HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Statement Relating to State Aid for Highways in Town of Webster

Under Chapter 29 of the Laws of 1899, towns are required to raise one-fourth of one per cent of their valuation for maintenance of roads, provided, however, that no

town is required to raise an amount exceeding \$50 per mile of road. The valuation of the towns for 1909 and the actual mileage of roads in each town cannot be definately stated at this date, hence the amounts opposite "A" and "C" below are approximate only.

Subject to the above statement, the following amounts relate to the above-named town:

- A. Amount required to be raised nnder the law of 1899, one-fourth of one per cent \$745.14
- B. Additional amount if towns applies for state aid 149.00
- C. Total mininum amount required to be raised for highway purposes if town applies for state aid 894.14

If no application for state aid is made in 1909, the town is required under Section 3 of Chapter 35. Laws of 1905, to set apart and expend for permanent improvement the sum of \$298.00

If the town does apply for state aid under the abovementioned law of 1905, a joint fund for the town is formed, the items of which are as follows:

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

Another year in our school work has passed and gone, and we are again called upon to make out our school report. In doing so we will say that we think the past year has been a success.

Perfect schools are seldom seen. Perfection is difficult of attainment, but we are ever striving for it. A first class school is now and then found in the country as well as in the city. Its pupils may have as keen minds, as good powers of assimilation and far more originality, all of which qualities go to the making of forceful men and women.

Our generals, presidents, and men of affairs are not all nurtured in the hot bed of the city life but more of them grow fresh and vigorous in our small country schools, with their rugged surroundings.

In order to have good schools we must have good teachers. To hire first class teachers, graduates of normal and training schools, requires more money than is at our command.

First class teachers can be obtained and held for any length of time only as wages are reasonably high; otherwise it naturally followes that they seek other and more remunerative fields of labor.

In any school there are a few children able to do two or three times as much work in a given time as others, and yet these two extremes of children must be placed in the same class for the very fact that the teacher does not have time to hear so many classes. For that reason your committee have seen fit to unite several of the schools and grade up the pupils so the teacher could have more time to devote to the several classes.

During the first term of the school year we maintained six schools. One at Putney Hill, Bashan, Sweatts Mills, Pleasant St. Corser Hill, and Little Hill. During the fall and winter terms we maintained four schools only, one at Putney Hill, Bashan, and two on Corser Hill.

By doing this we did not have to pay but four teachers but had to pay for the conveyance of several of the pupils. We leave this matter of uniting the schools with the parents of the pupils. But we as a committee think it was a wise thing to do.

A VITAL QUESTION.

One of the serious problems of the school is that the pupil who, for one reason or another, has fallen behind children of his own age and has lost interest in his school work. Such children often learn with more than the usual dfficulty; somet imes though not lacking in quickness of perception, they are restless and mischievious; while in the case of still others, backwardness is due to frequent absence from school. Pupils who are absent for only a half day do not return to school with quite the same interest. They have lost the connection in their lessons and what is more, the feeling that they should be in school at all times is a little less imperative and its duties rests upon them a little more lightly then before.

He has by degrees become an idler and the small beginning was that first half-days unnecessary absence from school. The remedy in all such cases is to avoid the beginnings of evil; it is very much easier to prevent the formation of a bad habit than to cure one when formed.

With the fifty dollars which was appropriated for repairs we have used as follows: Put a new coat of paint on the school buildings at Putney Hill; a new hard wood floor in Corser Hill school house and a double partition in the same for the purpose of grading the schools and other minor repairs.

During the school year there has been three hundred

and sixty visits made by parents and friends, thirty of these were made by the committee, This shows an interest in the school work for which we thank you all.
