WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milan, in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are notified to meet at Androscoggin Hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz.:

- 1st. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor and other necessary charges arising within the town.
- 3rd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for laying out and building and maintaining highways and bridges.
- 4th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for breaking roads during the winter of 1916 and 1917.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for building state highway.
- 6th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for maintaining state highway.
- 7th. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for support of schools.
- 8th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of books and paying other expenses of the public library.
- 9th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the proper observance of Memorial day, and appropriate the same to the use of the Grand Army.
- 10th. To choose a Library Trustee to serve three years.
- 11th. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a road machine.

Chairman's Report

To the Citizens of the School District of Milan:

Again I have the privilege of submitting to you a report of our schools.

Repairs.

Hardwood floors have been put in the village primary rooms, halls and stairs. Minor repairs on other buildings.

The Hodgdon Hill schoolhouse needs a thorough repairing and painting.

Books and Supplies.

The only change made in books was the exchange of the Brooks readers in the lower grades for the Holton-Curry series, which has proved very satisfactory. The teachers tell us it is the best series they have ever used.

The school board urges better care of the books. It seems to us there is no need of any pencil marks in them. Bookmarks on which the lesson can be indicated should be used. Teachers should set the example and require pupils to follow it. A case of maps has been placed in Hodgdon Hill school.

Teachers.

The same teacher has been retained in each school for the whole year. Four have taught nearly four years in town. Four are in their second year. Six have taught continuously in the same school. What better proof of their good work is needed?

Attendance.

From our report to the state, July 15, 1915, I will quote:

Changes in School Board.

Mrs Susie V. Barrows moved from town in early summer and Mrs Louise S. Willard was appointed to fill the vacancy. Since the latter's going from town in October, there have been but two members. Both these ladies took deep interest in the work and their resigning was much regretted.

Tabular Report of Schools.

I hope everyone in town will carefully examine this report. We believe few towns in the state are having better attendance. We feel this is due in a great measure to the great interest our teachers take in their schools and personally in the pupils, and wish to thank them.

General Remarks.

My frequent visits to the schools have shown an increasing interest and better work by most of the pupils for several years. Cases of tardiness are fewer, absence, except for sickness, seldom found, neater and better work is being done, better order in the school-rooms is noted, especially in the rural schools. The teachers have shown great interest in their work and in the care of the pupils.

Parents' days have brought many visitors to the village schools. Would it not be wise for the rural schools to extend invitations for such days? But, parents, do not wait for these special days to visit your school. Visit often, and so see what is being done in the days of dull routine. You will get different and true ideas of what the teacher and pupils are doing and accomplishing. Such visits will clear up many a misunderstanding. One teacher has frequently had half-hour entertainments on Friday afternoon—speaking pieces, singing, dialogues, dramatization of stories the children read, physical exercises. These have enticed many visitors for the whole afternoon and been a great source of pleasure and profit to the children.

Some parents feel it is a disgrace if their child is not promoted every year. Poor health, especially cases of throat trouble or adenoids, or absence from school for a long time because of sickness, has often been the reason the child has not been able to complete the year's work.

By doing the year's work over, they usually get so much better understanding of it that they advance easily in all the other grades and stand high in the class, whereas if promoted they would always be at the foot. Teachers and school board earnestly seek the greatest good for each child and want to promote every pupil every year.

Eleven years' service in this work is a long time. It has been a pleasure to me. I enjoy children, observing their development and advancement during their home school life, and as they go to higher institutions, I am proud of the standing they have and are maintaining. I hope to follow them as they take up their life work. I wish to thank them over and over again for the courtesies they have ever shown me, and for the beautiful presents sent me as I retire from the service.

I assure you I prize the gifts and the spirit of love which prompted it, and your autographs. I urge you to be good citizens as you grow up. That is the object of education. The more education you can get the more useful citizens you can be.

The kindness which you, citizens, have ever shown me will never be forgotten. I thank you for the confidence you have placed in me to permit me to help direct the education of your children so long. It is a privilege, regardless of the work. There have been many changes in the board of colleagues, yet all have worked in harmony, making our work pleasant. To all with whom I have served, I extend thanks for your many favors and courtesies.

In closing these remarks, I urge you citizens to make the education of your children a chief object of your town. An investment in education pays the best interest.
