## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1959 showed a continuation of growth and expansion for our town. Assessed valuation of taxable property on April 1, 1959, showed a total increase of \$64,060 over the previous year. Of this, \$43,960 was in year-round property, and \$20,100 for summer property. During 1959, the Selectmen issued building permits for the following:

- 11 year-round dwellings
- 10 summer cottages
- 1 boys' camp building
- 5 commercial buildings
- 20 misc. outbuildings, alterations, additions, signs.

While this shows a healthy growth for the town, the increased tax revenue from this property will not meet the added amount called for in our 1960 budget. The progress and expansion of New London far exceed that of many New Hampshire towns, but means that our taxes must keep pace with the growth, if we are to continue the services required by more roads, more residents, more school children, and to meet the higher costs of everything we purchase.

Our HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT cares for 37 miles of town roads, with new residential streets being added from time to time. Each year, we plan to rebuild and hard-surface sections of our road system under the Special Highway Improvement Fund of \$5000 which you were asked to raise at Town Meeting. We have done Bunker Road, Shaker Street, Gould Road, and are currently in the process of doing Seamans Road. This work is done in cooperation with State aid, under what is called T.R.A., or Town Road Aid, in which we will contribute \$685.88 for 1960, and the State will contribute \$4,572.50. We hope to complete Seamans Road in 1961. Last year we added our new loader, and purchased a sand lot that should be adequate for many years for highway use. In 1957, our Town Meeting voted to adopt the pay scale of the State Highway Department for the regular employees in our Highway Department. This

year, an article in the Warrant will ask you to approve the adoption of a schedule of vacations, paid holidays, and sick-leave for this department. The schedule will be based on that of the State Highway Department, but modified to be more suitable to our local conditions. In recognition of over twenty-five years of service, Henry Stanley and Willis Prescott will be credited with full accrued sick-leave benefits.

Our FIRE DEPARTMENT, under the direction of Merle C. Gay, Chief, reports the following:

The addition of the new truck in 1959 means that we now have two fully equipped fire-engines carrying a total of 1500 gallons of water, along with hoses, ladders, extinguishers, and other necessary equipment. The fire department asks that if you call for help, you give:

1 — Your name

2 — Location of fire

3 — Type of fire (house, chimney, car, brush, etc.)

The correct number to call is LAkeview 6-2222.

Our MUNICIPAL COURT, Judge J. Duane Squires presiding, reports:

“To the Town of New London:

Insofar as available records show, 1959 was the busiest in the history of the New London Municipal Court. Total number of cases which came before the Court was 104. These were divided as follows: Criminal Cases, 89; Juvenile Cases, 3; Small Claims Cases, 12.

The total amount of fines collected and payable to the Town Treasurer was \$673.50; Small Claims fees due the Town were \$3.00. Total turned over to the Town from the New London Municipal Court was \$676.50.

The Court desires to express appreciation to the Selectmen for providing a dignified place of meeting for Court sessions. All such sessions are held in the Town Hall. The Court also desires to commend the law enforcement officials of the Town for their diligence in enforcing the statutes, both local and State.

This department, unfortunately, also showed considerable increase over the previous year, reflecting both the trend of the times, and the diligence of our policemen.

Our PLANNING BOARD had a quiet year. Members met with the Selectmen and Road Agent in discussing new roads and establishing procedure for future expansion. The Planning Board is concerned over the lack of adequate public beach facilities, which has been a town-wide problem for years. Your constructive criticism and ideas would be very welcome. One amendment to the zoning ordinance appears in the Warrant for this year. Here again, ideas you might have during the year for improving the ordinance would be helpful.

Our ZONING BOARD of ADJUSTMENT had only one case to consider in 1959, that of Edwin Keith for permission to erect an automobile sales agency and service station on the Newport Road, the old Glengae land. This request was granted. After two years of operation, our zoning ordinance, which caused some concern when adopted, has settled down to a normal part of modern community living. Percy Thurston, who has ably served as Chairman, is retiring from this post, and we wish to thank him for his help during these first two years.

Our TOWN DUMP finished the year without a complaint, so we think it deserves a place in our report! A small shelter was erected for the attendant, Lawrence Miner, who is on duty during summer months. He reports that cars from eighteen states visited the dump, some from as far away as Arizona, Texas and Wisconsin. A report from the New Hampshire State Inspector reads:

"This dump is second to none in the District, a credit to the Town of New London and the State of New Hampshire. May I express my deepest appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, to Mr. Stanley and Mr. Miner for the great improvement and management of this dump with regards to forest fire protection.

We are pleased with this report, but even more pleased with the helpful cooperation of you folks in helping us keep this necessary part of our town in such good condition.

The Selectmen wish to thank the townspeople for their approval of altering the Town Hall to make pleasant quarters for our weekly meetings. Our new office, and the modern heating system have been a great pleasure to us. The alteration also provided a satisfactory meeting place for our municipal court, and for our Boy Scout troop. We said that 1959 was a year of expansion for New London — here are a few reasons we think so. During 1959 we saw the opening of Sawyer Hall, a beautiful building to be enjoyed as a cultural center by townspeople as well as students; the opening of the New London Bowling Center, by Davis Thomson and William Sharkey; the opening of The Country Press, by Laurence F. Petersen, who has printed our Town Report for 1959. Last year brought us a Boy Scout troop, sponsored by Heidelberg Lodge, I.O.O.F., Theodore Brooks, Scoutmaster, with 33 members; a Cub Scout troop, sponsored by the P.T.A., John Kiernan, Leader, with 25 members; a Girl Scout troop, sponsored by the Outing Club, Judith Greene, Leader, with 26 members. The old hospital building is in the process of renovation by Mr. and Mrs. Urban Busch, to be opened as a convalescent home; William and Barbara Brown expect their new Laundromat to be operating by early Spring.

All of these things make us feel that New London is growing, is a healthy community, and a nice place in which to live. The Board of Selectmen meets every Thursday night at 8:00 P.M. and would be happy to have you stop in if you have questions, or suggestions to help our town.

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall  
in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next  
at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following  
subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year  
ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to  
defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropri-  
ations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate  
the sum of \$16,250.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing  
year. This sum includes:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for Police Department maintenance for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Fire Department maintenance for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Civil Defense for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for Town Welfare cases.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,724.80 as the Town share of sewer maintenance for the ensuing year.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,100.00 for summer maintenance and \$6,840.00 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 in excess of maintenance funds for the improvement, rebuilding and resurfacing with bituminous mix of Town roads to be designated by the Selectmen in conjunction with the Town Road Agent.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the purpose of completing the construction of Hillside Road and Mountain View Terrace.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00. This sum to be known as the Highway Department Equipment Fund and to be held in reserve until such time as it may be needed.

13. To see if the Town wil vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$685.88 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$4,572.50.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the improvement and construction of sidewalks and curbs for the ensuing year.

15. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to build the first nine hundred feet of a road starting from King Hill Road, just west of Arthur Roberts' house and running south toward the Outing Club Ski development on King Hill. The same road construction to start only when the Outing Club is ready to complete the road and begin actual work on the project.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to improve and hard-surface the Town Parking Lot.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,100.00 for the maintenance of street lighting for the ensuing year.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Tracy Memorial Library for the ensuing year.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for the purpose of providing additional storage and shelving in the basement of the Tracy Memorial Library Building.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of shade trees for the ensuing year.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of control and eradication of Pine Blister Rust for the ensuing year.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day for the ensuing year.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 for maintenance of the Information Booth for the ensuing year.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for publicizing and advertising the Lake Sunapee Area, the same to be turned over to the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade for this purpose.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for Hydrant service for the ensuing year.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the purpose of defraying expenses for hiring a Band to play a series of concerts during the months of July and August, 1960 and to act in any other manner thereto.

(The Budget Committee recommends \$600.00)

29. To see if the Town will allow the New London Bowling Center to continue Sunday operation between the hours of two and twelve P.M. as it has operated since August, 1959, by temporary permission from the Board of Selectmen.

30. To see if the Town will vote to approve the adoption of a schedule of Vacations, paid Legal Holidays, and Sick-Leave

for the Town Highway Department. Said schedule to be based on that of the State Highway Department, with modifications agreed upon by the Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent.

31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinance:

Add to Article IX

G. Permit an owner of a residence within the Town, who also owns lake-shore property, to erect a boat-house, or a bath-house, on such shore property. The structure shall be considered an accessory building to the residence, shall be for the owner's use or for rental as part of the residence, and not for public use. Such a structure shall conform to Article IX, section C, and to the yard requirements of Article IV, Section B2. The frontage requirements and Lot Area required shall be determined by the Board of Adjustment in each case, upon application.

32. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at public sale, property acquired by tax deed and other real estate of no value to the Town. This order to be in effect until rescinded.

The committee held one public meeting and two closed meetings to discuss the proposed articles in the budgets. Although the school budget was approximately \$8,500.00 higher than last year's budget, it was approved as submitted. The town budget was approved as submitted except for reducing the amount requested for band concerts by the sum of \$200.00.

In these times of rising costs, it was gratifying to have the town appropriation nearly \$19,000.00 less than last year.



NOTES: There are now 215 Cemetery Trust accounts for the care of cemetery lots. The principal in these accounts totals \$19,580.32 with unspent earnings of \$3,770.03, making a combined total of \$23,350.35 in the Cemetery Trust Fund.

The Tracy Memorial Library has the support of three trust funds, i.e., the Tracy Trust Fund, the Brown Trust Fund and the Jelly

**Trust Fund.** The principal of the Tracy Fund was created at \$100,000.00 but this principal today amounts to \$101,436.45 due to accumulations of cash capital gains received over the past nine years. Incidentally, this \$100,000.00 endowment had a market value, December 31, 1959, of \$148,485.00. All cash capital gains were deposited in any one of the four savings accounts as "Uninvested Funds" and the interest earned, turned over to the Library as income. During the past year, there were new investments made from Uninvested Funds, at a cost of \$10,895.77 which necessitated closing out two of these savings accounts, leaving the Newport Savings and the Concord Savings Accounts still active. The total earnings from the three Library Trust Funds which were turned over to the Library during the past year was 5,518.13 which was a return of 5.37% on their total investments in the three trust funds of \$102,692.87. This annual Library Income was \$360.00 greater than the previous year.

There are three Miscellaneous Trust Funds. All of the Ministerial Trust Fund income was turned over to the First Baptist Church, as has been the custom in recent years. The Heidelberg Prize Speaking Fund has a balance of unsupnt earnings of \$34.32 which is available for the 1960 prize money. Finally, a new account was opened by the School District, but too late for 1959 earnings. This account will earn 3 3/4% during the coming year.

This is to certify that the information contained in this report is complete and correct to the best of our knowledge and belief.

## **PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS**

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note — 58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent-minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

## NEW LONDON SERVICE ORGANIZATION, INC.

The Veterans Trust Fund made two new loans during the past year for a total of \$700.00. These, with an older loan, constitute the "Active" group of Veterans Loans.

Veterans' Trust Fund income was confined to Government Bond coupons and interest on Savings Account totaling \$27.71. Expenditures from Veterans' Trust Fund were \$47.00 for Memorial Day Flowers to Gold Star Mothers, Christmas Cash Gifts to all men still in Service, and the following additions to Serviceman's Book Shelf of Tracy Memorial Library: "Leyte" and "Liberation of The Philippines" by Morison, "Strange Ordeal of The Normandier" by Tredree, "23° North" by Pope and "Destroyer and Destroyermen" by Yates. Our contribution of \$31.00 for Girls' State was returned, so no girl was financed by us this year.

The Kneeland Parshley Trust Fund made the usual Christmas contribution to the Elkins Church for the Children's Christmas Party, from earnings.

There were no changes in the Richard Edwin Messer Trust Fund or the Burt Gay Trust Fund, except of course the addition of interest on savings.

The Charity Trust Fund received income from the Kearsarge Telephone Preferred Stock and from interest on unspent earnings for a total of \$51.57. In midsummer this fund gave New London Hospital \$100.00 for a flag pole.

The Expense Trust Fund is our checking account, through which all financial transactions are made. The only income is from cash gifts which totaled \$102.00. Expenditures were \$50.00 for the Annual Banquet, \$25.00 for our contribution to the Guy F. Williams Memorial Fund as set up by Colby Junior College, and the usual bank service charges. Inasmuch as the cash gifts exceeded the expenditures we ended the year with \$24.42 more than a year ago.

The usual quarterly meetings were held during the year.

## TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The record of the past year of the Tracy Memorial Library is now made for the trustees and the town. It is an account of the growth in variety and the increase in volume of the library and community work.

The increase, this year, in the circulation of juvenile books and materials has greatly pleased the library staff and Board. The statistics are as follows:

Adult fiction .....	5337
Adult non-fiction .....	2528

During 1959, there have been 11,883 visitors to our library.

All calls for inter-library loans have been answered promptly from the State Library at Concord, and from neighboring libraries. We also have been fortunate in borrowing 693 supplementary books from the Bookmobile which have been used to a large extent in the Children's Room.

Although the price of new books has increased enormously in the last five years, so that our book budget has not expanded for the usual new purchases, we have added 178 adult and 160 juvenile books to the shelves. Our friends have generously presented 21 more books to us as gifts. Upon the magazine table in the reading room are 50 current magazines, three daily and two weekly newspapers.

We have answered requests for extra reading material as follows: to the New London Central School, 289 books; to the Wilmot Schools, 194 books; to Mr. Alphonse Soucy (remedial reading classes), 19 books; to Mrs. Woodward's Kindergarten, 9 books; to Proctor Academy, 6 books. Our picture file has been

in constant use, especially by the elementary grades, with 164 pictures loaned for use, mostly in the social studies classes.

The reference requests have been unusually numerous this year with material supplied in answer to 621 inquiries, for special information and source themes. Summer camps in New London and surrounding towns have used the library for books and magazines.

The New London Service Organization has continued its gifts of military books with the following additions: "Leyte" and "The Liberation of the Philippines", by Morison; "73° North" by Pope; "Strange Ordeal of the Normandier" by Tredree; and "Destroyer and Destroyermen" by Yates.

Meetings in the Committee Room have averaged three each week. The auditorium is used for special exhibits during Children's Book Week and National Library Week, by the Hospital Board for its annual meeting, by the Woman's Club, and for summer displays.

One hundred and forty-seven adult, and eighty juvenile borrowers have registered at the desk, and their cards have been placed in our files during the past year.

The room in the basement, used for the preparing and serving of refreshments, was repainted this year, and a new electric plate was purchased by the Woman's Club. At the beginning of the summer a new Cooler and drinking fountain was placed in the hallway, and proved most popular during the hot weather. In December, a small hot water heater was added so that, again, the building has hot water facilities.

A Lincoln's birthday exhibit, with a display of adult and juvenile books concerning this great American, was viewed by many persons. An original letter, written by President Lincoln, was loaned for this occasion by Dr. Mather Cleveland. A replica of the type of log cabin in which Lincoln was born, loaned by Miss Marion Peabody, and a photostatic copy of a book of devotions, given to Mr. Lincoln by his wife, loaned by Dr. J. D. Squires, added much interest to this exhibit.

National Library Week was observed under the supervision of Mr. Lewis Simonds, chairman, with a tremendous amount of painstaking effort on the part of the committee. Art Displays and posters of the pupils of the Central School, an exhibit featuring the "Golden Age of Opera," arranged by Mrs. Edwin Hubbard; a bronze plaque of Admiral Richard T. Byrd designed and made by Mr. Vincent S. Wickham; and wood carvings by Mr. William Lawrence, were admired by 256 persons during the week. Open house was held every evening with different programs to appeal to all ages.

During National 4-H Week, members of the New London Club held a display of posters and articles made during the past year.

In July and August the project for the Vacation Reading Club was a "trip to Alaska", to encourage the children to familiarize themselves with our new state. Seventy children enrolled for this study, and were given record booklets in which to keep reviews of the books read, as well as bookmarks, pins, and a flag with 49 stars. At the end of the summer a garden party was held for all participants where colored slides and films of Alaska were shown to the children. John Kiernan with 81 books read, and Margaret Richardson with 75 books, finished first in the contest. They received new books as prizes. Diplomas on completion of the course were awarded to 47 members.

During August, the water color exhibit of Vincent Schofield Wickham, and the oil paintings of Dorothy Dey Howard, were on display in the auditorium.

Miss Harriet Hartwell, of Weston, Mass., spent her second summer at the library, assisting with the reading club and the circulation of books.

In October, appropriate displays marked the observances of United Nations Day and National Bible Week.

During October the staff and trustees attended the regional meeting at Bradford, with the guest speaker, Miss Margery Stroud, state librarian, stressing the great importance of an

accurate and up-to-date collection of reference books for a small public library.

From October 6 to December 16 the Woman's Club sponsored an adult education program, a series of Current Event discussions, on Wednesday evenings, in the Committee room. Chairman of the Committee was Mrs. James Cleveland, and the discussions were led by Dr. J. D. Squires.

"Exploring into Space, 1959" was the theme of the displays during Children's Book Week, with maps of outer space and the heavens to illustrate the subject. Models of planes, jets, rockets and missiles were loaned by Kirk Ramsey, Robert Thomas, Haydn Wright and Keith Wheeler. A display, deeply interesting to everyone, of the souvenirs and medals of Major George J. Cricenti, filled one showcase in the auditorium, and a fine collection of German steins was loaned by William F. Kidder. Mrs. Elizabeth Ripley, children's author, spoke to the first seven grades of the Central School and the Springfield Memorial School, at the High School auditorium. All the grades of the Central School, Wilmot Schools, Springfield School, and the Kindergarten visited the library during Book Week. The trustees and staff at the library were greatly pleased with the interest shown in the Book Fair by the attendance of 425 persons.

Beginning in February, a group of Colby Junior College students from Miss Helen Spaulding's course in Child Study, began to assist the staff during Children's Hour. Every Saturday afternoon two girls came to help and to learn. This practice accomplished a three-fold purpose: it provided field work for the students, gave valuable assistance to the children and staff at the library, and made the Hour a most popular place on Saturday afternoons. This practice work was inaugurated by Mrs. Ray, librarian, when she visited the college classes to tell of the work done with the children on Saturdays at the library. During the past year, 535 children have been entertained and instructed by the library staff and their helpers.

Our Christmas lights shine brightly again, marking the holiday season, and sending out a warm invitation to everyone to visit "their library".

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New London qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said District on the third day of March, 1960, at 8:00 o'clock p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, and other state sources, together with other income; the School Board to certify

to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

# **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of New London:

I submit herewith my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

## **Enrollment**

The enrollment for the school year 1959-60 is 295 — divided as follows:

Elementary Grades (1-7)	157
Senior High Grades (8-12)	138

## **School Plant — Elementary**

Presently, pupils in Grades 1 to 7 are being housed in five classrooms. It is necessary to run double grades in four of the five rooms. (The size of Grade 7 — 30 pupils — made it necessary to operate this grade by itself.) In addition to double grades, a further disadvantage of our elementary set-up is that pupils in Grade 2 and Grade 5 cannot be taught together as a unit but must be assigned to two different rooms.

From the comments of parents, my own observations, and generally accepted sound educational practice, I believe this split, double-grade situation should be corrected — soon.

## **School Plant — High School**

An additional instructor in English has made it possible to provide grouping in each grade for both Academic and General sections. Work in Remedial Reading has been added and should pay real dividends in the accomplishments of students bothered with reading deficiencies.

At the high school level, the existing facilities present both problems of quantity and quality.

As we have provided additional course offerings and ability grouping in some subjects, a shortage of teacher-stations has

developed which can only be solved by making available additional classrooms.

Quality-wise, the greatest needs exist in:

1. Science facilities
2. Home Economics facilities
3. Space for Industrial Arts expansion
4. School Library facilities
5. Shower and Locker Room facilities

### **Plant Expansion**

The New Hampshire Department of Education has recently made a preliminary study on school building needs.

Quoting in part from the **General Recommendations** of the Department's findings:

"It is our opinion that New London does not have a sufficient number of pupils by itself to provide an efficient and economical secondary school."

"It is our recommendation that New London accept a long-range program which provides for a 12 grade program at the present location and build at this time only those phases which will meet immediate needs."

"Every effort should be made now to interest as many neighboring Districts as possible in this consolidation."

The space requirements for a 300-pupil high school (Grades 7-12) are not substantially greater than those for a 200-pupil school. This is true since the smaller school must provide essentially the same Special Facilities as the larger one. Consequently, the smaller unit is not as efficient and is more expensive to operate.

The Warrant provides an Article to use money now in Capital Reserve Funds to employ an architect to provide preliminary studies and cost estimates for an expansion of the present plant. When these have been developed, it will be

possible to present definite proposals to the citizens for their consideration and appropriate action.

### National Defense Education Act of 1958

We are taking advantage of the matching Federal funds under Title III of this Act for the purchasing of special materials in Science, Math and French.

Some of the items include:

- Filmstrip projector and screen for Elementary Building

- Geometric Construction Set
- Volume Demonstration Set
- Geometric Solids and Surfaces Set
- Approximately 40 Reference Books on Mathematical subjects

#### FRENCH:

We are studying and investigating materials and equipment available for a Language Laboratory. Since this equipment is highly technical, expensive and rather permanent, it seems advisable to move slowly.

The 1960-61 Budget includes addiitonal funds to be used with Title III Federal funds. The total cost of the requests in the three fields this year was much greater than the funds available.

### **Completion of Payment for Central School**

The \$4,000 included in the 1960-61 Budget will complete the payment on the Central School Building.

### **Conclusion**

The work of the school reaches many phases of community activity. It is my hope that our accomplishments will be such as to merit the continued interest and generous support of the citizens of New London.

## **REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL TO SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT**

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my annual report as Principal of New London Central School.

Quite a few years ago it became apparent that the curriculum of the high school should be studied to see if it was meeting the requirements of the students. The study indicated the need for change in several different areas. These changes have been taking place as rapidly as possible during the past few years.

In September, 1957, a second social studies teacher was added to the teaching staff. By doing this, the eighth grade could be departmentalized and integrated with the high school. The offerings in the social studies area were increased and the five elementary teachers would now have seven grades instead of eight.

In March, 1957, the State Department of Education published a bulletin, "Minimum Standards and Practices for New Hampshire Secondary Schools, Grades 9-12", outlining the standards a high school must meet for approval in September, 1958. This set of standards was then used as a guide in determining the changes needed at New London High School.

Another science and mathematics teacher and an art supervisor were added to the teaching staff in September, 1958. This permitted the revision of the course offerings in both the mathematics and science areas as well as the addition of an art course. A second English teacher was added in September, 1959, allowing the necessary changes to be made in the English area.

Also, in September, 1959, the first step was taken in the plan to offer three years of French. By the time the present sophomore French I group reaches the senior year, the third year of French will be offered.

The next phase in the improvement of the curriculum will be accomplished by the addition of a language laboratory in French.

At the present time there are two courses of study offered — college preparatory and general. Students who take the general course are encouraged to take as many of the college preparatory subjects as possible, if the many tests used for guidance purposes indicate the student will benefit by taking the subjects.

The program of studies as offered for the current school year is given below. This program of studies, according to the standards of the State Department of Education, gives New London an Approved Comprehensive High School.

## **REPORT OF HELPING TEACHER**

In this brief report of services rendered, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the superintendent, principal, and teachers for their continued encouragement and cooperation toward the fulfillment of various responsibilities including (1) the educational growth and development of children, (2) needs of some exceptional children, (3) special resources or materials for classroom use, and (4) the consultant services on various phases of the school curriculum.

CLASSROOM VISITS and conferences with teachers have made it possible to share the educational atmosphere of the

classroom. In this respect, there is every indication that the teachers are genuinely concerned with and conscientiously seeking to meet the varied needs of all pupils in their charge.

RESOURCES AND MATERIALS are made available where needed and where specific requests are made. This would include such items as references, special texts, workbooks, filmstrips, reading lists, and other instructional aids.

CURRICULUM IMPROVEMENTS have been attempted through (1) the added emphasis of science at all grade levels, (2) the adoption of a new language series, eventually to be extended to all elementary grades, (3) the use of educational T.V. in strengthening the study of New Hampshire in grade 4 and science in grade 3.

THE TESTING PROGRAM, as in other years, includes (a) achievement tests at all grade levels (1-12); (b) mental ability tests in grades 1, 4, and 7; (c) provision for clinical referrals where requested or necessary; (d) individual tests as needs and requests arise. This year, having completed the necessary qualifications for the administration of the Stanford-Binet Scale (an individual test of I.Q.), it is expected that an increased use of this service will add considerably toward the educational guidance of pupils.

MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES, whether a staff meeting, an informal chat with a teacher, a conference with a parent or group of parents, are all aimed at providing the best education for all.
