*To the inhabitants of the Town of Newington qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at twelve of the clock, noon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose, in the manner provided by law, a town clerk; one selectman to hold office for three years, assessors of taxes, overseers of the poor, a town treasurer, a collector of taxes, a superintendent of burying ground, a janitor of the town hall, auditors, highway agents, a library trustee to hold office for three years, a trustee of town trust funds to hold office for three years.

2. To choose measurers of wood, surveyors of lumber, fence viewers, a pound keeper, constables, police officers and all necessary town officers.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for all town expenses for the year ensuing, (as included in the budget).

4. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the town land and buildings.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer, or to dispose of, any real estate acquired, or to be acquired, by the town through tax collector's deeds.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes, and to fix the rate of interest.

7. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99, Laws of the State of New Hampshire passed January Session 1933.

8. To transact such other business as, legally, may come before the meeting.

## LANGDON PUBLIC LIBRARY

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To the Citizens of Newington:

The Trustees of Langdon Library herewith submit the forty-second annual report with financial statement and Librarian's report for the year ending December 31, 1933.

A librarian touches the lives of many people. The service that radiates from the desk of our good and faithful Mrs. Greenough is far-reaching. She serves with equal interest and enthusiasm the varied needs of the pre-school age, the primary and grammar school age, the high school and college age, the adult patrons of the library, as well as many who are unable to come to the library in person. Spend a Wednesday afternoon at the library and witness this. We are grateful for such abundant service.

The supply and demand of the reading table is interesting. You may note an increased expenditure in magazine subscriptions. While we have added a few new magazines, our subscriptions and renewals have been so combined and extended that many of them are prepaid for two and three years. The special rates thus obtained make a more convenient and economical method.

The Baltimore and Ohio R. R. bond matured in March. One half of this was paid in cash which was deposited in the Portsmouth Savings Bank. The remainder was reinvested with the Baltimore and Ohio for another period of years. We took advice on this matter at one of the Portsmouth banks.

The number of volumes added to the library has been substantially increased this year by the thought-

ful gift of seventy-two volumes from our friend, Mrs. Langdon. There are choice books in this collection. That the ties of the library are far-reaching is shown by the gift of twenty-two volumes from Mrs. Marion Howard. We extend our thanks for these generous gifts.

A recent visitor at the library commented favorably on the collection of curios, which suggests that it has been some time since we have received a gift, or loan for the Curio Cabinet. The gift of jig-saw puzzles for the children's table would also be acceptable.

The library is open Wednesdays from 9 to 5 December, January, February, March; Wednesdays from 12 to 5 April, May, June; Wednesdays from 3 to 8 July, August, September; Wednesdays from 12 to 5 October, November; Saturdays from 2 to 5 throughout the year. The early opening hours on Wednesday is voluntary on Mrs. Greenough's part to better accommodate the school children.

To all who have contributed in any way to our welfare we extend our thanks and appreciation.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

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To the School Board of Newington:

I, herewith, submit to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

During the early autumn of the current year teachers' meetings were held in all towns of the Union to formulate a plan of survey and procedure which would continue for a number of years. By this plan one subject will be surveyed each year to determine our strengths, in order that we may not lose ground, and also to determine those points where gains should be made. As a result of these meetings the work of the school was laid out in five different fields, each field assigned to a definite year for special investigation and endeavor. By vote of all teachers the special field this year is English. To ascertain our present position several tests were given in all schools. By using the results thus obtained we are enabled at once to enter a definite line of advancement. We believe, as a result of this procedure, both the path which we should follow and the ends to be reached will be made more definite.

The statistical report, following shows the data on school attendance. The percent of attendance is 89. This rating should be much improved during the current year, if the school is to do the work of which it is capable. We have two earnest and conscientious teachers who are doing their very best to bring our children the education to which they are entitled. Frequent absences not only react to the detriment of those who are out but hinder the progress of the entire class. I am urging parents to cooperate with us in the attempt to correct this situation. It is a satisfaction to

report that the percent of attendance for the current year (during the fall term) is 93%.

Reports coming to us from Portsmouth High School show uniformly satisfactory work done by our graduates in that school. This is one proof of the good standing of your school. The continued improvement in the morale of the school is very noticeable. The pupils are becoming more in harmony with the purposes of the teachers and the school board.

The cost of education throughout New Hampshire has been materially reduced. The figures of the State Board of Education give the median per pupil cost during the year 1931-1932 as eighty-two dollars and that of last year as seventy-six dollars—a drop of six dollars. It is interesting to note that the drop in school costs in Newington has been six dollars and forty-six cents, proving that we have economized to a degree slightly greater than the state as a whole. Last year the Newington per pupil cost was \$73.07.

### **The Schools and the Depression**

During times of business depression an increasing burden is placed upon the schools, not only to see that the school dollar is economically spent but that the welfare of the children is carefully guarded. The national emergency relief has helped the schools in this latter obligation. Every child in attendance at Newington schools who is underweight, to any appreciable extent, has been furnished one-half pint of milk daily since the first of November. It is expected that this distribution will continue through the present school year. Seventeen children in Newington have received this service. As a result we find these children, practically without exception, gaining in weight and in vitality.

An extension of this service is the distribution of Cod Liver Oil to pupils in need of it. Funds are now



allotted from the Federal Relief Administration for the furnishing of free school lunches to the pupils whose parents are out of work and therefore cannot really afford suitable lunches for their children.

These new activities have placed an added responsibility upon the work of the school nurse. The deciding factor in all cases is the physical welfare of the child. The nurses have willingly given extra time and acquired increased expense to see that all children secure the benefits to which they are entitled.

With the decreasing of hours of labor the schools must pay more attention to education for leisure. One of the best departments in our present schools for such training is Music. Newington is fortunate in having, as its instructor in this subject, Mrs. Poore whose enthusiastic interest in our children is continually evident. To the same purpose, Mrs. Greenough has been generously helpful in allowing us the use of the town library.

I wish to express to you my appreciation of kindly advice and help received from you as a board. My contacts with pupils, teachers and citizens has been uniformly pleasant.

This year we were again most fortunate in having Miss Margaret Pickering to teach the first four grades in school, and Mrs. Marion Kenison for the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

They have both, as usual, lived up to their fine reputations as teachers and we as the school board wish to thank them for their splendid co-operation in every way.

Mrs. Mary Poore has been our musical instructor and, as in the past, has carried on her work most efficiently.

We sincerely wish that the parents would visit the school more often and so check up on the work the children are doing, and to talk over with the teachers any problems they may have.

We also wish the parents would realize the importance and necessity of good attendance of the pupils in order for the teachers to carry on and complete the work required for the year.

Mr. Roy W. Gillmore, our superintendent, has devoted a great deal of time to the school and the unanimous vote for his re-election at the annual meeting in May of the Supervisory Union showed the feeling of the various towns in regard to his fine work.

We have been most fortunate in having Mrs. Angela Dolbec as our school nurse again. With her help we were able to have many of the children in-

We find, according to statistics, that the cost of running our school is much below the average cost and we hope that the people in the community will appreciate this fact.
