

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next. at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Trunk Line with State Aid.

5. To raise and appropriate money to maintain State road other than Trunk Line.

6. To raise and appropriate money to construct State road with State Aid.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.

8. To raise and appropriate money for observance of Memorial Day.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money for White Pine Blister control with State Aid.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money to buy a tractor for running crusher.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate such sum as may be needed to secure continuing State Aid for the improvement of the Brook road between the Trunk Line and the Turnpike, or take any other action regarding the improvement of said road under State aid or otherwise. Or pass any vote relating thereto. 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

Fellow Citizens:

The financial affairs of the little N. H. Republic in which you and I live, have been settled up for the year ending Jan. 31, 1926.

And on the whole have been found to be in quite a satisfactory condition.

Through the efforts of our Representative to the General Court, E. V. Howard, the town received an appropriation from the State of four thousand dollars towards paying the cost of repairing the Conn. River Bridge Pier. This with good results along other lines of activity, makes a very good showing for the town financially.

It seems as though Piermont, situated at the gateway to the White Mountains on the Dartmouth College Boulevard, with its Lake River and Ponds unsurpassed for the beauty of its scenery by few towns in the State, should be an attractive and desirable place, both as place of permanent residence and for summer tourists and visitors.

We have had no destructive storms, no fires and no epidemics of sickness to mar the happiness or healthfulness of our people.

On the whole, general conditions seem to be very good.

One hundred thirty eight (138) Automobile Permits were issued for which the town received \$746.61 net. over and above the Credit Permits.

Sixty five (65) Dog Licenses were issued: 1 Breeders' License; 59 Males and 5 Females. Amount received, \$155.00

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Piermont:

I have the honor to present my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The scholastic and financial years end June 30, and the statistics to which I call your attention are for the year ending June 30, 1925.

At present schools are in session in five different buildings. The teachers are as follows: Village Grammar, Mary Underhill; Primary, Alice Hickey; River Road, Lillian Swain; Brook Road, Mildred Kimball; Clay Hollow, Marjorie Brown; Rodimon, Rena Morriss. I feel that we have a fine teaching force and that good school progress is being made.

There were 103 different pupils enrolled last year. This is 11 more than during the previous year. The attendance averaged 94.8 per cent of the membership. The average for the state for this period was 94.2. The per cent of attendance for the previous year was 91.6. Thus we see that there has been an improvement of 3.2 per cent. The interest shown by the children in the attendance contest has been a large factor in this improvement.

After the experience of last year with the timesaving school calendar, the School Board has adopted a similar one for this year. This plan provides more frequent, but not too long vacations, allowing a week at Thanksgiving, two weeks at Christmas and a week of vacation after each seven weeks of school, for the remainder of the year.

The medical inspection of the school children and the follow up work, has been done by Miss Underhill, the district nurse. Her activities to establish health habits have been a help to the tearchers and of much benefit to the children. The examination of young men for army service at the time of the World War showed that one man out of every three was incapable of service because of physical defects. It was also found that a very great number of these defects could have been remedied in childhood by medical attention. Physical defects when discovered in childhood should receive prompt attention.

A dental clinic was held last Spring. Miss Underhill gave much time to this undertaking and was a large factor in its success. 29 children came for treatment. The work done was as follows—(1) children having their teeth cleaned, 25; (2) 57 teeth were filled; (3) 15 teeth were extracted. The local Red Cross paid for the work done on 9 of the children, We hope it will be possible to have another clinic in the near future.

The Red Cross of this town has given a fine first-aid equipment to each school. The children and teachers have made cabinets to hold the supplies. We wish here to express our appreciation. Now the injuries that the children receive in play, can be cared for at once.

The supervisory activities of the Superintendent have been expended in classroom visits, with follow up interviews, personal conferences and frequent school inspections.

The toilets at the Village are in very poor condition. Some measure must be taken in the near future to remedy this. A majority of schools, similar to ours, have installed chemical toilets and they are without an exception considered entirely satisfactory. Such toilets could be installed without the necessity of making any addition to the present building. I hope it will be possible to install chemical toilets at the Village School, next Summer.

In closing may I express my appreciation of the loyal cooperation of the teachers, the kind and understanding support of the School Board and the cooperative attitude of parents and citizens.
