School Report, 1881.

To the Citizens of Stoddard:—The following is the report of your schools for the year ending March 1, 1881.

In District No. 1, two terms have been taught by Miss Clara I. Gould. Summer term commenced May 3d and continued 8 weeks. Average attendance, 28.7. The winter term commenced Oct. 4th, continued 10 weeks. Average attendance, 38.7. Both terms were successful, the scholars showing marked improvement in their studies.

In District No. 2, the summer term was taught by Miss Etta J. Lowell, commenced May 10, continued 10 weeks. Average attendance 17. The fall term was taught by Miss Ellen H. Rogers. Commenced Aug. 23d and continued 11 week. Average attendance, 19.29. Good progress was made during both terms.

In District No. 3, Miss Mary E. Davis taught the summer term which commenced May 10th and closed June 26—7 weeks' school. Average attendance, 4.6. Fall term commenced Sept. 6th and continued six weeks. Attendance, 3.8. Both terms were successful.

In District No. 5, two terms were taught by Miss Nettie M. Sheldon. Summer term commenced May 3d and continued 8 weeks. Average attendance, 21.13. Fall term commenced Sept. 13th and continued 8 weeks. Average attendance, 24.96. Miss Sheldon has had a very successful school. Teacher and scholars alike deserves our praise.

In District No. 6, Miss Clara E. Lowell has taught three successive terms. The first term commenced May 3d and continued 8 weeks; average attendance 12.7. Second term commenced Sept. 13 and continued 10 weeks; average attendance 11.3.

Third Term commenced Dec. 3 and continued 10 weeks; attendance 13. This district has more school money than any other in town, and the improvement that has been made the past year shows that it has been used to good advantage. Considering the age of the scholars this school is second to none in town, which speaks well for the perseverance of the teacher.

In District No. 8, two terms were taught by Miss Minnie M. Barrett. Summer term commenced May 18th and continued six weeks; average attendance 17.2. Fall term commenced Sept. 20 and continued six weeks; average attendance 15.82. The teacher worked very hard to have a good school, and, considering the difficulties to contend with, was quite successful.

In District No. 9, the summer term was taught by Miss Bell E. Washburn; commenced May 10 and continued six weeks; average attendance 5. Fall term was taught by Miss Kate M. Barrett; attendance 5.1. Good progress was made during both terms.

The schools in town have been very successful during the year. Everything has been quiet and there has been nothing to need the interference of your committee.
