SCHOOL REPORT.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE TOWN OF DUBLIN.

We hereby submit the eighty-eighth report of our schools.

The Town raised and appropriated \$2385.00 as required by law. The income of the Sprague School Fund amounted to \$331.57, Literary Fund was \$40.30, Unexpended Dog License for the year 1908 was \$179.18, and amount received from the State toward the Superintendent's salary was \$145.84. There remained unexpended in the treasury from last year \$1532.07; making a total of \$4613.96 in hand for school purposes the past year. Of this amount we have used \$2909.00, leaving a balance of \$1704.96.

All the scholars in town have had the privilege of thirty-six weeks of school during the past year.

During the spring term the pupils of No. 3 were conveyed to No. 2. During the fall and winter terms, the pupils of No. 4 were conveyed to Nos. 1 and 3. Owing to sickness in No. 2, the winter term was shortened by two weeks; the children able to attend being so situated as to join No. 3 school for the remaining weeks.

It has become necessary during the year to find three new teachers. Miss Watson, a graduate of Fitchburg Normal School, was hired for No. 3. Miss Philbrick a graduate of Northfield Seminary, having had a year's experience teaching in Maine, being commended by her Superintendent, we engaged to teach in No. 5. Miss Mendum, a graduate of the Massachusetts Art Normal School, was engaged to teach music and drawing. For the sake of giving more time to the regular work of the schools, it was thought best to have music and drawing taught but one day in the week.

The work of the year has been progressive and harmonious. The faithful work of the teachers has been gratifying. The work of Superintendent Pratt has been real and approved. The interest of the children has been above the average; and

the co-operation of the parents, when given, has been appreciated.

We have noted an increased interest and marked profit resulting from the supply of supplementary reading wisely used.

The neat and attractive appearance of the school rooms has been gratifying,

Educational methods are progressing, but the purpose of assisting children to become intelligent, happy, successful citizens of this free land has not changed. We have sought to keep this ideal in view in selecting both method and means.

According to the law as changed in 1909, we submit the following estimate of the amount of "money which will be required during the ensuing fiscal year for the purchase of text books, scholars' supplies, flags and appurtenances, and for the payment of the tuition of the scholars of the district in high schools and academies in accordance with chapter 96 of the Laws of 1901, and for the payment of all other statutory obligations of the district."

Other moneys being available it will be necessary to raise under this section only enough money to pay high school tuitions, which we estimate at \$200.00.

The Board of Education,
Dublin, N. H.

Gentlemen :

It is a pleasure to hand you herewith the ninth annual report of the superintendent of schools of your town for the reason that it is a record of a year of progress, cordiality and results. Good schools are the result of slow growth or evolution and not of hasty changes from time to time. With this principle in mind your superintendent has worked.

A second principle which has governed his work is this definition of a good education : one that considers the natural tastes and abilities of the child and trains him to be whatever he should naturally become so much the better because of his education. Such education teaches the boy who has the natural taste for a farmer to become a more scientific one (for the time of the unscientific farmer has forever gone); and trains the born mechanic into a better one. Education is not good which leads a child, either by its implications or direct influence, to misdirect or misapply his natural abilities,—to make the one who would become a first-class mechanic into a poor lawyer, or one who should be a skillful dressmaker or breadmaker into a third-rate teacher. The time has come for schools to serve the needs of the community in which they are rather than the whims of a so-called culture of other places and other times. With this principle as a matter of his firm conviction the superintendent has laid plans for the future and executed things in the present. It may be of interest to indicate the course which study in the schools would follow under this plan of making them practical rather than ornamental.

1. Reading. This is taught as quickly as possible when the child enters school,—in any way which shall prove the quickest and most effective,—to enable him to read rapidly and understandingly so that he may proceed directly to his other studies by the use of this one.

2. Arithmetic. This should be severely practical and taught with a direct view to its use. The pupil will not need to bother with such abstruse subjects as bank discounts, partial payments, (which depend on the laws of the several states and need to be releared later at any rate), cube root (of no practical use), and will devote his energies to an effective mastery of common fractions, percentage, and particularly to the subject of measurements and calculations from them, making of bills and keeping of simple accounts, interest, and square root.

3. Geography as the understanding of commerce and manufacture, forestry and agriculture, climate and production, and the varied pursuits of man wherever man is found.

4. History as the study of the beautiful record of cause and result, a most effective means of training the logical and reasoning faculties; as a means of understanding how the governments of the world became as they are and why social conditions are as they are.

5. How to express one's self clearly and exactly in the English language.

6. How to write legibly, rapidly, easily.

7. The study of elementary science: nature study (for training observation and thought), elements of agriculture, manual training, drawing, (including practical mechanical work such as a mechanic would find helpful), and elementary physics.

This indicates briefly the lines along which your superintendent has been working.

A by no means unimportant part of our school work has been the making of our schools an attractive place for children, by means of interior decoration. This has consisted in posting the work of the pupils in drawing and writing, exhibiting pictures of instructive and beautiful character; in making collections to illustrate nature study, geography, and history; and in blackboard sketching. Our rooms have been decorated also with quotations from the world's best writings. Such a school makes better men and women. It provides by its constant and pervasive influence for a richer mind. It has the same effect, or more, upon a child that comfortable and beautiful surroundings in the home have upon a grown man. Too much trouble cannot be taken for the comfort, health, and refinement of our children.

The books of the year have been bought with the above mentioned principles in mind. We have a wide variety in reading, historical, geographical, in natural history and literature. We are buying books so that each school may have a small circulating library of its own, as a supplement to that of the town. The whole aim of the book buying has been to make available for the schools the most instructive, the most wholesome, and freshest writings of today. Among their number our books include science as well as literature.

The superintendent has begun a series of parents' meetings intending to hold them once each month that the schools are in session. Only one of these has so far been held but it was productive of considerable satisfaction to the superintendent and it is hoped to those who attended. These will be opened again at the opening of the spring term. It is the in-

tention at these meetings to have problems of interest to parents discussed, freely and without restraint; to discuss the means for securing better physical health for our school children; and ways in which the home can directly aid the school in matters of better education. The superintendent wishes to express his thanks to the many people who have so heartily coöperated with him during the past year in Dublin.

Much time has been spent in careful work with the teachers themselves, helping them to more efficient methods of teaching, to plan their work more effectively, and in every way that seemed to suggest itself. Our schools are under good teaching and that teaching is growing more direct and to the point month by month. It is but right to express to our teachers our sincere appreciation of their cordiality and helpfulness, for without these things no school system can be a success. No friction has arisen during the year and to that fact can be attributed a portion of the results in the schools.
