**TOWN WARRANT**

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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenland, in the County  
of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in  
Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenland, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$13,500.00 to meet the cost of the following permanent public improvement and construction, to wit. The permanent reconstruction and improvement of the public highway therein extending from Greenland Parade to the town line of Stratham being a portion of the Portsmouth-Exeter Road, so-called, the money so raised to be expended by the Town under the direction of the proper officers thereof in conjunction with such State and Federal aid as may now be or hereafter become available to the Town for that purpose. The said sum if and when raised and appropriated shall be expended for the aforesaid public permanent construction and improvement and for no other purpose whatever.

4. To see if the Town will vote to borrow upon its credit a sum not exceeding \$12,000.00 (Twelve Thousand Dollars) for the purpose of meeting in whole or in part an appropriation (if any) made under the foregoing article and to authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds of the Town for said sum under the provisions of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire for the payment thereof with interest and to pass such other votes in relation to said bond issue as the Town shall deem proper.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding Thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3500.00) to be used as a first payment on the road described in Article 3.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Aid Roads.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Trunk Line Highway.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and bridges.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weeks' Public Library.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the control of the White Pine Blister.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to celebrate Old Home Week.
13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pay a reward of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for the arrest and conviction of poultry thieves.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## LIBRARY REPORT

Last year's report stated that 1926-7 was a banner year for our Library and it is with pleasure that we announce that this year has been even more successful. Forty-one new borrowers' cards were issued and our circulation was 7750, almost one-sixth of that number being children's books. 513 volumes only of non-fiction were taken out, which shows that our people do not avail themselves as they might of the large number of volumes on the shelves that are really worth while. If this section of the Library were better appreciated we should be encouraged to put more money into the best books which are constantly being published and which a few always enjoy.

The usual number of volumes have been added during the year and the situation in regard to shelf room is becoming serious. A new book-stack is an absolute necessity, as the shelves are much over-crowded, although several hundred volumes have been removed to make way for new ones.

The Library has been open two afternoons and evenings during the year, as no time was lost through storms or holidays. The fund for repairs is growing and it is hoped that renovation may soon be begun.

Thanks are due to Mrs. Frank Moody, Mr. Kennard and Mrs. Wilcox for gifts of books and to Mrs. Lord for magazines. A local magazine club has for years supplied most of the current issues which are placed on our reading-tables.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenland:

Your fine school property is classed as one of the best in New Hampshire and your continued interest in your schools is to be highly commended. The Parent Teacher's Association and friends of the school have given an excellent equipment for the play grounds and it is contributing in a marked degree to the efficiency of the school work in preparing the pupils for life.

A change in the teaching force has resulted in some improvement to the school. Mr. Maynard the new headmaster, is making a host of friends among the pupils and parents. The following is a list of the teachers and the number of pupils in each room.

Miss Marjorie Whytock, Grades 1 - 2	33

The Union District No. 12 at its annual meeting decided to employ a school nurse and the committee chose Mrs. Anna Clow of Wolfeboro, who made the following report of the work done in Greenland during the fall term. Number of pupils examined 89; Number with bad teeth 35; defective vision 7; bad tonsils or adenoids 15; defective hearing 2; unvaccinated 7. She reported 21 pupils are under weight. She made nine visits to the school and visited five of the homes in order to consult with the parents in regard to improving the condition of the children.

As most of you know her two children were drowned during the Christmas vacation and because of this shock, Mrs. Clow feels that she is unable to go on with our work. Our sympathy goes out to Mrs. Clow and her husband and we are sorry she finds herself unable to return. We hope that an efficient nurse can be found to carry on this important work which Mrs. Clow has started.

More equipment is needed in the Manual Training department. I suggest that a new bench and additional tools be

secured and that one of the divisions of the boys, work in the unoccupied part of the basement. Typewriters in the school will add to the interest and give the pupils practical work that will aid them in this work in the world.
