleven dollars and twenty-five cents (\$11.25) each per year for thirty-two candle power lights, the same to be paid monthly.

3. To permit the said Company to supply at the terms aforesaid all electric lights that may be required by said City during the period of this contract.

Report of Sewer Commissioner.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor the Mayor, and City Council:

Gentleman:—I take great pleasure in appending hereto the annual report of the work performed by the department of sewers, during the season of 1910.

Work of construction was begun the later part of the month of April and continued during the summer on the following streets:

German street—910 feet of six inch sewer with two man-holes, this sewer runs from Goebel street across the Boston & Maine railroad to a point near the International Paper company's fence, was built through 315 feet of ledge with an average depth of three feet and nine inches and a total cost of \$625.00.

Goebel street—215 feet of six inch sewer, from German street 215 feet northerly along Goebel street. Cost \$480.00.

Merrimack and Burgess streets—830 feet of six inch sewer with two man-holes and one catch basin. This sewer runs along Burgess street both ways from Merrimack street and along Merrimack street to Champlain street sewer. Greater part through ledge and cost \$1,110.00.

Sessions street—208 feet of six inch sewer built from Third avenue to a point along Sessions street to Louis Lapointe house and cost \$130.00.

High street—530 feet of six inch sewer built on both sides of Stahl street about 110 feet easterly from Stahl street and 420 feet westerly. Sewer was laid mostly through ledge and cost \$775.00.

Stahl street—250 feet of six inch sewer built from High street to Treamer street and cost \$275.00.

Treamer street—540 feet of eight inch sewer was built from Stahl street to Portland street sewer, and cost with the right-of-way across Samuel Carver's land \$665.00.

Denmark street—310 feet of six inch sewer from Eighth street northerly and cost \$265.00.

First avenue—80 feet of six inch sewer was laid from Philip LePage's house to the Grand Trunk right-of-way, and cost with the right-of-way across land of John Charlton \$55.00.

Making a total of 3,873 feet of sewer built during the season.

Fifty-six house connections were made with sewers constructed during the season and eighty-one connections with sewers heretofore existing.

The out fall for the Hutchins street sewer near the office of G. W. Blanchard was extended to the brook running along the Berlin Mills company's railroad and as this is only a temporary arrangement steps will have to be taken to extend this sewer to the Androscoggin river.

The out-fall for the west side sewer which now empties into the culverts under the Grand Trunk railroad near Hillside avenue should be extended to Dead river the coming season.

The sewer system of our City is taking on quite a size and steps must be taken in the near future for its proper up-keep, this can be only accomplished by detailing men whose duties should be only on maintenance, and they should be equipped with proper flushing machines for cleaning the whole sewer system.

During the paving of Main street openings were left in the pavement for the building of man-holes, so that if occasion required the sewer along the street might be accessible in case of cleaning or plugging. These man-holes should be built the coming season.

A great amount of surface water finds its way into what is known as the St. Giles district and a storm sewer will have to be built in this section in the near future.

In closing I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the Mayor and City Council for help and encouragement given me in carrying on the work of this department, I also wish to thank the members of the Board of Health for assistance given during the past season.

Report of Street Commissioner.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—I take great pleasure in appending hereto the annual report of the work performed by the Department of Roads and Bridges, during the season of 1910.

Owing partially to my absence from the City and partially to a late spring, work of construction did not begin until well towards the first of May, but from that time onward work was carried on under full sail.

As usual we found that the roads in the outlying districts needed extensive repairs, and work was begun on the West Milan road April 20, and was resurfaced with gravel from Broad street or Third avenue, to a point just beyond the pest house. The cost of this work was in the neighborhood of \$525.00. We also started about the same time to resurface the east road to Milan, and starting at the Paine bridge the road was put in fairly good shape as far as the Success road, some of the hills being cut down and steel culverts replacing the wooded ones. Later on in the summer the bushes were cut along the side of the road from the Success road to the town line, and the Success road repaired from the Milan line to the east road. The cost of this work was \$585.00. I might say here, that good road building material is hard to find in the immediate vicinity, and hope that in the near future this road may receive a coating of macadam, as the foundation is excellent for such material, and a road built in first class shape of this material would add greatly to the comfort of the citizens as a whole, and this side of the river is becoming very popular both for commercial and pleasure usage. As the final papers for the Joint fund appropriation were a little delayed, we found it necessary to repair the westside road to Milan to quite an extent from Paine bridge to Dyers, and the cost of the work was \$113.00. The Gorham road was resurfaced with cinders from the Berlin Street Railway car barn to the Gorham line, and the bushes cut along the sides of the road at the second crossing, the cost of repairs were \$273.00. It may be well to mention here that this road is in the direct line of what is known as the east side boulevard, and comes under the joint fund appropriation act, and as the foundation of the road is getting pretty rough it would be of great benefit to the traveling public if this section could be rebuilt the coming season.

City Streets.

A large majority of the streets in the thickly settled portion of the city received attention to a greater or less degree and following is a list of such streets.

Second Avenue:—This street was regraded from Clarke street to David Hazzard's, a distance of 475 feet and cost \$365.00. The ledge knoll at Charles Clarke's was blasted out and the street is in fairly good condition as a whole. Also the section from Madigan street to Manering street was coated with crushed rock, as we found that it was useless to try to hold this hill with the local material, this cost \$47.00

Madigan Street:—This street was resurfaced from Broad street to Fifth avenue, and the knoll or ledge at the corner of Fourth avenue blasted off. The cost of this work was \$80.00.

First Avenue:—This street was regraded from a point opposite the Old Hospital to Philip LePage's and cost \$307.00. It may be well to mention here that some means will have to be taken to carry off the surface water that collects at the corner of First avenue and Gilbert street, as at present after every rain or thaw quite a quantity of water collects and as there is no outlet for the water, it makes it very inconvenient for those who have occasion to use these thoroughfares.

Western Avenue:—This thoroughfare is in a deplorable condition from a point opposite the residence of Thomas McGuire to the Cascade Village and while we repaired the street three times during the season, the material in the immediate vicinity is of such poor quality, that it is sending good money after bad to continue to try to keep the street up with the material at hand. As this way to Cascade village is much used, we must take steps to get material that will stand the traffic, and as there is good macadam material in this vicinity would suggest that the street be reconstructed in the early season coming. Four of the wooden culverts were replaced with steel culverts. The entire cost of work done during the past season on this street was \$360.00.

Hillside Avenue:—This street was resurfaced from Dead River bridge to Washington street and cost \$155.00.

Hemlock Street:—This street was resurfaced from Hillside avenue to Park street, and cost \$118.00.

Pine Street:—This street was resurfaced from Willard street toward Dead river a distance of 650 feet and cost \$53.00.

Willard Street:—Resurfaced from School to Emery and Hillside avenue to State, cost \$105.00.

School Street:—Resurfaced from Willard to Washington street and Spring street to Third street, and cost \$290.

MAIN STREET.

The paving of Main street was continued during the season and work begun June 29, and completed September 7, starting at High street and ending at Fifth street in Berlin Mills village. The total length of pavement laid during the season being 3,800 feet or about 13,500 square yards of roadway averaging 32 feet wide. While the appropriation for this work was overdrawn to the extent of about \$2,000 the city has a street that surely warrants the money expended. The one drawback seems to be the dust nuisance, but as this is a pavement that is practically new to road building I look to see some method discovered by which the nuisance can be obviated; in fact there is a method in the experimental stage, which bids fair to be a success, and no doubt will be far enough developed for use the coming summer. The citizens in general seem well pleased with the pavement and as it is really one of the most economical pavements now in use, both as to first cost and up-keep, I trust that our future City Governments will see fit to continue the construction of such a class of pavement on our busiest streets. One mistake was made in the pavement laid during the season of 1909, and this was the method adapted of placing the concrete on both sides of the street railway track and then filling in the section between the rails afterward. A joint has developed which looks bad and the concrete has started to wear on the edge. This joint should be cleaned out the first thing this coming spring and filled with asphalt; outside of this there are but few spots that need to be patched up, which speaks well of the class of pavement.

The heavy shower of the latter part of August washed the top coating of the freshly laid concrete at Fourth street and this should be repaired in the early spring.

Pleasant Street:—Resurfaced from York street to Dead river with material taken from the New Convent and cost \$40.00. A section of this street was paved with concrete from School street to Main street and cost \$275.00. The condition of this street is very bad and should be resurfaced from School street to Green street. Would recommend macadamizing, as the street is pretty well settled and subject to a great deal of traffic.

New Streets.

The following new streets were reconstructed during the past season:

Champlain Street—Mason to Merrimack street.

Mason street—Burgess to Hillsborough street.

Rockingham street—Grafton street to northerly terminus.

Merrimack street—Champlain to Burgess street.

Germain street—Goebel street to westerly terminus.

Strafford street—Champlain to Burgess street.

Third avenue—Mount Forist street to Madigan street (graveled only).

In addition to above work on streets, considerable repair work was done owing to the many severe showers of the summer. The Cate's Hill road was entirely rebuilt from a point opposite the LaCasse farm to the main road and cost \$685.00.

Berlin-Milan Road, state aid, Joint Fund Appropriation.

The section of road between the Paine bridge and Dyers was built under the State Aid act, the length of the road built being about 3,800 feet and the cost to the city being about \$1,000.00. There still remains a short section to be constructed to complete this end of the "East Side Boulevard," and my estimate of same is about \$1,500.00. Of this the state would pay one-half.

Sidewalks.

Following is a list of sidewalks built during the past season:

Green street, west side, from Revere house to underpass, 460 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$276.00.

First avenue, north side, from Mount Forist street to Philip Le-Pages, 1,190 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$608.00. Considerable ledge had to be blasted to get a uniform grade.

School street, Willard street to Washington street, and from High street to Church street, 450 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$180.

Church street, School street to Pleasant street, 240 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$96.00.

Success street, Main to School street, 340 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$175.00.

School street, Success street to opposite Prospect street, 210 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$85.00.

Sweden street, Denmark street to Eighth street, 1,030 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$485.00.

Seventh street, Main street to Denmark street, 840 feet of curb and dirt sidewalk. Cost \$415.00.

Mount Forist street, 210 feet of cinder walk. Cost \$33.00.

The walk in front of the new Convent was reconstructed and a new curb cement walk laid, a retaining wall was built along the front of the convent grounds, the cost of the work being \$615.00.

Sidewalk built on Broad street, from Madigan to Mannering street, 390 feet of curb and dirt filling. Cost \$235.00.

Making a total of 5,355 feet of new walks laid in the season.

In addition to above the sidewalk from Fifth street to Gilbert

Perry's was covered with tar concrete, a tar concrete walk was laid on High street from Pleasant street to Emery street and these two walks together with repairs of concrete walks on Main street and Postoffice square cost about \$1,500.

Owing to the fact that the three companies failed to remove their poles along the business section of Main street, until late in the season, very little was done toward putting in the cement walk between Postoffice square and Mason street, about 210 feet of cement walk being laid, costing \$235.00.

Our present method of constructing walks while on the whole heading towards permanency is not on the whole satisfactory, for after a heavy shower more or less of the filling is washed out and somewhat of a nuisance to the public, and would suggest that on streets where steep grades exist that all walks be covered either with tar concrete or cement, to prevent the gulying out of the filling. Hillside avenue is a notable example of this state of affairs and should be covered over the coming season.

Mason street bridge, easterly span, was replanked and cost \$163.00.

The easterly span of the Mason street bridge is weakening and during the past season we had it inspected by a bridge expert, and he recommended that the present structure be replaced by one of more substantial proportions. This bridge is subject to a very heavy traffic and the condition of the bridge is getting towards the danger point. A new span would cost in the neighborhood of \$5,000.00, and the salvage on the present structure would amount to about \$500.00. Would recommend that steps be taken the coming season to place the bridge in a safe condition.

General Conditions of Streets.

In closing this report I would recommend that the question of road making in our city be followed up along the lines of permanency, and I have found that while we have an unlimited supply of materials at hand for the building of good roads, the money end has been somewhat cramped. The gravel roads that have been built during the past do not stand up under the heavy showers which our climate is subject to, and it seems to me that the only proper road for our city is that built of crushed rock. It has been suggested by one of our present members of the City Council that we crush rock the year round. This is a move in the right direction and accomplishes two objects, one of which is the giving of employment to many of our worthy citizens, and the other that of permanent roads.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to the Mayor and City Coun-

cil for help and encouragement given me in the carrying on of the work of this department.

Department of City Poor.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending February 15, 1911, showing a total expenditure for city poor of \$614.18 from an appropriation of \$1,000.00, leaving a balance unexpended as a credit to the account of \$385.82.

I have no particular suggestions to make at this time, as the work in this department varies little from year to year; but I anticipate for the coming year an increase in the expenditures for support, on account of assistance that will be necessary in caring for Mrs. William Lemire and four children, who have recently applied for aid. and in view of this, would suggest that the appropriation of \$1,000.00 be made as usual, and unless some new cases come to us, this amount should be sufficient.

Last year I suggested that the net revenue from Couture property be credited back to the Poor Department, because I have supported Mrs. Couture entirely, and the amount has been charged up to the Pauper Account. It of course make no particular difference to the City, being simply a matter of bookkeeping, but if done would better show the net cost of the pauper support by the City.

I believe this completes twenty years service for me as Overseer of the Poor for Berlin, and I am pleased to report that the net cost to the City is no larger than when I began. During the past year I have often had occasion to consult Mayor Daley on various matters, and his good judgement, coupled with his knowledge of the law, has been of value to the City as well as of assistance to me in doing the work. I take this opportunity to thank also all City officials for their assistance to me personally.

City Solicitor's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—Herewith I beg to submit my report as City Solicitor of the City of Berlin for the year ending February 15th, 1911.

During the past year the following cases have been disposed of:

The case of Joseph Cloutier and Frank X. McHale were ordered nonsuited by the court, and in the case of Albina E. Wilson the plaintiff elected to take a voluntary non-suit without costs to the city.

The cases of Joseph Guay, William H. Paine and James L. Beattie against the City were dismissed without costs, at the April 1910, term of the Superior court and like order was made in the cases against Joseph Guay and Ella M. Beattie.

The cases of Anna Lessard and John T. Quinn for damages caused by the flowage were investigated by a committee of the City Council, and it was voted that the same be settled and agreements filed in court accordingly. The cases of Jos. Corey and Louis Corey were also investigated by a committee and ordered settled as the records of the City Council show.

In connection with the two latter cases, I take this opportunity of calling your attention to the suits and claims for damages which have been presented against the City on account of defective railings along embankments in various parts of the City. These suits and claims show the importance of keeping all dangerous embankments protected by suitable railing.

The City is defendant in cases instituted by the following persons: Emily C. Paine, David Guay, Cyril Brooks, Simon Stahl, H. E. Stahl and John B. Gilbert.

The action of Emily C. Paine is a continuance of the litigation arising from the laying out of a highway over Cates hill, and it has been before the Council at various times.

The cases of David Guay and Cyril Brooks are action in trespass against the City and will undoubtedly be disposed of at the next term of the Superior court.

The cases of Simon Stahl and H. E. Stahl are the appeals from the assessment of taxes, and I am informed that the Board of Assessors have practically adjusted these actions.

The action of John B. Gilbert is one to recover expenses in attend-

ing the Police Commissioners hearing before the Governor and Council at Concord, New Hampshire, in November and December, 1909, and inasmuch as it involves questions of law the case will be transferred to the Supreme court for a final decision.

The City is plaintiff in an action against the Grand Trunk Railway system for neglecting to place flagmen at the various crossings in this City, and this matter unless otherwise disposed of will be in order for trial at the next term of the Superior court. It is possible that an amicable adjustment may be made of this matter and I am still in correspondence with the office of the road.

In addition to the above litigation attention has been given to cases in the Police court, and other work incidental to the office of Solicitor.

In conclusion I desire to express my thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, and the members of the City Council for the kind and careful attention which they have given to matters relating to this department.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:--Attached is the report of the Health Officer, which the Board of Health submits for your careful consideration.

It is unnecessary to make any comments on this report, as it explains itself. The Board would like to call your attention, however, to the fact that during the past year we have been able to systematize the work of the Board so that things are being handled in a much more business-like way than heretofore. It is our aim to make the Health Department of the City of Berlin the most efficient in the state, and we are anxious to have the Council feel that the Board is trying in every way to work with them towards this end.

We wish to thank the Council for the assistance they have given us, but we also would like to call attention to the fact that the appropriation which was made originally is insufficient to meet the present needs, and that it should be increased for the coming year to \$2,100. Our estimates of the expenditures are as follows:

Report of Health Officer and Milk Inspector.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To the Board of Health of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—I herein respectfully submit to you the first annual report of the Health Officer and Milk Inspector.

Following the passage of an ordinance regulating the sale and care of milk in the City of Berlin (Passed October 28, 1909) the position of Health Officer and Milk Inspector was created by a resolution of the City Council passed on the same date, and I began work as said officer on March 4, 1910. My appointment was again confirmed at the first yearly meeting of the City Council held March 28.

I have received, or discovered, investigated and taken action upon 176 complaints of unsanitary conditions or nuisances during the year. These complaints were received as follows:

As may be seen, these complaints embrace a great variety of subjects, yet in nearly every instance the action that was thought necessary to remedy the complaint has been taken without recourse to legal proceedings. Where the notice was short and the party asked for an extension of time such extension was given, my idea being to accomplish the desired result quietly, yet satisfactorily. Legal proceedings have been resorted to in only four cases—my position being upheld in each case.

I have received reports of 148 cases of contagious diseases. In each case the house has been quarantined without delay after the receipt of the report, and the inmates instructed as to the quarantine rules governing their particular case. Warning has been given not to allow milk vessels to pass in or out of the house. The heads of the different schools have been given notice of the occurrence of disease with a list of the school children in each family, and they have been warned not to admit those children to school without a permit from the Board of Health.

The large increase in the number of reported cases over previous years may be satisfactorily accounted for as follows: Every effort to have the physicians of the City co-operate with us in the reporting of all their cases has been made, and they have responded so satisfactorily that many cases which never would have come to light in the past have been reported and quarantined. Further, the Board decided early in the spring to keep a record of and quarantine all cases of measles. As a result, 63 cases, or nearly one-half of the total record were reported. With these allowances, it would appear that the City is in its usual healthy condition.

There have been about 922 children vaccinated, and over 2,000 inspected for previous successful vaccination, and a record has been kept of the results of such vaccination and inspection. This will eliminate an immense amount of work for the Board, as it will be necessary to keep track of only those who enter school each year, instead of going

over the whole each year. In view of the several cases of small pox which have occurred lately, it seems very fortunate that the vaccination has been thorough.

The Board still pursues its practice of furnishing antitoxin free of charge to many of its diphtheria cases, such assistance amounting to \$152.00 during the year.

Milk.

The laboratory, situated at the High School, was equipped and ready for work the first of May, and since then 159 samples have been examined for richness, cleanliness, temperature, and bacteria count. When I began my work, I found most of the milk men using from two to eight thicknesses of cheesecloth for straining—a method that is bungling, unsanitary, and above all unsatisfactory.

In spite of the eight thicknesses, they still found a fine dust in the bottom of their jars, and informed me that they could get the milk no cleaner. After several personal demonstrations I was able to convince them that a thin layer of absorbent cotton between two layers of cheesecloth to hold the cotton in place would accomplish the desired result, would be more sanitary, and just as cheap. In place of the cheese cloth, and cotton, one thickness of a good cotton flannel could be substituted, and satisfactory results obtained. Today, most of them are using either one method or the other.

After having been reduced from 50 per cent. to 0 from May to September, the cows come in from the pasture in October, thereby raising the amount of dirt as would be expected. But this has in turn been reduced from 11.5 per cent to 0.

The practice of icing milk on the wagons was begun the last of the season, and while much practical good as far as reducing the amount of sour milk put out was not obtained in the short time before cold weather, it served to give the dealers an idea of how to prepare for the coming summer. I expect we will be able to cut the amount of sour milk in half next summer, thereby helping both the producer and the customer for a producer cannot hope to hold his trade during hot weather by delivering sour milk.

There is always the proposition of railroad milk in a City of this size, and where the conditions of railroad transportation are as poor as they are up here, I do not hesitate to say that the larger part of such milk cannot be brought into Berlin in a satisfactory condition during the summer months. There is no chance of icing on the cars, and I have seen milk reach here so warm that the butter fat has been churned out by the motions of transportation. The morning's milk has to be brought to the cars so early that there is no chance for proper cooling and the milk is well on its way toward souring before it gets here. Then again comes the difficulty of satisfactory inspection of distant farms and the surety that the directions laid down are followed while the Inspector is away.

It is my earnest opinion that the Milan district should be the source of the milk supply of Berlin. There is clear land enough there to support plenty of cows, and while it is somewhat distant, the roads are level and in excellent shape. At the same time, if the farmer had the surety of a good market for all the milk he could produce for years to come, there would be an inducement for him to go into the milk business on a larger and more scientific scale, and Berlin would benefit thereby. Careful figuring has shown that nearly one-half of our milk supply can be satisfactorily produced in the immediate vicinity of Berlin, and the Milan district can easily be made to produce the other half. Berlin would then have a constant supply of *Fresh* milk while the farms from which it came could be brought under close supervision of the Inspector.

In regard to the scoring of dairies, I would say that the larger producers have shown a decided effort to increase their scores and several of them have made gratifying gains. The work of inspection has had to be carried on very slowly and carefully so that farmers would not go out of the business and create a shortage of milk.

I would suggest that a method of scoring which has been used in other cities with satisfactory results be employed here, i. e., to require dairies scoring below 50 to make a yearly improvement on their farm equal to an increase of ten points in their score until they reach a total of 60, when they shall make an increase of 5 points until a total of 75 is reached. For dairies scoring 50 or over an increase of 5 points a year should be required until a total of 75 is reached. Milk coming from farms that score 75 or over can always be depended upon to give satisfaction. Requiring a graded improvement covering a number of years would lessen the expense per year, and as many points can be made simply by introducing cleaner methods without the outlay of a dollar this plan will not work the hardship or expense that might be imagined.

Having received the opinion of many of our physicians that a mixed milk is more satisfactory for infant feeding, I would recommend that the Board pass a regulation requiring all milk men to mix their milk before offering it for sale. In this way, each man's milk will be uniform from day to day, and the baby will get the same amount of nourishment daily.

In conclusion I would like to acknowledge with thanks the free use of a team donated by the Berlin Mills Co., as it has been of great value to me in making my inspections, besides saving the City a considerable sum of money.

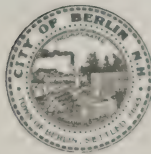

Superintendent's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen:—This is the seventh annual report issued from this office and I beg leave through it to point out some of the more important problems that present themselves and to include not only what has been done but what is proposed for the future.

Teachers.

The great feature that determines the efficiency of any school system is the teaching force. Plans may be good, supervision reasonably so, equipment first-class and expenditures liberal but if the teachers are of low grade the results must surely be unsatisfactory.

With no desire of intention of instituting comparisons I am able to state as a simple fact that never during the past seven years has the whole teaching force averaged so high in results attained or when there were so few weak places in the teaching.

Many of our teachers have been here long enough to have reached the salary maximum and fortunately nearly all of the new teachers have proved able to meet the requirements in their respective rooms.

The problem of securing competent teachers, however, is constantly growing more and more difficult and until the State establishes a Normal School in this City the whole of Coos County must experience increasing difficulties in advancing its educational work.

The Problem of Promotion.

There are many elaborate plans for securing flexibility in the promotion of pupils and in general the more complicated the plan the less flexible it becomes. Berlin's plan is very simple and absolutely flexible. It is based on the belief that there is no day in the year when a pupil may not be promoted *if by such promotion the pupil will be better served by the school.*

No machinery is necessary. If a teacher is of the opinion that one or ten pupils are able to do work materially above the average of the class then by reporting this opinion to the Superintendent

along with her reasons the promotion will be made with the one condition that the pupil or pupils must make good in the new grade.

Last year, 1909, at Christmas as previously reported 96 pupils were advanced a grade; the June promotions again advance 86 of these. While 6 left school for good reasons leaving only 4 out of 96 who failed to "make good." At Christmas, 1910, 54 have been extra promoted. These pupils are easily and quickly adjusted to the work of the new grade because the work itself is not rigidly laid out.

There are school systems where every cog in every wheel must pass a given point at a given instant. Where on the thirteenth day of the seventh month at the third hour and twenty-third minute a given grade must sing a certain song, read a given poem, analyze and parse a prescribed sentence or repeat in concert the rule for cube root but it's needless to say that such systems are not the ones where promotions may be made at any time in the year.

Retardation.

The forgoing leads up to the much discuss question of lagging behind or *retardation*. Many acres of statistics have been gathered and many good men have been tangled in a net work of figures from which they have emerged with most startling conclusions. I do not purpose to analyze the figures, but will leave that for experts, however, during the year ending June 10, 1910.

It is evident that more than 100 per cent were promoted, that is, if pupils who are not promoted at the end of the year are to count *against* complete or 100 per cent promotion, then pupils promoted twice in the same year you must count *for* complete promotion.

We thus have the seemingly paradoxical condition of more than 100 per cent efficiency, so far as, promotions are concerned.

The result of systematic and constant effort along this line has had a very pronounced effect in bringing the average class age well within reasonable limits except in grades 5 and 6 where the influence of over age pupils who come from other schools is felt.

As compared with previous years this is a remarkable exhibit and indicates, with the exception above noted, a close approach to the standard.

Elimination of the Eight Grade.

Last year I called attention to the possibility of giving pupils a satisfactory preparation for High School in seven years instead of eight and in the report for 1910 will be found the following: "At the present time we have 30 pupils in the seventh grade who are fitting to pass from the seventh grade to the High School, and there is every reason to believe that nearly all of these will make good."

Now what are the facts about the group? The first fact is that all of the group did cover the required subjects and were given cards to enter High School; second, all but one did enter and 28 are now in school.

This group has been mingled with about 90 pupils from three eighth grade classes and have been shown no favors nor have they needed any.

The result up to the mid year examinations is as follows; The group from the seventh grade have received an average rank in all subjects of 76 per cent as compared with averages of 76.5, 78 and 78.4 per cent in the three groups from the eighth grades. One of the seventh grade group only two have fallen below an average of 70 and one of these is abundantly able to stand in the 80 section. Stated another way: 91 1-2 per cent of the seventh graders have maintained a passing average as compared with like averages of 88, 90 1-2 and 93 1-2 per cent in the three eighth grade groups, so as a final result, **91 1-2** per cent of the seventh grade pupils have made good as against **91** per cent of the whole number who came from the eighth grades.

The *prediction* that they would make good is substantiated by the *fact* that they have made good.

It seems reasonably certain at this time that at least three-fourths of the pupils today in the two seventh grades will be able to enter the High School next fall and as the plans for future development work out, it will be seen that from 85 to 90 per cent of all our boys and girls can easily secure the "power and capacity" for High School work in seven years.

The seeming under age of the freshman class is the result of the change made last year and as is always the case a period of readjustment must follow but in all probability under the seven grade plan the entrance age to the High School will remain close to 14 years, an age now fully recognized as a standard.

The lower average age of the freshman class does not show decreased but rather increased ability to handle the work.

New Departments.

School Savings Bank.

One of the most important of the new lines of educational work taken up this year is the School Savings Bank organized on an educational basis.

This bank is organized as a part of the Commercial Department of the High School and furnishes the material for the study of banking as well as experience in office practice. Deposits are received from all of the grades and the plan contemplates a board of directors one from each grade from the fifth up. The officers are chosen from the senior class and these receive all deposits, enter the same in the card ledger and deposit the totals weekly in one of the local banks where it draws interest.

One of the interesting days in the Commercial department is banking day, that is every Friday at which time the officers assume all the responsibilities of real business, handle real money and keep real books.

The total number of depositors up to date is 620 and the total deposits have amounted to \$950.57. The average weekly deposits have been \$51.10.

Withdrawals are by means of checks and up to date have amounted to \$ 91.23, leaving a balance of \$859.34 now on deposit. The interest on this thus far credited is \$ 3.51, making a final total of

\$862.85 now standing to the credit of School Savings bank.

The chief object of course is not so much the accumulation of money as it is the formation of the habits of saving. Habits are easily established in children, these may be good or bad, cigarette smoking, buying and reading literature of low character, fooling away good money and valuable time at moving picture shows are some of the bad habits while bringing pennies, nickels and dimes to the School Savings bank is a good habit that tends to offset the whole evil brood just mentioned and many others.

On the purely educational side the actual concrete experience involved in this real banking business is of the greatest value and in time I hope to see the work not only of saving but also of investing these funds carried on by the pupils guided and directed by an advisory council of business men. Such a plan is possible and will no doubt in time be inaugurated.

Home School-Gardens.

Last April there were distributed among the pupils nearly or quite 2000 packages of flowers and vegetable seeds and over 500 pupils at least attempted to do some real gardening.

The results were extremely gratifying. Teachers who visited and advised and assisted their pupils reported unanimously that the parents of these children were enthusiastic in their support of the home garden as encouraged by the schools.

Berlin has enough unused land to produce a very considerable addition to the food supply of its inhabitants and from observation last year I feel convinced that directly and indirectly there were close to one thousand more gardens large and small in the city than ever before.

In many cases that came under my notice parents not only cleaned up some rubbish covered lot for the children but also made a garden for themselves.

Any one who doubts the possibility of gardening in Berlin should visit the splendid garden at the corner of School and Willard streets, and should ask the owner, Mr. Companion, as to the income derived from this land cared for chiefly during spare hours.

I hope we may develop this work on a still larger scale this year. Here is a school directed activity that costs nothing and produces value in food, in sanitary improvement and in an improved appearance of the City. Prizes were offered by the Womans club for the best kept gardens.

Play Grounds.

Since our last report the City Council unanimously voted to buy a

play ground for the use of the pupils in the Marston School. This lot has been graded into a good tennis court, a basket ball ground and room for various other games and plays. Through the efforts of the Woman's Whist Club we have received \$15.00 which has been used to buy two tennis outfit; these have been of great value in extending the recess work along the lines of plays and games. I am glad to report that this recess work is solving the discipline problem in our schools and that progressive teachers fully appreciate the importance of organized games wisely directed.

High School Additions.

The wings added to the High School building though somewhat tardy in their completion have given ample room for the increased enrollment of the school and have given opportunity for the development of two Industrial Courses, Mechanic Arts and Domestic Arts. The building as it now stands will no doubt prove equal to the demands for sometime to come for with next September enrollment will probably come a nearly permanent condition as to numbers except for the growth of the City or at least until such time as the New French Parochial School shall graduate classes fitted for and ready to take a high school course. When that time comes new problems will arise for solution.

Financial.

The unexpected and gratifying thing this year is the fact that it has cost about \$1500 less to maintain this Department than was estimated at the commencement of the year. A part of this, nearly \$1000, is due to decreased purchase of coal which is not a real gain because the amount on hand today is nearly 100 tons less than a year ago, and next year there must be bought correspondingly more.

Another unexpected decrease in expense came from a greater number of vacancies in the staff of teachers than was anticipated resulting in more inexperienced teachers at lower salaries. While this was a financial gain in some few cases it was not an educational advance and yet remote as we are from Normal Schools and other training centres we must expect teachers to leave after reaching a reasonable standard of efficiency although with all the advantages of higher salaries elsewhere and the attractions of splendid positions nearer home our teachers stay with surprizing fidelity a fact which is very gratifying.

The total cost of maintenance this year and last is shown in the following table and is printed because of its value for future reference.

In the plans and estimates for next year it will be necessary to include nearly \$1,000.00 more for fuel than was expended this year and \$600.00 more for a large bunch of insurance that falls due on the High School and Marston school. The salary list too will tend to increase from \$500.00 to \$1,000.00 on account of the increase that is sure to occur in the High School enrollment so all things considered it will be fortunate if we can keep the total expenditures for running expenses below \$31,000.00, but this will not call for increased appropriation by the Council because the \$25,000 plus the average income from other source will no doubt reach the sum just named.

This year 71 1-3 per cent of the total expenditure is for teachers as against 71 per cent last year.

Without again giving a comparative table it may be said that our expense from any point of view is materially less in Berlin than in most cities of its size while there are very few cities of our size that offer four such courses as are provided here.

Cost of Maintenance.

The following data is valuable and should be made a part of this report for as the years go on and the accounts become more and more detailed this information will serve not only to enable the Council to make its appropriations understandingly but it tends towards economy in management to have comparative costs available.

The cost is slightly less per pupil than last year while the service rendered has been in most respects better.

It is not out of place at this time to call attention to the fact that of the boys who have gone from this school to College considerably more than half have taken either the Commercial, or Mechanic Arts Courses, thus demonstrating that the so-called College Preparatory

Course, that is the Latin Scientific, is by no means the only road to higher education. This tendency is fixed and sure to continue, and in the future as now, more boys and girls will be quickened to a realization of the need of a College training by preparation for life in the practical courses offered by the best high schools than by the so-called cultural courses which tradition has labeled College preparatory.

The world does move and while there are conservatives and "stand-patters" in education as in business and politics yet it is the progressive, the "insurgent," that sets the pace and lifts humanity on to higher and higher planes of service and usefulness and it is the order of the day that education shall fit for life *first* and for College *incidentally*.

The Colleges are beginning to understand this though as usual they are the last to recognize the drift of things.

Not many years hence any boy or girl who has average ability and who has completed eleven or twelve years in the public schools will be given a welcome to any college whether he has read the Vicar of Wakefield or Sir Roger, or Burke's Conciliation or even the Flight of the Tartar Tribes and full credit will be given for trained hands that can do as well as for trained brains that can direct. Then the tempest in the teapot about certificates, and examinations and conditions, that wise old College men once found so useful as a fence to guard an "aristocracy of learning" against the on rush of the rank and file of the worlds worker, will be found unnecessary and unwarranted and any one of good character bearing a high school diploma will be given a chance to match his time and money against the College equipment of men and means and if he can carry the work sufficiently well to insure the making of a better citizen, a more efficient creator of values, a better workman, in act if he tries for all that is in him, then standard or no standard he will be permitted to continue his labors. This isn't true now, I know but it will be true before the calendars for 1925 are printed.

Ventilation.

The importance of ventilation cannot be over estimated; disease is found to increase very rapidly as ventilation decreases and especially do contagious disease like influenza, measles, whooping cough, etc., become widely spread by the germ laden air of poorly ventilated school rooms.

In any city where investigations are made it is found that contagious diseases rapidly increase with the opening of the public schools in September, and as rapidly decrease when the schools close in June. A part of this is unavoidable and due to the massing together of pupils, but thorough ventilation by removing the germ infested air and by keeping the pupils with a high resisting power tends to reduce the evil to its lowest point.

In Berlin three of our school houses are as well ventilated as possible and except for a few days in fall and spring when the air is cooler inside than outside the school house there is a constant stream of fresh air flowing in and an equal amount of foul air going out. The High school, the Burgess and the Marston are as well supplied with good air as any building anywhere but the Brown and Cole are nothing but foul air boxes in which pupils are smothered for 4 1-2 hours a day. It is a serious problem what to do in these cases and especially in the case of the Brown school. As a matter of fact this school house is not worth the expenditure of the money necessary to make it suitable for its purpose. It will be necessary to raise it up out of the ground, install a new heating plant and provide hot and cold air ducts throughout the building and by the time this is all accomplished the cost will be a considerable sum and the building will then be an old patchwork affair, poorly built and expensive to maintain. It needs careful investigation to determine what is best in this case.

The Tobacco Menace.

CHAPTER 265.

SECTION 5. If any person shall sell cigarettes or tobacco in any other form to a minor, he shall be fined not more than fifty dollars for each offense.

(1895 CH. 7, SECT. 1. If any person other than the minor's parent or guardian shall give or deliver any cigarettes, snuff or tobacco in any of its forms, to any minor under eighteen years of age he shall be fined not more than fifty dollars for each offense.

We have secured twelve convictions under this law the past year and take this opportunity to suggest to all concerned that selling or giving *any form of tobacco* to children under 18 years is a violation of law and no person other than the parent can hand any form of tobacco

to such children without being liable to the penalty imposed by the law.

It is the intention of this department to rigidly enforce this law and we call upon all citizens to assist. We also ask all dealers in any form of tobacco to refrain from selling to minors as designated in the law and warn all others that *giving* is as much a violation as selling.

Principal's Report.

To Supt. Geo. H. Whitcher:

The High School has continued its remarkable growth, until in four years time it has out grown a new building; and while the new additions afford ample room for the present, they will suffice for not longer than two years, if those years give the same per cent of increase in number of scholars as the last two have.

The total enrollment of the school this year has been 282:

Statistics.

The efficiency of a school is determined in part, by the number of pupils it retains year after year, after a strict enforcement of high standard requirements. Along this line I take pride in submitting the following statistics.

The number enrolled three years ago was 176. Of this number 133 or 78 per cent. are still members of the school or have graduated. Of the 43 not now in school only 23 or 13 per cent have left school of their own volition evidently to get work. The other 20 have left for such reasons as sickness, death, change of residence and discipline.

Two years ago the number enrolled was 228. Of these all but 45, or 80 per cent are now in school or have graduated. Of the 45, only 14 left of their own volition. That is, of those enrolled two years ago less than 5-8 of 1 per cent have left because they preferred to work in the mills or elsewhere.

This year to date, from an enrollment of 282, all but 13, or 95 per cent are now in school and only 3 of the 13 left of their own volition.

The interest of the pupil in the work of the school is further shown by the fact, that the average daily attendance for a year, has at no time in the past four years fallen below 95 per cent, and has been as high as 97.91 per cent. This I think to be an exceptionally high average for so long a time.

In the past four years the school has graduated 82. Of this number 15 entered college and 6 have entered Normal Schools or continued studies in other schools. 42 are located here in Berlin and 38 are engaged in the various occupations of the city.

For a school, that does not direct its efforts primarily to fit for college, to send 30 per cent of its graduates to college, is evidence of its good scholarship and of its influence to awaken within the student the realization of the advantages of higher education.

If the efficiency of the school is to be measured by the success of those graduated from it in their chosen occupations, every department of this school deserves praise. The graduates of the Commercial and Mechanic Arts departments are successfully filling important and responsible positions here in the city and elsewhere. The graduates of the Latin department are making good records in colleges, and Normal Schools, and other schools to which they have gone.

Graduates have gone to Dartmouth, Bowdoin, Middlebury, University of Maine, University of Vermont, University of Pennsylvania, New Hampshire State, Phillips Exeter, Plymoth, N. H. Normal and Gorham Me. Normal.

Reputation.

The reputation of the methods used in this school is widely extended. During the past year I have received letters of inquiry, concerning the work done here, from Kansas, Nebraska, Illinois, Indiana, Pennsylvania, New York and all the New England states excepting Rhode Island.

The outside interest shown in the Berlin High School is gratifying to all concerned; but it would be much more gratifying and encouraging, to me at least, if more interest was manifested by the citizens of Berlin.

The number of citizens visiting the High School, since my connection with it, is not one-fourth as many as that of visitors from outside.

This is not as it should be. I am aware that we are busy people in Berlin, but I wish that the schools could be made a part of each life, and time be found for visiting them to ascertain what is being done.

Social Activities.

The social side of the school life still has its problems, with which we are still laboring. The social activities have been somewhat broadened this year, by the organization of a school orchestra of ten pieces.

Our athletics have been confined to base ball and basket ball, and with excellent success, but not more than fifteen men and ten girls engage in these sports. However, we hope to broaden these ac-

tivities by adding field sports, and thus give a larger number of the student body the benefits of athletic contests.

It is also planned this coming year to arrange an interscholastic prize speaking contest with other schools of Coos county.

In General.

The past year's work has been a satisfactory one from the point of accomplishment and advancement.

In September we opened the school with seven new teachers. Progress is always delayed by a change of teachers, and with so many changes it of course took some time to get down to the usual working basis. But the new teachers have now adjusted themselves to all the conditions and methods of the school, and are working in good spirit and with satisfactory results. The Commercial department now has a man at its head, and the wisdom of this is shown by results and discipline. The Mechanic Arts department now requires two teachers.

The school is a good working school; and thanks to your wise plans and advanced methods, is filling its place in the community.

Report of Library Trustees.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

The trustees of the Free Public Library, of the City of Berlin, herewith submit their 18th annual report containing a statement of the financial condition of the library department, with information and suggestions regarding the general work accomplished during the past year, and also a report of the librarian showing accessions and circulation of books and containing incidental items and suggestions of interest.

Generally speaking, the work accomplished at the library during the past year has been up to the standard of previous years and in some respects advance steps have been taken looking toward more efficient and satisfactory results.

At the beginning of the year the board organized with Oliver H. Toothaker as chairman; W. Robinson Brown, treasurer; and Annie C. Hamlin, secretary.

Early in the year Miss Grace E. Turner resigned her position as children's librarian, and Miss Gertrude Weymouth was appointed temporarily and later given a full appointment. Miss Adria A. Hutchinson who was librarian during part of the previous year has continued as such throughout the period covered by this report. These young ladies have aimed to accomplish the best possible results obtainable under the existing conditions.

Early in the year the city council granted an appropriation for the equipment of the children's room in the basement. The work of putting this room in readiness for the use of the children has gone along slowly but will soon be completed. The board has aimed to keep the cost of this work at the lowest possible figure and practically all of the furniture, at least all of the bookcases and tables, has been made by the pupils in the mechanic arts department at the high school. This plan, while delaying somewhat the equipment of the room, has greatly reduced the cost, has given the high school pupils practical and valuable work to do and at the same time has provided the library with furniture reasonably suitable for its needs.

The value of the library to the public schools which we referred

to in our report of last year has again been demonstrated and the co-operation between these two municipal departments has continued as a very valuable factor in the success both of the schools and of the library.

It is impossible for the management of the library to increase its efficiency to the extent that should be done with the appropriation available, as more than two-thirds of the amount appropriated is needed for running expenses; thus leaving only a comparatively small amount for the purchase of new books. We would urgently recommend to the city government any increase in the appropriation to at least \$2,000.00.

A prominent factor in the expense account is that for janitor service and we can offer no better statement along that line than was made in our report of last year which we quote herewith as follows:

"We have repeatedly called the attention of the city council to the expense entailed in the hiring of janitor service and have expressed the opinion that we believe this might be entirely avoided by having some of the firemen at the central fire station do the janitor work at the library building. This change, however, has not been brought about and in consequence we have been obliged to pay out approximately \$200.00 for the care of the building during the past year. For a long time one of the firemen at the central station did the janitor service at the library building and was paid for the same, but when the present library board suggested to the fire department that this work ought to be done without pay we were refused on the ground that a man could not be spared from the central station to do the work, and this in spite of the fact that one of their men had been doing it for two years more or less and was doing it at that time."

We believe that for the best interest of the reading public the library should be kept open more hours than is possible at present, particularly on Saturday and that the reading room should be open for a time at least on Sunday, especially during the winter months.

We append herewith the treasurer's report and that of the librarian.

Back numbers of magazines have been given to the library by Mrs. A. W. Hammond, Mrs. Ina Holt, and Mrs. L. A. Hutchinson. Mrs. Ralph E. Weymouth presented the Children's room with a small bust of Mozart.

Through the kindness of Mrs. A. M. Boudinot and Mrs. George E. Hutchins, during the summer months, the library was supplied with flowers.

The circulation this past year was 27,887. While this is an increase over last year, the circulation is not as large as it should be. This fact can be explained perhaps in several ways. Only 238 books could be purchased this year. We are able to send books to the bindery but once a year, thus leaving a vast number of books out of circulation and these are always the ones most in demand. A patron soon becomes discouraged and fails to come to the Library for material, when nine times out of ten he is told that the book he desires is "out of circulation." Thus, it is becoming almost impossible to carry on the work as it should be with the appropriations we now receive from the city.

The mission of the library is to try to fulfill the wants of all. With this in mind, a few French books were purchased during the year.

These have been greatly appreciated and much in demand. If possible at least fifty more should be added.

Miss Gertrude Weymouth was appointed children's librarian in June, upon the resignation of Miss Turner. Work upon the furnishings for the new children's room in the basement was begun in September, but we regret to report that the room is not ready for occupancy. The shelves, made by the Mechanic Arts department of the High School, are in place and the tables are in process of construction. Because of this delay, satisfactory work with the children has been hindered. However, the demand for books has been just as great, and the seating capacity has been taxed to the utmost. It is with pleasure that we report the number of boys who use the children's reading room far exceeds the number of girls. Often every chair is occupied by boys, reading or playing quiet games.

The "reserve list" has proved a successful venture, two hundred and ten books having been reserved this year.

Work in the reference department is steadily increasing. Many bulletins on various subjects have been issued and proved useful.

Report of Finance Committee.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1911.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Your committee herewith submits its report for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1911.

The most important transaction with which the committee has had to deal during the year was the matter of a bond issue of \$80,000, as authorized by resolution of the City council passed October 13, 1910, as amended by resolution passed November 10, 1910, to be found elsewhere in this volume.

The duties imposed upon the committee by virtue of such resolutions were fully performed, and a detailed report of same under date of January 3, 1911, was furnished said City Council, a copy of which is hereto appended, and made a part of this report, to which attention is called for details.

The books and accounts of all financial departments, including the assessors, tax collectors, city clerk, police court and city treasurer, have been audited by Arthur T. Byrnes, accountant, to whose report attention is directed.

The amount of cash in the city treasurer's hands at the close of the fiscal year was \$15,318.46, as shown by the treasurer's report hereto annexed, and made a part of this report.

Attention is especially called to the following disbursements which were unexpected, and for which no appropriations were made.

The date upon which these \$5,000.00 in bonds became due according to the language of the resolution authorizing the bond issue was December 1st, 1911.

The bonds, according to the terms of the documents themselves, became due a year earlier, or December 1st, 1910, and were presented

for payment, on that date.

It was, therefore, necessary to meet this obligation notwithstanding no appropriation was made to pay it, but of course this payment reduced our debt to that extent.

The construction of the additions to the High school building were found to be necessary some time after the appropriations were made, and this large item of expenditure was, therefore, not provided for by any appropriation.

These additions, however, have been completed, and paid for, and a much needed improvement has been accomplished.

The expense of the small pox epidemic was another item, which, of course, could not be anticipated. This, however, had to be paid with no appropriation to meet the expenditure.

It will be noted that the aggregate of these three items accounts for nearly the whole of the net overdraft as appears by the auditor's reports.

Especial attention is also called to the fact that the City debt has been reduced during the past year to the extent of \$10,675.83.

We herewith submit our recommendations for appropriations to defray the expenses of the several departments for the ensuing year, subject to such changes and modifications as the City Council may see fit to make when the final appropriations are made.

The committee consisting of the city treasurer, and finance committee of the City Council, to whom was delegated the power and discretion of providing for the sale, and fixing the place of payment of, the issue of refunding bonds of said City to the amount of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000.00), authorized by said City Council by resolution passed October 13, 1910, as amended by resolution passed November 10, 1910, having performed the duties assigned to us beg leave to submit the following report:

After the passage of said resolution, and the amendment thereto of November 10, 1910, both resolutions, together with a certified copy of the record showing the passage thereof, were submitted to Messrs. Ropes, Gray and Gorham, attorneys, of Boston, Mass., for a legal opinion as to the validity of said resolutions, and the regularity of the proceedings by which they were passed. We were later informed that a favorable opinion on the subject had been rendered by this firm, and they prepared and submitted to us a draft for the form of the bonds to be issued under, and by virtue of, the authority given by said resolutions.

After the form of bonds was finally adopted, the Old Colony Trust company of Boston, Mass., procured the material and prepared the same for execution by the proper officers of the City.

A meeting of your committee was then called for to be held on the first day of December, 1910, and special notices were sent to a large number of dealers in municipal bonds in Boston, Mass., request-

ing bids for these bonds to be delivered to the City Clerk on or before said December first, 1910, at 12 o'clock noon, the time and place of said meeting.

At said time and place all the members of your committee, excepting Councilman Elliott, absent on account of illness, were present, namely, Daniel J. Daley, chairman; Jules E. Parent, clerk; John T. Moran, and the City Treasurer, R. L. Wilson.

At the hour named the city clerk announced that only two bids had been submitted, and they were opened by the chairman in presence of the members of said committee named, the city clerk and representatives of the firms who had submitted the bids.

The highest bid submitted was \$102.07 by E. H. Rollins, & Sons of Boston. This bid would mean one thousand twenty dollars and seventy cents for each one thousand dollars of bonds, and accrued interest from November 1, 1910, the date of said bonds.

Your committee after considering the subject unanimously voted to accept said bid of E. H. Rollins & Sons, and awarded the bonds to them.

It was further voted by your committee that the place of payment of said bonds, and interest on the same, should be at the Old Colony Trust Company, Court street, Boston, Mass.

After the bonds were prepared for execution and signed by the treasurer and mayor of said City, they were delivered to said E. H. Rollins & Sons and the latter paid over to the Old Colony Trust company the proceeds of the same amounting to eighty-two thousand eighty-six dollars (\$82,086.00) which was placed to the credit of the City of Berlin.

Your committee then arranged with the holders of all the notes described in said resolutions, to forward the same to the Old Colony Trust company, aforesaid, and all of said notes were accordingly forwarded for payment and cancellation on or about the 21st day of December, 1910.

From the proceeds of said bonds said notes, with accrued interest, were fully paid, cancelled, and returned to the City Treasurer.

The aggregate amount of notes so paid, including interest, was eighty-thousand nine hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$80,984.23). Amount of notes \$79,477.71. Amount of interest \$1,506.52.

To this amount should be added one hundred and forty dollars (\$140.00) paid for attorney's opinion as to validity of bonds, and the material for, and preparation of, the bonds, making a total of eighty-one thousand one hundred and twenty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$81,124.23).

The total proceeds of the bonds, namely \$82,086.00, less these disbursements left a balance of nine hundred sixty-one dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$961.77) which has been paid over to the City Treasurer.

For further details of this whole transaction reference is made to the City Treasurer's accounts, and the records of the City Clerk.

We desire to acknowledge with sincere thanks the generous assistance extended to us by the Old Colony Trust company during the progress of our work.
