

Philip Worcester Look

Philip moved to Campton in 1970 following his retirement as Motor Pool Supervisor at the Boston Army Base in Massachusetts. He had worked in Bartlett during 1938-40 as a member of the Civil Conservation Corp and loved the NH Mountains. He came here to help his life-long friend Al Moulton develop and build the Waterville Gateway Condominium Complex. He quickly became committed to and involved in the Campton area. He established Look Enterprises Inc. and was on of the six owners and developers of 6 Flags Trailer Park. He also developed and built Mayhew's Trailer Park, now called Chesley's.

He purchased from Bill Herting in the early 1970's Hertings's Garage on Route 3 and operated it for several years. Seeing a need for affordable land for new home owners, Phil purchase a large tract of land off Route 175 in Thornton and developed "175 Estates" providing building lots for many locals and vacationers.

Upon arriving Phil quickly became involved with the politics and affairs of Campton. He was motivated to help his town develop and thrive. He served as a Campton Selectman for eight years, Representative to the North County Council, the White Mountain Region Association and Director of the Campton Parks & Recreation Association. He was a past President and Director of the original White Mountain Gateway Chamber of Commerce and was very involved in the planning and building of its Information Center. Phil served two terms in the NH House of Representatives District 6 including the towns of Campton, Dorchester, Ellsworth, Rumney, Thornton, Wentworth and Waterville Valley

During the 37 years Phil resided in Campton he tried to help in it's development and progressive growth with pride and tireless effort. He was always guided by his Mother's often repeated advice of "Always leave your campsite better than you found it." He will be greatly missed by his friends, neighbors and family.

TOWN OF CAMPTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN MEETING MINUTES - MARCH 14, 2007

Moderator Charles Grand opened the meeting at 7:35pm. Moderator Grand announced the Boy Scout Troop #58 who led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Pastor Russell Petrie then led us in a prayer. Moderator Grand announced the head table beginning with Hannah Joyce, Town Clerk, Sharon Davis, Selectmen, Ann Marie Foote, Town Administrator, Charles Cheney, Selectmen and Charles Wheeler, Selectmen. Selectmen James McGarr and Selectmen Jon Homer were unable to attend. Moderator Grand read the results from the elections on March 13, 2007.

Selectmen Davis made a motion for Articles 26 and 31 to be moved forward and taken up after Article 10. Selectmen Davis stated that discussion on these articles will include a presentation by Patrick Miller, Chairman of the Campton Building Committee and Dennis Miers and his associate, Steven from the architect firm in Manchester regarding the building plans as proposed by the Campton Building Committee and supported by the Board of Selectmen. Moved. Seconded to move up Articles 26 and 31 after Article 10. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted in the affirmative to move up Articles 26 and 31 after Article 10.

Article 4:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$87,736.00 for the lay-out and construction cost of Kati A. Lane and Millie's Circle roads, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$87,736.00 of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. The Kati A. Lane and Millie's Circle property owners will be liable to repay the above sum to the Town of Campton under RSA 231:29. (Selectmen recommend this article). (2/3 ballot vote required)

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Selectmen Cheney asked to amend the article. Selectmen Cheney read the amendment. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$87,736.00 for the lay-out and construction cost of Kati A. Lane, Millie's Circle and Vivid Lane roads, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$87,736.00 of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. The Kati A. Lane, Millie's Circle and Vivid Lane property owners will be liable to repay the above sum to the Town of Campton under RSA 231:29. (Selectmen recommend this article). (2/3 ballot vote required)

Moved. Seconded. Voted on the amendment. Moved. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative by voice vote to vote by secret ballot using ballot #1 on this

article. Moved on to Article 5 while one hour passes. Moderator Grand read the results for this article after one hour passed. This article passed YES - 140 NO - 41.

Article 5:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,069,891.94 which represents the operating budget to defray Town charges during the ensuing year. This sum does not include amounts set forth in individual or special articles contained in the warrant.

Selectmen Cheney read the breakdown on this article. Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Article 6:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$396,307.00 which represents the operating budget of the Campton Police Department. Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion.

Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Article 7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 which represents Police Details. This figure is offset by revenues received for these services.

Moved. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Article 8:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highway and bridges. (Selectmen recommend the amount of \$619,390.45 which includes \$94,371.11 in Highway Block Grants to offset taxes)

Moved. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Article 9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,000.00 for the maintenance of Blair and other cemeteries in Town and to authorize the withdrawal of \$3,041.52 from the Cemetery Trust Funds for Perpetual Care leaving \$44,958.48 to be raised by taxes.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Article 10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$258,977.39 for the support and maintenance of its Fire and Fast Squad Departments.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Alan Mann asked if this was where we were asking for two more employees for the fire department to raise it to a four man fire department. Selectmen Cheney stated yes. Selectmen Cheney explained that it would be for the last quarter of the year if the ambulance service was voted in. Richard Giehl asked where the money would go if it was not voted in. Selectmen Cheney stated that it would go back in to the general fund to offset taxes. Mike Dunklee asked if we should wait to vote on this until we see if the other article passes. Gerard Rienzo asked if we could make a motion to move up Article 23 before we vote on the other articles. Moderator Grand asked for a motion to table this article. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards to table this article.

Article 26:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the creation of architectural and engineering design drawings for a new Town Office Building and expansions of the Fire and Police Buildings, all to be proposed as a single building master plan. Said sum includes the expense of a professional construction cost estimator. This amount to be taken from the unexpended Town's General Fund Balance as of 12/31/06 (surplus).

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 31:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 to be placed in Capital Reserve Account known as the Municipal Building Evaluation Fund. This amount to be taken from the unexpended Town's General Fund Balance as of 12/31/06 (surplus). (Selectmen recommend this article)

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Marsh Morgan asked about the name of this account and if it could be used for construction or just the evaluation. Ann Marie Foote stated that next year they could ask the voters to apply that money towards the project. Selectmen Davis stated that they will have a proposal to change the name of the fund. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,051.55 for the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association for fire dispatch and dues.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for fighting forest fires.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 13:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,675.50 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, Inc.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$47,291.37 to reimburse the Town of Plymouth for ambulance service.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 15:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,940.15 for Advertising & Regional Expenses.

Moved. Seconded. Discussion. Selectmen Wheeler read the breakdown on this article. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 16:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for an AcuVote-Optical Scan System voting machine.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 17:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for a laptop computer with remote access by internet.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 18:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for a new police cruiser.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 19:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for a printer to be used with the GIS mapping system.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 20:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for a Decatur Radar Trailer. It is anticipated that the Town will recover up to 50% of this expenditure from the NH Highway Safety Agency.

Moved. Seconded. (The Moderator had to do actual count by hand as it was to close to tell by a show of cards and also to close to tell by having the voters stand. Selectmen Wheeler counted one side of the room, while the Moderator counted the other side of the room.) The final vote was YES - 122 NO - 73. This article passed.

Article 21:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$118,759.00 payable over a 4 year period for a 6 Ton International Truck with Wing, Plow and Sander for the Campton Highway Department and to raise and appropriate \$31,804.77 for the first year's payment. Lease contains a non-appropriation clause. Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article

passed.

Moderator Grand stated that it had been an hour and stated that this was the last chance to cast a vote for Article 4. A brief recess was taken while the Moderator opened the ballot boxes so the Supervisors could count the cast ballots. Moved on to Article 22 while the ballots were being counted.

Article 22:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$63,000.00 payable over a 4 year period for a Ford F550 truck for the Campton Highway Department and to raise and appropriate \$16,871.99 for the first year's payment. Lease contains a non-appropriation clause.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 23:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$139,000.00 payable over a 5 year period for a 2007 Horton Ambulance for the Campton Thornton Fire Department and to raise and appropriate \$19,236.00 for the first year's payment which represents Campton's share of the budget (60%). The Town of Thornton pays the remaining 40%. Lease contains a non-appropriation clause.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Lu Stivali asked about the \$47,291.37 from the previous article. Selectmen Cheney stated that the \$47,291.37 is for this year's service. Gerard Rienzo asked about the 60/40 split between the two towns and if it was written in cement for the

next five years. Selectmen Cheney stated that it is for now and this article has a non-appropriation clause. Mr. Rienzo asked if the 60/40 split with Thornton would change along with the growth. Selectmen Cheney stated that if there was a significant increase in the population or assessed value in Thornton, they would renegotiate that with Thornton so it could change. Richard Giehl, Fire Commissioner, stated that the inter-municipal agreement will be up this year. Ann Marie Foote stated that the 60/40 split is based on what the current intergovernmental agreement is between the two towns for equipment. Ann Marie also stated that for the operating budget it is split 58/38/4. The 60/40 is strictly on the lease. Lester Mitchell made a motion to indefinitely postpone this article. Seconded. Moderator Grand explained that this would mean no more discussion and we would just vote on the article. Lester Mitchell asked that we vote by ballot. Moderator Grand stated that we will be voting by ballot on indefinitely postponing this article. Moderator Grand explained that it will require 2/3 vote by ballot to indefinitely postpone. The voters asked for an explanation. Moderator Grand explained that we will take a brief pause and vote by secret ballot to table this article. If voted yes, it will be tabled indefinitely, if voted no, discussion will continue. Used ballot #2 to vote on this. Moderator Grand announced that the results to table this article indefinitely were 56 Yes, 123 No. Motion to table fails. Moderator Grand re-read the article. Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Selectmen Davis asked that Chief Tobine come to the microphone to explain the program. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards to end debate. Voted on the article in the affirmative by a show of cards. This article passed.

Selectmen Davis made a motion that Article 10 be taken off the table. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards to take Article 10 off of the table.

Article 10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$258,977.39 for the support and maintenance of its Fire and Fast Squad Departments.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 24:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into a three year lease for a total amount of \$34,130.00 for a William Scottsman Modular unit for a temporary building for the Town Offices to have additional space for meetings, private offices, and file cabinets and to raise and appropriate \$13,000.00 for the first year's set up and payment. Lease contains a non-appropriation clause.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Selectmen Sharon Davis stated that this is to pose as an alternative solution while we work on a new building plan. Selectmen Davis stated that we are out of room at the town office building. In addition, she stated that we have a mold and mildew situation and we are in violation of state laws regarding privacy and welfare. Selectmen Davis stated that this would be parked behind the town office building and is only a temporary solution and a three year lease to get us through. Dennis Prescott asked if we would own it at the end of the lease. Selectmen Davis stated no. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 25:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 from the Town's unexpended General Fund Balance as of 12/31/2006 (surplus) to be added to the amount approved at last year's Town Meeting for the Town Garage (\$190,000.00). This money will be placed in the Capital Reserve Account designated for the Town Garage.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 27:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of heavy highway equipment. (Selectmen recommend this article)

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 28:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established for Bridge Construction and/or Reconstruction. (Selectmen recommend this article)

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Patricia Barker asked if some of this money could go toward the roof on Blair Bridge. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 29:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of future Road Construction or Reconstruction. (Selectmen recommend this article) Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 30:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,050.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of restoration and proper storage of vital Town Records. (Selectmen recommend this article)

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 32:

To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under RSA 35:1 to be known as the Campton Historical Building Fund, for the purpose of the upkeep and maintenance of the building. Further, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in this fund, and to name the Selectmen as the agents to expend such fund. (Majority vote required)

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 33:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a 7 year lease-purchase agreement in the amount of \$315,000.00 for the purchase of a 2007 Pumper-Tanker fire Engine, and to raise and appropriate the amount of Zero Dollars to fund a 2007 payment. If approved, at future Town Meetings, the payment for each year of the agreement will be (\$31,629.97) which represents 60% of the purchase amount. The Town of Thornton pays the remaining 40%. This lease agreement shall contain a non-appropriation clause.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 34:

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 41:14-a, so that the Selectmen shall have the authority to acquire or sell land, buildings, or both; provided, however, they shall first submit any such proposed acquisition or sale to the Planning Board and to the Conservation Commission for review and recommendation by those bodies. After the Selectmen receive the recommendation of the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission. the Selectmen shall hold 2 public hearings at least 10 days but not more than 14 days apart on the proposed acquisition or sale; provided, however, upon written petition of 50 registered voters presented to the Selectmen, prior to the Selectmen's vote, the proposed acquisition or sale shall be inserted as an article in the warrant for the Town Meeting. The Selectmen's vote shall take place no sooner then 7 days nor later than 14 days after the second public hearings which is held. This article shall not apply to the sale of and the Selectmen shall have no authority to sell: (a) town-owned conservation land which is managed and controlled by the Conservation Commission under the provisions of RSA 36-A; (b) any part of a Town Forest established under RSA 31:110 and managed under RSA 31:112; or (c) any real estate that has been given, devised, or bequeathed to the Town for charitable or community purposes. This vote will remain indefinitely until rescinded by future Town vote.

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 35:

To see if the Town will vote to modify Article 31 as approved at the 2005 Town Meeting. This is in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, 111, and as authorized under the provisions of RSA 79-A:25, 11. The purpose of this petition would be to give the Campton Conservation Commission 25% of the land use penalties monies (LUCT) (they currently receive 50%), and to place the balance in the General Fund to offset taxes. (By Petition)

Moderator Grand explained that this will be by secret ballot as a petition by 5 registered voters was presented. Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand explained that if you vote yes it will cut it to the 25%, and if you vote no it will remain at 50%. Used secret ballot # 3. Moderator Grand announced the results. Yes – 69 No – 86. This article did not pass.

Article 36:

To see if the Town will vote to completely discontinue a section of Cox Road as authorized under 231:43. As noted in RSA 231:43. Written notice has been given to all owners of property abutting the highway. This section of road starts by Oak Lane and continues up to the berm in the road before the Browne property on one side, and the Collet property on the other.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. Selectmen Sharon Davis made a motion to indefinitely postpone this article as there are legal issues surrounding the article. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative by a show of cards to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 37:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept, in accordance with RSA 229:1, a paved road known as Weston Woods Circle, with a length of approximately 1200 feet beginning on Route 175 and ending on Route 175. Weston Woods Circle as depicted on a plan entitled Subdivision Survey Plot for Luther Haartz, South Route 175, Campton, NH. Approved by the Planning Board, October 11, 2005, recorded with Grafton County Registry of Deeds as Plan Number 12032. This road presently has nine (9) houses. Subject to final approval of the Selectmen and Road Agent. (By Petition)

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 38:

To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Campton. These actions include: 1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting U.S. economy. 2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment. In addition, the

Town of Campton encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declare candidates for those offices. (By Petition)

Moved. Seconded. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 39:

To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of agents and officers hereto chosen.

Moved. Seconded. Moderator Grand asked for any discussion. No discussion. Voted by a show of cards in the affirmative. This article passed.

Article 40:

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Selectmen Sharon Davis asked to read a statement that would also be read at the Thornton Town Meeting. Selectmen Davis stated that over the last nine months, the Thornton and Campton Selectboards have been in discussion with Neighborfest about the use and disposition of the Neighborfest property located in Thornton. All have agreed that the sale of the property is a positive move for all partied involved. They would like to obtain additional input from townspeople of Thornton and Campton and would like to plan a joint community focus group. Anyone interested can contact Chris Bolan at the Waterville Valley Region Chamber of Commerce.

Selectmen Davis then stated that Lisa Ash is working on a grant for the Town and Campton Elementary School, sponsored by the NH Dept. of Education and the federal government. These competitive grants are awarded for expanded academic enrichment opportunities for children. Some of the programs that may be provided are youth development activities, drug and violence prevention, technology education, art, music and recreation. The program would be after school and in the summer which are considered high risk times for our youth. If anyone is interested please contact Lisa Ash.

Selectmen Davis wanted to let the voters know that the Board of Selectmen voted to reinstitute the park and recreation committee that was put in to place back in the 1980's and are trying to revitalize that so if anyone would be interested in serving on this commission please let Ann Marie Foote know.

Lester Mitchell stated that long ago two young boys passed away at a young age and a bronze plaque was made and had been misplaced and forgotten about. They found the plaque and with the help of Mr. Keeney it was reattached to the flag pole out

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in front of the school. Lester stated that a ceremony took place for that in front of the school this year. Lester stated that he, Kevin Hamilton, and the school board decided to make a memorial for young children that have died at a young age and were in grades K-8 who attended the Campton Elementary School. Lester also stated that they searched the local records, and will be looking at the state library for more information and plan on having this done by late fall. Lester Mitchell said that the location out front will need to be modified some. Lastly, Lester stated that there were 4 memorial trees in Campton Village but that there is only one left today up by the bridge.

Moved to adjourn. Seconded. Resolved at 10:37pm.

TOWN CLERK & TAX COLLECTOR'S 2007 REPORT

It is with pleasure and appreciation to Campton citizens that I summarize the 2007 developments in your Town Clerk & Tax Collector's Office.

This year, exclusive of property tax revenues there was a \$16,917.59 combined increase in automobile and dog registration revenues. The Town Clerk's Office issued 781 dog licenses, an increase of 59, and registered 4,940 vehicles.

Our office sent out reminder notices for property tax accounts that reflect an outstanding balance, hoping to avoid properties going to lien this spring. The Tax Collector's Office will be deeding, sometime in the fall, any properties with uncollected taxes dating back to 2005.

Questions regarding your property taxes can be answered in person at our office or by calling (603)726-3223 ext. 102 or 103.

Renewal of your vehicle registration by mail was begun in 2003 and seems to be appreciated by residents. Information regarding this process as well as comments and suggestions to make our office increasingly user friendly are encouraged and welcome. The office of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector answered 3490 phone calls and processed 5609 pieces of mail in our office in addition to the normal foot traffic that comes in on a daily basis.

Beginning in January of 2008, the Office of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector will be offering an additional service allowing people to obtain OHRV and Hunting and Fishing licenses. This will be on a trial basis and will hopefully prove to be a successful addition that can continue to be offered while also increasing revenue that will benefit the Campton taxpayer.

Dog owners, please remember that dogs must be registered by May 31st to avoid any additional penalties and costs. You may register your dog(s) by mail, as long as, our office has a record of their current rabies information. The fees are as follows: Non-Spayed/Neutered Dogs - \$9.00, Spayed/Neutered - \$6.50 and owners over 65 receive one dog at \$2.00 and any additional are at regular price.

If you are a parent or guardian in need of obtaining your child's birth certificate, we are able to provide that to you here in our office. The fee for the first certified copy is \$12.00 and \$8.00 thereafter for more than one at the same time. This is a great help to those who will be entering the school system. In addition, we provide marriage licenses and can also provide certified death certificates. Please call our office first to make sure that the date of the event is a year that we can produce for you.

Thanks to the continued support of Campton voters, Brown's River Bindery has once again provided you with several restored town record books. Our office thanks you for your dedication in helping us to preserve some of Campton's history. On behalf of the Campton residents, I applied for and received a \$10,000.00 grant from the State of New Hampshire Vital Records Preservation Grant. The grant covered two dehumidifiers for the vault, removal of moldy carpet from the vault, sealing the concrete vault floor, a fire extinguisher, additional metal shelving for the vital records in the vault plus the major portion of the grant went towards restoring various vital records.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Campton Elementary School in said Campton on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 2008 from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m. to act on Article 1. The Business Meeting will reconvene at the Campton Elementary School on Wednesday, the 12th day of March, 2008 at 7:30 p.m. to consider the other warrant articles.

- Art. 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year: Selectman for Three Years, Town Clerk /Tax Collector for Three Years, Treasurer for Three Years, Superintendent & Sexton of Cemeteries for One Year, Supervisor of the Checklist for Six Years, Library Trustee for Three Years, Library Trustee for One Year, Trustee of the Trust Funds for Three Years, Town Moderator for Two Years.
- The following articles will be taken up during the Business Meeting beginning at 7:30 p.m. on the 12th of March, 2008 at the Campton Elementary School.
- Art. 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,183,428.66 which represents the operating budget to defray Town charges during the ensuing year. This sum does not include amounts set forth in individual or special articles contained in the warrant.
- Art. 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$412,394.65 which represents the operating budget of the Police Department.
- Art. 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 which represents Police Details. This figure is offset by revenues received for these services.
- Art. 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000.00 for a new police cruiser.

CAMPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 2007

The commission's mission statement (adopted in 2001): The Campton Conservation Commission (CCC) believes the community is sustained by its natural landscapes, clean water, forest and agricultural products, and varied habitats for plants and animals. The CCC sees its mission as working to preserve, protect, and properly utilize these resources for current and future residents of the town.

The commission remains at 5 commissioners. Jim Blake, who had served for several years, left the commission when he moved from town. His common sense approach was very much appreciated by the commission. Lisa Doner began attending meetings and joined the commission mid-year. She is presently a research assistant professor at the Center for the Environment at PSU and adds a lot of knowledge of the natural world to the commission. She has already proven to be invaluable in using her research and writing skills on various projects. Those interested in consideration for appointment should contact a commission member, the Selectmen or attend a meeting. The CCC has room for 7 commissioners and welcomes public involvement. The commission meets at the town office at 7:30 PM, the second Wednesday of each month.

The Campton Conservation Fund is a trust held by the town for the purpose of conservation projects or acquisitions. When Land Use Change Tax monies are collected, 50% of the tax is deposited into the fund. In 2007, the fund grew by \$65,935 deposits and \$8,135 interest. The power of the fund comes as important lands benefiting the community are permanently protected through purchases or conservation easements. Property owners interested in considering conservation of their property can contact the commission for support, advice or for referrals to other conservation professionals to guide families with estate planning. This year, expenditures totaling \$1,144 were made from this fund for professional consulting fees while working to protect lands over the town's important aquifer (more about this project below) for a total balance at the end of the year of \$231,892.

Blair Woodland Natural Area, acquired and protected through actions of the CC in 2002, had many visitors this year, as evidenced by many comments in the kiosk visitors' notebook. This shows entries by appreciative local residents making frequent ours of the site as well as non-local visitors to the area. The kiosk received a plexiglass covering to protect displayed materials. Commissioners Melissa Greenawalt-Yelle and Jessica Halm offered nature walks in various seasons and 16 PSU students were brought as part of an environmental class studying water quality with commissioner Lisa Doner. Also, Melissa Greenawalt-Yelle conducted nature walks in conjunction with the Campton Historical Society's open house at Blair Chapel. The trails are open year round, however winter use of the parking lot is problematic because of its upward slope towards Rt. 3 and poor visibility from show banks. Because of this, winter parking is available around the corner at the Country Cow Restaurant or the Blair Covered Bridge. New trail signs will be installed in spring 2008, through a generous donation of materials by Leah Gray.

This year the CCC's biggest focus was a land conservation effort to protect17 acres over Campton's valuable aquifer. The Campton Village Precinct (CVP)

and CCC established a collaborative relationship, shared expenses to engage a conservation consultant, and applied for LCHIP grant funding in an attempt to purchase a conservation easement. The conservation effort itself was unsuccessful, but the process was beneficial on many levels. The Commission gained greater knowledge of our area's aquifer and its importance to the majority of residents in town (including the school), established a good working relationship with the CVP, and learned much about grant application processes. These gains will benefit new conservation efforts in future years.

Commissioners continued outreach and collaboration with other groups in the community including the Planning Board, the Campton Historical Society, the Pemigewasset River Local Advisory Committee, The North Country Council, Conservation Commissions and protection groups from other towns, and Rumney Ecological Systems (Quincy Bog) acting as a local land trust. Commissioners attended workshops and seminars on various topics. CCC outreach efforts this year included GIS maps and conservation displays at town meeting, collaborative efforts with university students working on summer projects at Hubbard Brook Experimental Forest, formulation of a list of conservation resources and the bulletin boards at the Town Office.

The commission reviewed Wetland and Forestry applications, making advisory comments to the state bureaus and occasionally making assessments after site visits. Residents are reminded that a permit is needed when planning work such as driveways or logging operations over or near wetlands or surface waters. NHDES applications for wetland permits can be obtained from the Town Clerk's office. Changes to the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act (CSPA) will begin in April, 08. Since Campton's rivers are now included in these measures, we anticipate that the CCC will work with the community to help increase understanding of and compliance with the new regulations. The CCC views the changes to the CSPA as a positive action that helps preserve quality of the drinking water supply for Campton residents, helps reduce risk of annual flooding, and preserves the local riparian and lake environments for wildlife as well as human visitors.

The CCC encourages local efforts in the community for increasing sustainability and protection of our valuable local resources. These actions benefit the local area as well as global efforts to reduce carbon emissions. Campton is fortunate in having large tracts of land which, in their undeveloped state, contribute to overall protection of air and water quality and are important lands for recreation, timber and wildlife habitat. Along our town boundaries, conservation efforts have begun to preserve similar tracks of forested lands. Within Campton, a group that includes local landowners, the Squam Lakes Conservation Society, The Nature Conservancy and Trust for Public Lands, are acting together on adjoining land conservation projects. This effort could eventually result in Campton owning and managing its own town forest.

CAMPTON POLICE DEPARTMENT YEAR END REPORT - 2007

To the citizens of Campton, Board of Selectmen and other interested persons, I respectfully submit the police department's year-end report for 2007.

This is the ninth such report that I have submitted as your Police Chief and on behalf of our staff, we remain pleased to have your continued support. Our staff remains the same in number, but with some personnel changes. During 2007, Cpl. McComiskey returned to Ashland PD after a short time in Campton. Rich Butterfield left law enforcement for a position with Homeland Security. We wish them both the best. We did welcome Michelle Toepel and Dan Gilman. Michelle is the Town's first full-time female police officer and received much praise from the training staff at the Police Academy for her hard work and professionalism. Michelle graduated from the twelve-week Police Academy in November. Our most recent full-time hire, Dan was promoted from a part-time position when Cpl. McComiskey left, and will attend the Academy just after Town Meeting. Dan, a Campton-Thornton call firefighter, is also a National Guard soldier who recently completed a tour in Iraq. We all appreciate his dedication and patriotism. In their spare time, Dan and his fiancée, Alison, will be married in May.

As I wrote last year, the Department continues to work with the Board of Selectmen and Building Committee to assess the current space needs of the agency, as well as for the future. I would like to thank all involved. I strongly believe that we have outgrown the current police facility and so I am hopeful that you all support the Committee's recommendations for "smart growth".

In 2007, the Campton PD responded to and subsequently investigated 72 felony-level offenses. These offenses included numerous sex crimes, burglaries, weapons offenses, and aggravated assaults. Reviews of these offenses indicate that the average amount of time spent on investigating felonies is 12 hours, for a total of 864 hours. During the same period, the department responded to 385 misdemeanor offenses. These offenses include thefts, assaults, DUIs, stalking, vandalism, drug offenses, resisting arrest, and others. The average amount of investigatory time for a misdemeanor is 2.5 hours for a total of 962.5 hours. There were a total of 1,682 calls for service and 65 vehicle collisions during the year.

In conclusion, it goes without saying that your police department has been very active in providing for a safe and secure place to live, work and play. CAMPTON-THORNTON FIRE/RESCUE CHIEF'S REPORT FOR 2007

The department responded to 649 calls. This has been a very busy year for the firefighters and EMT's. We responded to 216 fire calls, 311 medical aids, 85 motor vehicle collisions and 37 service calls.

The sub-station on the south end of Campton is occupied. There were two structure fires in this area of town this past year. Having an engine here has proven to be a beneficial asset. The response time is much quicker. This station is not manned by full-time staff; the call firefighters respond for equipment here.

As you are aware, the Fire Department has acquired an ambulance and started transporting to Speare Memorial Hospital. The transition has gone smoothly. The EMT's have done a very good job with staffing. We are staffed and licensed by the state from BLS to ALS level which means from EMT Basic to EMT Paramedic Level.

The grant money for Personal Protection Equipment of \$61,275, was spent on turnout gear and SCBA masks for the firefighters. We have applied for grant money in 2007 for equipment. We have not been selected yet, however, we are still in the process of review.

The Explorer Program would like to invite boys & girls between the ages of 15 & 18 to come and join the Post. The Explorer program gives young people a chance to see what it is like to be a Firefighter or EMT and to see if they are interested in becoming one, whether it be as a career or as a call person to help in the community.

The department needs new members that can make a commitment to service their community. If we are to continue to be a call company, then you as citizens of the community need to volunteer your services and help your neighbors.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

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Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 
Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. CAMPTON GARDEN CLUB (BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE) 2007

Continuing with our mission to beautify the Town of Campton through municipal landscaping projects, the Campton Garden Club is proud to say that after three years of volunteer work—planning, fundraising, and finally, implementation, the last phase of the Campton Dam/Bridge Area Beautification Project is complete:

• Installation of the Bridge garden at the junction of Rte. 175 and Rte. 49 involved complete soil removal and replacement (approximately 40 yards each of loam and compost), installation of the "Welcome to Campton Village" sign/lighting, and approximately 125 plants, shrubs, and trees. Below the Bridge on both sides, the installation of 11 evergreen yews w/ their associated loam/compost.

 On Pond Road---crushed stone, loam installation, and in collaboration w/ the Campton Historical Society, the placement of an historical marker. Clumps of

daylilies will be added this spring.

Club members initially spent 20 hours! a week watering the new Bridge garden, containing over \$3,000 in plantings. We continue to maintain all of the various flowerboxes, tubs, and planters located around town at the Bridge, post office, chamber, exit 28 and watering trough. In the future, the Club is looking for assistance from donors to install an automatic soaker hose system at the Bridge to ease some of the maintenance and keep the garden looking beautiful.

Our next project? There has been a great deal of interest expressed to the Club regarding the restoration of the watering trough at the intersection of Route 175N and Mad River Road. The trough will be 100 years old in 2008, so what better time to do it?! To accomplish this goal, we will be collaborating with the Campton Historical Society. It is anticipated that a fair amount of engineering, masonry work, etc. will be required. Any interested citizens or donors please contact us.

The completion of the Bridge project demonstrates what an impact beautification measures can make in a community. The public response from the greater Campton area has been incredible, and the pride and sense of ownership expressed by our local citizenry has been gratifying to witness. Volunteers, comprised of individuals and local businesses, can affect positive changes in our shared community. GRAFTON COUNTY SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT 2007

Grafton County,

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Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. is a private nonprofit organization that provides programs and services to support the health and well being of our older citizens. The Council's programs enable elderly individuals to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible.

The Council operates eight senior centers in Plymouth, Littleton, Canaan, Lebanon, Bristol, Orford, Haverhill and Lincoln, and sponsors the Grafton County ServiceLink Resource Center and the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program and Volunteer Center (RSVP). Through the centers, ServiceLink and RSVP, older adults and their families take part in a range of community-based long-term services including home delivered meals, congregate dining programs, transportation, adult day care, chore/home repair services, recreational and educational programs, and volunteer opportunities.

During 2007, 181 older residents of Campton were served by one or more of the Council's programs offered through the Plymouth Regional Senior Center:

- Older adults from Campton enjoyed 3,956 balanced meals in the company of friends in the Plymouth center's dining room.
- They received 4,245 hot, nourishing meals delivered to their homes by caring volunteers.
- Campton residents were transported to health care providers or other community resources on 2,029 occasions by our lift-equipped buses.
- They received assistance with problems, crises or issues of long-term care through 285 visits with a trained social worker.
- Campton's citizens also volunteered to put their talents and skills to work for a better community through 2,953 hours of volunteer service.

The cost to provide Council services for Campton residents in 2007 was \$79,785.74.

Such services can be critical to elderly individuals who want to remain in their own homes and out of institutional care in spite of chronic health problems and increasing physical frailty, saving tax dollars that would otherwise be expended for nursing home care. They also contribute to a higher quality of life for our older friends and neighbors. As our population grows older, supportive services such as those offered by the Council become even more critical.

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council very much appreciates Campton's support for our programs that enhance the independence and dignity of older citizens and enable them to meet the challenges of aging in the security and comfort of their own communities and homes.

UNH COOPERATIVE EXTENSION GRAFTON COUNTY OFFICE 2007 REPORT

University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension, Grafton County, has been serving the people of our county in the following ways:

The Nutrition Connections program, coordinated by Robin Peters, reached over 100 families in their adult programs and 200 children in their youth programs. The children were from various Head Start programs; local elementary schools; Whole Village Family Resource Center's Child Care Center; the 21st Center, After School Program, North Country Academy Charter School and the Circle Program's summer camp.

The Family and Consumer Resources program Educator. Deb Maes, has worked with a new collaboration in Plymouth that allowed limited resource families to participate in a five-week Making Money Work for You program. In addition, over 400 food service workers participated in either a two-day food safety class or an intensive one day class as part of the Family and Consumer Resources program. Of those attending, over 83% scored 75% or higher on the National Restaurant Association's exam and were certified for five years based on their food safety knowledge. Deb also taught participants in the Grafton County Academy Program nutrition and food budgeting tips, money management, parent education and people-skills as part of their education prior to graduating from the program

Nutrient management in the production of forages, vegetables and fruits continues to be a major focus of the Agnicultural Resources program. Nutrient Management Plans on more than 4000 acres of com and forages were reviewed and updated by Tom Buob. Extension Educator. Through the use of the UNHCE Soil Testing Program farmers were encouraged to maximize the utilization of their on-farm resources to minimize costs and improve profits. Forty producers submitted 160 samples in this process.

Agricultural Resources programs continued to expand efforts with vegetable farmers to incorporate more environmentally sound management practices into their overall management schemes, including: drip irrigation, individual row fortigation, and the introduction of disease resistant varieties to reduce pesticide use. The use of floating row covers was promoted and demonstrated to reduce the use of insecticides and encourage earlier production of various vegetable crops. The vegetable produce from the demonstration plots (several tons of tomatoes, squash, cucumhers, etc) was donated to various Senior Centers in the Upper Valley.

The 4-H Youth Development program has over 300 members and 110 leaders supporting 23 traditional clubs. Volunteers in the 4-H program provided over 4,000 hours of service in 2006-2007 to support the educational objectives of the program. A 4-H Afterschool group was formed in Littleton. In addition, Kathy Jablonski, 4-H Youth Development Educator, has provided assistance to four community's and their after school programs. One program in Littleton, Project REACH, received a JC Penney 4-H Aftershool Grant. Consultation for grants has been done with several other programs. Statewide training in positive youth development theory has been presented at Plustime, 21th Century and Extension sponsored conferences.

This year the Master Gardener and the 4-H horticulture programs have been supported by a program associate. The approximately 25 MG's have given hundreds of hours of support to the Grafton County communities. Their showpiece project, the perennial gardens at the county complex, has been coordinating with the County Commissioners. In addition, Dana Karuza Tulp, Volunteer Management Coordinator, coordinated the 4-H summer gardening program for 60 youth and their leaders. A series of 10 workshops, open to 4-Hers and the general public, were held on a variety of horticultural topics throughout the spring and summer months.

Michal Lunak, Extension Darry Specialist, has also been working with local dairy producers on herd management, farm transfer planning, and quality milk production. He also facilitated with a series of biosecurity workshops that were co-sponsored by UNH Cooperative Extension and the New Hampshire State Veterinarian. In all, 77 agricultural professionals and 72 producers, youth, and general public participated.

Northam Parr, Forestry Resources Educator, spent considerable time assessing the damage from the spring storms and connecting wood lot owners with the correct agencies and providers. The Tree Farm program continues to be supported, including the New Hampshire Tree Farm Field Day. In addition, Northam has worked on sustainable forestry plans with landowners and has facilitated with certified logging professional workshops.

Northam Parr and Michal Lunak serve on the county farm committee to help to develop a sustainability plan for the county farmlands, woodlands, and darry herd. Deb Maes, Nory Parr and Robin Peters have assisted the communities of Landaff, Rumney and Canaan in their Community Profile work and follow up activities.

UNHCE continues to provide New Hampshire's citizens with research based education, information and technical assistance, enhancing their abilities to make informed decisions strengthening youth, families and communities while sustaining natural resources and improving the economy. Funded through the federal, state and county government and competitive grants, educational programs are designed to respond to the local needs of citizens through direction and support of the elected volunteer Extension Advisory Council.

The Chamber's 36th year representing the businesses of our region has been a successful one. I am proud to report that we have continued our positive track record as a representative and advocate of the local businesses and a first stop for the tourists.

We have continued to encourage our members to participate in Getaway Packaging, a collaboration of the various business sectors to provide appealing vacation packages year round. Visitors of the region were able to access information on these packaging deals through the official state tourism website and through our own website.

The 3rd year of White Mountain Holiday Magic and Light Park has given the region some statewide press in the newspapers, radio and television. PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT 2007 ANNUAL REPORT

The Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District met five (5) times during 2007. This past year District programs provided residents access for proper disposal of their household hazardous wastes (HHW), paint, fluorescent light bulbs, antifreeze and rechargeable batteries

The District held two (2) one-day collections – in Lisbon (May) and in Plymouth (September). 181 participants (vehicles) took part serving an estimated 434 residents. This estimate is based on the number of vehicles coming to the collection site and multiplying that figure by 2.4 – the average number of people per household (see tables 1 & 2).* This year's participation decline can be attributed to at least two factors; (1) the District held only 2 collections instead of 3 as in past years, and (2) moving the collection usually held in Littleton to Lisbon. It should be noted that even though participation numbers were down over 50% from 2006, volume totals for this year were down only 24%. Member communities also brought waste that had been dropped off at their individual transfer stations. There is no effective means to record an accurate number of residents that are being served in this capacity so it should be understood that the participation numbers reported are conservative. In reality, the District's program is serving a greater percentage of the District population than is being reported.

The total cost for disposal for the one-day collection program was \$22,500. The cost per capita was down considerably from last year and this can simply be attributed to the decrease of \$8,000 in program costs. The rise in average cost per vehicle and average cost per "participant" figures can be attributed to the sharp decrease in participation numbers paired with modest decrease in program costs. The District received over \$8,900 in grant funds from the State of NH's HHW grant program to help offset this year's collection costs.

As noted earlier the estimated 34,528 pounds of waste collected was down approximately 24% from 2006. However, the 2007 figure is higher than the 2003, 2004, and 2005 numbers, when three collections were held (only two in 2007). The pounds/participant and pounds/vehicle numbers were the highest seen by the District in recent years. This is consistent with what was seen at the events as a number of participants brought large quantities of waste to the sites with some participants making multiple drop-offs. Even with the fluctuations in participation, volumes of waste collected, etc. it should be noted that the cost per pound of waste collected declined slightly from 2006 and has remained relatively stable over the past six (6) years.

In 2008 the District plans to hold two (2) collections, one in the Lisbon/Littleton area on September 13th and the second in Plymouth on September 27th.

Accompanying the one-day HHW collection program were the individual municipal transfer station collections for paint and fluorescent lights. Over 640 gallons of paint and 34,000 feet of fluorescent light bulbs were collected through these programs. These ongoing collections not only provide less expensive recycling options for wastes typically collected at HHW collections, but they also allow residents greater access to disposal opportunities, in turn minimizing the potential for improper disposal.

The District supported a legislative proposal, HB 503, which would levy a \$.01 fee/tax on beverage containers at the wholesale level (Milk, wine and liquor bottles would be exempt). This proposal would raise approximately 10 million dollars annually for recycling and HHW programs. It is estimated that \$800,000 dollars would be set aside for HHW grants annually, four times the current amount allocated to the State's HHW grant program.

In 2008, the District will continue to promote its cooperative approach to solid waste management and recycling and continue its HHW and universal waste collection programs. By working together, District members can minimize disposal, transportation and recycling costs and help ease the strain on municipal budgets. Citizens interested in participating in the development of the District's programs are welcome to attend the District meetings. Information regarding the place and time of the meetings is available at all municipal offices.

Report to the People of District One By Ray Burton, Councilor District One

It is a pleasure to serve this large northern district of 98 towns, 4 cities, and 5 counties with a population of 247,000 people. The Executive Council is at the top of your Executive Branch of NH State Government. The Governor and Executive Council appoint 352 Commissions and Directors who administer NH law and budget as prescribed by the NH House and Senate.

2008 is the year to keep an eye on and follow the progress of the NH Transportation Plan. The recommended projects in the highway and bridge plan can be accomplished with existing revenue from the state gasoline tax, bonds and matching federal funds. The Executive Council held public hearings on the projects throughout the state and forwarded their recommendations to Governor Lynch. Governor Lynch will review our recommendations and then submit his recommended plan to the NH House and Senate by January 15th, 2008. Without any new revenues for additional projects we will be lucky to maintain the existing state highway and bridge system. If more work is desired than new revenues will have to be voted by the Members of the House and Senate and signed by the Governor. Contact your local legislators-House and Senate. This large northern district needs more people on state mandated volunteer boards and commissions. CAMPTON CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

In its second year, the Campton CIP Committee built upon its initial effort to plan for the town's foreseeable purchases of \$10,000 or more over the next ten years. We received the department heads' requirements of what vehicles they need to do their jobs properly, then devised a financial plan to enable the town to meet these requirements with level funding, and level tax impact, over the period of the plan.

With Road Agent Butch Bain's expert help, we were able to create a priority system for repaving the town's roads. This method uses RA Bain's assessment of a road's current condition, then prioritizes future paving work based on both the road's condition and on the number of dwellings that the road serves. Available funding then determines how far down the priority list the town's annual contracted re-paving effort will go. The Selectmen are supporting our town's efforts to improve road conditions with increased funding.

We will start next season's CIP process again this summer by participating with the Selectmen and department heads in validating the information we need to plan, to include buildings and other needs in addition to vehicles and paving, and to present a joint multi-year Capital Improvements Plan for approval at the next Town Meeting.

REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

It is our pleasure to update you on our progress in a number of areas. The Visual Arts Guide and the Career Development Curriculum have been presented and adopted by the majority of our Boards. As with all of the SAU #48 curriculum guides, they are available on our web site at www.sau48.k12.nh.us.

SAU #48 teachers have continued to curriculum map for each content area. The curriculum mapping software enables all SAU teachers to view curriculum for their grade level and subjects in schools around the world as well as within our SAU. This allows for collaboration and active, meaningful dialogue about teaching practice. Curriculum mapping serves as the central connection to other school improvement initiatives such as the use of data to guide classroom instruction, literacy skills across all disciplines, and Understanding By Design (McTighe and Wiggins, 2004) to plan meaningful units of instruction.

We have been very pleased by the progress our students have made increasing their reading skills. Our Title I programs continue to actively support our students. Plymouth Elementary School and Plymouth Regional High School have successfully implemented the Read 180 program which gives extra reading and language arts instruction to students who need it.

Our technology directors are close to making a recommendation to the full SAU Board to update student management software and the associated hardware. These upgrades will make parent/guardian access to student records, assignments, curriculum maps and various school announcement and information readily accessible.

Please know that our teachers and students are working very hard. The changes taking place in education at this moment in time are enormous. We are examining learning styles, alternative education, incorporating technology into lessons and differentiated instruction with the commitment of giving our students an education that will allow students to accomplish the many goals they will have in their life time.

On behalf of all our students, faculty members, administrators, paraprofessionals and support staff, we thank you for your generous support and commitment to our schools.

ANNUAL SCHOOL NURSE REPORT CAMPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 2007-2008

Our student enrollment as of the writing of this report is 301. As the recipients of the Well/Dollars Health and Safety Grant through Health Trust, the Campton School with the help and support from the PTA installed exercise fitness stations on the walking path over the summer. This completed the construction phase of the grant and provides a community recreational area. The community can utilize the path all year and welcomes everyone to enjoy the fitness path. Students utilized the fitness stations with their physical education classes as well. The grant supports continued education and health resources for wellness and safety. An additional grant through Healthy New Hampshire Foundation purchased snowshoes for k-3 grades. They have enjoyed snowshoeing with their teachers. These snowshoes can also be utilized on the fitness path for year round utilization of the fitness stations.

During the school year students will be screened for vision, hearing, scoliosis, immunizations and current physicals. Parents/Guardians will be notified if further evaluation by your own physician is recommended. You will also be notified if documentation is required to meet state standards and regulations for your child's health file.

Physical exams are offered during the school year with Dianne Arsenault, M.D., from Mid-State Health, for those 5-8 grade students participating in school sports. All fifth through eighth grade students that participate in sports must have a current physical exam on record. This exam is good for two years. Referrals will be made and follow-up done on those students requiring further medical attention by their Primary Care Physician. In accordance with school board policy students that participate in sports will maintain a current health physical in their file.

Fluoride Rinse program for grades 1, 2, and 3 students has begun. K students will participate during the month of March. A school dental program in cooperation with Speare Memorial Hospital will begin dental screening during February of 2008.

The SAU 48 school nurses continue to meet monthly at the Plymouth Elementary School with Brenda Clement RN, Speare Memorial Hospital Nursing Supervisor, to review and update policy and procedures for Board approval and discuss how best to support and address identified health and safety issues for the schools in SAU 48. As an employee of Speare Memorial Hospital the support and resources that are available to me is much appreciated.

I would like to thank all parents, school personnel, physicians, community agencies, and the PTA in their cooperation and support in assisting me in my role of promoting a physical and emotional healthy learning environment.

CAMPTON SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING SATURDAY, MARCH 10,2007 • 10:00 A.M. CAMPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Moderator, James McGarr, opened the meeting with everyone standing for the Pledge of Allegiance. He then proceeded with the warrant articles.

- Article 1: To see what action the School District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers. Mr. Healey moved, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, to accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers. Mr. Desrosiers gave a 'state of the school' address:
 - For the 2007-08 school year, the building bond is in year 18 of 20. The remaining principal is \$385,000. The loan rate is 6.8%. The renovations bond will be in year 1 of 7 with the principal being \$1,950,000. The interest rate is 4.15%.
 - The teacher contract will be in year 3 of 3 with a 3.9% raise + step. The support staff contract will also be in year 3 of 3 with a 4% increase.
 - Campton's share of the SAU budget is up, from 11.81% to 12.31%. The SAU assessment is down but our share has risen approximately \$5,000 due to the annual funding formula adjustment.
 - School staffing includes 33 full-time equivalent teachers and/or administrators and 24 full-time equivalent support staff.
 - School enrollment is currently at 325. It's projected for 294-300 next year. The student/teacher ratio is 13.3 to 1. The cost per pupil as determined by the Department of Education, is \$12,426.
 - The transportation contract continues to be with Robertson Transit, year 3 of a 5-year contract with a 2% annual increase.
 - The Building Maintenance capital reserve fund has a balance of \$46,356, and the special education fund has \$57,664.
 - Mr. Desrosiers stated that children are our biggest asset. Our students are doing well, both at the elementary and high school levels. He also noted that the college level students from Campton who receive scholarships from the Walter I. Lee Trust Fund are doing very well in college. He thanked the community for supporting the school.

Vote on Article 1 was taken in the affirmative.

Article 2: To see if the School District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with RSA 198:40-b, such contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and, further, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for such contingency fund. Mr. Henderson moved the article as read. Mr. Desrosiers seconded. Mr. Henderson explained that the board decided to lower the appropriation from \$4,000 to \$2,000 due to the new construction/renovations and the need, hopefully, not to have any unanticipated building issues arise. This past year \$250 was taken from the contingency fund for a donation to the Doug DiCenzo Memorial fund.

Vote on Article 2 was taken in the affirmative.

- Article 3: To see if the School District will vote to authorize and empower the School Board to borrow up to two hundred six thousand dollars (\$206,000) representing a portion of the State of New Hampshire's share of special education costs for the 2006-2007 school year, pursuant to RSA 198:20-d upon such terms and conditions as the School Board determines in the best interests of the District; said sum together with the costs of borrowing to be repaid by the State of New Hampshire pursuant to RSA 198:20-d; or to take any action in relation thereto. Ms. Hiltz moved the article as read, seconded by Mr. Hamilton. Ms. Hiltz noted that passing of this article would authorize the school board to borrow money for catastrophic use should a special needs student move into the district.
 - Sharon Davis asked if these funds would be in addition to the funds in the special education capital reserve fund. Mr. Halloran noted that they would be additional. He explained that in order to withdraw funds from a capital reserve fund, the district has to hold a special hearing. Mr. Desrosiers noted that passing of this article would allow the district not to have to use regular education funds to cover special education expenses.
 - Mr. Desrosiers amended the article to read ".....education costs for the 2007-2008 school year,". The amendment was moved and seconded and vote taken was in the affirmative.
 - Sharon Davis asked if the need arose, would the board request a special hearing to withdraw funds from the reserve fund. Mr. Halloran noted that if the expense could be covered by the funds in the capital reserve account, they would be used first, but any large expense would require borrowing funds.
 - Another woman asked why the budget was so disproportionate between regular education and special education. Mr. Hamilton noted that the federal government in not fulfilling their part of funding their mandates. Mr. Desrosiers noted that the average percentage of special education students

SAU-wide is 16.4% and Campton's is 17.7% of the school population. -With respect to a question about the budgeting of Gifted & Talented funds, Mr. Desrosiers noted that within regular classroom budgets, teachers acquire materials for enrichment programming. Last school year we funded a part-time teaching position for Algebra II instruction. G & T fund are used annually to fund TSA activities. Funds have been used in the past to send 8th grade students to the high school for advanced classes.

• It was asked what action the Board is taking to get better funding. Mr. Halloran noted that Congressman Bass had led a group that has worked to increase previous funding of 8-9% to current funding of 19%. People are encouraged to write to our congressmen and other state representatives to express their concerns.

Vote taken on Article 3 was in the affirmative.

Article 4: To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four million nine hundred twenty-five thousand six hundred eighty nine dollars (\$4,925,689) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district officials, employees and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. This amount also includes the sums found in Articles 2 and 3 and includes sums previously approved for support staff and teacher salaries. Mr. Desrosiers moved the article as read, seconded by Mr. Henderson. Mr. Desrosiers reviewed the revenue data noting the district assessment of \$435,505, an increase of 14.6% or \$1.29 per \$1000 on the tax rate. He noted that appropriations are up and revenues are down by approximately \$275,000. This loss represents \$.82 per \$1000. It was noted that if the Governor's current budget proposal passes, the law will change and the district will receive last year's state aid figure plus 5% for a total of \$1,003,284, an increase of \$241,953 over the current estimate. If the district receives the Governor's number, the tax impact from lower revenues would be only \$.11 per \$1000. Mr. Desrosiers outlined the cost savings measures for the 2007-08 school year. He explained that two faculty members will be on unpaid leave and one faculty member will be moved from Title I due to reduced funding. Due to another faculty member retiring, there will be one less position budgeted in special education. There will be three paraprofessional positions eliminated. The total savings is \$238,428.

• It was asked if there has been a change in student's needs that would account for the elimination of these positions. Mr. Halloran noted that the administration will be looking at the grouping of students differently to accommodate the needs. This will allow for more flexibility in using staff and scheduling opportunities to play to faculty teaching strengths.

Vote on Article 4 was in the affirmative.

Mr. Hamilton moved the article, seconded by Mr. Healey. Mr. Hamilton introduced Lester Mitchell who spoke about an initiative between the school board and the historical society to erect a monument in front of the school in memory of Campton students who have met an untimely death. It will be placed near the flagpole. He noted that a plaque that was originally on the flagpole when the school was built had been misplaced several years ago. He found it and in a ceremony last fall had it re-hung on the flagpole. The new memorial will be made of granite and have the school logo embossed on it. There will be room for two rows of names to be engraved on bronze plaques. He and Mr. Hamilton have done considerable research and are going to the Concord State Library to acquire more information. Mr. Hamilton noted they have received a lot of support for this project. Mr. Mitchell noted donations for maintenance costs may be requested in the future. They hope for completion of the project in the fall.

Mr. Desrosiers thanked Mr. Dennis Prescott for his $6 \frac{1}{2}$ years of service on the school board. Mr. Desrosiers also asked that if anyone had any input regarding having this annual meeting on a weeknight versus Saturday to please let the board know.

Mr. George noted that Lisa Ash has initiated writing a grant through the N.H. Department of Education (21st Century Grant) for after school programming. If anyone is interested in becoming involved, please let the school know. He noted that both Plymouth and Rumney schools are successfully involved in this program. Mr. George, on behalf of everyone at the school, also thanked Mr. Prescott for his efforts while serving on the board. He was the force behind working on the latest building renovations project.

Moderator, Mr. McGarr suggested that a vote of confidence be given for the 21st Century Grant. Dennis Prescott moved Mr. McGarr's suggestion, and it was seconded. A vote of confidence was supported by many.

Sharon Davis invited anyone who might be interested in serving on a Park & Recreation Commission to call Ann Marie in the selectmen's office.

Dave Moriarty thanked the school administration, SAU office, and the school board for being a good team and building confidence within the community. He noted that the renovations look great, but did question the status of the septic system. Dennis Prescott noted that it's okay and that what we thought we could just dig up and repair will actually, due to state regulations, be a bigger project then budgeted for at this time.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The meeting adjourned at 10:47 a.m.
